Eva Cheatham of Quitaque has been appointed to the Mission Service Corps of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Miss Cheatham, 22, is a graduate of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William S. Cheatham and is a member of the First Baptist Church in Quitaque. She will serve as part of a

Mission Service Corps Brazil Team for one year in Brazil. Miss Cheatham and about 25 other young adults will work with Brazilian college students in evangelism and local church programs. The team will arrive in Brazil in July.

FLEA MARKET

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PLANT POPULATION AFFECTS YIELD AND BOLL WEEVIL

The optimum cotton plant stand will not only affect the yield but it can also cause increased boll weevil numbers in the fall.

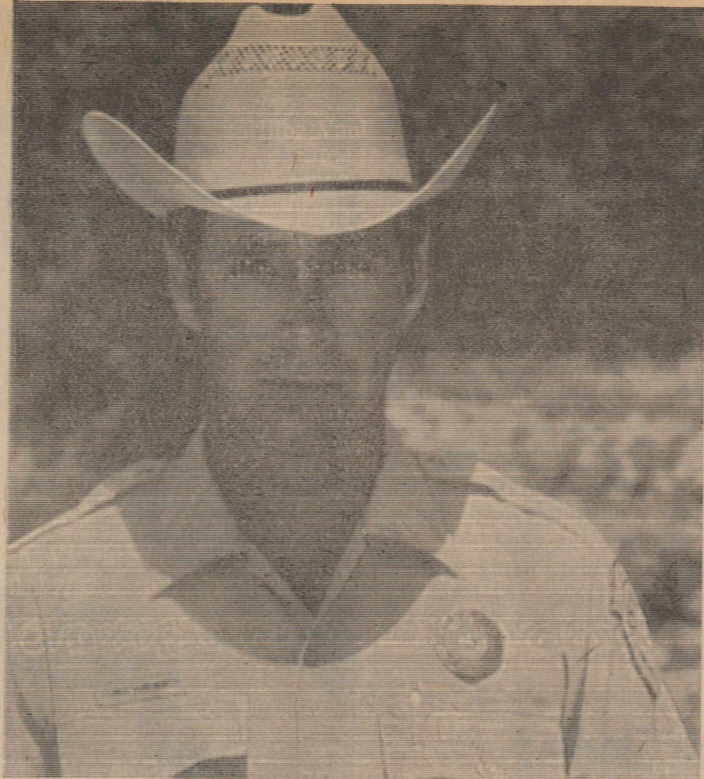
Result demonstrations conducted in Dickens, Kent, Jones and Fisher counties last year showed that the best yields were obtained where there were three to four plants per foot of row. Yields decreased at higher populations and decreased drastically where there were eight plants per foot of row. This was the case in skip-row cotton as well as in cotton planted in 40 inch rows.

This is by no means new information. It has been known for many years that cotton produces best when there are 30,000 to 55,000 plants per acre. However, many producers are now plant-

ing cotton varieties that have smaller seed and if the small seed size is not taken into account, it can result in a 25% increase in plant stand.

When the plants are crowded, they compete with each other for nutrients and some plants do not produce squares and bolls until late in the growing season. These late producing plants not only interfere with the development of the plants that will produce the cotton crop but they produce squares and bolls which become boll weevil feed late in the growing season. This allows larger numbers of boll weevils to build the fat reserves that are needed to overwinter.

Most of the cotton in Hall and eastern Briscoe counties will be planted in the next two to three weeks. Soil temperature will probably be in the optimum range for quick emergence. Therefore,

based on the viability of seed, only enough should be planted to obtain a stand of three to four plants per foot of row. This plant population will result in uniform maturity of the crop, reduced competition between plants and less feed for boll weevils this fall.

to mind is the area Texas game warden and Ronnie Ainsworth of Plainview is the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department representative for Hale and Floyd counties.

Ainsworth covers two counties with as much variety of wildlife as any in northwest Texas including deer, quail, dove, pheasant, waterfowl and aoudad sheep.

Ainsworth is also familiar with northwest Texas as his home town is Vernon. He resid-

FEDERAL LAND BANK RAISES INTEREST RATES

Ted D. Jordan, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada, has announced that the Federal Land Bank of Houston's billing rate on farm and ranch loans and rural residence loans will be increased from 8½% to 9% effective June 1, 1979.

In making this announcement, Jordan stated that the increase in the billing rate became necessary because of the continued high cost of funds to finance the Bank's lending operation and no substantial decline is anticipated in the near future.

He further stated that in today's economic climate the 9% rate is very competitive.

The Land Bank in Houston introduced a variable rate plan in 1969 which allows the billing rate to increase or decrease with variations in the money market. This increase in billing rate will affect 676 loans in the total amount of \$16,700,574 for the association in Floydada.

Changes Made In Game Regulations

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved several changes in the fish and game regulations affecting sportsmen in northwest Texas this fall.

The Commission authorized reducing the mule deer season in the Panhandle from 16 days to nine days. A shortened season will reduce the buck harvest and increase the number of older age class buck mule deer left in the population. The nine day season will standardize the length of the season with the Trans-Pecos area.

The mule deer bag limit for the gun season will be the same as last season with a bag limit of two mule deer, no more than one buck, antlerless by permit only. Archery season bag limit is one buck mule deer only.

The Commission established an expanded and split season for aoudad sheep in the Panhandle. The season will be the first Saturday in November for 14 days and from the first Saturday in January for 16 days.

This aoudad season rule will provide greater hunter opportunity as some landowners do not have sheep in November, but have them on their winter wheat fields in January.

The upland bird hunters will have a longer season to bag pheasants in the Panhandle as the Commission expanded the pheasant season from 16 to 30 days, from the second Saturday in December for 30 consecutive days.

The Commission did add the restriction of prohibiting the use of cables, chains, ropes, or other moving objects to flush pheasants.
