Mrs. Brown Is Lamesa's First Juvenile Officer

Announcement was made recently by Lamesa Police Chief Lee Bartlett, jr., that Officer Cora Brown will head the Lamesa Police Department Juvenile Division.

The need for a separate Juvenile Division has been brought on by the increased number of juvenile cases handled by the Police Department—90 percent of the cases in the county.

"By designating Cora as Juvenile Officer for the City of Lamesa," Bartlett said, "we will have a better system of handling juvenile offenders than we have had the past several years."

The new title actually is in close conjunction with Mrs. Brown's job as Crime Prevention Officer, since most criminal behavior begins at the juvenile age and the right kind of contact at that age sometimes can prevent future problems.

Mrs. Brown is now on call 24 hours each day to assist with juveniles in any way she can.

"Due to her rapport with young people, her experience and her all-around ability to get along with the young people, she is the most qualified person in the department to handle the job," Bartlett said. He added that he has talked with officers, non-officers and young people alike and all have responded favorably to both the idea of the juvenile division and Mrs. Brown as head of it.

Later this month another officer will be named to assist Mrs. Brown in the Juvenile Division.

Mrs. Brown is finishing her fourth year with the Lamesa Police Department, having moved to Lamesa from Plainview.

She has been teaching the law enforcement class at Lamesa High School, a program which gave Lamesa the distinction of being the second city in Texas to implement it. The program has been well-received by parents, faculty and students alike.

The former Cora Ivory moved from Quitaque to Silverton in her senior year in high school and was graduated with the Class of 1967. She received the girls citizenship award and a \$50 scholarship from the Future Teachers of America. She earned a B.A. degree in law enforcement at Wayland Baptist College in 1975, and has attended West Texas State University for one year. She needs only 100 hours of clinical practice to finish a speech and hearing therapy program.

Her "street experience" came while she was doing volunteer work at the Harry Hines Juvenile Delinquent Center in Dallas. Having passed the 240 hours required of all certified peace officers, Mrs. Brown has gone on to advanced courses, attending at least seven such courses in Lamesa alone as well as 40 hours of crime prevention. The crime prevention session included about eight hours devoted to juvenile crime prevention.

She has attended classes on traffic control, the penal code, group therapy counseling and even riot and mob control.

Because of her schooling and expertise in presenting a program on shoplifting, she was asked to teach a class at San Marcos for the Crime Prevention Institute. The institute normally has speakers from Los Angeles or New York to teach the classes, and this again shows the high quality of officer she has become.

Mini Marathon To Be Held Labor Day At Lake Mackenzie

A mini marathon will be held Labor Day (Monday, September 3) at Lake Mackenzie, with races and divisions for men, women and children of all ages.

All of the races will begin at Coronado Shores on the north

side of the lake.

The first race begins at 8:00 a.m., and ends at the same point at which it begins so that parents and friends can watch both the beginning and end of the race. This will be a one-mile run for kids, and its divisions will be for boys and girls ages eight and under, ages 9-10 and ages 11-12.

The second race will cover three miles, and begins at 8:15 a.m. This race will have eleven divisions: ages 8-10, 11-12, 13-15, 16-18, 19-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50 and over for men and boys, and 18 and under, 19-25, 26 and over for women and girls.

The third race is the 10,000 meter (6.2 miles) run and starts at 8:45 a.m. This race will have eight divisions: 18 and under, 19-29, 30-39, 40-49, 50 and over for men and boys, and 18 and under, 19-25, 26 and over for women and girls.

Trophies will be awarded to the three overall winners, and ribbons will be awarded to the division winners.
