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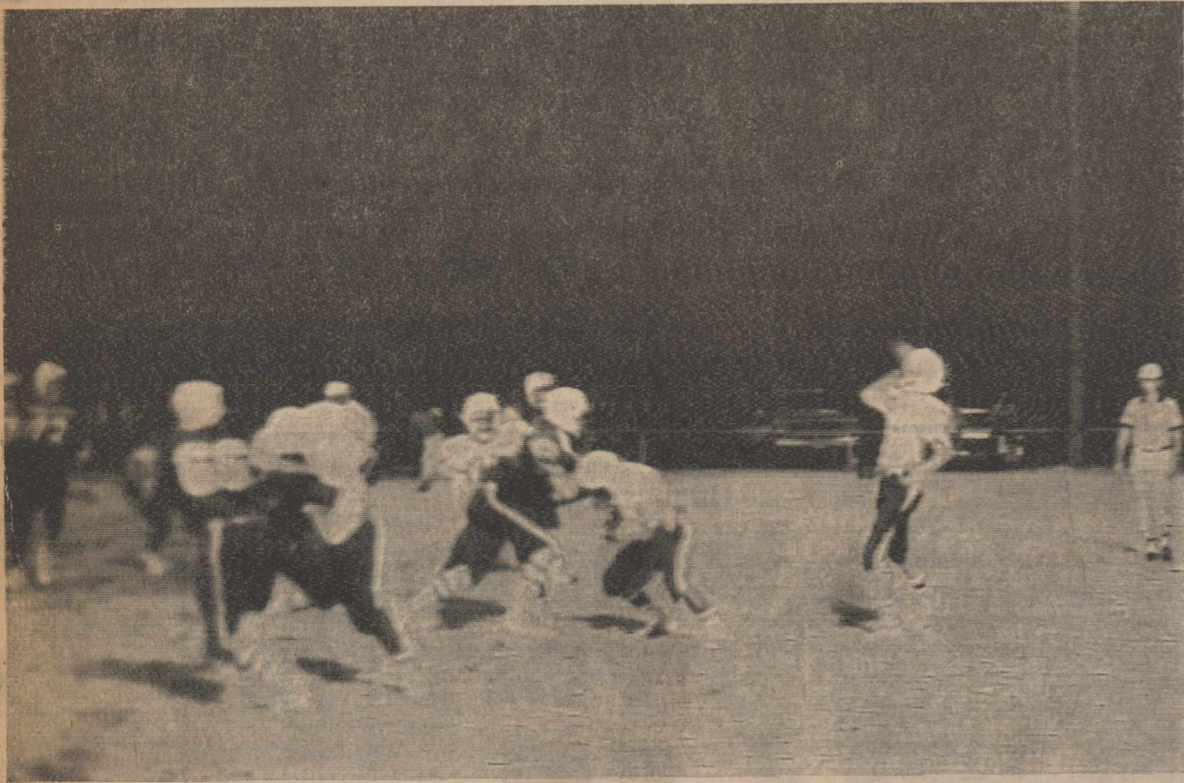

Valley High Patriots Get Over First Hurdle 19-0; Meet Silvertown Friday In Homecoming Game

The Valley High Patriots drove up to Nazareth last Friday night to meet the team that was generally picked by the "experts" to win the District Title this year. The Patriots were equal to the challenge and defeated the Swifts 19-0.

Nazareth kicked to the Patriots on the 10 yard line and Valley ran it out to the 30. Valley picked up one first down with the aid of a penalty for 15 yards. Nazareth, playing good defense, forced the Patriots to punt.

The Swifts took over on their own 35 yard line. Valley was hit with a 15 yard penalty (the first of many for the night).

The Patriot defense held and then forced the Swifts to kick. Valley set up for business on their own six yard line. The first play lost a yard. On second down, McNary got the call again and he headed left, turned the corner, and then went all the way 95 yards for a touchdown. Michael Dowd kicked the extra point. Valley was on the scoreboard 7-0.

Nazareth took the ensuing kickoff on their own 10 yard line, and returned it to the 20. Once again the Valley defense stopped the Swifts, forcing them to punt. The first quarter ended with Valley ahead 7-0.

About midway of the second period, Dane Cheatham got off a beautiful 50 yard punt which the Swifts fumbled and Valley recovered on the nine yard line. On third down and eight, quarterback Carpenter passed to Dee Dowd for the touchdown. The extra point try was missed and Valley led 13-0. At the end of the first half, the score was 13-0.

Valley kicked to Nazareth to start the second half of play, and the Swifts set up for business on their own 28 yard line. On the second play, Brum Pinkerton intercepted a pass for Valley on the Nazareth 25 yard line. Valley was penalized 15 yards for clipping. Valley promptly gave the ball back to Nazareth on a fumble. Once again the Valley defense stopped the Swifts, forcing them to kick to Valley on their

own 34 yard line. Valley picked up a couple of first downs and then had to kick and Nazareth set up at the 22 yard line.

Valley got another 15 yard penalty. The Swifts picked up seven yards on the next play, then Brum Pinkerton picked off another interception. The third quarter ended with Valley in possession and leading 19-0.

Late in the fourth quarter, Valley forced a punt by Nazareth, and took over on their own 40. Valley started to march toward paydirt. With a fourth down and three yards to go on the Nazareth 19, McNary put the Patriots on the board again. Once again the try for extra point was missed, and the fourth quarter ended with the Patriots leading 19-0.

Statistically, the Patriots pretty well dominated the game. Valley recorded 14 first downs to seven for Nazareth. Valley rolled up 256 yards rushing to 52 for Nazareth. Valley completed four of eight passes for 66 yards, while Nazareth completed only

Improvements Shown For Caprock Canyons State Park

A large crowd gathered at the Quitaque Community Center a few days ago at the open meeting where plans were shown and future improvements for Caprock Canyons State Park of Quitaque were explained and discussed.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin scheduled the meeting so that the local people could learn first-hand about what is being planned for the new state park. Bob Singleton, who is the head of master planning for this project, did an excellent job of reviewing the works of improvement that are on the drawing boards and almost ready to be submitted to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Board for approval.

The most welcome news reported at the meeting as far as the crowd was concerned was the announcement that a paved road down into the beautiful South Prong area was included in Phase I of the project. This has been of utmost concern to local residents from the very beginning, for this will give visitors the opportunity to see some of the most rugged and picturesque scenery in the state.

There was an air of excitement as maps were shown and improvements for Caprock Canyons State Park were announced.

Mr. Singleton pointed out that extensive work will be done at Lake Theo. There will be a swimming beach, fishing pier, boat ramp, 40 picnic sites with shelters, parking for 70 cars and 10 cars with trailers, a comfort station, and repairs and rip-rap

on Lake Theo dam.

There will also be a large Interpretive Center and Headquarters at the beautiful site behind Lake Theo which overlooks the canyons to the north. This is the spot that Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown once told a group of community improvement judges that they were about to see the "prettiest place I've ever seen outside of Grand Canyon." From this vantage point there will be a spectacular view for visitors as they enter the headquarters and view the exhibits.

Near the Interpretive Center there will be an amphitheatre, a paved parking area, a nature trail, and wildlife introduction and propagation.

The paved road will proceed in a northeasterly direction along the top of the canyons and there will be two large camping areas. One area will be for tent camping and the other will be a multi-use area that will have complete facilities for 60 campsites with shelters, restroom and a trailer dump station.

Just off the main road near the central part of Little Red, there will be an Interpretive Overlook, and from this point the entire range of hills can be seen in the distance. The hills can be seen in a spectacular range of colors at different times of the day when the sunlight strikes them at different angles. This point is expected to draw many visitors and should be a favorite spot for camera bugs.

Near this point the road down into South Prong will begin, and along this route the visitors will be treated to some of the most rugged and spectacular scenery that can be found anywhere in the state.

These were only a portion of the plans that were outlined at the meeting, for there will be over 18 miles of wilderness trails for backpackers and hikers, along with wildlife exhibits, wilderness campgrounds and many other interesting improvements.

The master planners are to be commended for their work in developing plans for the new park. Their willingness to come to Quitaque and discuss these plans and work with the people of this area in developing what many believe will be the finest park in the entire state is also appreciated.

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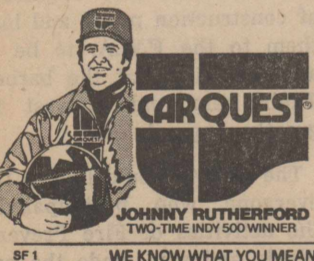

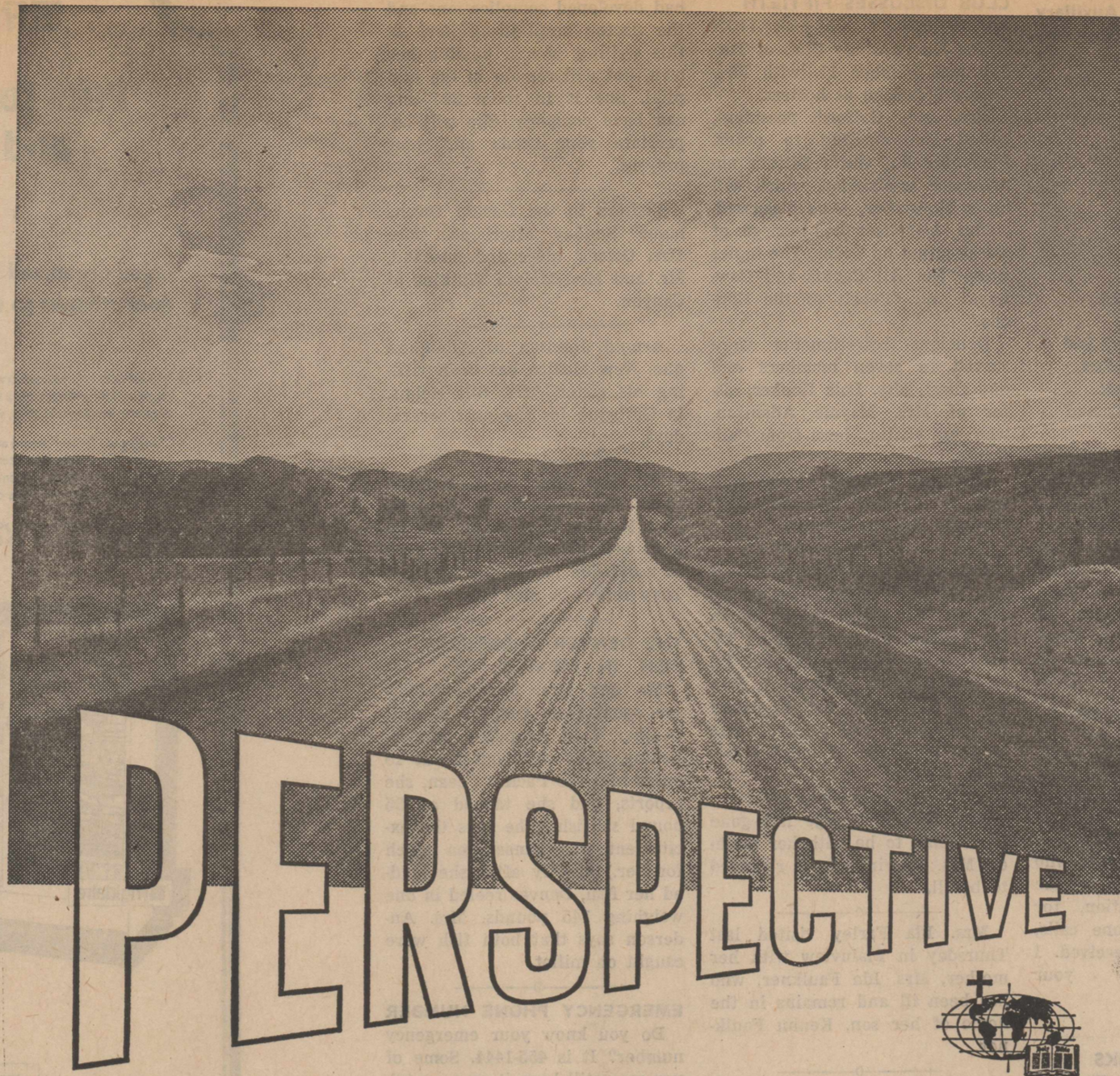


