Parrish Carries Bailey County

Senator Sterling Parrish carried Bailey County but lost the race for the Democratic nomination for State Senator for the 30th Senatorial District to Judge Kilmer Corbin, of Lamesa.

Senator Parrish received 460 votes in the run off primary to 310 for Judge Corbin Bailey County was in the minority in this race, since Mr. Parrish carried only six counties in the district and the vote was tied in one county.

R. V. Thurmond, irrigation specialist for the Extension Service, was in Bailey County all day last Thursday doing research work according to the needs of our farmers as pointed out to him by J. K. Adams, county Extension agent.

Highlight of the day was the testing of irrigation wells for rate of production and water level while the pump was operating at mid-summer peak.

The Irvin St. Clair well, a mile northeast of Muleshoe was double checked for pumping capacity and proved to be producing 1718 gallons of water per minute. It was the strongest well yet tested by Mr. Thurmond in the Panhandle area.

Mr. Adams commented: "While we are all proud of our strong wells, it might be well also to give sober consideration to the fact that the St. Clair well also had a temporary draw down from the 20 foot natural level down to 63 feet, 6 inches while pumping. A little mental arithmetic will indicate that many wells in the Muleshoe area should have a deeper setting to insure efficient operation."

Plains Missionary To Brazil Dies

Mrs. Iona Stover, who went out from the First Baptist Church in Clovis as a missionary to Brazil in 1923, died at 2 p. m. Sunday in a Clovis hospital. She was 52.

Survivors are her husband, T. B. Stover, 722 Ross street; a son, Bert, a student at the University of Colorado; her mother, Mrs. Laura Baster, 500 Ross street, and three sisters, Mrs. Everett Sieren, Clovis, Mrs. W. B. McAdams, Muleshoe, Tex., and Miss Ray Baster, also a missionary to Brazil.

Mrs. Stover and her sister were the first two missionaries from the Baptist Church in Clovis, the only Baptist church here at the time.

They served a six-year period and then a one year furlough, during which time they returned to the United States. Mr. Stover, also a missionary and connected with the Baptist publishing company in Rio de Janeiro, brought his wife to Clovis in March of this year because of her ill health.

Funeral Services were to be at 4 p. m. Monday at the Charles V. Steed Memorial Chapel by the Central Baptist church. Burial was in the Mission Garden of Memories under direction of Steed Funeral Home. - Clovis News Journal.

The well is located on land owned Finis Kimbrough.

Crops Deteriorate In Heat, Drouth

Continued hot, dry weather has caused a swift deterioration in grain sorghum and cotton prospects in Bailey County. The cotton crop, which looked very promising six weeks ago, has gone down so rapidly that an estimate of 60,000 bales made August 1 had to be scaled down to 20,000 estimated as of August 26. K. N. Klapp, of Anderson, Clayton Co., Lubbock, estimated the prospects were down by two-thirds.

Sorghum grains, especially the early crops, have not suffered so spectacularly, but the prospects are far below the outlook a scant thirty days ago. Late feed is burned up in many places.

Rains have been spotted, and this is reflected in spotted crop conditions. While much dry land will produce well, crops on many dry land farms are burned to a crisp.

September is the month when wheat growers begin to look for moisture for planting. This year is no exception. There is no underground season and moisture will have to come for this operation.

Crops on irrigated farms are good.

R. P. McCall won the Democratic nomination for Bailey County Commissioner, Precinct 4, in the run-off election held Saturday, nosing out his opponent, W. E. "Woody" Goforth by only 7 votes. The final tally gave McCall 224, Goforth 217.

It was the only run off contest for the county, all other races having been decided in the first primary.

Bailey county will have two new commissioners when January 1 rolls around. Bob Kindle was nominated in Precinct 3 to succeed Glen Williams, currently the commissioner. McCall will succeed P. A. "Dude" Altman, who is retiring from the post. Tom Smith in Precinct 2 and L. T. McKillip in Precinct 1, had no opposition for reelection.
