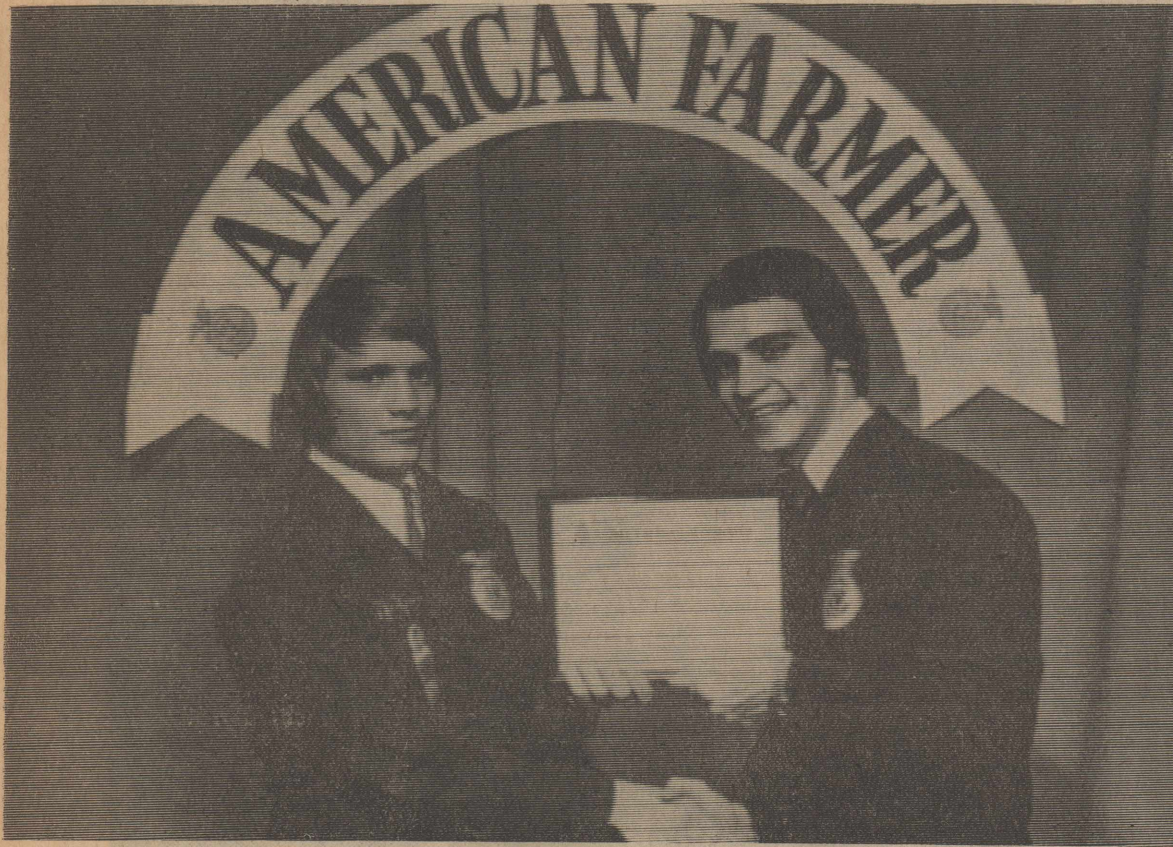

The American Farmer Degree is the highest degree of membership in the FFA. It was presented to 807 FFA members during their Golden Anniversary Celebration at the 1978 National Convention held in Kansas City, Missouri, November 7-10.

Jeff Tiffin Receives Highest Degree

Jeff Tiffin, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Ray Tiffin of Silverton, received the American Farmer Degree November 9 at ceremonies held during the Golden Anniversary National Convention of the Future Farmers of America, in Kansas City, Missouri. He was one of 807 FFA members selected to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree of membership in the FFA. As a holder of the American Farmer Degree, he joins a select group representing about one percent of all the nation's FFA members.

Tiffin, who completed the requirements for the American Farmer Degree while a student at Valley High School, now farms

near Silverton. Each American Farmer Degree recipient is presented a gold key and certificate by the Future Farmers of America, this year celebrating their 50th year. They also receive a cash award for travel to Kansas City and attend a breakfast in their honor both of which are co-sponsored through the National FFA Foundation, Inc., by J. I. Case Co. of Racine, Wisconsin; Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. of Des Moines, Iowa; The Federal Land Bank Systems of the United States; Amoco Oil Co. of Chicago, Illinois, and The Chevrolet Motor Division, General Motors Corporation of Detroit, Michigan.

The American Farmer Degree is the highest degree of membership in the FFA. It is presented only by the National Organization of the Future Farmers of America to members who have demonstrated exceptional agricultural and leadership ability. State FFA Associations may submit candidates for the American Farmer Degree based on total FFA membership in the state. The 807 members awarded the American Farmer Degree this year represent the highest achievement of more than 507,000 FFA members in almost 9,000 high school vocational agriculture departments.

All the FFA members who receive the American Farmer Degree begin as "Greenhands." After at least one semester of vocational agriculture, members may be advanced by the local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer." The third degree, that of "State Farmer," is presented by the State FFA Association. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree.

In addition to having earned the State Farmer Degree, candidates for the American Farmer Degree must have been active members of the FFA for at least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities and they must have completed all of the vocational agriculture instruction offered in their high school. American Farmer applicants must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts and they must have demonstrated leadership and cooperation in student, chapter, and community activities.

The National FFA Convention is an annual event of the Future Farmers of America and is carried

The Valley High Patriots opened their district schedule five weeks ago by taking a 42-0 win over Nazareth. Friday night the Patriots, having already won the Zone title, wound up the schedule with a convincing 41-0 win over the Claude Mustangs, setting up an encounter with the Amherst Bulldogs tonight (Thursday) in Bulldog Stadium in Plainview for the District 2-B title. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

The game matches an unbeaten team with only a tie with a Class A team to mar its season record.

with another team that has lost only one game. Valley has won eight games and tied one of a nine-game schedule, while Amherst has won nine and lost 28-0 to Wilson in the third week of the season. Since that time the Bulldogs have won seven games in a row. Since Valley's first four opponents were Class A schools it would appear that the Patriots have played a tougher schedule.

The Patriots have proven themselves to be real stingy on defense. Their nine opponents have scored a total of only six touchdowns and a total of 42 points. The Patriots have scored 256 points against their nine opponents. In district play, the Patriots have given up only 18 points. Valley scored 162 points in district play.

Coach Giddens reports that the Bulldogs will be "big, tough and mean." A tackle, Gayle Robertson, is 6-7 and weighs 310 pounds. The wishbone operating offense of the Bulldogs features two players named Johnson, Ronald and Wayne, who will draw a lot of attention by the defense. It is likely to be quite a ballgame. Valley, of course, has a very explosive offense that is likely to erupt on any play and any one of the backs is capable of making the big play. All of the backs have scored. The biggest threat, of course, is Darrell Dowd, and he will be the marked man in the Valley offense. Opponents cannot afford to concentrate on him entirely, though, for if given a step, opponents are not likely to catch James McNary and he has several long touchdown runs to his credit this year. So the Patriots can score and quickly, too.

The Patriots returned to earlier season form against Claude. Darrell Dowd was injured in the second quarter against Silverton, did not play against Motley and only in the second half against Happy. Rodney Carpenter quarterbacked the Patriots almost all the way against Claude while Kirk Proctor sat out most of the game with an injured elbow. However, Rodney ran the team well and to cap it all off, intercepted a Claude pass in the fourth period and ran it 90 yards for a touchdown. Coach Giddens reports that Proctor's elbow is still sore but he will be ready to play Thursday.

The Patriots moved the ball pretty well after taking the game-opening kickoff. The Patriots moved steadily downfield picking up a couple of first downs in the process. Valley failed to pick up a first down at the Claude 23 and

the ball went over to the Mustangs. Valley stopped the Mustangs after they had picked up one first down. This was the story of the first period and at the close of the quarter, Valley owned the ball at the Claude 29. When the second quarter play began, Helms was given the ball on the first play and he picked up 14 yards on the carry. On the next play, he was given the ball again, and Kenneth wasn't stopped until he had the Patriots' first touchdown of the night. Proctor kicked the PAT and Valley led 7-0.

Just minutes later, Darrell Dowd put the Patriots on the scoreboard again when he went 25 yards for the touchdown and Proctor kicked the point after once again and Valley led 14-0. James McNary got loose for a 20-yard touchdown run and Proctor added another point after to make the tally 21-0 at halftime.

In the third quarter the Patriots continued to dominate the game and managed to score four touchdowns, two of which counted. For fans who missed the game it happened like this: the Patriots had a first and goal inside the ten yard line. Dowd went to for the touchdown but a Patriot was caught clipping and the play was called back and Valley was penalized 15 yards. On the next play Valley once again went in for the score and this time the score counted and once again Proctor kicked the point after. Score 28-0. Kenneth Helms scored on a 36 yard run to run the tally to 35-0 as the third period was over.

Rodney Carpenter scored his TD when he intercepted a pass and ran it back 91 yards for the TD. Proctor missed his only try for point after for the night to make the final score 41-0, next-to-highest total score of the season for Valley. Valley scored 42 points against Nazareth. Coach Giddens could have let the Pat-

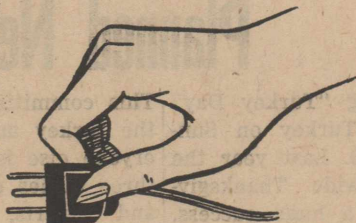

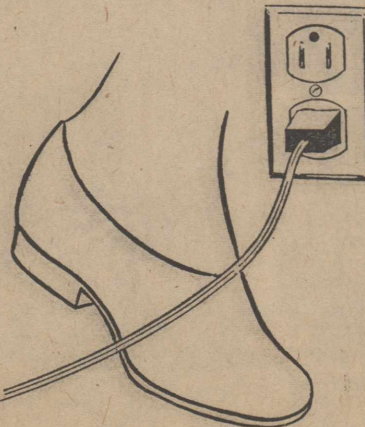
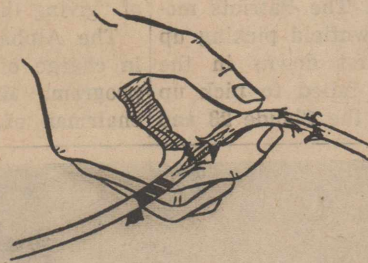

Reddy's tips on electric safety



- ★ When disconnecting an appliance, don't pull cord; pull plug.
- ★ Be sure each appliance has the type of cord suited to the job it does — heavy duty extension cords for power tools; moisture resistant cords and plugs for outdoor equipment.

- ★ Have frayed cords replaced promptly.
- ★ Water conducts electricity; never handle electric appliances or switches with wet hands or when standing on a wet surface.
- ★ If an appliance has a separate cord, attach cord to appliance before plugging it into an outlet; disconnect cord from outlet before disconnecting it from appliance. Store cords away from cutlery, heat and dampness.



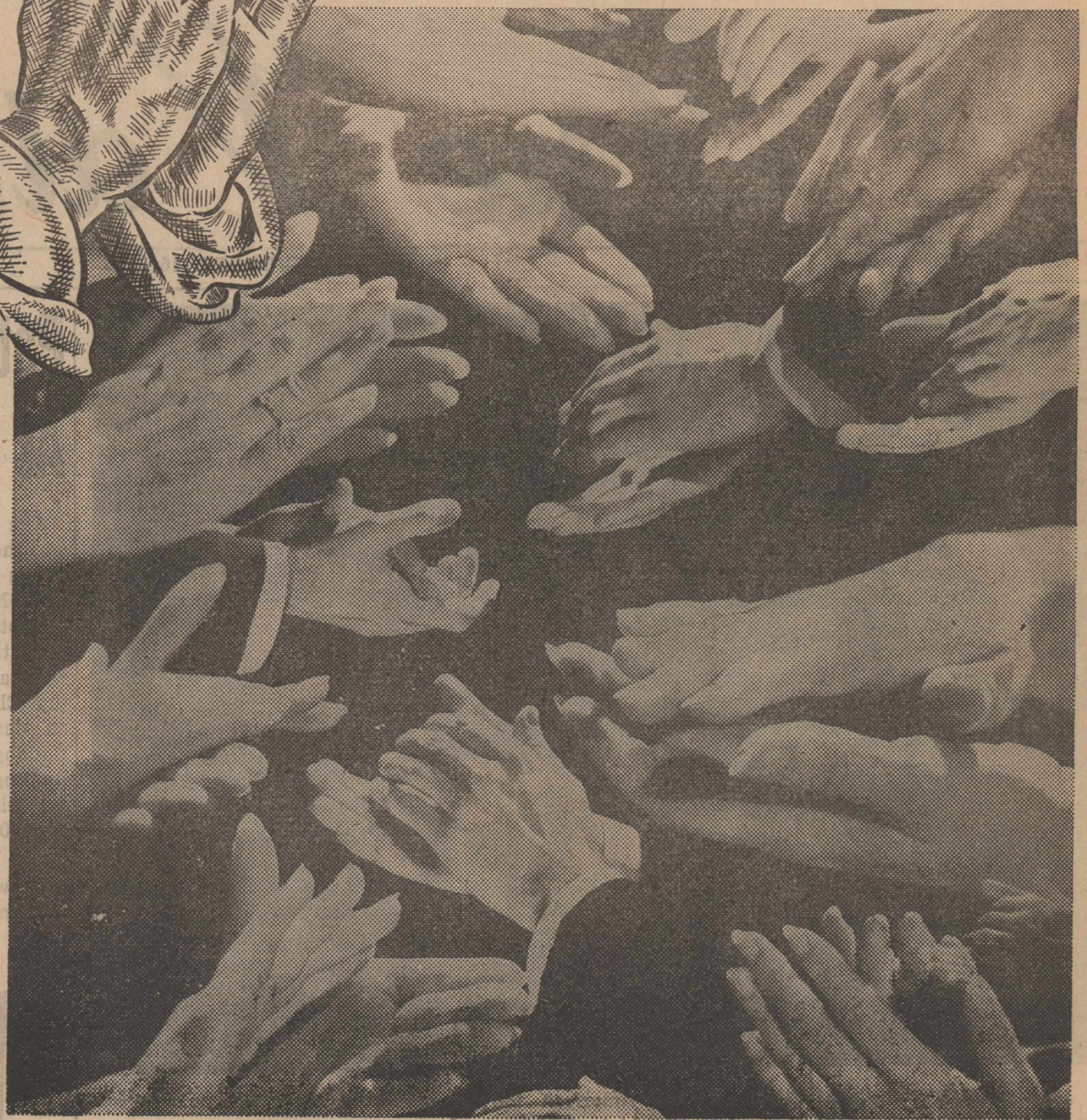
- ★ Don't place cords where they'll be tripped over or be subject to wear (under a well-travelled rug, through doorways).
- ★ Teach children not to play with or around electric sockets or equipment.
- ★ Don't use an electric lawn mower or hedge clippers when barefoot, or on wet grass or hedges.

COVER CROPS HELP CONTROL EROSION

Farmers in the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District can protect their land from wind and water erosion by having a good cover crop, according to Phil Jones, Soil Conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service in Memphis.

Interseeding rye and winter peas in cotton will make a lot of difference in the lands' ability to absorb water and avoid runoff and washing. The rye and winter peas also add organic matter and

humus to the soil. Putting cotton burrs on the land is another alternative that will help the farmer receive the maximum production from his land while conserving the soil.

Maximum return on every gallon of irrigation water has been the topic of many hours of research by agricultural agencies the past 2 years.
As fuels grow higher in cost and equipment and its repair grows higher again the farmer and rancher must change procedures and habits.
To explain a few, just 5 years ago it was economically feasible to irrigate grasses to run cattle on. Then the price of cattle broke making it impossible to make money even pasturing cattle on dry grass and of course a big loss if you watered grass for pasture. For cash crop irrigation the farmer has had to use almost perfect timing and the water very conservative to make grain crops pay.
The agricultural experiment stations over the area have spent many hours these last two years developing the best methods to make irrigation pay. They have worked on everything from skip row planting to the use of smaller amounts of water at the right time. It would be wise for irrigation farmers to go spend a little time with the fellows at the experiment station if you haven't already before you set up your watering program this year.
