## About 1450 Voted In Primary Saturday

### Mr. Muleshoe

Water is becoming a scarce article in Muleshoe, right in the heart of a shallow water irrigation belt. However, it isn't a question of the availability of water, it's a problem of storage.

The supply has run so low in the last week or so that W. E. Young, city water superintendent has asked local citizens to reduce their volume of lawn watering so that the Muleshoe Canning Company plant might have a sufficient supply.

The company is running far into the night, sometimes as late as 11 p. m. to keep up with their bean packing. They use lots of water and the plant must be kept going regardless. In this issue of The Journal Mr. Case, the owner, has used advertising space to thank the citizens for their cooperation in this matter.

Mr. Young said he will ask the city commission to publish a notice requesting everyone to stop watering lawns when the fire whistle is blown in a certain manner. During a fire the supply of water is used up rapidly, and all that is available then is what is being pumped.

One can tell when the water reservoir down town is full or empty. When the light on the tank is at the bottom, the tank is full, and vice versa.

Starting in the morning with a full tank and with the pumps going, it is a hard task to keep water on hand. Electricity was off ten minutes Tuesday afternoon and 15 minutes Wednesday morning early while workmen installed new transformers. A half tank was lost during the 15-minute period Wednesday.

The present storage capacity of the Muleshoe water system is only 50,000 gallons, but a concrete reservoir being built now will bring storage potential to 150,000 gallons. Mr. Young believes this is still not enough for a town the size of Muleshoe. It is a fact that many Plains towns are having water troubles during this long drought, particularly early fast growing Amarillo and Lubbock. The latter city is said to have had a critical shortage of water Saturday, and some citizens had to carry water from a distance.

Storage of 150,000 gallons does not sound like too much for Muleshoe, which is growing rapidly. However, for the next few years it should prove sufficient.

I do not intend to press the matter, but the City of Plainview once this writer a five-cent piece. ### Insurance On Wheat Crop Is Available Now

The Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is again offering a three year contract under its All-Risk Policy, to producers who plan to seed wheat this fall, according to Travis A. Winter, administrative officer of the Bailey County Agricultural Conservation Association. All producers who do not already have a wheat insurance contract and plan to seed any wheat this fall should investigate the possibilities of this insurance coverage. If a producer desires his wheat protected under this insurance contract prior to August 31 or before he seeds the wheat which ever date occurs first.

The County ACA office is now in position to accept applications for this all-risk insurance from producers who desire its protection, according to Travis A. Winter. Progress is being made on submitting cotton crop insurance acreage reports to the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. Most of these reports have been submitted and producers have had a loss on their cotton crop and were covered by cotton crop insurance will start making claims for their indemnities next week, according to Travis A. Winter, administrative officer, Bailey County ACA.

# Proposed Constitutional Amendments

**H. J. R. NO. 10**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows: "Sec. 62. (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall be printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

"According to an opinion by the Attorney General of Texas.

**H. J. R. NO. 49**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds of warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot to be used for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants, to be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county and the percentage allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall be printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing, and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds of warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand

of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and "AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand

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**A JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

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Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand

(\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

### Boxing Tourney Set At Plainview

Plainview will be the scene of another three-day boxing tournament early in August when the Plainview Junior Chamber of Commerce plays sponsor in a regional TAAF elimination contest. Max Peret, named as chairman of the event, reports. Young leather slingers from all parts of West Texas will enter the contests here to be staged out doors under lights at the football field Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, August 5, 6 and 7.

Winners in the eight weight classes in the Plainview tournament will be eligible for compensation in the Texas State TAAF boxing tournament scheduled for August 14, 15 and 16 at Fort Worth.

dition to the regular cash prize and ribbons, the American Quarter Horse Association and the National Quarter Horse Breeders Association are both offering special prizes this year for top winners in the show. All quarter horses that are registered or eligible for registry in any recognized breed association are eligible for entry in the show.

The Veterans Administration has signed a contract with the Texas State Pharmaceutical Association to provide "home town" prescription service to veterans with service-connected disabilities.

"The service will be available to disabled veterans as soon as the state association works out administrative details with more than 1,000 member druggists in Texas," Dr. Lee D. Cady, VA's Medical Director, said.

Under the new project eligible veterans simply take their prescriptions to their neighborhood drug store the VA pays the bill. Formerly, they had to be mailed.

A similar contract is being sought in Louisiana and Mississippi.

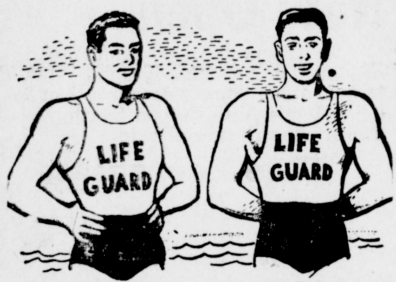

## 152 Million Units Surplus Are Sold

Approximately 152 million units of surplus consumer goods, ranging from household appliances to fence posts, have been disposed of in more than 140 nationally-conducted sales programs completed to date. War Assets Administration announced today.

On the basis of figures received from its 33 regional offices, WAA estimated that the goods, which cost the government about \$188,000,000, brought an average return of more than 47 per cent. Most of the items were in new condition and, in some instances returned full OPA prices, WAA said.

In many of the sales, orders received exceeded the quantities of goods available by as much as 100 to 900 per cent WAA reported. In all the sales the complete inventories were disposed of. However, WAA said, this does not mean that surpluses of these items no longer exist. Additional stocks of many of the items have been declared surplus since the sales were conducted.

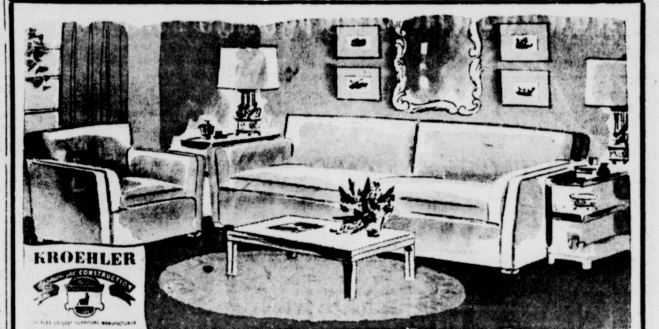

Q. May a veteran pay off a guaranteed loan before it becomes due?  
A. Yes, the regulations give the veteran that right.  
Q. Can a guaranty be obtained if the proceeds are to be used by a minor or a person under legal disability?  
A. This can be done only if the loan and liens are valid under the state law governing the transaction. Many states have enacted with, and injuries occur when persons and for the wives of veterans

who are minors to enable them to make such loans.

Q. May widows or children of deceased veterans obtain guaranty of loan?  
A. No. The privilege is limited to veterans. A guaranty on a loan may continue, however, after the veteran's death.

Q. Are veterans of World War I eligible for benefits under the Act?  
A. No. Its benefits are for World War II veterans only.

Q. If a loan is for farming purposes, must the veteran live on the farm?  
A. No, but the Act requires that he actually conduct the farming operations.

Q. Is there any limit on the size of the loan?  
A. No. The limit is on the amount which may be guaranteed or insured.

Q. May funds from a guaranteed loan be used to pay operating expenses on a farm?  
A. Yes.

Q. Must a veteran put any of his own money into a business, a home or a farm in order to get the guaranty?  
A. No. This is not a requirement for guaranty or insurance. It is a question which is settled with the lender. The only bearing it has on the guaranty or insurance of a loan is that in the case of a farm or a business it may affect the likelihood of the veteran's success in the venture.

Q. May a loan to buy an automobile or truck be guaranteed or insured?  
A. Yes, but only if the automobile or truck is necessary to the conduct of the veteran's own business or farming operations, or the conditions of his employment require that he have such a vehicle for use in carrying on his work for use in carrying on his work but not merely for transportation.

## Safety In Handling Stock

**COLLEGE STATION.**—Crowding pens and loading chutes will prevent many unnecessary injuries to farm people in handling livestock, says Dr. E. A. Grist, veterinarian for Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

The use of practical handling facilities will enable the person working the stock to get the job done better as well as ward off personal injuries. By handling cattle in small, improperly fenced pens, farm people receive too many unnecessary injuries, Dr. Grist says. Crowding pens and loading chutes will prevent being shoved against a fence or kicked severely.

Dr. Grist recommends dehorning cattle, as a protection to the worker as well as other cattle. Long tusks on old boys are another dangerous weapon, and should be clipped. A rug should be put in the nose of the old bull, and he should be handled at all times as if he were dangerous. Nervous or excited livestock might be marketed as these are the animals the worker will most likely lose patience with, and injuries occur when patience is lost.

The job of doctoring livestock is particularly dangerous when old strong arm cowboy tactics are used. Farm workers should check the facilities for doing the job at hand. Convenience and practicability have much to do with farm safety.

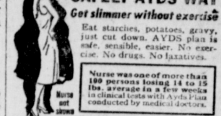

#### NO WHEAT MARKETING QUOTAS ON NEXT CROP

There will be no wheat marketing quotas on acreage allotments during the 1946-1947 wheat production and marketing season according to officials of the United States Department of Agriculture. The Agricultural Adjustment Act provides for marketing quotas when the wheat supply exceeds a normal year's domestic consumption and exports by more than 35 percent. This is calculated at 1,250,000,000 bushels. According to present expectations, the 1947-1948 wheat supply plus carry-over stocks will be less than this figure.

## USDA Buys 224 Cars Potatoes

U. S. Department of Agriculture purchased 224 carloads of potatoes from Texas farmers during June under the 1946 support price program and buying now is underway in the Hereford-Plainview area. B. F. Vance, state director, Production and Marketing Administration announced.

Purchases for the month include 183 cars in the San Antonio producing area and 45 cars from East Texas. A total of 453 cars (at the close of business July 16) have been purchased in the state since June 5, 1946, he said.

These potatoes, which will not be returned to overcrowded consumer markets, are being sold to industrial concerns and distributed to community school lunchrooms and institutions, Vance said.

USDA is authorized under the Steagall amendment to purchase certain agricultural commodities, which include potatoes, when they come to market in such abundance that glut occurs and farm prices fall below guaranteed levels, the State PMA director explained. This often occurs during a crop year when seasonal products, especially perishable vegetables, are harvested faster than normal consumer outlets can handle.

Marketing assistance offered North Texas farmers during the month resulted in purchase and movement of 65 cars of onions, which also will be distributed to limited outlets, Vance said.
