Few people on earth realize that this is the first year when irrigation in Bailey County spread south from Muleshoe, where it has always been practiced. Around Needmore several farmers are irrigating now, including Mr. Davenport, Mr. Leslie Arnold and others. How much territory south of the sand has ample supplies of water at a reasonable depth remains to be proven. But it sure is encouraging in that neighborhood, says Mr. Davenport and Mr. Arnold have fine crops of cotton and big acreages at that.

J. K. Adams, the county agent, who has kept up with this new irrigation development, says we still have a far piece to go before we learn all about one of our greatest assets - our abundant supplies of underground water. Incidentally he has a map prepared by the Texas water control board that will be of interest to prospective irrigators. We still have a long way to go to learn about our water and how to use it - but we're on our way.

Bailey County Democrats, meeting in county convention in Muleshoe Saturday afternoon, August 3, endorsed the administration of President Harry S. Truman and commended him for his "effort to carry out the policies of the greatest Democrat, Franklin D. Roosevelt." The report of the resolutions committee, printed below, was adopted without debate.

George Johnson, county chairman, was elected permanent chairman of the convention and Noel Woodley was chosen secretary. Delegates to the Democratic state convention to be held in San Antonio September 10 are: J. H. Damon, Henry Hanover, Pat Bobo and V. E. Garner. Alternates are Connie Gupton, Dr. A. E. Lewis, Jess Osborn and George Johnson. Prior to the holding of the convention the county executive committee had met at the courthouse and canvassed returns from the July 27 primary. No material discrepancy in unofficial returns was found.

Cunningham Tells Of School Plans

W. C. Cunningham, superintendent of schools, addressed the Lions Club at its luncheon, Wednesday, telling of some of his plans for developing at Muleshoe "one of the finest educational systems in West Texas."

Mr. Cunningham paid tribute to his predecessor, W. C. Cox, as superintendent for 16 years, and said that a great deal of hard work had gone into the job of bringing the school system to its present position.

Yet a great deal needs to be done here. Mr. Cunningham said work probably can start on the new school building, for which bonds have been voted, but he said the money available will not erect the school building he needs here.

In addition, he told the Lions the present grade school building is not fit for the purpose for which it must be used. He would like to see this building used for the music department, and a new grade school erected. The present high school building needs repairs that would cost about \$25,000, he said.

Guests of the Club included Bob Greer, son of Lion N. H. Greer, Carl Baker, Clovis, brother of Lion Odie Baker, and Fred Ward, Houston, a guest of Myron Pool. Club dues were raised from \$3.50 per month to \$4 by vote of the club.

Lion Greer reported on the preliminary plans for Lions sponsorship of the Boy Scouts here. The club voted to sponsor the appearance here of the Erman Gray band, further announcement of which will be made later.

County Plans Booth At Fair

Preparations for erecting a Bailey County booth at the South Plains Fair, Lubbock, this year are being made under the direction of County Agent J. K. Adams. Mr. Adams will seek support of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce.

He said that he, Mrs. Laurgite Wilson, the county home demonstration agent, F. W. Jones and Edward White, Muleshoe vocational agriculture teachers, will cooperate in gathering material to be maintained a booth at fair, will assist where possible, he said.

Some attractive money prizes are being offered for best county booth and besides it is considered "good business" for a county to have a booth at the regional fair, where many people will see the great variety of quality products that can be produced here.

.85 Inch Rain Fell Sunday

Rain which fell here Sunday morning apparently covered a considerable part of the territory immediately surrounding Muleshoe, according to reports. The official observer, R. J. Klump, reported .85 inch fell here.

The rain extended nearly to Earth on the east and to Clovis on the west. Northwest of Muleshoe, in the West Camp community, a heavier fall is reported, as much as 1 1/2 inches in places, while to the north as much as 1 inch of rain fell in spots.

Young feed in the section is desperately in need of moisture, and the shower Sunday will give relief to that section where it fell. However, the entire Plains country is very dry, and a big general rain is needed.

Rain fell here between 6 and 9 a. m.

Dan Barber, who resides just east of Lazduby, said about an inch of rain fell at his place.

Ross Glaz, 8 miles northwest of Muleshoe, reported a rain estimated at 1 1/2 inches fell Sunday at his place.

O. C. Thompson, who lives 11 miles north and west of Muleshoe, east of West Camp, said the rain Saturday night at his place was about 1 1/2 inches. Mr. Thompson said young feed would be benefited by the shower.

Reports from informed sources reveal that location has been staked for a 5,000-foot wildcat, to be drilled immediately in south-central Bailey county, by John W. Naylor of Fort Worth.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

H. J. R. NO. 16
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of such Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of such Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid

for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed, at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars, (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of

the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas;" and

AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

"Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

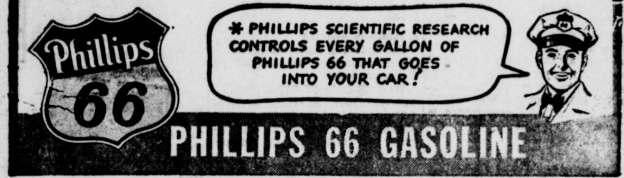

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing, and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (¼) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (¼) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways; and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, one-fourth (¼) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county and the percentage allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained

herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

S. J. R. NO. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

"Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Rainey States His Platform

In a restatement of his platform as he launched his runoff campaign for governor, Dr. Homer P. Rainey has included a provision to set up separate polling places for Negroes in line with the constitutional principle of segregation.

Summarizing his stand, Dr. Rainey listed 11 things he is for, 6 things he is against. He declared himself:

1. For the finest educational system in America.
2. For a first-class public health program.
3. For the removal of the ceiling on pensions and payment of the full \$40 a month to our old people; meeting our obligations to the blind, dependent children and helpless needy, regardless of age.
4. For reasonable increase in taxes on oil, gas and sulphur.
5. For farm-to-market roads; improvement of rural life thru soil conservation, farm co-ops, scientific research and promotion of farm ownership.
6. For industrial peace so that management and labor can devote their time and energy to production instead of costly strife, the public interest to be at all times paramount.
7. For organized labor under responsible, public-spirited leader-

ship, like organized farmers, organized business and organized professional men.

8. For genuine free enterprise for the little business man and the veteran entering business, as well as every other American.
9. For States' Rights through an active, alert state government.
10. For a constitutional amendment to prohibit a public official, while holding one office, to run for another until the last year of his term.
11. For separate schools and separate polling places for Negroes.

On the other hand, Dr. Rainey declared himself against:

1. Against admission of Negroes to white schools.
2. Against communism, atheism, fascism, Ku Kluxism or any other 'ism' contrary to our democratic way of life.
3. Against socialized medicine.
4. Against election or control of our public officials by invisible government, whether it be in the form of big business or any other group.
5. Against monopoly or destruction of the American system of free enterprise.
6. Against a general sales tax or a transaction tax.

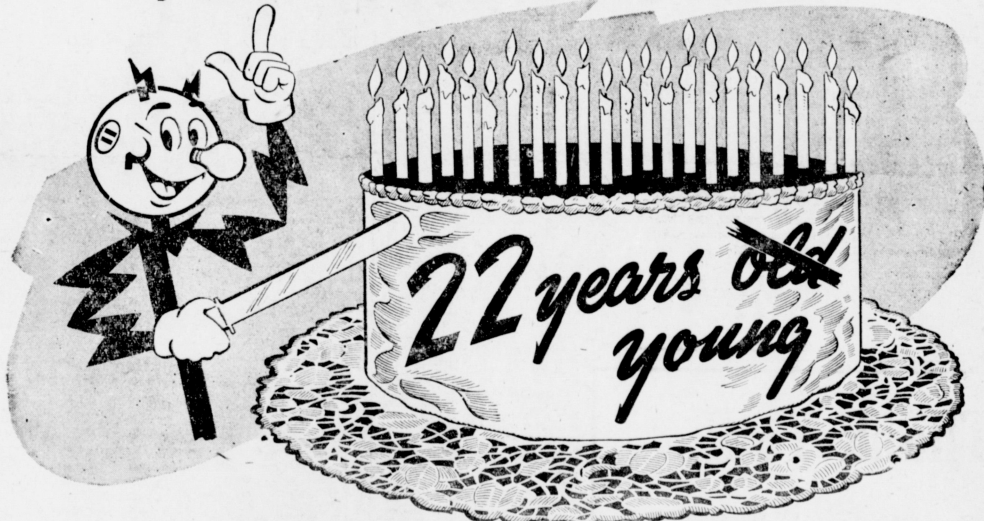

Q. How can a veteran get assistance with his unemployment problems?

A. The veteran may consult a veterans employment representative in a local office or in the state central office of the employment service, a local service organization, a school or a community veterans center.

Q. If a veteran is unable to find work, where can he obtain specific information concerning unemployment allowances?

A. Inquire at the public employment office or the office of the unemployment compensation agency in the state or territory in which the veteran resides.

Q. Are there any penalties in case the veteran accepts readjustment allowances to which he is not entitled?

A. Any veteran who knowingly

accepts an allowance to which he is not entitled shall be ineligible to receive further readjustment allowances. Also, the law provides for fine and imprisonment for anyone who fraudulently obtains payment or makes a false statement in order to cause allowances to be issued under the act.

Q. Does a veteran who is partially employed have a right to readjustment allowances?

A. Yes, a veteran who works less than his normal number of hours and who receives less than \$23 per week should inquire at the nearest public employment office of the state unemployment agency as to his eligibility for partial readjustment allowances.

Q. Can a Veteran have a loan guaranteed or insured to buy or construct more than a single-family home?

A. Yes, but one veteran cannot get a guaranteed or insured loan to buy or build a four-family home. If more than one veteran is buying, then the basic four-family unit for each veteran participating; thus two veterans can buy or build a six-family home, three veterans a seven-family home etc.

Mansfield, Fort Matched Aug. 11

LEVELLAND—Aug. 7. Trots Mansfield and Troy Fort, two of the world's best known calf roping events in the Levelland rodeo arena on August 11. The long awaited contest is expected to attract roping fans from a several-state area.

Slated to get underway at 2 p. m. on Sunday, August 11, the match roping will be sponsored by the Levelland Rodeo Association.

Association President W. J. Robertson, long-time friend of the two ropers, was responsible for arranging the contest of champions in Texas' largest rodeo arena.

Mansfield, whose hometown is Rankin, Texas is the present world champion roper—a title the Texan has held for five out of the last eight years. At 32 years, the champ roper stands six feet, one and one-half inches and weighs 187 pounds.

Fort, New Mexico's champion roper who has challenged the world champion, is from Lovington, N. M. The challenger is three years younger than Mansfield (29) and is two and a half inches shorter in stature (five feet, 11 inches). Fort's weight is 168 pounds.

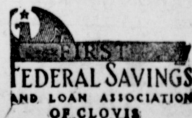

PUBLIC OPINION STILL AT SEA AS ATOMIC YEAR 1 ENDS

WASHINGTON—Public opinion pollers have been busy during Atomic Year 1, asking a great many citizens a great many questions. From coast to coast people have aired their views on the potentialities of atomic power and on means for its control, have confided their fears and revealed the misconceptions under which they have been laboring. Enough answers have been analyzed by the poll takers to allow some general conclusions about John Q. Citizen's state of mind at the end of Atomic Year 1.

First of all, of course, he wants peace, not war. Beyond that, he acknowledges that a profoundly important change has come about, but it not clear about what he's going to mean and what he's going to do about it.

Since the explosion over Hiroshima he has listened to many terrifying reports of what may happen to him and to his city should another war come, and he has also grown uneasy about the condition of the world in general. As an example, the June survey of the National Opinion Research Center reported that 68% of the public believe we will fight in another war within 25 years; 75% think that if this happens atomic bombs will be used against American cities. Sometimes John Q. Citizen decides he'd just like to get away for a while and go fishing. Most often, fortunately he has been trying to figure a way out.

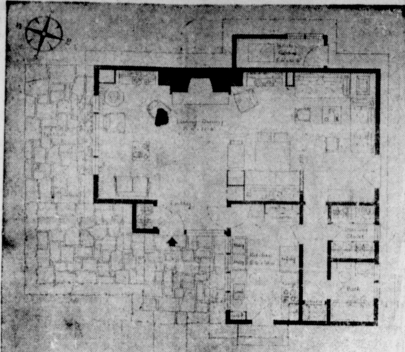

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Plans For Vet Houses



One large room skillfully organized for living, dining and sleeping is the outstanding feature of the plans for a three-room house for veterans shown above as pictured in the June issue of House Beautiful magazine. This arrangement affords a large house look, avoids mean single rooms. Such a house might be built for approximately \$5,700 in climates where heavy construction is required, or for about \$5,250 in warmer climates.

By and large the public seems to believe that the release of atomic energy has ushered in a "new age". And about 50% believe, in a somewhat shaky fashion, that the development of atomic energy for industry and other peacetime uses will take place within ten years. For the most part, people concentrate their atomic opinions on problems having to do with war, not peace.

The polls show very decidedly that the months since Hiroshima have been months of change public opinion. Since last fall an increasing number of Americans have become aware of the dangers of uncontrolled atomic weapons and, in the same period, more and more people have accepted the necessity for international control. The Gallup poll showed an increase of 3% in six months—not very large but nevertheless a gain on a highly difficult subject. Despite the worrying state of UN affairs during this year, there has been a growth in the number of people who are optimistic about the success of an international control plan. This group is now a sizable minority.

The fact remains that the majority of people have not yet come to accept the testimony of the scientists and statesmen, that international control of atomic energy is the only road away from fear and toward security. Security through strength is an idea which is easy to grasp. The idea of security through cooperation, it appears, comes harder.

In spite of military and scientific experts, a recent Gallup poll showed that 49% of Americans think a defense will be developed. There are also still those who think that this is the only nation financially or industrially able to make bombs. There are those who find refuge in the prospects of retaliation.
