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Proposed Determinations Given For 1980 Agriculture Programs

The Secretary of Agriculture proposes to make the following determinations with respect to the 1980 crops of corn and grain sorghum: (a) The amount of the 1980 national program acreage; (b) the reduction from previous year's harvested acreage required, if any, to guarantee established (target) price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage; (c) whether there should be a set-aside requirement and, if so, the extent of such set-aside; (d) whether there should be a land diversion program and, if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment; (e) whether a limitation should be placed on planted acreage; and (f) the established (target) prices.

In addition the following determinations will be made with respect to the 1980 crops of corn, grain sorghum and soybeans: (1) the loan and purchase levels, including county loan rates and premiums and discounts for grades, classes and other qualities; and (2) other related provisions. Most of the above determinations are required to be made by the Secretary on or before November 15, 1979, in accordance with provisions in section 105A of the Agricultural Act of 1949, as amended, and section 1001 of the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977, as amended. 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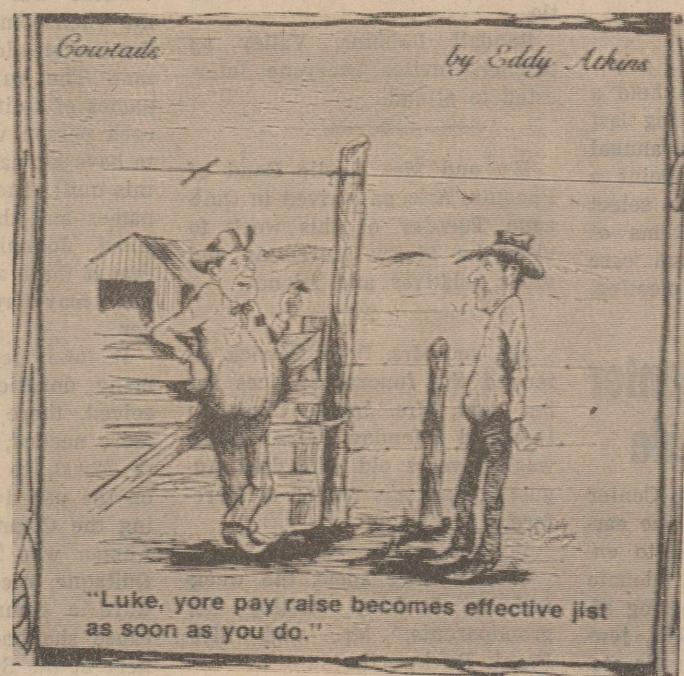
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Green Thumb Advisors Meet

CANNING MAY DAMAGE RANGE

Bountiful harvests mean busy canners! Canning produce is a great way to save money, but don't forget to take care of your equipment.

Your most expensive piece of home canning equipment is the range. Some of you may notice a

mysterious discoloration or even crazing of the porcelain enamel surface around your range's heating unit.

According to the Porcelain Enamel Institute, this kind of surface damage is usually caused by large canners which are too big for the heating element. This creates an overhang that can trap the heat from the burner and reflect it back onto the range surface. This can cause a surprisingly high temperature build-up—sometimes as high as 1200 degrees Fahrenheit. This kind of heat, especially when it takes place over a long canning cycle, could affect any finish, even porcelain enamel.

The one sure solution is to use only equipment that fits the burner. However, since this isn't always practical, there are some precautions you can take to at least minimize the chances of any damage happening to your range.

First, be sure there is at least a 3/8-inch space between the bottom of the canner and the range surface. This will allow air to circulate and spread out the trapped heat. Normally this kind of air space is easy to achieve with a gas range. With an electric range, it might be necessary to use a special trivet.

Also, take into account what the bottom of the canner looks like. A flat bottom is less likely to trap heat than one that has ripples or is slightly concave. In addition, a bright, shiny bottom will reflect more heat than one that's dull or made of brushed

metal. But the safest is one with a dark surface, such as the old blue-black porcelain enamel water bath canners. These absorb heat rather than reflecting it.

Next, try not to use the same burner for canning batch after batch in a row. Some foods take over an hour of processing in a pressure canner. Repeating these long canning cycles on a single burner is one thing that invites the damage to the finish. So, if your range has two large burners, alternate the duty between them. But if you only have one, you'll be on safer ground if you let the range cool down for a while before processing another batch.

And last, but certainly not least, be sure to turn the control dial to the lowest heat setting needed to keep the water boiling or pressure up. You may have a habit of turning the heat too high to get the water boiling—and leaving it there during the entire operation. Besides adding to the heat build-up problem this also wastes lots of energy.

If you follow these few, simple precautions, chances are you WON'T be one of the unlucky few who finish a proud day of canning only to discover your range top damaged.



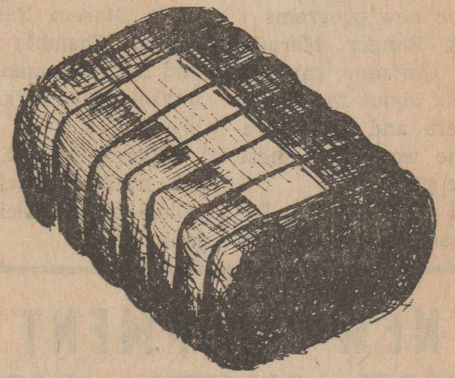
Two-County Livestock Meeting Slated Tuesday In Silverton
