Coach Giddens reports there are several very promising sophomores who will play on the JV team until district play starts, and then will probably move up to the varsity. The team will average approximately 165 pounds per man.

O. R. Stark reports in his latest issue of "Comings, Goings & Doings" the following story:

"Some exciting things are happening in regard to Caprock Canyons State Park north of Quitaque, for the Master Planning Branch of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has almost completed the Master Plan for development of the new State Park. This is the news that people in this part of the state have been eagerly awaiting, for it means that actual development of the Park will begin soon afterward. Mr. Paul Schlimper of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Master Planning Branch in Austin said recently that a meeting will be held in Quitaque sometime in September, at which time some proposed works of improvement will be outlined and discussed with the local people. One of the plan concepts under consideration has proposed developments that are almost exactly what our people have requested for it proposed a paved road with camping facilities through the South Prong area, which is by far the most scenic portion of the Park. This is the portion of the Park where towering hills engulf you as you travel toward the western rim, and it is the portion that the late Theo Geisler dreamed would someday be opened to the public so that all the world could enjoy its beauty. Because of the rugged terrain very few people other than a few local residents have ever seen the South Prong area, but if this plan is adopted by the Parks and Wildlife Commission, it will open some of the most beautiful scenery in the state for public view."

(Ed. Note: Years ago, when the Park was first in planning stages, a speaker mentioned the long range possibility of connecting the Caprock Canyons and Palo Duro Canyon State Parks, crossing the Schott Cap area and opening to view all the beautiful scenery in between. If this is possible, people will come to Texas like they now go to Colorado, New Mexico and Arizona. Think Positive.)

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PLANNING IS KEY TO LANDSCAPING

Some homeowners are getting a bit carried away with the plant craze that has hit Americans in recent years. Ivies and other climbing plants cover windows, heavy tree limbs hover over houses, and hanging baskets clutter doorways and patios.

Since most new homes are planned to the individual's wants and needs, the landscape should be prepared the same way, points out Buddy C. Logsdon, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Tall trees can be used to shade a home without being placed so close as to endanger a home or high wires in stormy weather. Climbing plants and trellises should also be trimmed and kept from hiding windows.

Most new homes no longer have a centered doorway, so symmetrical balance is no longer needed in the landscape, adds Logsdon. The old custom of outlining the foundation of the house is seldom justified.

With the entrance to a home tied to the driveway, a small section is usually bordered by cement and proves to be a perfect place for an informal garden.

Bright flowers or a shrub and rock garden are a cheerful sight to guests visiting your home.

To add a new touch for a drab area, a fence or a combination of

a fence and plants can hide a sore spot or enhance a beauty mark in your yard, adds Logsdon.

Correctly placed plants will also add a sense of privacy around a busy backyard.

Landscaping has been brought indoors with hanging baskets and pole planters, but the same principles must be remembered inside the home, reminds Logsdon. Greenery should complement the furniture or accent a bare corner.

They Ate Fish


