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

Over three million of America's pre-war cars need either new auto cigarette lighters or have defective lights requiring immediate attention, a recent survey discloses. The study conducted by Casco Product Company of Bridgeport, Conn. also shows 5.4 per cent have missing heads or heating elements, 8.4 per cent have defective wells, while 15.6 per cent have defective or worn heads.

A recent police traffic safety check shows that 34.2 per cent of the cars on the road today are defective. Defects help to roll up accident tolls at Rear and stop lights, 31.4 per cent; front lights, 19.7 per cent; brakes, 14.1 per cent; windshield wipers, 8.2 per cent; horns, 8.1 per cent; tires, 6.2 per cent.

**Farm Notes**

**AGRICULTURE SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED TECH STUDENTS**

**LUBBOCK**—A \$200 scholarship for agriculture students at Texas Tech has been presented by the Global Corporation of Lubbock in a move to encourage high scholarship and greater achievement in the field of agronomy.

The scholarship will be awarded annually in the fall semester to the senior student in agriculture who has completed at least 11 hours of agronomy before September of the school year in which the award is made, and who has the highest average of all students eligible in all work preceding his senior year.

The Global Corporation, which deals in both wholesale and retail grains, seeds and feeds, is headed by Ted T. Tipps, president and Homer Hunt, vice president, both long time residents of Lubbock, who are well known among farmers and seedsmen of the state.

**TEXAS BEING WASHED AWAY!**  
AUSTIN.—Texas is being literally washed away and eventually depleted grasses must be replenished to save the land, a University of Texas scientist says.


Dr. W. G. Whaley, director of a new project tentatively known as the Plant Research Institute, and an associate professor of botany, said that a study of grasses of Texas will be undertaken by the institute after other projects are well under way. An aerial study of Texas shows the tremendous losses of soil, and the need for conservation of grasses, he said.

The new institute will help Texas farmers grow bigger and better crops, and will have a program of fundamental development studies, he said. A working nucleus will be material and equipment used since 1935 in research on cotton.

**GARDENING POINTERS**  
COLLEGE STATION.—High cost of living and the low cost of a vegetable garden makes home gardening a smart move this year, say Extension horticulturists of the A and M College.

Giving pointers on February and March plantings, the horticulturists says that such vegetables as English peas, beets, carrots, spinach, lettuce, Irish potatoes, sweet corn, and cabbage should be planted early. These are cool season plants, and may be planted now in Central East and West Texas. In the Southern part of the state, it may be advisable to substitute other plants, such as mustard, or Swiss chard, for these cool season vegetables.

Horticulturists warn gardeners not to plant the entire garden now. Space should be left for tomato and pepper plants, butter beans, okra, and eggplants. These vegetables can be started now in a bed, however. Six or eight weeks later they will be ready to transplant in the open garden. This practice will give the slow-growing, frost tender plants a good head start and make it possible for the gardener to have them

out in the garden and producing vegetables from six weeks to two months earlier than usual.

Home gardeners can always call on county offices of the Extension Service for help on any phase of gardening, the horticulturists say.

**Crippled Children Entitled To Aid**

AUSTIN.—In an effort to familiarize every person in Texas with the services offered by the Crippled Children's Division of the State Health Department, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has released the following statement:

Every crippled child in Texas, un-

der 21 years of age, and of normal mentality whose parents are unable to pay for needed care, is entitled to assistance from this Division.

Assistance may be obtained by applying to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, or by placing an application through an established agency, city or county health unit.

**Social Security Man Here Feb. 27**

Elliott Adams, manager of the Social Security Administration in Lubbock, will be in Muleshoe on Thursday, February 27, at 9:00 a. m. at the postoffice.

At that time, Mr. Adams will answer any questions you may have with regard to benefits, claims, account number cards and others pertaining to Social Security.

Since monthly payments under the Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance system of the Social Security Act are based on average

wages, it is important that the worker keep a record of the name and address of each employer for whom he works and the amount of wages received from each.

This is particularly important for carpenters, plumbers, bricklayers, plasterers, electricians, musicians, and others who usually work for several employers a year.

Widows of insured workers may be delayed in obtaining the monthly insurance benefits for themselves and children if they don't know the names and exact locations of their husband's employers.

**Cotton Farmers Warned On Prices**

AUSTIN.—Warning cotton growers to plan 1947 operations with care, Dr. A. B. Cox, professor of cotton marketing at the University of Texas says that possible declining prices anticipated in 1947 could be the pitfall of cotton growers.

In the current Texas Business Review, published by the Bureau of Business Research, Dr. Cox writes, "The consensus is that the year 1947 will be one of declining prices both in terms of what farmers buy as well as what they sell. These declines will not be universal, they will not be uniform and they will not occur at the same

time." He estimated the carryover of cotton in the United States in August 1 will be about 3,200,000 bales, the lowest since August, 1929. On August 1, 1946, the carryover was 7,522,000 bales.

Demand for cotton goods is strong in the United States as it is throughout the world, Dr. Cox said, and there probably will be high rate of consumption in the next 12 months.

Sometimes, it's quite a problem to vary menus for your family, isn't it? I have one favorite recipe that's inexpensive but delicious, which I rely on for different family dinners and for company, too. So many of my friends have asked for it that I thought perhaps you might like to try it, too! And incidentally, if you've wondered how to use those odd leftover slices of bread, this is a grand way. Just be sure to wrap your bread carefully in waxed paper, and it will stay fresh until you're ready to use it. Here's my recipe for:

**Big Blow Was Good Soil Test**

COLLEGE STATION.—"The Big Blow" that swept across West Texas January 29 had its points—it was a good test of the Texas farmer's soil conservation work.

County Agricultural Agent J. K. Adams reports that the dust, called by old timers "the strongest puff of wind that has hit Bailey County in many moons," would have caused ten times as much soil damage if it had come along before the days when farmers knew how to protect their land from wind erosion.

Most Bailey County farmers were ready for it, Adams says. They left stubble in the fields after the grain

sorghum harvest, and let late weeds stay on the ground to help anchor down the top soil. The farmers are realizing the value of vegetative cover as a protection against wind erosion, says Adams, and to prevent speeding up moisture loss, they are not in too big a hurry to get their land opened up.

The county agent is working with the Soil Conservation Service in promoting Bailey County's soil conservation program.



**No Action Needed By Relatives of War Dead Until Inquiry**

Next of kin World War II need take no action relative to the return of the remains of their loved ones until an inquiry as to their wishes has been received from the Quartermaster General of the Army, Bureau of Medicine and Surgery of the Navy, The Commandant of the Marine Corps, or the Commandant of the Coast Guard, Col. E. V. Macatee, commanding officer of the San Antonio General Depot announced today.

The Graves Registration Service will begin returning bodies in the fall of this year from ten temporary cemeteries in both the European and Pacific Theatres, namely: seven in Hawaii, Henri Chappelle, Belgium, Cambridge, England, and St. Laurent, France. Relatives of those buried in these cemeteries will receive inquiries this spring asking whether they wish the remains returned to the United States for burial. This process will be continued as the Graves Registration Service move from cemeteries to cemeteries until the entire program is completed. As additional information is received names of other cemeteries will be published.

Col. Macatee said it is expected two years will be required to finish the program and also emphasized the importance of keeping the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard advised of any change in address or change in next of kin.



## SIDELIGHTS From Washington

By George Mahon

I was rather pleased to read in a Texas newspaper today that George Mahon is one of the hardest working men in Washington these days. I don't want to enter into a controversy with the press and cannot, therefore, deny the statement. Speaking of denials, we were having a hot argument in the Joint Senate-House Budget Committee the other day when Congressman Knutson, a blustery Republican leader, shouted that if the Republicans didn't do so-and-so they could be rightfully accused of talking through their hats for the last ten years. Senate Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky spoke up very quietly and said, "Well, I would like to say to the gentleman that I am in no position to deny that."

My work lately has been in connection with the effort of Congress to slash the budget and reduce Government spending, an essential requirement for our national well-being. As a member of the Joint Senate-House Committee to do the spade work on the job and report to Congress, I have attended all the meetings. At the first meeting last Friday, I voted against the 6 billion dollar cut which was proposed and approved by the committee. I made a speech in opposition to the action of the Committee, asserting that the Republican members had confessed from the Congress and from the American people the facts and figures as to just where the cuts were to be made. I said that the report would be meaningless and ineffective unless backed up with an itemized list of the major cuts. Senator Taft agreed with me on this point and to demonstrate his good faith, he himself gave some specific figures as to where he would support certain reductions, but the figures were inadequate and inconclusive. As to the Armed Forces, he thought a cut of one billion dollars would be in order. My thought is that some cut in military appropriations can safely be made, but not that much. Cuts in the military should be made in civilian personnel and in Army construction, but not in such things as military personnel, research and development, and aviation.

At any rate, it is estimated by those best acquainted with the facts that if the 6 billion dollar cut actually goes into effect, the Army and Navy will decidedly be reduced. The Federal road fund will be curtailed, the school lunch program for next year will be abolished, the administrative expense of the Veterans Administration will be reduced by 200 million dollars, AAA payments already committed will be reduced by 100 million dollars, authorization of REA loans to local Co-Ops will be reduced by more



I have said to my colleagues here that Government economy was in the interest of agriculture but that was poor economy to try to balance the budget out of the hide of the farmer, and I could not go along with the Republican sponsored plan for Agriculture.

In the meeting last Friday, 102 Members of the House and Senate were allowed to participate. We made a motion to permit members of the press to listen to the pro-

ceeding so that a full report could be given to the people. The motion was voted down. A motion was made that 3 billion of the 6 billion dollar expenditure reduction be applied to the public debt. This motion likewise was voted down.

Senator Barkley, on behalf of 3 members of the Senate, and Cannon, Doughton and myself of the House, offered a motion that no income tax reduction be considered by Congress until we had passed the major

proportion bills through the House and had actually demonstrated that the proposed savings could be made. This motion likewise was rejected.

The whole controversy has now gone to the floor of the House and Senate. It will be confusing to try to follow this controversy. But I hope that many needed economies will be made and Government spending reduced, without the impairment of essential Government

operations. Everybody wants to cut expenses and reduce taxes. The argument comes over the extent of the cuts and where they are to be made.

The Bureau of the Budget has recommended the spending of 37 1-2 billion dollars next year, but Congress thinks that's too much and we feel the people agree.

One day last week Gen. Omar Bradley came down and said he needed 2 billion dollars in additional funds for the Veterans Administration. We are going to provide part of the money now and more later when he needs it. The OPA has 14,000 employees and 150,000 men to operate.

spend 28 million dollars for operating expenses between now and July 1. We are asking Congress to reduce this expenditure by one half. It is capturing some of the funds appropriated for OPA before the President lifted most controls last November.

One of the members of our Committee said he got a letter from a man in his District in Missouri a few days ago which began like this: "I am so mad at the OPA that I am shouting at my stenographer as I dictate this letter."

As this session of Congress gets under way, clashes between Democrats and Republicans become

more pronounced, but this is understandable because we live in a Country where men in and out of public life are permitted to have different opinions and freely express them. This is unlike Russia, where Joe Stalin in his District recently was elected by a vote of 110,691 to nothing.



**Fixing Up the Farm**

**Head-Hole Hog Waterer**  
WALLOWs are eliminated when head-hole hog waterers are used. A drinking unit of this kind can be made with comparatively little effort of the used lumber found about the farm. The one pictured below is made in the shape of a rectangular box and contains five compartments, four of which have openings just large enough for the jaws.



Each long side has two openings. The fifth compartment is completely boxed in and houses the float valve that regulates the water level. The waterer shown has been mounted on a skid platform to facilitate hauling from one site to another and as a further precaution against wallows. A barrel could hold the water supply if piped water is unavailable.

Excess water runs through the cracks between the boards so there are no wet places inviting the pigs to lie down.
