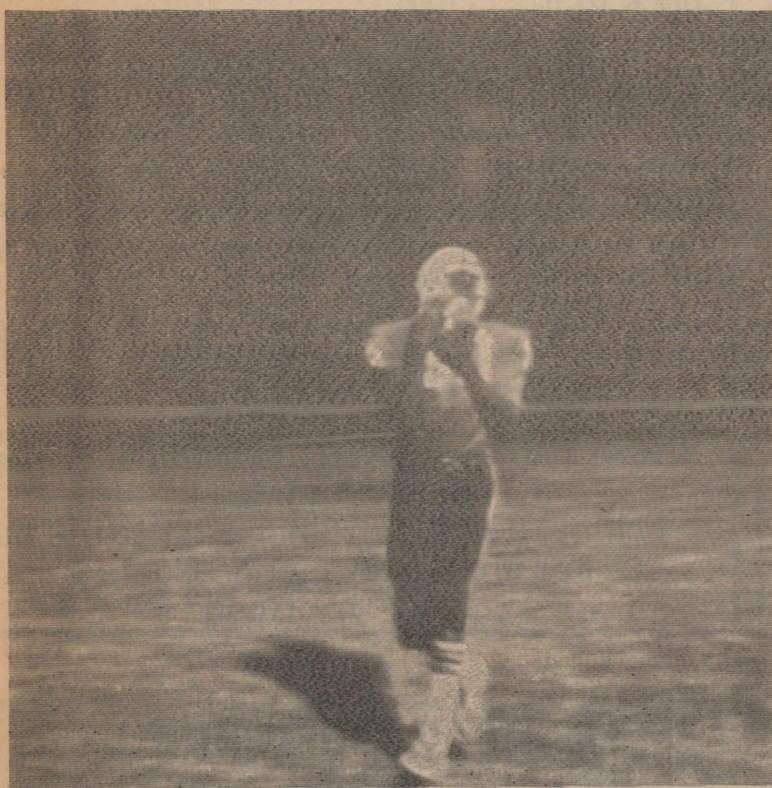

## Valley Explodes To Take 60-0 Win Over Bulldogs

The Valley High Patriots were on display for the first time at home this season Friday night, and the Patriots responded with an avalanche of touchdowns and took a 60-0 win over the Spur Bulldogs, believed to be the most ever scored by a Valley football team.

Valley took the game opening kickoff on their own 20 and returned it to the 46 yard line. On the third play from scrimmage, Terry Brittain went 45 yards for the first touchdown. Rod Carpenter passed to Dee Dowd for the extra point, and with less than two minutes gone, Valley was ahead 8-0.

Spur took the kickoff and returned it to the 20 yard line and then picked up one first down before stalling and kicking it to the Patriots. Valley moved then to a first down on the three yard line. From that point, Juice Williams moved it in for the second touchdown. Johnny Cotten kicked the extra point, and the Patriots were ahead with 5:30 left in the first quarter. After receiving the kickoff, Spur failed to pick up a first down and kicked short to Valley on the 35 yard line. McNary almost broke another one but was pulled down after he went 28 yards. He scored the third touchdown from eight yards out. The try for extra point failed, and at the end of

the first quarter the score was 21-0 for Valley.

That pretty well set the tone for the game. The Patriots scored twelve points in the second quarter and led 33-0 at halftime. Valley scored 14 points to lead 47-0 at the end of three quarters, then put 13 points on the scoreboard in the fourth period.

McNary scored in the second quarter on a three yard run and a twenty yard run, Brittain scored on a 17 yard run in the third period, and McNary ran fifteen yards for a score. Carpenter ran one yard for a touchdown in the fourth period, and McNary wound up the scoring when he broke one for 85 yards.

Statistically the game was about as one-sided as the score indicated, as nothing seemed to work for the Bulldogs. Valley picked up twenty-three first downs to only four for Spur. Valley rushed for 402 yards to 87 for Spur.

Valley completed three of six passes for 51 yards, and Spur completed four of ten for 23 yards.

McNary carried the ball fourteen times for 203 yards and four touchdowns. Juice Williams carried nine times for 88 yards and one touchdown, Terry Brittain picked up 65 yards on nine carries and got two touchdowns. Rod Carpenter carried the ball

## Plans To Be Shown For New State Park

There will be an important meeting next Thursday night at the Quitaque Community Center, when plans for development of Caprock Canyons State Park will be shown and discussed.

The meeting will be at 7:30 p.m. on October 4, and the public is urged to attend.

Members of the Master Planning Branch of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin will be present, and they will show three concepts that are under consideration for develop-

ment of the Park. Cost figures and future development plans will also be discussed, and questions and comments from the group present will be encouraged.

One of the plans under consideration will be what the local people have requested from the very beginning. This plan would include large areas for picnicking and overnight camping facilities, along with a paved scenic drive through the South Prong area, which is considered to be the most beautiful portion of the Park.

It is felt by many that to have a really meaningful Park that will draw thousands of people each year that this paved scenic drive is a must, for without it many people would never be able to enjoy the Park's true beauty.

If one of the concepts without a paved road into South Prong is adopted, our Senior Citizens and many others would never see the towering hills and magnificent sculptural works, for back packing and long hikes would be the only way to reach this portion of the Park.

All of this will be brought out and discussed at the meeting, and maps and other presentations will be shown.

It is important that the State Park Officials know how the local people feel concerning the development of Caprock Canyons State Park, and this meeting is the place to let our feelings be known.

Everyone who possibly can do so is urged to attend, for it is an Open Meeting and we need to let the Planners know that we want the Park developed so that thousands of people can drive into its deep recesses and enjoy its beauty.

We need to encourage the Planners to develop the Park as quickly as possible, and to include scenic drives, adequate camping facilities, and historical displays, so people will want to come back to visit the Park again and again.

Remember the date: Thursday, October 4, at 7:30 p.m. at the Quitaque Community Center. Please make a special effort to be there.

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**Phase I Of Hall Jail Completed**

The architectural firm of Corgan and Associates of Dallas has completed Phase I of the proposed Hall County Jail project, County Judge Lester Campbell said this week.

Phase I consists of the feasibility study of the necessary needs of a jail to determine the size, the prisoner capacity, and the proposed operation. The study, since it has been completed by the architect, has been sent to the Texas Commission on Jail Standards for approval, Campbell explained.

Jail construction, at the present time, is set up in three phases: Phase I, the preliminary study; Phase II, the drawing of actual plans, advertising for bids, and letting of the construction contract, and Phase III, actual construction of the facility.

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Following the approval of Phase I, plans and specifications will be drawn up, the judge explained. At that point, the estimated cost can be made and bonds to pay for the facility will have to be voted upon by the taxpayers.

"We actually do not have any definite idea of how much the jail will cost," Campbell said. "Generally speaking, jail construction costs now are running \$100 or more per square foot.

This means, of course, that if a 4,000 square foot facility is necessary, the building would cost in the neighborhood of \$400,000 or more. Taxpaying voters will determine whether the building is constructed or not."



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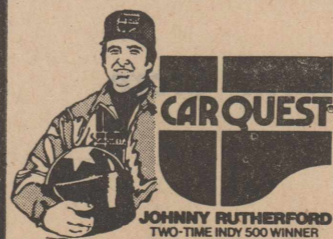

## Bob Wills Hometown People Interviewed

During the month of August, George and Bonnie Carmack of the San Antonio Express News, were in Turkey interviewing people about Bob Wills' hometown.

They published their story in the San Antonio paper and the following are some excerpts from their story: "A Place Called Turkey—Before It Got Its Post Office Its Name was Turkey Roost—Is the Hometown of One of Texas' Best Known Men." The Texas Almanac gives its population as 684. But one day each year, 10 times that number gather to pay tribute to Bob Wills.

Turkey has one of the most unusual monuments anywhere. It has a big eight-sided base of granite on which is told the story of this man's life.

Above the tall round shaft of aluminum, this topped by two back-to-back fiddles, each five feet tall.

More than that, this monument is wired for sound. Tapes played at the monument not only are heard there but also over a loud-speaker system in downtown Turkey.

Bonnie and I spent a day in Turkey on our recent visit to West Texas.

Turkey is the hometown of Bob Wills and the monument is

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to him. Bob is one of the few people who saw a monument to himself before he died. He pulled a cord that unveiled it from his wheelchair.

San Antonio has a special interest in Bob Wills, as all know, his "San Antonio Rose" spread the fame of San Antonio around the world particularly during World War II.

But more than 40 years after Bob put it together and recorded it for the first time in the old Blackstone Hotel in Fort Worth on November 28, 1938, it is still one of the most popular country and western tunes.

The trip to Turkey was a sentimental one for Bonnie and me. We spent the day with Bob and Mrs. Wills in their Fort Worth home six years ago.

How proud Turkey is of Bob Wills and what fine people we met there—people who are the heirs of the tradition of country life in the good old days.

We talked with Jim Robison, cotton gin operator and businessman, before coming to Turkey. He is one of the leaders in Turkey's annual Bob Wills Day.

He had such a good interview waiting for us in his office—with big, hearty Bill Lane, a farm operator in the Turkey area. "When I was nine years old, my father brought me to Turkey from our farm one Saturday—Butter-and-Egg-Day—to get my hair cut."

"The shop was Ham's Barber Shop. There were four chairs and my father took me to the back chair. A young barber cut my hair. It was Bob Wills."

"Bob got through with me pretty quick and no one was waiting for Bob's chair."

"Lige Littlefield was shining shoes. Lige got his banjo out and soon Bob picked up his fiddle."

"My father was a good fiddler—one of those Tennessee fiddlers. He often played for dances. When Bob got through, my dad told him: 'Son, if you keep on with that fiddle, you'll make it.'"

Later at the Bob Wills Museum, a former school building, we saw the fiddle that Bob had when he was barbering in Turkey.

L. D. Gatlin, a friendly Turkey old-timer who will be 82 this September, had a personal connection with the fiddle.

"Bob as usual had his fiddle at the barber shop," Gatlin said. "It was in a sack in a chair near his barber chair."

"One of the other barbers dropped his shears. In a moment of frustration, he picked them up and flung them down again."

"The shears hit Bob's fiddle and split it. Bob knew I was pretty good at that sort of thing and had me glue the split."

We walked over to the display case and Gatlin pointed out the split.

Bob cut Gatlin's hair and shaved him many times.

"I knew Bob when he was a little boy," Gatlin said, "By the time he was barbering it was plain he was no ordinary fiddler."

Amid all the pictures of Bob at the museum are a number of him in his years of fame on his favorite horse—a big yellow horse called "Punkin'."

"Bob lived with his family out near the forks of the river—between the Little Red and Big Red rivers."

"His old home is a hay barn right now," Robison said.

Mrs. Zona Russell Lane, head of the museum staff, has lived in Turkey since 1907. She showed us the hundreds of photographs, awards, plaques and other mementoes.

Among the many plaques is one from the City of San Antonio given Bob in 1972 and signed by Mayor John Gatti.

The museum head not only told us of Bob's early days but described life in the days of his boyhood.

"The country was such a wonderful place," she said. "People had not left the country for the city."

"And how wonderful the small towns were. People came to Turkey on Saturday nights as farmers got their weekly shave and sometimes a haircut and what a lively place it was."

"Bob Wills was always popular when he went to Fort Worth. People made up a pot for him to get started with his own band. Fame really hit him when his little three- or four-piece band became the 'Light Crust Doughboys' and went on the radio. They were teamed with a super-salesman, W. Lee 'Pass the biscuits, Pappy' O'Daniel, later go-

vernor and U. S. Senator."

Robison told of Bob's love for Turkey. "Bob was a big success in FortWorth, Tulsa and Hollywood. But to Bob, Turkey was always his home town," Robison said. "The only fight I ever heard of Bob having was once when a man said something about Turkey that Bob didn't like."

This was the eighth year of Bob Wills Day in Turkey.

Bonnie and I had a fine picnic at noon under the trees at Bob Wills Park. A cotton field borders the park adding to the feel of long ago.

The monument is beside the park and before we were through eating, the sounds of "San Antonio Rose"—as only Bob could play it—were coming from it.

After eating we crossed the street to the Gulf Station to talk with Byron Young.

There we learned there is a switch inside the station and any time a visitor stops at the monument, the music is turned on.

Both Young and Robison told us of the moving scene when Bob, from his wheelchair, pulled the cord unveiling the statue. He had come to Turkey in an ambulance.

Bonnie and I believe we are among the few people Bob and Betty told in detail how "San Antonio Rose" came into being. This interview was in late 1973.

As a young man, Bob once left Turkey and went to the little town of Roy in New Mexico. There, as usual, he barbered and played for dances.

"Many who came to the dances were Spanish-Americans and Bob wanted some music with a Spanish flavor," Betty said. "He wrote 'Spanish Two-step.' He kept on playing it after he left Roy."

Then came the historic record session at the Blackstone. The recording company agent Arthur Satherly—known to everyone as "Uncle Art," needed one more side, an instrumental.

"I told Uncle Art to give me a few minutes," Bob took up the story halting—"I took my 'Spanish Two-step,' switched some notes around, made some changes and added some sounds I had been thinking about. Then I told Uncle Art we were ready."

Satherly, an Englishman, named it "San Antonio Rose." He just picked the name as having a "romantic sound."

Bob and some members of his band wrote the words later.

But this song created so cas-

ually still lives after 41 years. Astronauts Pete Conrad and Alan Bean even beamed it back to earth from the moon.

Betty is now Mrs. Jim Sheets of Alvarado, Texas. Sheets is a retired high school principal.

Betty was at Bob Wills Day again this year.

The climax to our day in Turkey was a visit to the shop where Bob barbered. It is still the same room in the same building as in Bob's years here.

"My daddy, Floyce (F. O.) Ham, came to Turkey in 1911 and started barbering," said Harold Ham, who owns the shop now. "He built the building in 1920."

"Daddy barbered here 56 years—until he died in 1967. I've been barbering here 37 years."

"We are proud Bob barbered in this shop," Harold Ham continued. "He came back here

many times and always came by the shop. Then I can remember at least four times when the band—just passing through—stopped and played out in the street for at least 30 minutes."

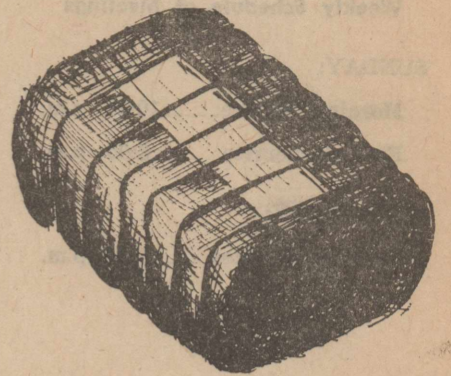
Bob never forgot Turkey, and Turkey has never forgotten Bob.
