Texas' Cherry Blossom Princess Alison Hightower, daughter of Congressman and Mrs. Jack Hightower of Vernon, joined her parents in Washington for the week-long Cherry Blossom Festival activities which began with the lighting of the ancient Japanese Lantern at the Tidal Basin Monday evening and ended Saturday night with the 1979 National Cherry Blossom Ball.

The Japanese cherry trees, 3,000 of them donated to this country in 1912, were in full bloom providing a fragile and fragrant setting of pastel pink for the opening ceremony and the presentation of Princesses, representing the 50 State Societies which have organizations in the nation's Capitol.

The first night ceremonies were followed by a reception for Princesses and their families at the Japanese Embassy. During other mid-week activities the Princesses were presented at a Congressional Reception and Luncheon Fashion Show at the Shoreham Americana Hotel. They enjoyed a private tour of the White House where President and Mrs. Carter greeted them, a tour of the Washington

National Cathedral, the Smithsonian, the State Department, and other points of interest in Washington.

Each Cherry Blossom Princess exchanged gifts representative of her state. Miss Hightower's gifts to the other Princesses were a miniature bale of cotton and a Texas-manufactured game.

Miss Hightower, a Baylor University freshman, was honored Thursday night at a reception on Capitol Hill, hosted by her parents, Congressman and Mrs. Jack Hightower.

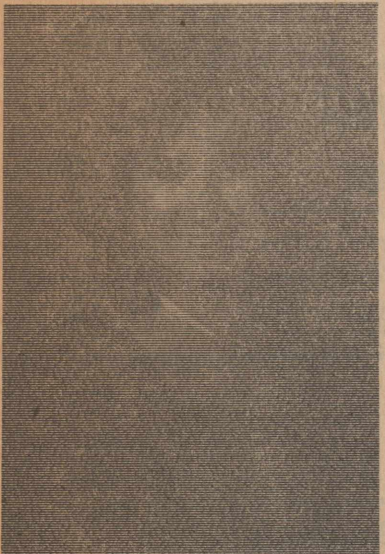

**Crop, Livestock
Reports Needed**

During late May and June, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaires and interviews provides the basis for determining the acreage devoted to the various crops and mid-year livestock numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Crop and livestock reports provide a dependable, unbiased picture of Texas' most important industry—agriculture. The estimates in these reports are tools to help farmers and ranchers work out their planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing and marketing plans.

Farm organizations and legislatures use them in planning programs. The estimates are also used in establishing the various government program acreage and payment levels to farmers for the state and county.

Extension economists and private farm and ranch management consultants use them as a basis for advising farmers and ranchers.

Exporters use them in planning and promoting the sale of agricultural products abroad.

Prompt and accurate completion of the survey forms provides for more reliable estimates and helps to reduce survey costs.

All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

This is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Economics, Statistics and Cooperative Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

FERTILIZE LAWNS

A continuous supply of nitrogen through the growing season is the key to maintaining a healthy, dark green lawn.

This calls for applying fertilizer in the early spring at six- to eight-week intervals. If "slow release" nitrogen materials are in the fertilizer, use higher application rates to extend the interval between uses.

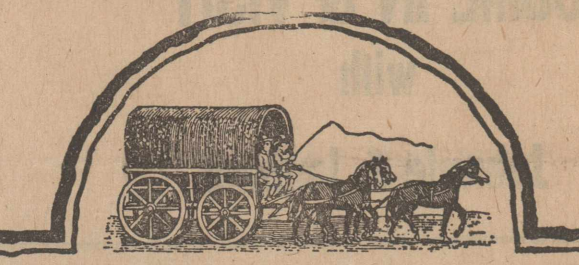
Each application of fertilizer should supply one to two pounds of nitrogen for every 1,000 square feet. The amount of fertilizer needed depends on the analysis shown on the bag. For example, 21-0-0 is ammonium sulfate which contains 21 percent nitrogen (N) and no potassium (K) or phosphorus (P). To get the needed two pounds of nitrogen, apply 10 pounds of ammonium sulfate. (10 x .21 = 2.1)

Use fertilizer containing phosphorus and potassium in the spring or spring and fall. The P and K levels in soil build up after such fertilizers are used for several years. Therefore, only annual maintenance amounts are needed.

Lack of nitrogen reduces leaf chlorophyll, resulting in light green or yellow grass. However, other causes of this condition include disease or insect damage, iron chlorosis or acidity.

Iron chlorosis is common on St. Augustine grass growing on alkaline soils. Information about soil testing and lawn fertilization can be obtained at my office in the basement of the Briscoe County court house.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The City of Turkey has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for Nitrate specified by the Department's "Drinking Water Standards" which were promulgated as required by the "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 93-523 (U.S.).

The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water we supply was reported to be 14.9 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of six months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of six months may reduce its available oxygen supply and possibly produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water, such as bottled water, for their infants under six months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation.

Caution: DO NOT BOIL YOUR WATER. Boiling the water will increase the concentration of Nitrate.

The City of Turkey has applied to the Texas Department of Health for an exemption from the Nitrate requirement while we search for alternate sources of supply and investigate available treatment techniques which would lower the Nitrate to an acceptable level. In the meantime, please follow the precautions mentioned.
