Is Announced REA Allocation

Announcement was made in Washington that the Rural Electrification Administration has approved a loan of \$430,000 to the Bailey County Electric Cooperative for improvement and extension.

The announcement said the allocation would permit improvements and the building of 240 miles of new lines in five counties.

Bailey, 143 miles; Cochran, 60; Lamb, 15; Castro, 15; and Parmer, 30. Officials of the local cooperative recently announced their purchase of a future site for a home of the association. A one-half block of ground located near the old school grounds was acquired for the erection of an office, warehouse, etc.

In token of their appreciation of his untiring efforts in behalf of the Muleshoe school system and of his successful conduct of the school expansion program, a group of friends of W. C. Cunningham have presented him with a grand new shotgun a week's vacation, and an expense free hunting trip to the pheasant country in the Dakotas.

At a special meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held Friday the surprise presentation was made. Morris Douglass of the school board read a letter granting Mr. Cunningham the vacation.

Marion E. Harris presented the shotgun and Pat Bobo presented the check which will defray all expenses of the pheasant hunt. Mr. Cunningham has worked diligently and intelligently since coming here a little over two years ago, as head of the school system. Many progressive movements have been initiated by him and the other school officials and a great era of development has been launched.

Through consolidations effected and through a steady growth in the district's population, the number of scholars here has doubled since Mr. Cunningham took over the reins of school administration.

Now under construction is a splendid new high school building. A vocational building has been completed on the new school campus, and several other auxiliary buildings have gone up to furnish badly needed class rooms. In addition the school last fall opened a new athletic stadium and has greatly improved it this summer.

Cotton Quotas Up For Decision

Whether or not marketing quotas must be proclaimed for the 1949 crop of American upland cotton will be decided by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan within the next few months. The Secretary has called on all interested parties to submit their views for consideration before the Official determination of facts as to the cotton supply and demand situation. Such views must be submitted by September 10.

As required by law, the Secretary of Agriculture must proclaim these facts not later than November 15: (1) the normal cotton supply and the carry-over as of August 1, 1948; (2) the probable domestic consumption of American cotton during the 1948-49 marketing year; (3) the probable exports; (4) the estimated carry-over of cotton on August 1, 1949; and (5) the amount of the national cotton allotment for 1949.

Marketing quotas for 1949-50 must be proclaimed if it is determined that the total supply of cotton in relation to probable demand for the 1948-49 marketing year exceeds the normal supply by more than 7 percent. To be made effective, the use of quotas must be approved by at least 520-thirds of the farmers voting in a referendum in all cotton-producing states. If quotas are proclaimed such a referendum must be held not later than December 15.

The 1948 crop of cotton on August 1, was estimated at 15,169,000 bales, about 28 percent larger than last year's. This would be the largest crop since 1937 and the seventh largest on record. The average yield was estimated at 313.5 pounds per acre, an all-time record which tops the previous 1944 record by 14.6 pounds.

Beneficial Rains Fall In This Area

Beneficial rains fell in a fairly wide area Tuesday night and Wednesday, but the moisture arrived too late to save many crops. In Muleshoe the fall was .81 of an inch.

The fall varied from around an inch north and west of town to a reported three inches in the Bileyboro neighborhood.

Several who called in the office this week expressed the opinion the moisture would be a life saver. Others have crops that have been too badly burned by August's hot, dry weather.

The rain fell slowly here and provided enough moisture for wheat planting, soon due to begin.

Those who desire to enter must qualify by shooting 50 rounds and pay a \$2 entrance fee not later than Wednesday, Sept. 15.

After all qualifying scores are in the field will be divided into championship, second and third flights.

Trophies will be given to the winners and the runner up in each of the three flights.

The Muleshoe Gun Club, sponsors of the tournament, set qualifying days on Sept. 8, 12, and 15.

Livestock Division

Registered Livestock Show Rules and Regulations

The primary purpose of this show is to allow the general public an opportunity to get acquainted with breeders of registered livestock in the Muleshoe Trade Territory and a well fitted and groomed sample of the kind of livestock they have or may in the future have to sell.

1. Each breeder will be allowed to enter two Registered animals. These animals may be males, females, or one male and one female.

2. All animals over one year of age must carry registration papers and all other animals shown must have sire and dam's that are registered in their respective breed association.

3. All animals must be in their places before noon on the opening day of the show and a well qualified judge will begin classification of show animals at 1:00 P. M. on the opening day of the show.

4. One third of all entries will be entitled to a blue ribbon and each blue ribbon winner will also win a cash prize of \$3.00.

5. One third of all entries will be entitled to a red ribbon and each red ribbon winner will be entitled to a cash prize of \$2.00.

6. Remaining entries will be awarded white ribbons and \$1.00 in cash.

7. The judge will place an official score on each animal so that each exhibitor will not only know how his animal will compare with animals of like sex and breed but will also know the exact degree of superiority or inferiority.

PLANTS AND CUT FLOWERS

All potted plants must be entered not later than 10:00 a. m., Friday, September 16.

2. Premiums on cut flowers will be awarded Friday, September 16, and must be entered by 10:00 a. m., Friday, September 16.

3. An exhibitor must be an amateur who raises and cultivates flowers purely for pleasure and ornament.

4. All entries under potted plants must be rooted.
