Bids To Be Received On City Water And Sewage Projects

Bids have been requested for the construction in Muleshoe of an elevated water storage, water mains, another well, sewage collecting lines, three lift stations, force main and an Imhoff sewage disposal tank.

Plans and specifications for these additions, authorized at a recent election, are available at the office of Hasie & Green, city engineers, in Lubbock.

Bids are to be turned in by March 30.

Voters at the election authorized the issuance of \$300,000 city bonds, \$95,000 of which was to refund an old bond issue, \$205,000 to go for new sewer and water system extensions, additions, and improvements.

Largest items in the program is the new elevated tank and the Imhoff sewage disposal plant.

He was accompanied here by a cousin Bill Lebow, farmer of near Clovis, with whose family he had been staying. Already three days on the road, Mr. Lebow estimated he could make New York City in eight months.

He was selling pictures of himself and his wheel chair, half of what he takes in to go to the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation. Mr. Lebow was stricken when he was eight years old. He is now 43.

SCHOOL CENSUS NOW UNDERWAY

The annual school census began in Muleshoe independent school district March 1, and will continue through the month, according to announcement of Frank Cummings, business manager. He said the census must be completed by April 1.

In connection with the census, Mr. Cummings made the following statement to the people of the district:

All children who will be 6 years of age on or before September 1, 1949, and all children who will be under 18 years of age Sept. 1, 1949, must be enumerated.

It is expected that the State apportionment will be \$50 per child for the coming school year, a drop of \$5 over the apportionment for the current year, which is \$55. So you can see that missing only a few children can mean a loss of quite a bit to the school district.

Every effort possible will be made not to miss one child, but we want and will need the cooperation of every parent and patron.

If any parents have a child that will be of school age next year, become 6 years of age on or before the 1st day of September, 1949, be sure to get his or her name on a census blank, or anyone knowing of a family that has just moved into the district or a family that have children not in school for any reason—either white, Mexican, or Negro—the will be greatly appreciated and you will be helping the school if you will drop by the office of Frank Cummings, school business manager, located across the street north from Malone Milk Company and give him the names and information.

LIVESTOCK TO BE BANNED IN CITY

Henceforth it will be in violation of a city ordinance to keep livestock, cattle, horses, or hogs, within the city limits of Muleshoe at a distance of less than 150 feet from a residence structure.

The city commission passed the ordinance at its last meeting, and the full ordinance will be published in The Journal in an early issue.

Dr. L. T. Green, the county health officer, will see that provisions of the ordinance are carried out.

Members of the city commission said the ordinance is to eliminate breeding places for flies and to prevent other unsanitary conditions. Last summer, they said, despite the fact the city used their own spraying machine, flies were numerous, because livestock furnished breeding places for them. It is hoped to better this condition the coming summer.

The officials told The Journal that a grace period of 30 days will be given by the ordinance, in which period residents will be enabled to make necessary arrangements to comply.

H. S. SANDERS, SR. HURT IN CAR MISHAP

H. S. Sanders, Sr., received painful bruises and lacerations when the car he was driving crashed into the rear of a parked truck on the highway near Falls last Friday morning at 7:30. Three stitches were required to close a cut in his forehead. He was given emergency treatment at a Lubbock hospital.

Mr. Sanders was alone. Another automobile, which had just passed him, turned over several times in avoiding the parked truck, and the ensuing dust obscured the truck from Mr. Sanders' view until he was within a few feet of it. He swerved to the right but the truck caught the rear end of his car, fortunate to get out of it with no more serious injury. His car was badly damaged.

AVERAGE MAN CAN ADVANCE IN THIS COUNTRY

A Swiss journal recently published a study of how much working time the average man in various nations has to put in to earn enough to buy certain basic commodities. Russia was at one end of the scale and the United States at the other. It was found that a Soviet worker had to labor over an hour for the purchase price of 2 1/2 pounds of bread, while the U. S. worker could earn enough in 15 minutes. That same Soviet worker required 580 hours for a suit of clothes. In this country, 28 hours was sufficient.

Many causes contribute to this amazing difference—such as skill of American workmen, our advanced technology, and an economic system which rewards initiative and enterprise. There is still another cause which many of us may overlook—and that is the contribution to our living standards and purchasing power made by American retailing.

In Russia, there is no such thing as competition among stores. The

OUR NEEDS

We realize most fully that our world is lost; that our nation is lost; that millions of adults are lost, and that we are losing our youth to the same subtle forces that make any people depraved. What can we do to redeem mankind, and to save our youth?

First, let the church and church people save themselves. The church is tied to traditions many of which have no meaning in the redemption of our people and our youth. We have ample preachers who preach the gospel along with a lot of antiquated ideas. Many things are preached in the pulpits of our land that are silly. Much preaching is ranting and lambasting, and does no one any good. We need men to first discover the true gospel; experience it, and practice it. The Church must first save herself if she hopes to save others. A new discovery of Jesus Christ will help solve our problems.

Much is said about our youth going to the "Devil," but who is really imparting unto youth the things they need and most of them want? New Orleans is solving their delinquent youth problem by means of recreational centers. These centers are costing a lot of money, but it is reducing crime at a rapid pace, and making good citizens. Idleness is the work shop of the "Devil." Keep any people employed all the time in work and play, and there will be less time for evil planning and living.

Muleshoe needs a recreational state owns or controls them all, and stocks and prices are whatever the dictators think desirable. In this country retail competition is wide open. Chains, independents, big department stores and little specialty shops—every kind and character of store is aggressively seeking consumers' inducements—such as lower prices, special service, more varied and attractive displays, and so on. The result is that we get better goods at a lower price than any other kind of economy can provide. The consumer's income, even in a period of inflation, pays for all the necessities and leaves him a surplus for luxuries that would be undreamed of elsewhere.

Those who think a controlled economy would benefit the masses should look at Russia, where regimentation is complete. The result has been one of the lowest living standards on earth.

center for our youth and adults, but our youth is our chief concern. If this town will employ a full time director of youth activities, and give an instructive and a wholesome program, we will produce even better boys and girls. We do not need any one to lead our youth except clean Christian leaders. Examples of goodness is the best teaching. It is not a matter of can we afford such a program; we cannot afford not to have this sort of program.

Then, too, let our business men and farmers employ these children who need the work and pay them ample for their wages, and help solve another angle of the delinquent problem. Children want and need spending money, but if the parents cannot give them any money they need, make it possible for these children to work and earn some money. Most children prefer to work for what they want. Children who work and play properly seldom cause any body or anyone any trouble. Give the "Kids" a chance to work and play, and we will soon forget about our youth problems. An underprivileged adult is an unhappy fellow. We all want a chance to work, and earn something worth while.

Then if the parents would see to it that they themselves attend some church and bring their children to attend with them, their purely religious angle will be solved. But so long as parents remain at home and see nothing in church for them, their children will usually follow the parents. Let the parents try the church, and recommend it to their children by example. No one has to be a saint to attend church. If you do not like one church; then try the others. There are enough churches in this town for all. You might like at least one of the many churches here. But attend some church. It cannot hurt you nor your children by attending church.

Getting out of the old "rut" is hard for most people. It takes effort to attack a problem in a new way. But there are solutions to all our problems. What are we waiting for? Well, you see the churches are doing but little for the social life of our youth. If the church cannot do the job; then I say let us ask the church to help, and let the parents of this community get busy. It will take money, time and work to save our children.

Food Handlers To Be Given Training

AUSTIN, March 2.—In a vigorous campaign to elevate the State health level by preventing the spread of communicable diseases which might be transmitted by foods, the State Department of Health is conducting training schools for food handlers in all sections of Texas, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Food handlers are being instructed in sanitary methods of preparing, handling, and serving food for public consumption," Dr. Cox said. "Actual experience has shown that an insanitary eating establishment is one of the surest sources of spreading infection. The lack of proper sanitation in food handling is a definite menace to public health and our goal is the education of cooks, waiters, butchers, bakers, fountain men, and all other food handlers to such a level as will insure an elimination of this health hazard."

PYORRHEA IS CURABLE SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

AUSTIN, March 7.—Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is always incurable, this is only true in the most advanced cases, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. His advice to persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea is to seek an early diagnosis from their dentist so that proper treatment can be instituted while the disease is still curable.

"Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment. Since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of having pyorrhea," Dr. Cox said, "regular visits to the family dentist are extremely important in the control of this disease."

Corbin Supports Rural Good Roads Bills In Senate

Senator Kilmer B. Corbin of Lamesa strongly supported the second of a series of Gilmer-Alkin educational bills last week after the highly controversial measure was amended several times.

Corbin and other West Texas senators added amendments to the bill that will provide for greater transportation aid to the sparsely settled areas that they represent, also guaranteeing at least as many teachers as the small schools now have.

Senator Corbin this week introduced a bill that will set up a Commodity Distribution Agency for the purpose of aiding the school lunch program, dependent children, the aged, needy and blind. He voiced the opinion that this measure will meet with little opposition.

A bill that will benefit the rural areas of the state with more farm-to-market roads quickly passed the senate this week. It would provide \$1,250,000. a month for the next two years for rural roads.

"I want to do my part to help set up some kind of definite policy on rural roads", Senator Corbin said in urging passage of the bill.

Cables Thanks For CROP Food Trains



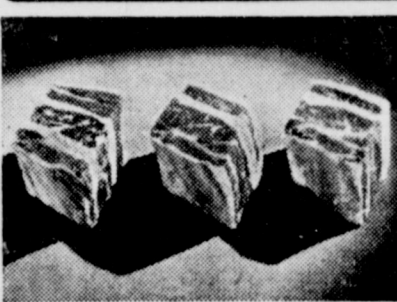
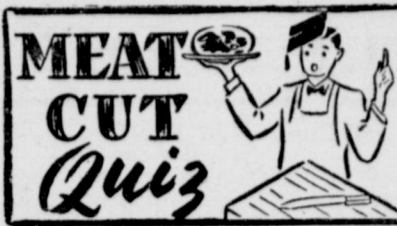

Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. These are short ribs of beef.

Q. Where does this cut come from and how is it identified?
A. The short ribs are cut from the plate and rib sections of beef and are made by sawing across the ribs. They consist of layers of fat and lean, and contain portions of the rib bones. Usually, they are cut in square, individual-sized serving pieces.

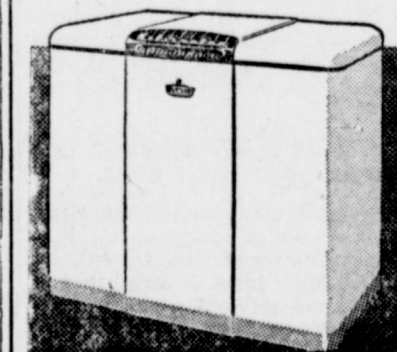
Q. How should this cut be prepared?
A. Short ribs of beef are either braised or cooked as a stew. To braise them, dredge in flour and brown on all sides in hot fat. Add a small amount of liquid (water, tomato juice, tomatoes, or other), cover tightly and cook slowly until tender, about 1½ hours. To cook as a stew, follow the same procedure, but cover with liquid, and cook 2½ to 3½ hours. Near the end of the cooking time, vegetables may be added. Either method produces a good homey meal that will more than satisfy family appetites.

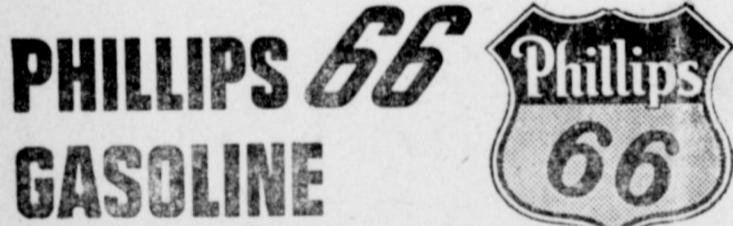

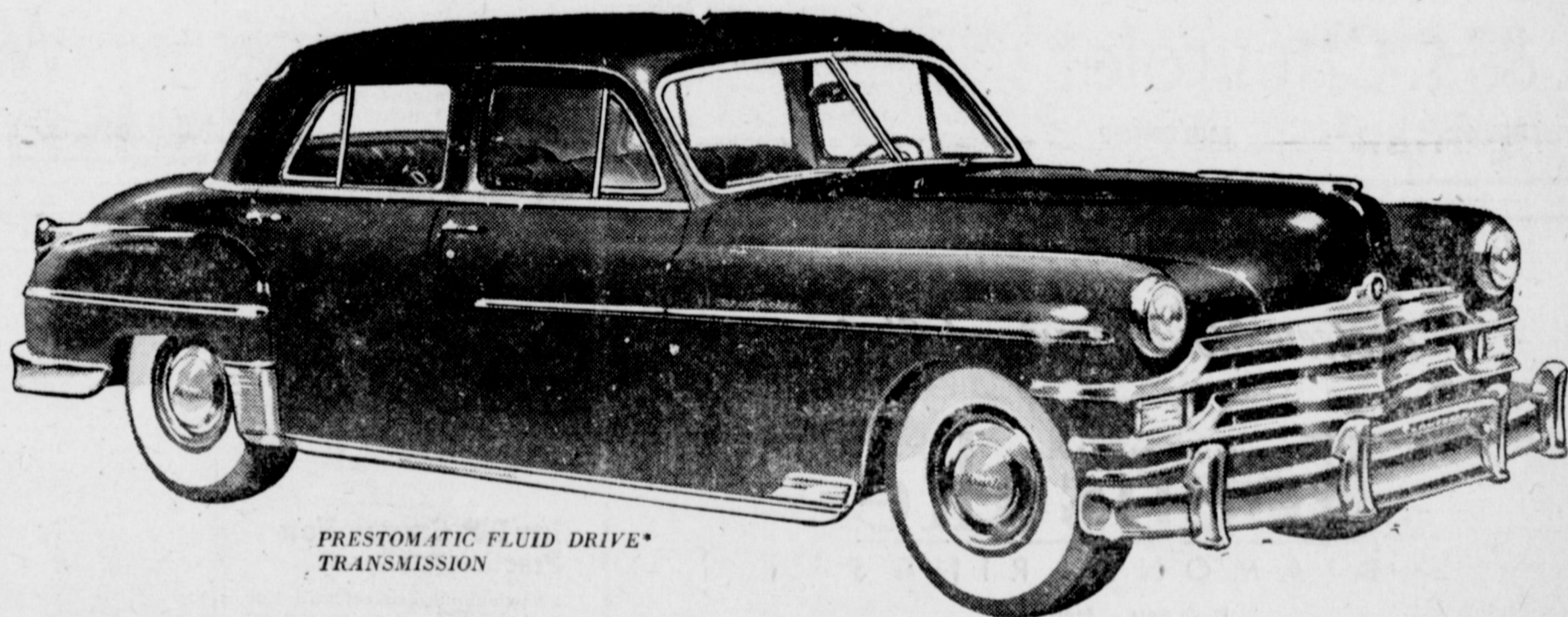

More Windbreaks Needed In Texas

A windbreak to protect the flowers and shrubs about the homesteads is needed in every county in the state.

That's the advice from Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape gardening specialist of Texas A. & M. College, who explains that the destructive mechanical action of the wind often mars the beauty of shrubs by spoiling their shapes and destroying the blooms.

Besides this, tender plants are hindered in growth or may be killed by the wind. Unless there's a natural windbreak to protect the farm homestead, planting one is the logical first step in landscaping a home, says Miss Hatfield. It will pay special dividends by breaking the force of the wind and modifying the temperature.

There is a combination of trees and shrubs that are well adapted for use in windbreaks, says Miss Hatfield. Among those which have been successfully planted for this purpose are desert willow, tamarix or salt cedars, native pine, western willow pine, red cedar and Arizona cypress. The landscape gardening specialist points out that the plants native to the locality are good ones to use for windbreaks.

In areas free of root rot, the Chinese elm is a strong favorite because of its rapid growth. All plantings should include several varieties of trees, because it's not a good idea to depend on just one variety.

Where root rot is found black walnut, cedar elm, red cedar and Chinese pistacia are often grown for windbreaks because of their resistance to this disease, says Miss Hatfield.

ATTEND GIFT SHOW IN DALLAS

Mr. and Mrs. C. M. McMath returned Tuesday, from Dallas, where they attended the Gift and Jewelry Show being held there.

Newspaper files afford one of the most authentic sources of historical facts available. And, if you're interested in earlier American customs and living standards, take a look at the advertisements published in any given year.

Jape Kindell, while in Texas some time ago, got a clipping of an advertisement of a personal property sale. Published originally in Kentucky in 1849 and later reproduced in Texas papers, it clearly visualizes the meaning of the passage of time from the 19th to the 20th.

The ad, as originally published, reads: "Having sold my farm, and am leaving for Oregon Territory by ox team, will offer on March 1, 1849, all of my personal property, to wit:

"All ox teams, except two teams, Buck and Ben and Tom and Jerry; 2 milk cows; 1 gray mare and colt; 1 pair oxen, ox yoke; 1 body yoke; 2 ox carts; 1 iron plow with wood mile board; 800 feet of poplar weather boards; 1000 3-ft. clapboards, 1500 ft. fence rails; 1 60-gallon soap kettle; 85 sugar troughs made of ash timber; 10 gallons maple syrup; 2 spinning wheels, 30 pounds mutton tallow.

"20 pounds of beef tallow; 1 large loom made by Jerry Wilson; 300 poles; 100 split hoops; 100 empty barrels; 1 32-gallon barrel of John Miller whiskey, 7 years old; 20 gallons of apple brandy; "One 40-gallon copper still, 4 sides of oak tanned leather, 1 dozen reel hooks, 2 handle hooks, 3 scythes and cradles, 1 dozen wooden pitchforks, one-half interest in tan yard, 7 32-gallon barrels.

"Bullet molds and powder horn, rifle made by Ben Miller, 50 gallons soft soap, hams, bacon and lard; 40 gallons sorghum molasses, 6 head of foxhounds, all soft-mouthed except one.

"At the same time, I will sell my six Negro slaves, 2 men, 35 and 50 years old; 2 boys 12 and 18 years old; 2 mulatto wenches, 40 and 39 years old. Will sell all together as will not separate.

"Terms of sale: cash in hand or note to draw 4 per cent interest with Bob McConnell as security. "My home is 2 miles south of Versailles, Ky., on McConnell's Ferry Pike. Sale will begin at 8 o'clock a.m. Plenty of drink and eat. - J. L. Moss." - Contributed by Ike Robinson.

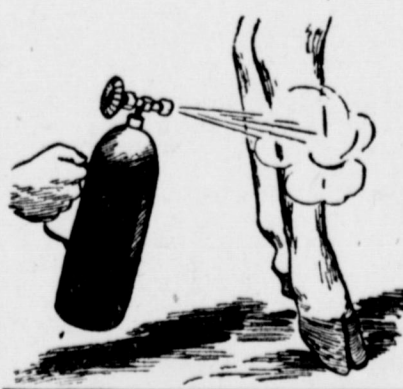

Dry DDT Crystals Now Practical for Spray

A new animal disinfectant device, called the "isomist cow bomb", is now available for use on livestock.

The cow bomb is used to apply a deposit of dry DDT crystals to the hair and hide of livestock for protection against the horn fly, house fly, stable fly, cattle lice, ticks, mosquitoes and certain other insects.



Dry DDT goes into suspension in water less readily than any other form and withstands rain more desirably. It contains no oil to cause burning or to help DDT penetrate the hide. The DDT particles are microscopic in size and thus a given amount covers a greater area than other forms. It is said one isomist cow bomb will treat approximately 100 cattle with the recommended 30 second treatment. It provides protection for cattle on pasture for about three weeks under average conditions. To help prevent lice infestation, prophylactic treatment of all additions to the herd is recommended.

The isomist cow bomb can be used on dairy and beef cattle, hogs, horses and sheep.

The procedure recommended for cows is to cover the body of the animal with paint sprayer motions at from 12 to 18-inch distances; for legs only 6-8 inches. Total time per cow is about 30 seconds.

Advantages of the bomb include microscopic coating of each hair and the hide of the animal with the DDT particles; less wash-off as compared with wettable powder and dusts, more equal results; saves chore time, and can be done with no mixing, cleaning or fuss.

Drastic Drop In Farm Income

AUSTIN, March 7.—Texas farm cash income totaled \$60,406,000 in January 1949, falling 36 per cent from December and 30 per cent from a year earlier, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Cattle was the greatest source of income in January 1949, bringing Texas farmers \$14,667,000. Income from milk products totaled \$10,464,000; and sales of fruits and vegetables amounted to \$5,784,000. Gains over December 1948 were

turned in by two crop-reporting districts. Farm income in the Lower Rio Grande Valley stepped up 39 per cent, and it was up 9 per cent in the Northern High Plains District. On the other hand, monthly declines ranging from 25 per cent in the Southern Texas Prairie to 60 per cent in the Southern High Plains were turned in by other districts.

Farm income was below January 1948 levels in all crop-reporting districts. Declines varied from 13 per cent in the Southern Texas Prairies to 65 per cent in the Southern High Plains.

The highest dollar income for January was recorded by farmers in the Northern High Plains, \$8,848,000. For second place, Black

Grand Prairies' income, from sales of farm products reached \$8,118,000; and Southern High Plains turned in \$6,574,000.

After adjustment for seasonal variation, the Bureau's index of farm cash income fell to 211 per cent of the pre-war (1935-39) base period from 337 in December and 310 in January 1948.
