Invasion Hero In Hospital



Lt. Arnold P. Atkinson, pictured here, has just written a letter to his brother, Troy Atkinson of Muleshoe, from McCloskey Hospital, in Temple, where he is recovering from wounds received while serving with the Army in France.

Lt. Atkinson is a graduate of the Muleshoe high school. He studied one year at Wayland College, in Plainview and attended Altus Junior College, Altus, Okla.; then entered Texas University. There he received his degree in law.

In April, 1942, he volunteered for Army Service. He entered as a private at Fort Sam Houston, and was then sent to Fort Benning, Ga.

There he completed his training and was an instructor for fourteen months.

He was then shipped to the European theater of operations. He landed in France on the day before D-Day, which netted him the Silver Star. He was then hit while in the breach through St. Lo.

Other medals he has received include the E. T. O. Ribbon with two Battle Stars, and the Purple Heart with one Oak Leaf Cluster.

Lt. Atkinson expects to be out of the hospital by late summer and to spend a few days with relatives and friends at Muleshoe.

Walter Thomas Wins Air Medal

With The Sixth Army on Luzon—Cpl. Walter J. Thomas, whose father, Joan Thomas, resides in Muleshoe, has recently been awarded the Air Medal by General Walter Krueger, Commanding General of the Sixth Army for meritorious achievement in Southwest-Pacific campaigns.

"Corporal Thomas and eight other men made numerous flights in unarmored cargo planes over enemy territory to drop supplies to our forces in forward areas. Many of these missions were successfully accomplished while flying through adverse tropical weather conditions and over jungle and mountain terrain," the citation stated.

On several occasions the planes returned damaged by enemy ground fire. By their courageous and outstanding devotion to duty, these men have contributed greatly to the success of the Allied Forces' operations.

AAA Ready To Pay On Beef Cattle Production

The 1946 Ford Is Announced

The first post-war hand made Ford passenger automobile to be known as the 1946 model, has been completed by the Ford Motor Company, according to Neil Rockey, of the Muleshoe Motor Company, distributors here of the Ford line.

Although assembly line production of new cars is expected to get under way in 60 or 90 days, depending upon the availability of raw materials, Ford officials pointed out that motorists will have to wait a year or two before they can buy new cars, due to limited production and priority restrictions.

The new 1946 post-war Ford will embody more mechanical improvements than many pre-war annual models, resulting in greater economy and a better ride.

The exterior front end appearance, interior trim, hardware, and other features are new in design.

E BOND GOAL NOT REACHED

Cattle feeders in Bailey County can now apply to the County AAA office for beef cattle production payments under the Government's new program to increase the production of meat.

Feeders are encouraged to feed more cattle, including those he purchased and those he raises, to good and choice grades under the new program. The method of payment is similar to the dairy payment, also handled through the local AAA office, according to County AAA Chairman W. L. Key.

The beef cattle production payment amounts to 50 cents per hundredweight on Good or Choice cattle weighing 800 pounds or more and selling for at least the minimum stabilization price, which for sales in this county is 13.50.

This is the first meat production payment made directly to livestock feeders. The program is designed to help hold the line against inflation by preventing sharp increases in retail prices which might lead to uncontrolled increases in wages and other economic factors.

The beef cattle production payment provided their cattle meet the program requirements. To be eligible a feeder must certify on his application (1) that he owned the cattle at least 30 days sold, (2) that the cattle brought not less than 800 pounds when sold, (3) that the cattle brought not less than the minimum price.

Veterinary Has Located Here

Bailey County and the Muleshoe territory now have the services of a veterinarian.

Dr. Jim H. Cass has moved here to open an office and soon he will be able to serve ranches, livestock and poultry raisers throughout the territory.

Dr. Cass is a graduate in Veterinary Medicine at the Texas A and M College, finishing his studies in 1943. Recently he has been assisting Dr. Saunders at Brownfield.

Dr. Cass said he has selected this territory to begin the practice of his profession after carefully investigating several points. He believes there are excellent prospects for further development of the livestock industry here.

Dr. and Mrs. Cass have located in an apartment in a private home just across the street west from the high school.

less than the minimum price for good grade, and (4) that the cattle were sold for slaughter to an authorized slaughterer.

An authorized slaughterer is any slaughterer who operates under a Federal inspection or under an OPA permit at the time he slaughters the feeder cattle on which the payment has been made.

A feeder-slaughterer is eligible to receive payment provided payment has not previously been made on his cattle. He also may receive payment on cattle he raises provided they are eligible under the program.

To collect payment he must substantiate the date of purchase, the price he paid, and the weight at the time of purchase. He must also certify the weight and grade of the carcass after slaughter to further determine the eligibility of the cattle.

A feeder other than a feeder-slaughterer must present sales receipts, invoices, scales tickets or other written evidence from the buyer to verify (1) date of sale, (2) the name of buyer, (3) point of sale, (4) the number of head, (5) the total liveweight, (6) the price received, and (7) the name of the legal authorized slaughterer to whom sold.

In addition the feeder, if he did not raise the cattle, must show the status of the cattle at the time he purchased them by furnishing the name of the person from whom purchased, and the date of the purchase. The feeder may also be required to furnish evidence that the payment has not been made previously on these cattle.

Payments will be made from fund of the Commodity Credit Corporation of which \$40 million has been authorized.

Farmers may obtain details of the program from their local AAA office. Applications will be accepted and payments made by the county AAA office as soon as the necessary forms are received.

I wish to tell you a little of my visit through the Hawaiian pineapple canning factory. This plant is the largest fruit canning plant in the world.

We were escorted through by a Hawaiian girl. We went first to the dining room for the employees. It is a very nice large room, with table space for fifteen hundred people. The meal cost the workers forty cents a meal for a five course dinner.

Then we went to the room where the pineapples are peeled. There are about forty machines that peel the fruit. Each machine peels ninety pineapples a minute.

The pineapple is elevated to the next room on endless chains, where

The plant in all covers forty acres. When we returned they had plenty of ice cold pineapple juice for us. I sure did enjoy my visit.

How To Keep Vegetables Fresh

If garden peas, beans or greens get ahead of family appetites now and then, a small quantity may be held over in the freezing compartment of the home refrigerator, according to Miss Grace L. Patterson, county home demonstration agent of Bailey county.

For finest eating quality, garden vegetables must be gathered when they reach just the right stage of maturity and tenderness. Left in the garden beyond this stage, they lose flavor and food value and become tough. Gardeners will be wise to pick all vegetables when they are just right, even if there are more than the family can use on that day. The extras may be frozen and kept in the refrigerator for meals a few days ahead.

Wash and prepare the vegetables as for cooking. Put them in a cheese cloth bag and dip in boiling water for the length of time recommended for freezing in lockers—approximately two minutes. Then cool immediately by dipping in ice water. Drain and place the vegetables in cellophane bags, seal with hot iron and place in the freezing compartment of the refrigerator.

The Army Answers Your Questions

Q. I was discharged from the Army last month. I lost the honorable discharge lapel button I was given. Would it be possible for me to get another one?

A. Yes. You may obtain one at the nearest Army installation for a nominal fee of 7 cents. Your honorable discharge certificate must be presented when you make the purchase.

Q. My husband wants to go to College under the G. I Bill of Rights as soon as he is discharged from the Army. We have two children. Will he be given any additional allowances under the bill to care for them?

A. No. In addition to college expenses, the most he can receive for maintenance is \$75 per month.

Q. Has the age at which an enlisted man may be discharged from the Army at his own request been reduced from 42 to 40?

A. Yes. QMMay WACs be discharged from the Army because they have reached a certain age, the same as enlisted men?

A. Yes. Any enlisted woman of the Women's Army Corps 40 years of age or over who has been on active duty for a year or more, may be discharged on her own application.

Q. Our son died at a Veterans' Hospital in this country. His body is buried in the cemetery near our home. Does the government furnish headstones for the graves of Veterans?

"THEY change their skies but not their hearts, who pass across the seas." That quotation, written by the poet Horace, provided Letitia Preston Osborne with the title of her delightful novel, "They Change Their Skies." The story is set in a pension in Honduras, but the cast of characters includes not only native Hondurans, but a variety of others who have made their temporary domicile under that country's skies.

Among them is the very British Mr. Pomfret, who is fond of commenting, "Time for the Latins has still to be discovered. Some people think this is enchanting. I do not." Another is Frau Holtz, the gentle German refugee, who is preparing so painstakingly to go to the United States. Her efforts to learn the conjugation of English verbs—even such contributions as "to pooh-pooh" and "to dilly-dally" which she learns from Mr. Pomfret—are one of the most hilarious sections of the story.

The main thread has to do with the romance of Isabel Gresham, a clerk in the American legation, and Armando, the Americanized son of the pension keeper, who returns to Honduras to realize that this is his land, and to find there a foreign wife.

The only character drawn from real life in her novel, says Miss Osborne, is Miss Amanda Peabody, a lady author from Virginia, who speaks Spanish with devastating assurance, and who, at one point in the story, does an Indian war dance to try to get it across to the little Honduran servant girl that she, too, has Indian blood.



Letitia Preston Osborne is descended from a combination of the finest Massachusetts, Virginia, and American Indian families. One of her ancestors was Opecanough, an uncle of Pocahontas, and a king. Her mother used to take out a picture of Sitting Bull and say, "Look, children, here is your great-granddaddy." To which, Letitia's brother would say, "Oh, Mother, please don't tell anybody in the town." Miss Osborne is small, with brown eyes and short, curly blonde hair, but she takes great pride in pointing out the high cheekbones, which she claims were bequeathed her by Opecanough.

"Rickshaw Boy," a novel of contemporary China, by Lau Shaw, one of China's greatest living writers, is the Book-of-the-Month Club selection for August. Some advance readers are referring to "Rickshaw Boy" as a kind of Chinese "Black Boy," and a book that will command wide attention among America's readers.

Sidelights From Washington

By Congressman George Mahon

The President last week, prior to leaving for the Pacific coast, prior to leaving for the Pacific coast by airplane, made a recommendation to Congress that the law be changed so as to provide that in the event of his death or inability to act, the Speaker of the House should succeed him as President. Under existing law the Secretary of State would

be the next in line. President Truman explained that this made it possible for him to name his own successor, the Secretary of State being an appointee of the President. The Speaker is an elected official. He is first elected by his Congressional district and later by the representatives of the people as Speaker.

The President's recommendation was apparently prompted by the fact that in the near future he is to make many trips by plane, somewhat hazardous in nature, including a flight over the Atlantic to the Big Three Conference. The Presidential plane is a four

engine C-54. We have many of them in the Air Transport Command. In fact, every thirteen minutes of the day, a C-54 takes off on a hop over the Atlantic. Only two of them have ever been lost on the Atlantic flight. The British by mistake shot one down in the vicinity of the Azores. Another one disappeared with 16 litter patients aboard, and no trace has ever been found of the plane or passengers.

The ATC planes fly on schedule in fair weather or foul, but the presidential plane would only fly in good weather, thus, fortunately, reducing the hazards to the very lowest minimum.

The C-54's of the Air Transport Command will have a big part in flying home from Europe 50,000 soldiers per month. Loved ones of these men can be thankful that the trips will not only be speedy but also relatively safe.

Bringing 50,000 men home by plane from Europe per month will require a half million barrels of gasoline. The big planes require an average of one gallon per mile.

Our men who return home by boat will cross the Atlantic in five days if they are lucky enough to be aboard the Queen Mary or Queen Elizabeth. But the Victory cargo ships which are being converted in to troop carriers will make only 15 knots and will require 14 days.

The shifting of the war in Europe to the all out effort in the Pacific will not only tax to the limit our transcontinental railroads, but will also give the Canal its biggest war job. I had a talk not long ago with General Joseph M. Haffey, Governor of the Canal Zone, and he said he was ready for the task.
