Research Of Sorghum Grains As A Substitute For Flour Being Resumed

LUBBOCK, Oct. 30.—Research on sorghum grains and flour made from grains produced in Texas' southplains area is being resumed by the foods and nutrition department at Texas Technological college.

Shallu, which produces a fine grain white flour, and Martin maize, producer of a coarser darker flour, are the two grains which will be tried in the next experiment. Standard receipts for hot breads, yeast breads and pastries will be used in the tests. The experiments are designed specifically to determine allowable proportions of sorghum grain flour substitute for wheat flour to obtain equally satisfying products.

During the texture and taste experiments, a biological assay will be conducted on the grains to determine nutritive properties, Mrs. Johnnie Michie, professor of foods and nutrition, said. A colony of approximately 125 white rats are to be used in this part of the ex-

periment. "Revived interest in utilizing for human consumption an abundantly grown crop as sorghums in this area prompted extension of grain sorghum experiments done in 1942. During that year some work was done in use of flours from coarser maize in hot breads," Mrs. Michie said.

Since Shallu has been developed, indications are that, because of better milling properties of this grain, it will be possible to make finer textured and more acceptable products from the flour, and also that this flour will be more suitable for use in wider range of flour mixtures.

Extensive investigation into sorghums' possibilities at Texas Tech has been made possible through the co-operation of Mr. R. E. Karper, agronomist, in charge of sorghum investigations by Texas Experiment station, who has made available sufficient amounts of the grains. The department of milling industry at Kansas State college at Manhattan, Kans., is turning the grains into acceptable flour types.

Dr. Mina Lamb, associate professor of foods and nutrition, and Miss Faye Hattox, instructor, are working with Mrs. Michie in direction of the experiment. A number of graduate assistants are assisting in the tests.

Results of the experiments will be announced next summer. Research will be continued, however, two years to substantiate findings.

So this is HOUSEKEEPING

As it must to all newlyweds came the time in the life of the Stuarts when the budget first reared its homely head. We worked out an arrangement which included a set sum for running the house and (the best part) a personal allowance for me. For a while everything went fine until house frantically began borrowing from allowance. I discovered that food was the bugaboo in the scheme of things.

With my ears out like antennae, I went back to mother and asked a repeat performance of all the good advice she had given me. She stressed two pearls of wisdom: first, food economy starts with

wise buying and goes through storing, and second, getting the best quality usually means getting the most for your money. One smart, important step is to choose foods that come well packaged and thus protected from any contamination. That means savings. Take butter, for instance. The best butter is packed in paraffined cartons which keep out odors of other foods and protect the product from the damaging effects of light and air both in the store and at home. Recent tests will prove what I mean about protective paraffin containers.

Two batches of top quality 93 score butter were compared. One batch was protected only by vegetable parchment. The second batch was packed in parchment plus a paraffined carton. At the end of five days the butter in the parchment—without the carton—had dropped its score to 89.3 while the cartoned butter went down only half a point to 92.5! That kind of protection against loss of quality and flavor adds up to wise buying in my book of figures. So I not only buy butter packed in a paraffined carton—I keep it in the carton till it's all used up—and it tastes better right to the last speck!

I've a few more economy tricks like the paraffin carton guide up my sleeve and it begins to look as if I'll be able to call my allowance my very own!

NEW CROPS ARE BEING RAISED

Parmer County Farmers Have To Dig Deeper For Their Irrigation Water

Parmer County farmers, our neighbors to the north, are digging deeper to find the source of huge agricultural wealth. A summary of the new developments in Parmer is contained in an article in The Friona Star

which we are reproducing here: Irrigation Development of Parmer County is set apart from its neighboring southwest Panhandle Counties because of the depth of its wells.

Some of the wells, particularly in the Farwell and Bovina area, reach 290 to 300 feet deep, with pumps set from 250 to 260 feet, according to County Agent Ollie Linder.

Other wells, mostly around Friona and along the Bailey County line, near Muleshoe, are 100 to 250 feet deep.

For the most part the water is being used to irrigate grain sorghums. With prices high, the operation has paid off in figures which loom high on Parmer County bank records and has enabled many farmers to pay for a well in the first year of operation.

This means a profit of from \$6,500 to \$10,000 for that is the cost range on wells, depending on depth of drilling. Average cost of wells in the county has been about \$7,500, the County Agent said.

Some farmers irrigated wheat and realized a profit last year when prices were high and the dry land crop was a near failure. But wheat irrigation remains a risky operation, Mr. Linder said, with timing the all-important factor. "The water's got to be on at the right time, or it's wasted," he emphasized.

Other irrigated crops, still brand-new to the county are showing promise. A few farmers around Friona have requested potato allotments next year, and four or five operators are raising sugar beets under contract with the American Crystal Sugar Company, which also is contracting the crop around

Hereford. Beet harvest is in progress and yields are reported good. Among farmers who are devoting 40 or 50 acres to beets this year are W. L. Edelson and Giles Cobb of Friona.

Another new crop which shows a two-way profit, in added beef poundage and in soil building, is the permanent pasture now being irrigated in Parmer County. A mixture of crested wheat grass, brome perennial rye and alfalfa is winning favor. Altogether there are about 1,000 acres in such pasture, Mr. Linder said.

That thousand acres can economically handle 2,500 head of cattle during the 9½-month growing season. Altogether the pasture project is one of the easiest and most profitable which can be undertaken by the farmer, the county agent believes.

Total irrigation equipment investment in the county is estimated at around \$1,125,000 and it's only the beginning, said County Agent Linder. In this business, he pointed out, one good well leads to another and already several farmers have two or more wells. Among these are W. S. Menefee, Frank and Charley Hinkston, Jess Osborn and W. L. Edelson. "Nearly every time I locate a well," Mr. Linder said, "I can count

on the farmer being back in six months or a year for help in locating a second well."

Parmer County farmers are having to dig for something which comes easy in other parts of the Plains irrigated district, but the deep digging is turning up the customary agriculture treasure.

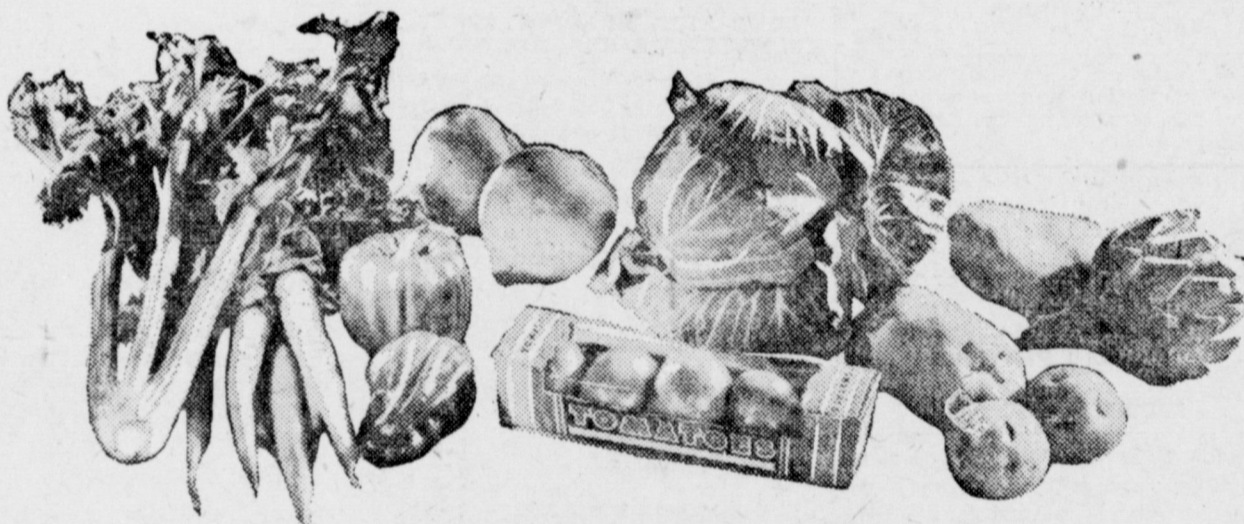

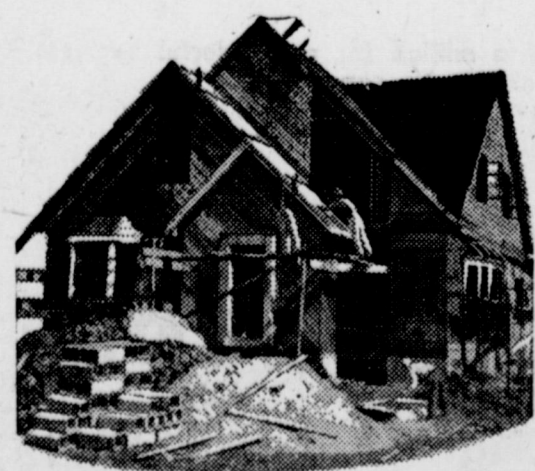

MEAT CUT Quiz
Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
 A. These are spare ribs.
Q. Where does the cut come from and how is it identified?
 A. Spare ribs are cut from the side of the pork carcass. They are the ends of the ribs which have been removed from the bacon strip. The spare ribs have a flat, gently-ribbed appearance, with a coating of fat. The ends of the rib bones are visible as is the lean meat between the ribs.
Q. How should this cut be prepared?
 A. Spare ribs may be braised or roasted. Complete cooking is important to bring out the fullest flavor of the meat, so they are always cooked to the well-done stage. To braise the meat, first brown it well in hot fat in a heavy utensil. Add a small amount of liquid, and cook slowly, covered for 1 1/2 hours. To roast, place the "ribs" on a rack in an open roasting pan and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 2 1/2 hours. To barbecue, roast the spare ribs, basting frequently with your favorite barbecue sauce. Spare ribs are also delicious when stuffed with a bread or fruit stuffing and roasted.

Adams Tells How To Treat Swine To Stop Mange

By J. K. Adams
 Mange is caused by small mites which burrow into the skin, spending their entire life on the infected hog. It spreads chiefly by direct contact with infected animals and sleeping quarters. The mites are so small they are very difficult to observe with the naked eye. As the mites burrow into the skin, they produce intense irritation and inflammation. A thick, leathery, wrinkled condition of the skin develops.
 Hog mange is a serious problem in the Texas Panhandle from now until late spring as hogs are prone to bed down in close contact in infected quarters.
 Until recently, the average farmer gave up in disgust after trying to clean up his premises by now out dated methods.
 Tests that have been made by the Omaha Livestock Sanitary and Loss Prevention Board involving 2,000 infected farm and feed lot hogs and the use of chlordane and benzene hexachloride have been concluded and results are worth our attention.
 Both of the above chemicals gave excellent results in cleaning up even the most advanced mange cases with only one treatment.
 You must use caution in applying benzen hexachloride as it may taint the meat if applied in less than 30 days before slaughter. If chlordane is used, special veterinary emulsion concentrates only should be used.
 Bulletins with complete information on the new and effective drugs will soon be available at my office.
