## BIKE-A-THON FORMS HANDED OUT AT SCHOOL

Forms for the Cancer Bike-A-Thon to be held June 3 were passed out at school Monday, but you may secure another by contacting Mrs. Degan in the fourth grade. The public will be contacted by a rider before June 3. The rider will ask that a form be signed telling how much the sponsor will pledge for the ride. No less than 20 cents a mile may be pledged, but any amount over that will be gladly accepted. If 20 cents a mile is pledged the sponsor will place \$1.00 in the blank provided. Five miles is the distance to be ridden. No money will be paid until after June 3. All checks will be made to American Cancer Society. Riders will leave City Hall at Turkey at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, June 3. The ride will extend two and a half miles west from City Hall on the Northfield Farm-to-Market Highway. A pickup will follow and drinking water will be furnished at the halfway point. Before he departs the rider will turn in his pledge card with his parent's signature giving him permission to ride. No one will depart until the signal is given, and a slow pace will be maintained. Dr. Peppers will be furnished at the end of the ride.

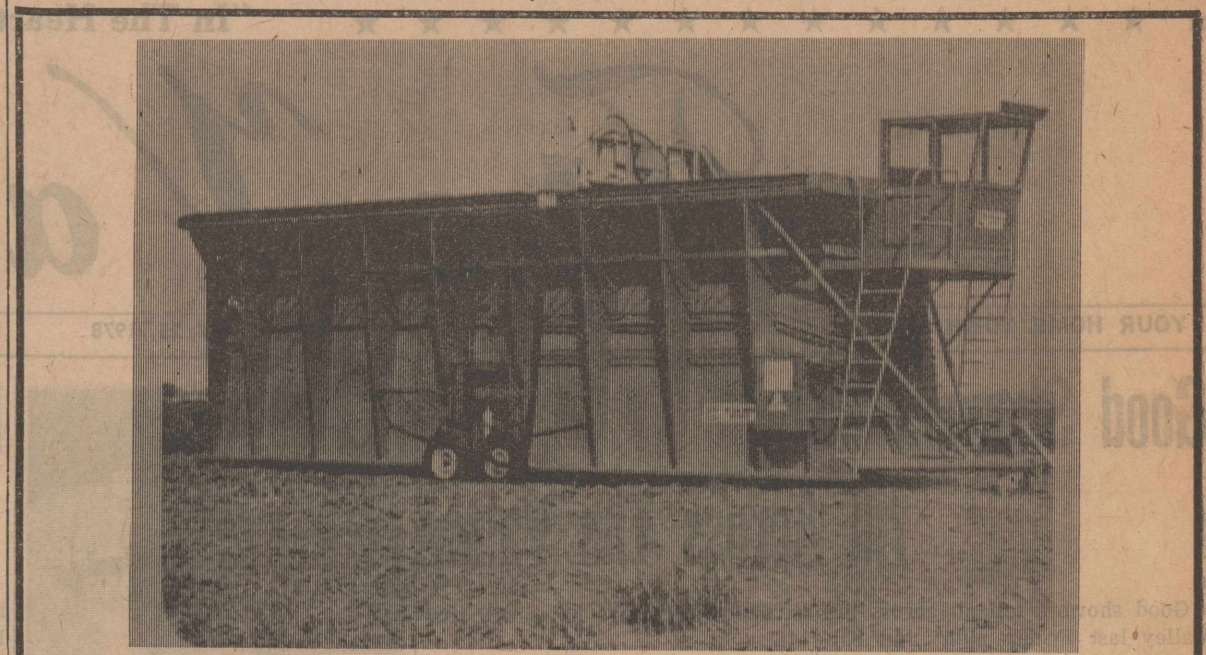

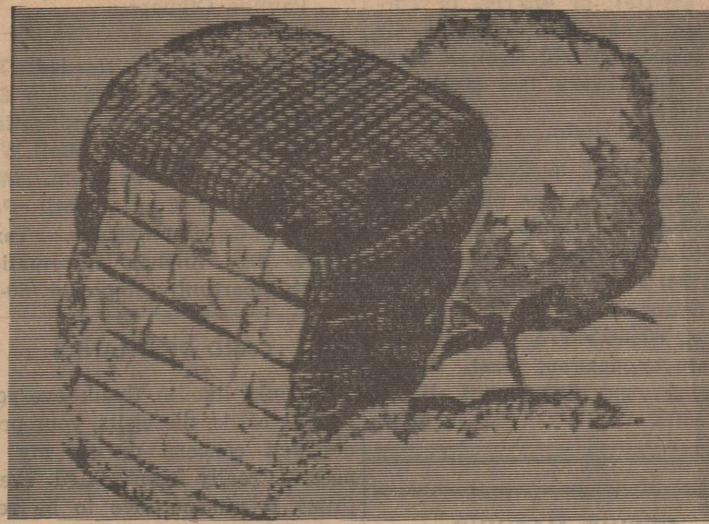

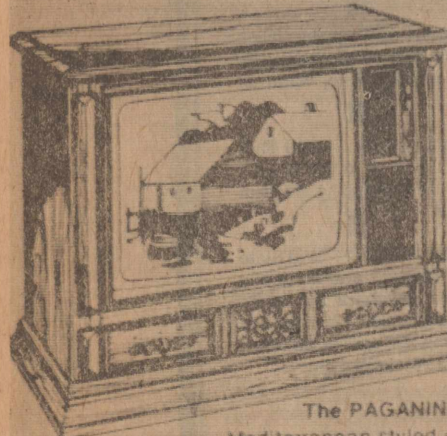
