TURKEY METHODIST CHURCH HAS NEW PASTOR


Rev. Jimmy Ward and wife, Jan, and four-month-old baby daughter have moved into the community to serve the Turkey United Methodist Church.

School Announces Free Lunch Policy

The Turkey - Quitaque School today announced its policy for free and reduced price meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, School Breakfast and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Each school district may determine the price charged for reduced-price meals, but in no case may the charge for a reduced-price lunch exceed 10c or a reduced-price breakfast exceed 10c.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy, the superintendent will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the superintendent, he may make a request either orally or in writing to the school for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

Gary James Finishes Tech With Honors

Gary Michael James, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudell James of Amarillo, formerly of Quitaque, graduated summa cum laude (with highest honors) in May from Texas Tech University in Lubbock. He received the bachelor of music degree with a major in organ performance. He completed the degree in only three years with a perfect 4.00 GPA, and was designated the highest ranking graduate from the College of Arts & Sciences.

While at Tech, Mr. James studied organ with Judson Maynard and harpsichord with Mary Pendleton. He also completed extensive composition study with Mary Jeanne Van Appledorn and Ron Pellegrino. Mr. James has won numerous organ competitions, including first prize in the statewide organ competition of the Texas Music Teachers Association in 1974, and the prestigious Fowler Award (a \$4,000 scholarship to Texas Tech) in 1976. He has also won awards for theory and composition.

He graduated from Tascosa High School in Amarillo in 1976 with a 99.2 average. While in high school, he won prizes in the University Interscholastic League essay writing contest and the Cours National de Francais. He also won five gold keys in the Northwestern Texas Regional Exhibition of Scholastic Art Awards, and in 1974, gained national acclaim when his pencil drawing, "The Death of the West," received an honorable mention at the National High School Art Exhibition in New York City. Mr. James began exhibiting his watercolors and selling in art shows at the age of fifteen, and subsequently, studied for four years with the eminent Amarillo artist, Stefan Kramer. Mr. James, a National Merit Scholarship finalist and member of the National Honor Society, also was named to "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

Presently employed as organist at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Amarillo, Mr. James occupied for two years a similar position at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Lubbock.

He is the nephew of Mrs. Letha Mae Jacobs of Quitaque, and is the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Claude Cantrell and Mr. and Mrs. A. A. James, who resided in Quitaque for many years. His mother is the former Betty Cantrell.

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
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Brown - Hurley Vows Exchanged


