Deadline Is July 15 For Filing For Homestead Exemptions

Implementation of the "TAX RELIEF" amendment as approved by the voters of Texas in November of 1978 is currently effective for all 1979 school taxes. The provisions of the tax relief bill were passed by the last Legislature in HB 1060 and provides that all individuals are entitled to an exemption of \$5,000 from the market value of their residential homestead. In addition, it provides that all persons 65 or older or disabled (under a disability for purposes of disability benefits under Federal Old-

age, Survivors and Disability Insurance) are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homestead. A person who is over 65 or disabled may receive ONLY ONE \$10,000 exemption, and only one such exemption may be received per family, per residence homestead. Persons wishing to claim these exemptions must file an application with the school no later than July 15, 1979 at the school tax office. To be eligible for the over 65 exemptions a person

must have been 65 years of age or older on January 1, 1979. Legislation also provides that any taxes pledged prior to the effective date of the act to pay debts (bonds) may continue to be levied and collected against the value being exempt. The Turkey-Quitaque school currently levies a 14 cent tax rate for bonded indebtedness. This rate may increase or decrease according to needs. The action by the Legislature also places into effect a freeze on taxes paid on any residence homestead which receives the \$10,000 exemption. Over 65 taxpayers who receive the exemption can expect the amount imposed in the first year to remain the same as long as the act is in effect unless improvements to the property are added. If improvements are made to the property, the value of the improvements can be taxed at the then current rate and value, and total amount of taxes imposed can be increased to reflect the new improvements. That new amount of

taxes would then serve as the ceiling on taxes in the following years. Provisions are also made for state replacement of revenue losses caused by the \$5,000 and \$10,000 homestead exemptions. One hundred percent replacement of losses to the school district will not be made and, in fact, nearer 50% will be recovered. The Turkey-Quitaque School has 483 homeowners who are eligible for the \$5,000 exemption and 209 of those owners are eligible for the additional \$10,000. If these numbers are converted into property values then the school district has a potential loss of over five million dollars from its tax roll. This represents approximately \$51,000 in lost revenue with about \$25,000 replaced by the state. Some owners, however, do not own property equal to that which they are eligible to exempt, which will cause the loss to be less than \$51,000. House Bill 1060 also exempts from taxation all intangible per-

sonal property except some items. It has been estimated by state sources that \$16 million in intangible properties existed in this school district. Those values, however, have never been taxed due to the great difficulty to do so. The bill exempts household goods and personal effects. The bill provides that ad valorem taxes on automobiles owned by a family or individual and not used for producing income could be exempt. Provision in the bill made it optional for taxing jurisdictions to continue to tax vehicles of the governing body so desired. The Board of Trustees of the Turkey-Quitaque ISD, at its last meeting, elected to continue taxing personal vehicles. If vehicles were exempt, the school district would lose about \$11,000 in revenues annually or the burden of financing would shift to other sources. The bill did not provide for state reimbursement to cover the losses. Another article of the "Tax Relief" bill provided that agricultural land be appraised based upon productivity rather than market value. Full effects of these provisions have not reached tax offices at this time and applications for this relief cannot be considered at this time.

HEALTHY LIFESTYLE

A healthy lifestyle is more valuable than a doctor.

Lifestyle is related to more than half of the diseases from which people in Texas die each year.

These lifestyle-related diseases include heart disease, cancer, cerebrovascular disease (stroke) and accidents.

Also, they are linked to our lifestyle choices such as eating, drinking, smoking, physical exercise and how we handle stress, anger and other emotions.

To develop a healthy lifestyle, form nine health habits—and set an example for the family and the community.

Health habits concern immunization, nutrition, weight, exercise, non-smoking, drinking only moderate amounts of alcohol if any at all and getting adequate amounts of sleep.

Also, acquire knowledge of health-care services and products and how to handle medical emergencies.

IMMUNIZATION

Start a child's immunizations early—rather than waiting for him to enter school.

Also, adults need immunization.

Get a tetanus-diphtheria booster every ten years, most health professionals say.

HEALTH

Eat three meals a day at regular times—and include a variety of foods—to insure the necessary balance of nutrients.

WEIGHT

Maintain a moderate weight—one that is right for your height and build.

Avoid obesity, a factor in many diseases.

EXERCISE

Regular, daily exercise is a must for staying healthy—and avoiding illness.

By the same token, vigorous exercise done only occasionally is not helpful.

Strenuous exercise once every couple of weeks or only on weekends is a practice which can actually harm the body.

NON-SMOKING

If you haven't started smoking—don't.

For those who do smoke, although it is difficult to stop, your health is certainly worth it.

ALCOHOL

If you use alcohol at all, use it moderately.

Farabee Blasts DOE

State Senator Ray Farabee blasted Washington for its lack of National Energy Program saying, "State government does not set energy policies, but somehow the Department of Energy (D.O.E.) expects state and local governments to enforce their piecemeal plans."

"Until we have a coherent National Energy Plan, we will be living from one crisis to the next. It is unfair to expect state or local governments to carry out something which the federal government can neither explain, understand nor administer," Farabee stated to the Lions Club in Wichita Falls this week.

Although there are no simple answers to the energy problem, according to Farabee, he outlined four points which he stated we must address: (1) a clear-cut National Energy Policy; (2) greater individual conservation; (3) development of energy alternatives such as gasohol, solar energy, coal and lignite power; and (4) priorities for agricultural production, emergency health care and commercial transporta-

ducts, such as drugs and medical devices, be an informed consumer.

USDA announced this past week that the national average market price for grain sorghum has reached the release level (125% of loan rate).

Producers with sorghum in the Grain Reserve Program may repay loans WITHOUT penalty.

Repayment amounts shall include principal, applicable interest, and any unearned storage.

Release will continue through July 31, when prices will be reviewed to determine whether release should be continued or stopped.

CROP ACREAGE MUST BE REPORTED

Operators of all farms (participating and non-participating) must file acreage reports for all crops including set-aside no later than July 15, 1979.

Failure to report crop acres by certification can cause producers to lose all program benefits.

If no report is filed by current year cotton producers, the yield for the farm shall be set at zero. All crop acreage for the farm will be zero if no acreage report is filed.

No late filed reports can be accepted unless it can be proven, a timely report was beyond the operator's control.

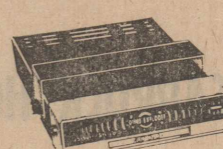

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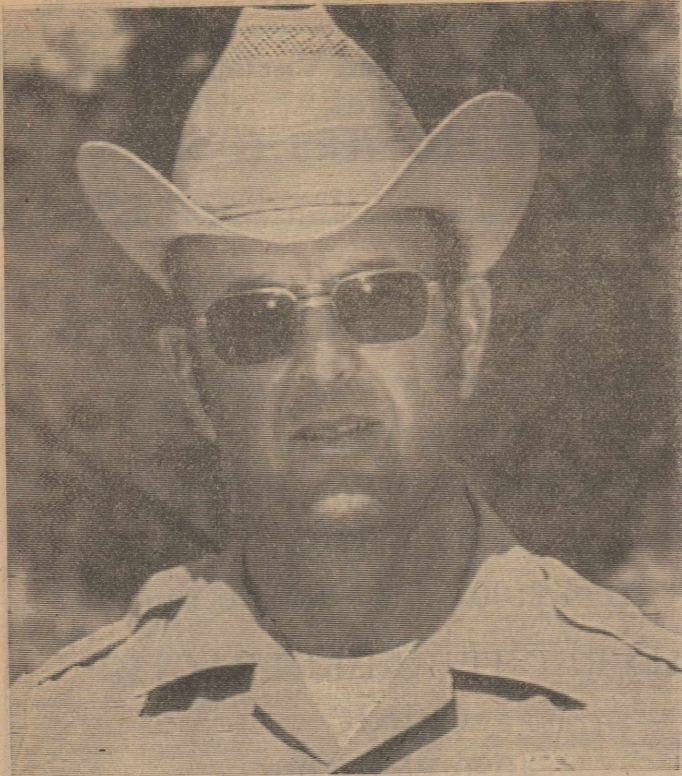

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A Texas Game Warden Profile

The rolling plains of northwest Texas are quite familiar to Jack Burrus, Texas game warden assigned to Hall and Childress counties.

These counties were affected by the drought and lack of wildlife cover last hunting season, but according to the Parks & Wildlife Department representative, they appear to be making a comeback this spring. The deer herd is stable and the area is well known for excellent quail hunting.

These counties furnish local fishermen with some good large-mouth bass opportunities and the dry period last summer slowed that activity also. Both Baylor and Childress lakes are small, but have yielded some real lunkers each year.

Burrus is acquainted with northwest Texas as his home town is Hereford. Burrus and his wife, Martha Jean, and daughters, Sabrina, age 15; Shelley, age 18, and Sharece, age 15, reside at 801 Avenue I in Childress.
