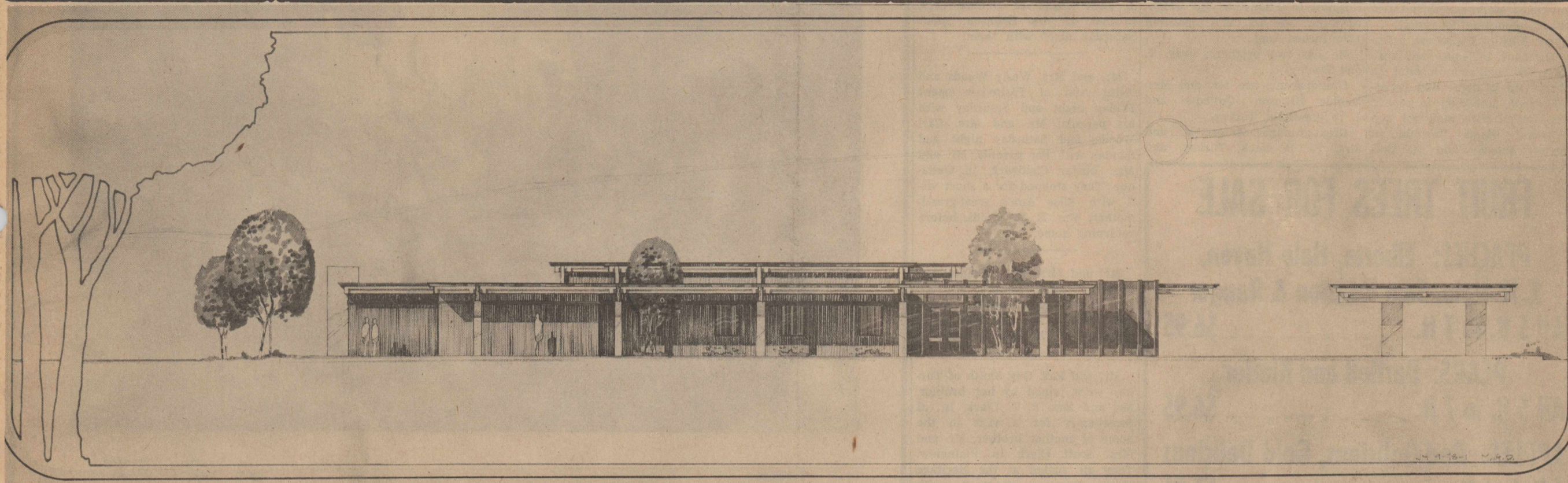

Pictured above is the architect's drawing of the proposed new First National Bank building in Quitaque, Texas. Whitaker & Hall, architects and engineers of Lubbock, are in charge of the plans. The new bank will be located just east of the Assembly of God Church between Third and Fourth Streets on East Main. It will be located on the space formerly occupied by Phillips "66" Station and King Machinery Company. That space is being cleared at present and plans are for actual construction to begin in the near future.

Season Nears End For Valley Basketball Teams

Valley High hosted Nazareth in a three-game series here Tuesday night, but salvaged only one game out of the three, that one a 44-30 JV boys game. Only one game is left on the regular schedule, that with Silverton to be played here Friday night.

The two-time Class B State Champion Swiftettes took a 58-39 win over the Valley girls and remained unbeaten in district play. Although the champions led all the way, the Valley girls never quit and the winners worked for what they got. Nazareth led 14-6 at the end of the first quarter, 24-14 at half-time, 48-25 at the end of three periods. It was not until the closing minutes of the fourth quarter that the Nazareth coach pulled his starters.

The scoring for Valley was as follows: Lisa Herrington, 10 points; Mary McNary, nine; Jenny Clay, eight; Peggy Shannon, six; Paula Lipscomb, four, and Laura Eudy, two points. The Valley girls made three of only four free shots awarded them by the boys in stripes while the Nazareth girls made only seven of 17 free throws. According to this reporter's bookkeeping the Valley girls were fouled 16 times while Nazareth drew only seven.

The boys game was won by Nazareth 42-37 and was very close all the way. At one point Valley led by seven points, and at one time the Swifts were also ahead by seven. Most of the way, however, only two or three points separated the two teams. At the end of the first period, Nazareth owned a 13-9 lead, but in the second period Valley out-scored the Swifts and led 19-18 at half-time. About mid-way in the third quarter, they increased their lead to 33-26, only to see the Swifts rally to narrow the gap to one point at the end of the third quarter. Neither team could do much scoring in the final period of play. With 3:32 left to play, Nazareth had a 36-35 lead, and from there they made only free shots. The Swifts were stalling and the Valley boys were fouling, trying to get the ball, but the Swifts managed to hang on for the win.

Once again the Valley boys were getting the shots but their shots simply wouldn't go down. Kenny Chandler led all scorers with 19 points. Kirk Proctor scored six points; Jon Davidson, five points; Terry Brittain, four; Rod Carpenter, two, and Richie Fuston, one point. Free throws made the difference in this one, too. The Patriots sank three of only five shots awarded them by the referee,

while the Swifts made 10 of 14 shots.

Friday night of last week, Valley drove to Happy for three games and won all three of them. The first game saw the junior varsity girls win 25-20.

The Valley varsity girls took a 53-25 win over the Cowgirls. For the first 10 minutes of the game it was close. At the end of the first period it was 10-8 with Valley owning the lead. Happy tied the score 10-10 as the second period opened and it was tied again at 12-12 but at that point the Cowgirls went ice cold and did not score again in that quarter, and Valley led 24-12 at half-time. The Cowgirls continued cold in the third quarter and again scored only four points and trailed 37-16 at the end of three periods of play. Coach Tandy Medford played all her squad, and still the Patriots won 53-25. Brenda Coker led all scorers with 11 points, Paula Lipscomb and Peggy Shannon scored 10 points each. Jenny Clay added eight points, while Lisa Herrington, Laura Eudy and Jandy Turner scored four points each, and Mary McNary hit for two.

The boys game was a good one, but the Patriots got a small measure of revenge for an earlier defeat at the hands of the Cowboys and hung on for a 49-47 win. Valley scored first to open the game, but it was just about shot for shot throughout the first quarter. The score was tied four times throughout the first period, but Valley went ahead 18-14 at the end of the first period. Neither team could score much in the second quarter but Valley led 24-22 at half-time. The Patriots increased their lead to five points, 38-33, at the end of three quarters of play. Valley increased its lead to seven points early in the final period of action, only to see the Cowboys rally but the Patriots managed to hang on for the win.

The Patriots played well, the offense was more disciplined for the most part, working for the good shot while playing good defense. Kenny Chandler hit for 16 points, Terry Brittain, who had one of his better nights in all around play, scored 12 points, Jon Davidson hit for 10 points, Rod Carpenter scored four points and Kirk Proctor scored one point.

Free shooting was the difference in this ball game as the Patriots scored 10 free shots and missed only one, according to this reporter's bookkeeping. The Cowgirls outscored them from the field.

Washington Trippers Call For Help

Mrs. Jack (Johnnie) Pigg of Quitaque called the Tribune Tuesday, February 6, at noon asking for help. She and her husband are two of the many farmers of the nation who are in Washington trying to get help for the farmers nationwide. Mrs. Pigg asks everyone at home and in the area and those you can contact in any way to send them help by calling your representatives, senators, or anyone you know who may get help to them.

She said the police have them penned in a mall with every kind of vehicle so that no tractor, car, pickup or camper can move. They have no water, fuel, and many of the necessities, and there are men, women, children (including babies) in Washington. Much of this has been seen on television, but when people from home are experiencing it, it is brought closer to home. They reported they have been in tear gas themselves, have seen windows and windshields broken from tractors, sticks used on the men in the tractors, guns pulled on them, two men hospi-

talized, and one woman photographed was reported to have been hit in the stomach with a club by a policeman. A man from Childress had his windshield broken on his tractor.

The riot squad, SWAT, is harassing the farmers. The police are using dogs, mounted police, and every means to hinder the farmers from their objective. At one time they discovered a policeman dressed as a farmer breaking glass on the vehicles. (Is this AMERICA?)

At the time Mrs. Pigg called the Tribune, they had just come out of a meeting with Senators Tower and Bentsen, senators from Texas, and Mrs. Pigg states both senators promised their support in trying to get the bill passed that will aid the farmers. She asked that everyone at home call your senators, representatives, and anyone who can help. This is the "last straw" for some of the farmers across the nation, she says. She asks for all manner of news media to help get the word around that they need help.

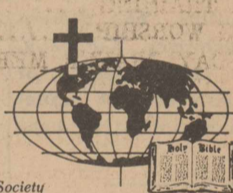
Is there life on other planets in other galaxies out there? This is a question we ask with increasing frequency these days. When God made our world, was it the only one He fashioned?

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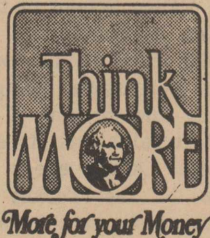

HALL COUNTY OFFICIALS PREPARE CIVIL DEFENSE PLAN OF ACTION

Officials of Hall County have prepared a plan to accommodate persons who might be evacuated here from a nearby high risk or primary nuclear target area in the event of a threat of an enemy attack.

High risk areas consist of high value military installations, key industrial, transportation and logistics facilities, and high population concentrations, County Judge Lester Campbell stated.

The program involved is called Crisis Relocation. It is based on the premise that a nuclear attack on the United States would most likely be preceded by a series of crises and by a sharp deterioration in our relations with the Soviet Union.

Under such circumstances, implementation of Crisis Relocation would call for the relocation of part of the population of Fort Worth to this area. Approximately 14,000 people from Fort Worth would be routed to Hall County.

The plan likely would be initiated by the Governor acting at the request of the President of the United States. It would require from one to three days for orderly accomplishment.

Extensive study and effort by the state civil preparedness office has resulted in the designation of this community as a host, or reception area for high risk relocatees. Local government officials have agreed with this decision.

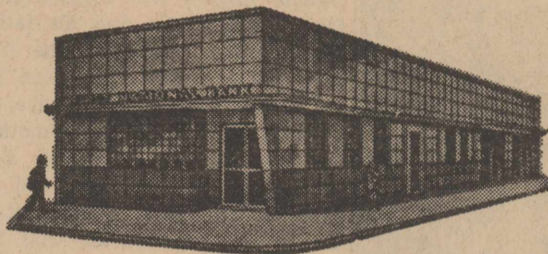
Under the plan, as many as two or three relocatees for each person now residing here will require care and assistance for one to several weeks.

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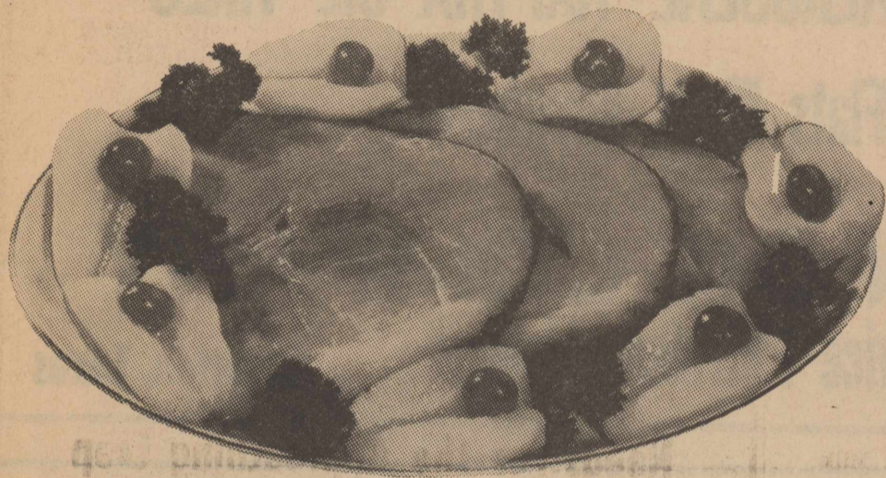

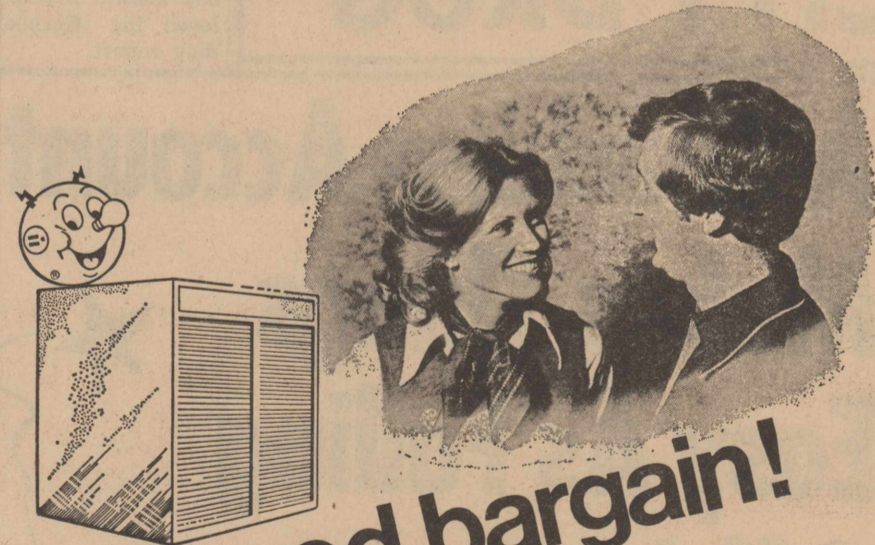
