Osborn Elected Area Official

Organization of water users of the High Plains of Texas advanced to the regional state in Plainview Saturday when ten countywide associations and the Petersburg association formed the High Plains Water Use and Conservation Association.

Course of action of the association will be mapped at a directors' meeting to be held in Plainview Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the city auditorium.

Officers elected were W. O. Fortenberry, of Monroe, and Lubbock, president; A. B. Tarwater of Plainview, vice-president; Jesse Osborn, of Muleshoe, secretary-treasurer. Presidents of affiliated associations were automatically members of the regional association and each member association will have another member-two from each association.

Jesse Osborn, Muleshoe banker, was elected secretary-treasurer of the regional organization formed in Plainview Saturday to oppose legislation designed to control ground water of the Plains.

Attending the meeting from Bailey county were Mr. Osborn, Ross Goodwin, O. M. Self, John S. Williams, W. M. Witterling, Bill Millen and Bill Mathieson.

They represented the Bailey County Water Conservation District formed here some time ago, of which Osborn is president and Goodwin secretary-treasurer.

Regional association must be made by at least two-thirds of the committee.

Other associations, not now represented, may be admitted to the regional organization as determined by its directors.

Directors of the regional associations are Fortenberry, Tarwater, Osborn, J. L. Suits of Petersburg, C. H. Kuper of Bailey county, Clyde Bradford and Archie Jordan of Swisher county, Howard Gault of Deaf Smith county, Ed Whitfill of Floyd county, J. G. McFarland of Parmer county, Posey Cunningham of Castro county, Gus Parrish and Mr. Lee of Lamb county with G. E. Bley alternate, and others yet to be named by local association to fill the complement of two each.

The area meeting followed one of the Hale county association, at which by-laws were adopted, proclaiming the purposes of the association to be "intelligent study, conservative use and beneficial development of the underground water resources of the High Plains of the state of Texas."

## —Farm Notes—

### HIGH COST OF LOW MILK PRODUCTION

College Station — Underfeeding a good cow is one of the most expensive mistakes that can be made in dairy management, say dairy husbandmen of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

From now on until grass comes on again, most dairymen are faced with a real need for getting the greatest good out of each pound of feed, the dairymen say. This means that cows that do an unsatisfactory job of milk production when given an opportunity must be moved out, so that feed supplies can be best utilized to prevent the underfeeding of good cows. Then the remainder of the herd should be fed a balanced ration according to production.

An average sized milk cow, capable of producing three gallons of milk per day, needs about 18 lbs. of good hay and 9 lbs. of suitable grain mixture. This feed will meet her production and maintenance requirements. If the hay allowance is cut in half, fifty percent of the nutrients required to produce the

three gallons of milk is lost. In a short time, her production will come down to a gallon and a half as she cannot draw on her body reserves indefinitely to make up for the loss.

Plenty of good roughage is the basis of the ration. Feeding hay twice or even three times a day is preferable to putting out the entire amount at one time, the dairymen say. This will prevent waste and enable the cows to handle more efficiently the hay that they eat.

The Extension dairymen emphasize that the cost of producing a pound of butterfat or a gallon of milk from a low producing cow is always greater than the cost of producing the same amount from a good cow.

### SAVED—ONE FARM

College Station—Worn out land can be made to produce again. Through modern methods of soil building, Frank Robinson, Comal County farmer, this year has realized the first big return from a four-year soil building program on a 76-year-old farm that had virtually no top soil back in 1942. The big pay-off was a 70 bushel-to-the-acre corn crop, harvested when average county yield was 20 bushels.

Taking over the old eroded land in 1942, Robinson began the revival of soil with terracing to prevent further erosion. Finding that the soil was hard and solid, he then devised a special method of tillage to break up the ground without disturbing the little top soil that remained. He had a tillage machine

made with claw-like blades which would go down into the earth 23 inches and break up the packed soil.

Taking another step, he went to the Comal County Agricultural Agent J. W. Brumelow and got recommendations on fertilizers and adapted cover crops that would supply the organic matter near the soil surface for rapid decomposition. Legumes were cut into the top 3 or 4 inches of soil.

When Robinson figured the land was ready to produce again, he planted treated seed to control diseases and carefully mapped out a crop rotation system, making a special effort to plant a variety of crops adapted to his region. County Agent Brumelow now reports that Robinson's program has brought the old farm back to

life. This year, his 70-bushel corn crop is a "convincer" that many of the lifeless farms in the state can be revived by modern soil building practices.

### FARM CASH INCOME

Austin—During the first eleven months of 1946 the Bureau of Business research of the University of Texas estimates the farm cash income of the state at \$1,154,537,000 as compared with \$1,064,306,000 in the same months of 1945. This increase represents a gain of 9 percent and puts the income of Texas farmers at an all-time high in dollars.

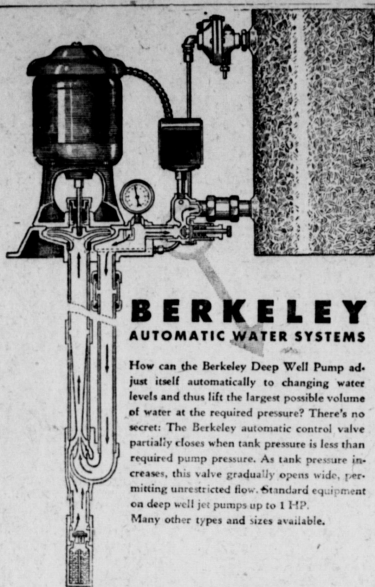

Agriculture, but will be financed by the Arabian-American Oil Company, a subsidiary of Standard Oil Company. Equipment will come through the lend-lease program. Chief of the mission is Kenneth J. Edwards, product of Texas A. & M.

Sam Logan had served as county agent in Kinney and Menard counties before coming to Bailey county. He took a leave of absence while on the field here, entered the Navy and served as gunnery officer in the Armed Guard. After separation from service following the end of the war, Logan became associated with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe F. Logan in the operation of their ranch near Sonora. Since that time he has visited here with friends and has kept in close touch with the people of Bailey county. Logan is a graduate of Texas A. & M.

Logan expects to be gone three years, the Sonora paper said. He said that the chief aims of the mission are to bring about an increase in food production in Arabia, which has never produced large quantities

of food, and to develop water resources of the country. The mission's headquarters will be about 50 miles from those of King Ibn Saud, ruler of Saudi Arabia.

Logan spent a year in the Pacific and a year in the Atlantic theaters, being discharged December 10, 1945 with the rank of Lieutenant.


### Fixing Up the Farm

by BURTON WILLIAMS

For Lightning Protection

CHECKING the farm's lightning protection equipment is a fore-handled thing to do at any time, but if it is done in fall while the weather is still pleasant it may save breaking into next summer's busy schedule.

Lightning rods should be placed within two feet of the ends of all ridges, gables and dormers and be spaced not less than 20 feet apart. They should be placed so that no corner of a chimney is more than two feet from such air terminals.

There should be at least two conductors with independent ground connections, located preferably at diagonally opposite corners. If the building is over 80 feet in length, extra conductors are necessary for every additional 60 feet of ridge length.

An effective lightning conductor system demands that the conductors extend into moist ground. In normally moist soil a depth of 10 feet is sufficient. In dry sand or gravel it is necessary to sink two electrodes 10 feet below grade spaced six feet apart.


