The doors of Salem Dry Goods opened in Turkey for the first time on April 7, 1938, with Tom and Carrie Nola Salem as owners. This ownership came to an end when the Salems sold the business to their son, Tim Salem, effective the first of January 1977.

Tom Salem grew up in Amarillo and attended Amarillo High School. After graduation, he attended college at Texas Tech in Lubbock. His first line of work was in the oil fields at Wink and Ranger. He later became an employe of a chain store, Heights Department Stores. Tom established a store at Conroe, Texas for Heights Department Chain Stores.

He moved from Conroe to Wellington where he was employed by a department store owned by Enis Schaded. While living in that Miss Carrie Nola Campbell. She was an employee of the Welling-


