## GEORGE MAHON TO SPEAK IN MULESHOE TUESDAY

July 21 to 27 has been designated "Farm Safety Week" because a million 5 hundred thousand farm people were injured in accidents last year. Forty three hundred farmers were killed in farm homes, in 1944.

Added to these injuries and deaths of farm people are the losses occurring from accidents, including fires. Accidents and fires usually strike 1 out of every 12 farm families. No wonder the people wish to stress farm safety during this specially designated week.

Other survivors include a brother, Archie Page of Park Springs, Texas; a sister, Mrs. Ed Baker of Edin, Okla., and a half brother, Ben Page of Plainview, and six grandchildren.

Mr. Page served as janitor at the grade school here the last two years.

superintendents, or the county superintendent will be glad to furnish parents with the necessary forms. District school trustees have the authority to protest all transfers of students whose grades are taught in the home district. July 31 is the last date for filing transfers, Judge Tate warned.

Contract has been entered by Bailey County Commissioners Court with Crummer & Co., Inc., for purchase by Crummer of \$225,000 road paving bonds, contingent upon their being voted by the people of Road District No. 1.

The Court made the contract now because of the danger that the money market might fluctuate during the next few months and the court saw that it would be advantageous to dispose of the bonds under the prevailing low interest rates. The bonds would bear interest at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent during the first ten years of their life; 2 per cent during the next 14 years and 3 per cent interest during the remainder of their life.

DISTRICT CREATED  
The commissioners court had, upon petition of the voters in precincts 1, 2 and 3, created Road District No. 1 for the purpose of paving 76 miles of farm-to-market roads. The court has routed these proposed roads in such a way as to serve the greatest possible number of people, and every school house in the county with the exception of Longview, would be on one of these roads. They would join roads already paved.

No date has been set for holding the election on the bonds, but it likely will be held within the next 90 days, after all other details have been ironed out. There is not any way in the county a farm-to-market road program involving about 23 miles of paving Bailey County would be very well served by paving when all this work is done, officials pointed out.

Hereford Camp To Be Dismantled

Plans to dismantle prisoner of War Camp, Hereford, Texas and make the salvage lumber and critical building materials available for building under the Veterans Emergency Housing Program are now underway, Harry L. Holliday, Dallas Regional Director of War Assets Administration, announced today.

Sales of the surplus materials will be handled as real property with government agencies, state and local governments, and non-profit institutions, being allowed to exercise their priorities in the above order for the first ten days after the camp buildings are advertised for sale. The facilities being offered are approximately 320 buildings including administrative buildings, barracks, guard towers, quarters, messhalls, etc.—houses and warehouses.

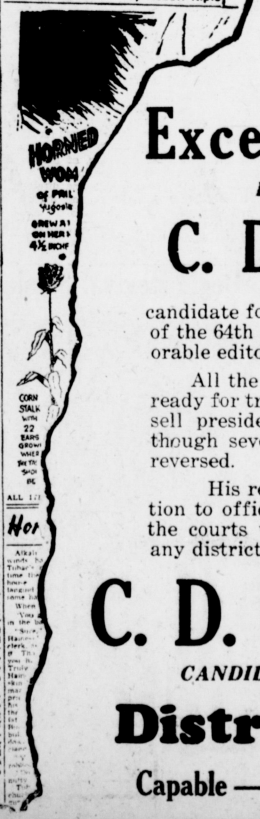

## Good Lighting Adds to Comfortable Living



GOOD home lighting not only adds to cheerful and comfortable living but also provides a cheap form of accident prevention, writes Myrtle Fababender, director of home lighting for Westinghouse in Capper's Farmer, a magazine of national circulation. "To say 'home is what the abe's of good lighting help to make it is to take considerable liberty with a very tender expression," she points out in the magazine read by 1,250,000 farm families. "But it's paraphrasing with real sincerity. For unless a home is cheerful and comfortable by night, as well as during daylight, it has sacrificed some of the livability good lighting can give. Good light can bring an almost sunlight quality of illumination to after-

dark eye tasks. It can make or mar the beauty of a home."

Among the basic principles for good lighting are 1—A carefully thought-out over-all plan for the job; 2—Having enough light when and where you need it; 3—Avoiding harmful glares; 4—Avoiding shadows in the room.

The above photograph demonstrates basic principles for good lighting. The floor and table lamps with reflector bowls give light where the family sits to read, sew or write. Such a pleasing over-all glow of light cheers up the room as sunlight does. Wall brackets and fluorescent tubes placed behind window valances are mainly for decorative effect.

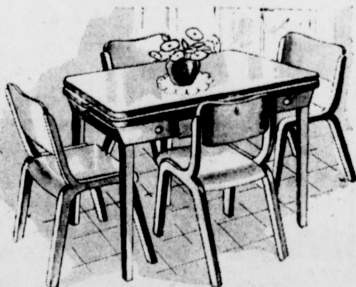

## Search Teams Continue Hunt For Missing

Simultaneous with the release for publication of the names of all Army personnel missing in World War II the War Department announced that search for isolated graves and bodies of military personnel will be continued by the American Graves Registration Commands in every part of the world where troops served. The work is being directed by Major General T. B. Larkin, the Quartermaster General, who also is chief of the Amer-

ican Graves Registration Service. Graves of missing soldiers, particularly fliers who were shot down over enemy territory and buried by civilians, are frequently being located in isolated areas and complete identification established. To find these isolated graves, or even wrecked planes which may still hold the remains of crews, search teams operate in all parts of the world under the American Graves Registration Commands of the overseas theaters.

Upon entering a town the search teams contact the official who corresponds to the mayor of an American city. He assists the clergy and other citizens who have participated in burials. Usually the underground was able to maintain a

record of burials of allied troops and this was turned over to the search teams or they are directed to isolated burial places. In most cases the graves have been marked with the identification tags of the deceased, but sometimes these are missing and identification must be made by other means.

Due to the scientific identification methods utilized, a very small percentage of the bodies in located graves remain unidentified. The slow procedure is to obtain the information about grave locations because of the world wide area to be searched.

Methods rivaling tales of fiction are employed by the Quartermaster Search Teams with the result that comparatively few cases still remain incomplete in the files of the Memorial Division of the Quartermaster Corps. Sometimes when the soldier's identification tag is missing, finger prints or dental charts have been sufficient to establish positive identification. But, in other cases even these have been unobtainable, but no small clue is over-

looked in an effort to establish complete identity. Fragments of letters, a ring, the serial number of a wrist watch and other seemingly inconsequential clues have led to identification after months of tireless search and investigation. No case is considered closed by the Quartermaster Corps until final identification has been made and this work will continue, the War Department states.

Even anthropology is being used where other means fail. By reconstructing the facial contour over the skull, identity has been established in a number of cases. Scientifically measuring bones has made it possible to establish the height of the deceased, and by the condition of the bones to tell the age.

One fruitful lead that has augmented the identification of fliers who have crashed or been shot down in action, comes from the custom of the Air Corps to record the serial number of all guns and instruments installed on each plane. In the case where a badly smashed plane is found it is usually possible to find a part of a machine gun or an instrument bearing a serial number. By checking with the Air Corps, the plane can be identified, and the names of the crew at the time of the last mission established.

## Veterans' News

Q. Can a member of the women's armed services obtain medical aid from the Veterans' Administration in pregnancy cases?

A. Veterans' Administration has ruled that pregnancy is not a disease or a disability but a natural phenomenon or process and therefore is not a responsibility of the government. However, if there are pathological complications, the ex-service woman can receive medical aid.

Q. Can a merchant seaman who is disabled in World War II receive vocational rehabilitation?

A. Not from the Veterans Administration, for the reason that he is not a veteran. He may secure it from the Federal-State rehabilitation program under the Federal Security Administration.

Q. For what purpose are - veter-

can get a guaranteed loan?

A. To buy, build, alter, repair or improve a home; buy a farm, livestock, equipment or supplies or to acquire working capital; construct a farmhouse or other buildings on a farm; repair, alter or improve a farmhouse or outbuildings; improve farm land or equipment; conduct farming operations; purchase stock in a cooperative association where the purchase of such stock is required by Federal law in connection with obtaining a farm loan; buy a business, buy a building or land for business purposes; buy business supplies and inventory; buy machinery, tools and equipment for operating a business; construct, repair or improve a business building or personal property; obtain working capital for a business or profession.

Q. Can a veteran get a guaranteed loan to pay off a debt that is past due?

A. Yes, under certain conditions. Full information may be secured from the lender or from the local VA loan guarantee officer.

Q. What interest rate is charged?

The interest rate on a guaranteed loan cannot exceed 4 per cent. The interest rate on a non-real estate loan which is to be insured for the lender instead of guaranteed may be as much as 5.75 per cent.

What loans can be insured by VA.

A. Any loan eligible for guaranty when made by a supervised lender.

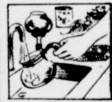

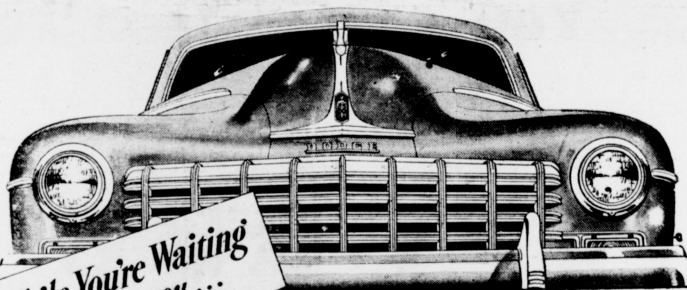

of the Fair, which will be held at the Fair grounds in Lubbock, is October 7-12.

In preparing for the first Panhandle South Plains Fair since before the war, officials announced that the Fairgrounds are being reconditioned, and that buildings are being painted and renovated so that everything will be in top condition when the Fair gets under way. They also disclosed that a carnival, a rodeo and midget auto races have already been lined up for appearance every day of the Fair.

**Traffic Toll Is Increasing**

The national death traffic toll, which is running 47 per cent ahead of a year ago, substantiates the traffic police contention that faulty equipment, as well as carless driving, has turned our streets and highways into vast abattoirs where the innocent, as well as the foolish and ignorant, are needlessly slaughtered.

That is the calculated statement of Robert E. Raleigh, director of the police traffic safety check program being conducted by the International Association of Chiefs of Police, after reviewing preliminary reports from 23 states.

The report to which the IACP official referred, revealed that one out of every three—a total of 35.3 per cent—of the vehicles examined in the first part of the check, failed to meet minimum safety standards.

Out of a total of 183,576 vehicles in 23 states recorded in the pre-

liminary figures, 15.5 per cent had inadequate brakes; 5 per cent defective tires; 22.5 per cent faulty front lights; 29.9 per cent faulty rear or stop lights; 9.5 per cent windshield wipers not working; 8.8 per cent defective horns; and 10.6 per cent other obvious and hazardous defects.

**Eisenhower Report Is "Best Seller"**

General Eisenhower's report as Supreme Commander to the Allied Chiefs of Staff has broken all sales records for documents, the Government Printing Office announced recently.

Over 30,000 copies of the 123 page report covering the operations in Europe were sold the first ten days. Orders are continuing to pour in. For a time 13 additional clerks were needed to open mail.

Printing officials consider the Eisenhower report one of the finest specimens of government printing. The cover is heavy antique paper and features the supreme headquarters shield which is printed in five colors.

As long as the supply is available, copies may be obtained for \$1 from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, 25, D. C.

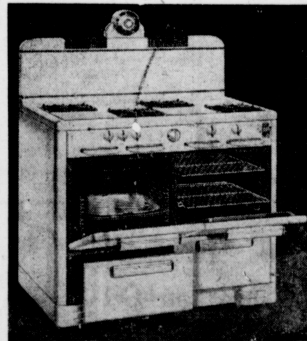
