Seminole Young Man Loses Life In Highway Accident Here Monday

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Muleshoe Wednesday afternoon by Rev. J. E. Boles. Interment was in Muleshoe cemetery under direction of Muleshoe Funeral Home.

More Fertilizer Used In Texas

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—Texas farmers are using larger amounts of fertilizer in the growing of their crops. Figures made available by the National Fertilizer Association show that an estimated 467,649 tons were consumed in the State last year as compared with about 13 percent over that in 1947 and an amazing 294 percent increase of over the prewar year 1940.

In the entire country, 1948 consumption topped the previous record year of 1947 by about 6 percent, 15,956,289 tons as against 15,039,376 tons.

The 10-year record of uninterrupted increase in the level of fertilizer consumption is attributed to several factors. An important influence, of course, has been the desire of American farmers to increase their crop yields and their readiness to accept and apply scientific practices that will accomplish this end. Other factors include the declining reserve of plant food in the soil; the realization that greater yields per acre can be produced from many crops; the greater requirements of new high-yielding crop varieties such as hybrid corn; and the recognition that pasture is a cash crop which should be fertilized.

When the right rear tire of the truck blew out, the vehicle swerved from the road, jumped a bar ditch and overturned, investigating highway patrolmen said. The pickup came to rest approximately 75 feet from where the blowout occurred.

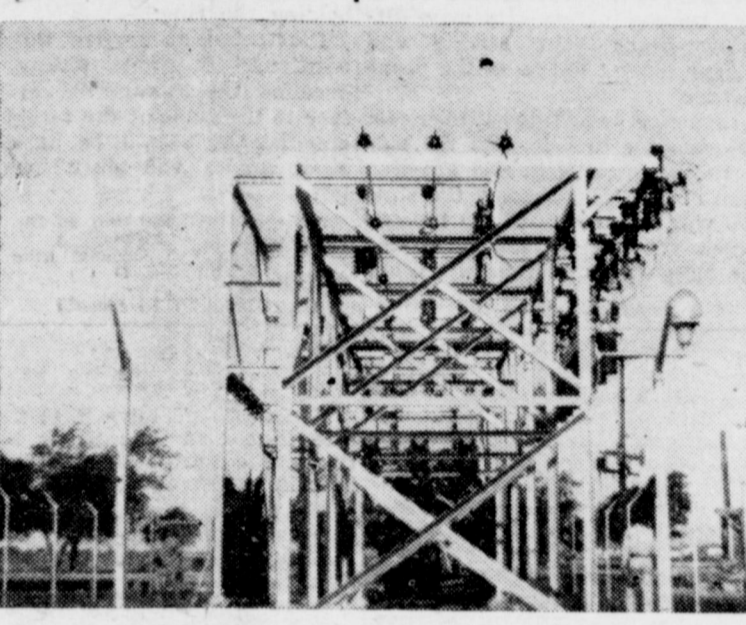
At an inquest immediately following the wreck, Justice of the Peace R. J. Clump of Muleshoe, rendered a verdict of accidental death for Park.

Sylvan Robinson and his helpers have been paying particular attention to the finish of the building. The meeting room will be particularly attractive with its knotty pine finish sheet rock, which extends to the ceiling from a broad dark wainscot.

The auditorium is suitable for rather large gatherings and for not too large banquets the building would be comfortably cool in summer, nice and warm in winter. The ex-service men expect that many organizations will find the building suitable for their meetings and occasions.

The Post has reserved considerable space about its building which will be developed later or left as parking space, etc.

Wheat Harvest Now Underway

Wheat harvest began in earnest this week and wheat began to arrive at Muleshoe in quantity Tuesday. The tempo picked up Wednesday and at times local elevators were experiencing a mild rush. During Wednesday much of the wheat reaching local elevators had a high moisture content and lots of it was light, testing around 58 and 59 pounds to the bushel.

There was little talk of yields, however some elevator men were of the opinion that much of the wheat being combined now was averaging 18 to 20 bushels to the acre.

However Henry Ivy was reported to be averaging around 30 bushels on one field near Bovilla.

W. C. Cunningham Has Verbally Tended His Resignation as Superintendent of Muleshoe Schools, According to Announcement of Morris Childers, Board President.

Mr. Childers said the board has interviewed several applicants for the place but has not discussed any one man, and that the field is still "wide open". More applicants will be interviewed when the board meets the coming Monday night, he said.

Cunningham "Promoted"

Mr. Cunningham told the board that he is accepting the post of superintendent of schools at Mineral Wells which normally is quite a promotion for him. It is a larger responsibility, larger opportunity, and the salary is somewhat larger than he was receiving here. He expects to move to Mineral Wells July 1. He has been superintendent here since 1945. Mr. Cunningham came here from Monday, where he was succeeded by Claude Cox, superintendent here for many years, whom he succeeded here.

Mr. Cunningham immediately plunged into consolidations which culminated in the formation of a very large Muleshoe Independent School District, enabling the district to begin the construction of a high school building, expected to be completed this fall, and to make other far reaching improvements. He will have something of the same job at Mineral Wells where a big organizing job will await his expert guidance.

Mrs. Cunningham has taught in the first grade here and her absence will be felt in this department.

It would be impossible to express our thanks to the people of the Muleshoe school district for the many favors extended to us during our three years service here, but we will very humbly say "Thank You."

We are very happy over our new position in Mineral Wells, and we are aware that our good friends in Muleshoe are largely responsible for our receiving the position there.

No school man could possibly put over the program that has been worked out here in the past three years without the untiring assistance that has been offered here.

When the board selects the new superintendent, if the patrons of Muleshoe will work together, as they have in the past three years, no school in the state will have a better school system.

To the men who have served on the school board, to the most outstanding PTA we have ever been privileged to serve with, to the service clubs, and members of the faculty of the Muleshoe school, we would say thanks for everything. We sincerely hope and believe you will have one of the best schools in the state.

VOICES AGAINST COLLECTIVISM

Two voices are raised against the socialistic trend in population thought in America. Former President Herbert Hoover, speaking at Ohio Wesleyan University, points out that "the judgement of the Lord of Adam (to eat bread in the sweat of his face) has not been entirely reserved, even by the Supreme Court of the United States." And Dwight D. Eisenhower, in his first commencement address at Columbia, declares that the fundamental struggle of our time is between individual freedom and gov-

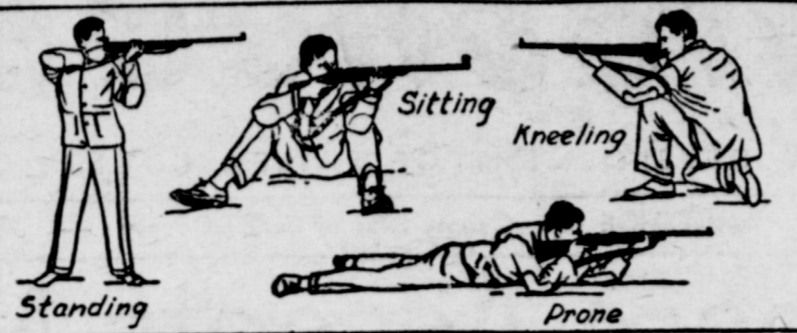
ernment control. Of real significance is the fact that both of these men should choose to speak on this theme on solemn academic occasions. Undoubtedly both were conscious of addressing the future, as represented by the young graduates of their audience. There may be those who will undertake to dismiss Mr. Hoover's views as those of an outmoded past. But there are certain to be many more who will regard General Eisenhower's views as those of an approaching future. Many will be confirmed in the conviction that the obvious course to follow in obedience to the challenge these two men present to the rising generation is to elect General Eisenhower to the Presidency of the United States. But both of these leaders spoke to the country as a whole, and not merely to the young graduates. And they spoke of an immediate challenge, and not one that can be safely postponed until 1952.

So-called security, as a substitute for freedom and equal opportunity, was decried by both Mr. Hoover and General Eisenhower. "At all times in history," said Mr. Hoover, "there have been many who sought escape into 'security' from self-reliance. And if you will look over the workings of these newest new eras throughout the world, you may notice that the judgement of the Lord of Adam has not been able to fix the wages of sin. Nor have they found a substitute for profit and other personal stimulants. . . . New

HOW TO SHOOT A RIFLE

Positions



There are four standard shooting positions in the target game that also can be adopted to field use. They are: prone, sitting, kneeling, and standing. Prone is most accurate and, in the order named above, they become increasingly more difficult. Learn your aiming and trigger control habits in the prone position.

In target shooting always use the gunslings to help hold the rifle in the prone, sitting, and kneeling positions. After loosening the sling you will find a loop in the top end which you can fit snugly around the bicep of your left arm. While

you are in position the sling, running from the upper left arm to the upper sling swivel of the rifle, will brace the V formed by the bent left arm. Properly done, this eliminates most of the muscular effort of holding the rifle. Illustrated above are the four positions. In prone, sitting, and kneeling the shooter should half-face to the right of the target. In standing he should be at nearly right angles and shoot over his left shoulder.

D. 1949, in this cause, numbered 1596 on the docket of said court and styled Lee Owen Plaintiff, vs. Blonnie Lee Owen Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit:

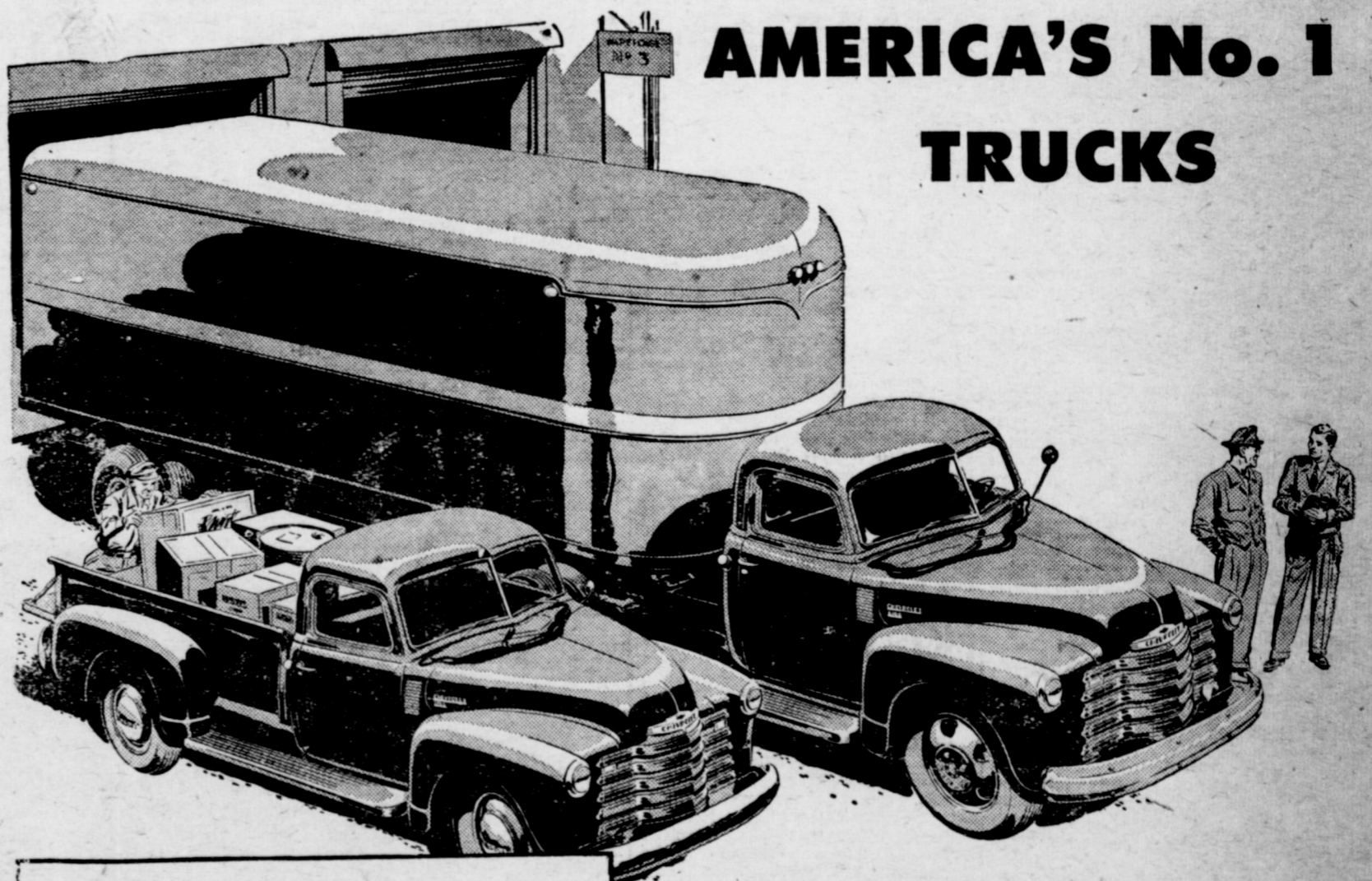

41 Per Cent of Land In U. S. in Herbage

Grass Top Resource, Cattlemen Assert
Grass is one of the greatest resources of this nation. In the United States there are approximately 779 million acres of land which will grow nothing but hay, grass and other herbage unfit for human consumption.

This great acreage represents 41 per cent of the total land of the nation. About 9 per cent of the lands in the United States are plowable but are used also to produce pasture, hay or forage crops. It can be concluded, therefore, that about 50 per cent of the United States would not be used if it were not for meat animals.



This little fellow, obviously so well-started in life, is symbolic of what good pasturage can mean to cattle and just how much cattle depend on grass. In the United States there are approximately 779 million acres of land which cannot grow anything but hay, grass and other herbage.

Of the total feeds consumed by beef cattle 78 7 per cent is grass, hay and dry roughage. A minimum of grain is needed to bring feeder steers from 700 pounds to 1,000 pounds when the principal part of the ration is made up of hay, ensilage or other roughage.

The process of producing beef cattle normally involves the following steps:

1. The purebred operator who produces the sires and females which are the foundation of beef animal production. This branch of the cattle industry is one that requires heavy investment and efficiency in management.
2. The commercial breeder who produces the calves which are the offspring of commercial herds of female and purebred sires.
3. The pasture cattleman who grows the animal from the weaning of yearling stage to two years old, taking his profit from the poundage gained on grass and hay.
4. The feeder who "finishes" the animal from grass stage to slaughter condition, disposing of a large percentage of roughage.

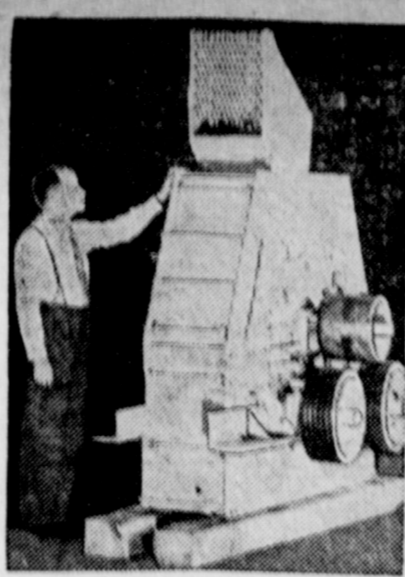

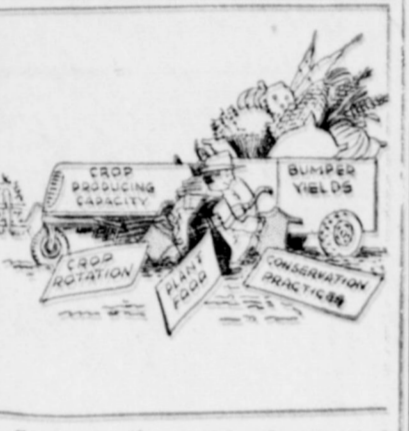

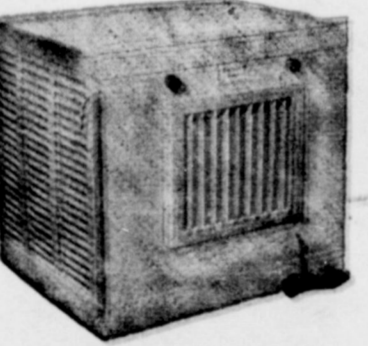

To Store Wheat In Pantex Igloos

LUBBOCK, June 20—First shipments of wheat for storage in the Pantex plant near Amarillo are expected to arrive early next week. Officials of Texas Technological college have announced. Contracts have been signed with several organizations and in each instance top preference is to be given members of co-operatives. Pres. D. M. Wiggins said. Space in warehouses and Igloos of Pantex will be used to store about 6,500,000 bushels of wheat. Tech moved to aid farmers of the Panhandle several weeks ago when it became apparent that storage space was short for the crop estimated to be upwards of 60,000,000 bushels. Officials of the War Assets administration, which recently gave the 17,000-acre Pantex property to Tech, speedily approved the program. Workmen speeded renovation of storage buildings, and the Santa Fe railroad cooperated by repairing Pantex trackage to facilitate wheat movement. Arrangements for the wheat storage were made by a committee of the Texas Tech board of directors which include Chancellor E. Weymouth, Amarillo; O. B. Rattliff, Lubbock; and Charles C. Thompson, Colorado City, board chairman.

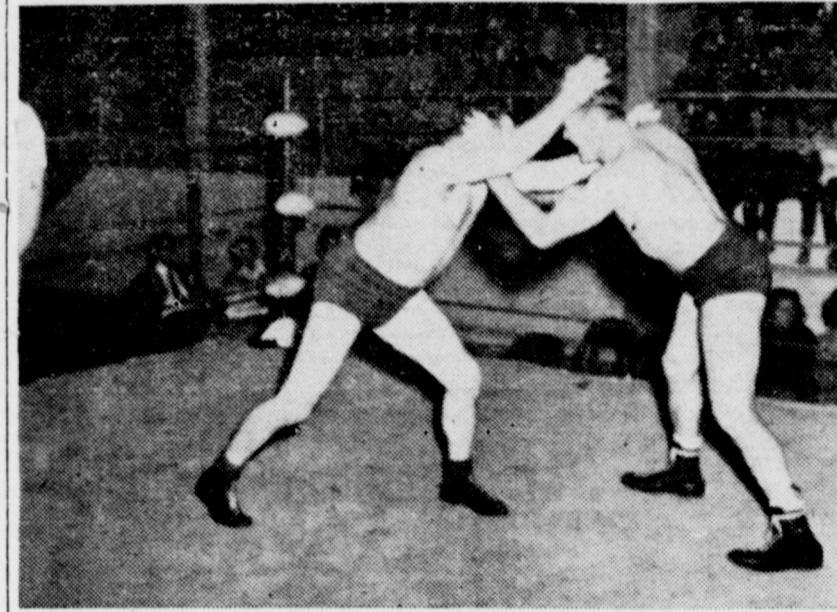

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 36

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature of the State of Texas to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created, it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts;" and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 15

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and to authorize cities and counties to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties in cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have first been registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-executing. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

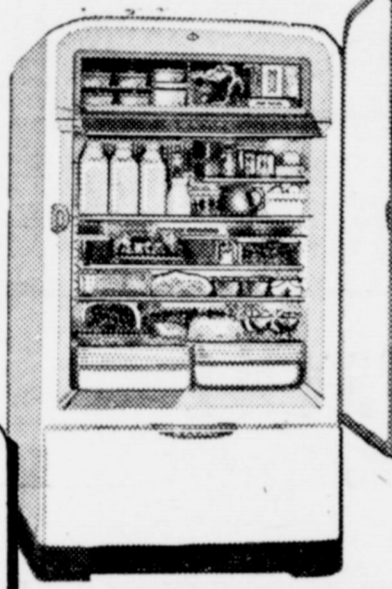

Moisture Conservation Helps With Wheat Crop

A 30-acre field that had produced little during the last few years, even with favorable moisture conditions, produced a good wheat crop, according to the Kansas state college extension service.

"A combination of things made the land productive again," a conservation district cooperater said. "Use of sweet clover, seeded in the spring of 1946, for green manure and terracing, and contour farming for moisture conservation were important."

The land, he explained, was badly eroded. The soil was thin, dense and hard to work. It had not produced a decent crop in the previous six years and was practically idle land.

Cullies were plowed shut after the terraces were built, so that the whole field could be contour farmed. In addition, grass waterways were developed and more terraces planned.

European Corn Borer Reduced Crop in 1948

The European corn borer reduced the 1948 crop of field corn by 85 million bushels, the U.S. department of agriculture announced in Washington, D.C. Surveys recently completed by the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, with cooperating agencies, indicate this loss in corn production is more than double that of 1947.

Giles, Explains Operation of New Veterans' Land Program

The Veterans land program is now a reality. The idea was born in the hearts of the veterans themselves while they were overseas and thinking about home. Their letters to my office asking how they might obtain a farm or ranch home if and when they returned, inspired me to put the machinery of this program in motion.

Last week Governor Jester's signature made the Veterans' Land bill into formal law. The bill was sponsored in the upper House by Senator John Bell of Cuero and in the lower House by Representative Reuben Senterfit of San Saba.

The legislation grew out of a Constitutional Amendment adopted by the Citizens of Texas in a special election in November of 1946. At the following session of the Legislature the necessary enabling legislation failed to receive final consideration in the Senate.

The 51st Legislature, promptly and without a single negative vote in either House carried out the mandate of the people, making it possible for Texas Veterans of World War II to own a farm or ranch home of their own choosing by making a small down payment with the balance financed by the State at a low interest rate.

The Legislature has placed the administration of this program in the hands of the Governor, Attorney General and the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

The second article explains how a veteran should proceed in selecting a tract of privately owned land for his future home.

Here briefly are some of the outstanding provisions of the new law:
 The Board may issue up to \$25 million in bonds to finance the program.

Land may be purchased from an individual, from the State, or Corporations for re-sale to veterans at cost. (This provision will be more fully explained in a separate article—Editor's Note.)

Veteran may select land which he desires to purchase subject to the approval of the Board.

The maximum purchase by each veteran shall not exceed \$7,500 to be financed by the State.

Veterans disabled by combat service connected disability have 90 days preference right to purchase.

Lands may be purchased for a minimum of 5% down payment with 40 years to pay the balance at 3% interest. (This indebtedness may be retired sooner if the veteran wishes.)

All money received during the six remaining years of operation shall be used to pay interest on bonds and to purchase additional land for re-sale to veteran. The purchaser shall not transfer or sell lands purchased for a period of 3 years from the date of purchase. The veteran will not be permitted to make more than one purchase. The veteran is not required to reside upon the property.

Texas At Top Of "High Loss" List Of Farm Stored Grain By Insects

COLLEGE STATION, June 20.—Those tiny insects in your grain bin may be small, but they do a tremendous lot of damage to stored grain. That's the word from the USDA Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

The first place to start getting rid of them is right inside the bin itself. By doing a good job of bin cleaning, and afterward spraying with 5 percent DDT before the newly harvested grain is put in, you can go a long way toward ridding out the hold-over infestation. Also, you're giving the new grain a chance to escape damage.

Dr. H. G. Johnston, head of the Texas A. & M. College department of entomology, says these tiny insects get one out of every eight bushels of farm stored grain in Texas. Missouri loses one bushel in ten, according to 1948 figures. But in that same year, the national loss average to insects was one in twenty. So, Texas is practically at the top of the "high loss" list.

Entomologists point out that grain losses can be lowered quite a bit by harvesting the grain as soon as it's dry enough for safe storage and by storing it in weather-tight bins that have been made insect free by a thorough cleaning and spraying.

Then, after you've got all the grain in storage, check it now and then to see if the bugs are getting into it. If they are, fumigate with a mixture of ethylene dichloride and carbon tetrachloride at the rate of 3 to 6 gallons per 1,000 bushels, depending on how tight the storage bin is, Dr. Johnston says.

Stored grain insects take 300 million bushels of the nation's total production every year. That much grain is worth a lot of today's prices. So Texas has a long way to go in cutting down her share of the 300 million bushels the insects get, he concludes.

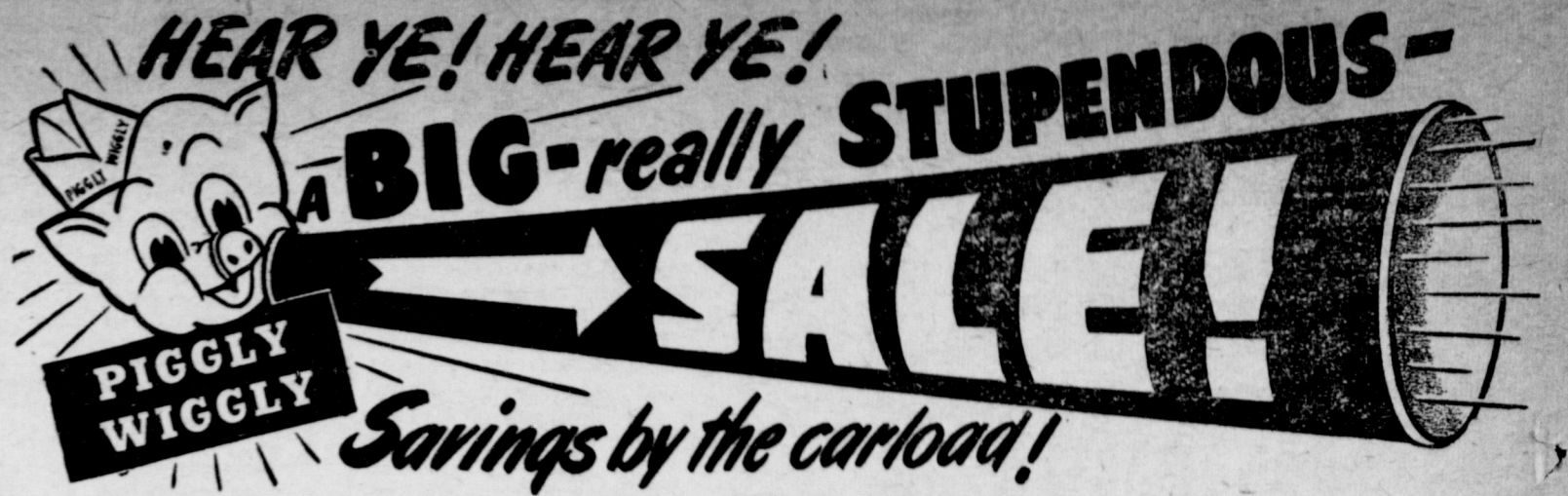

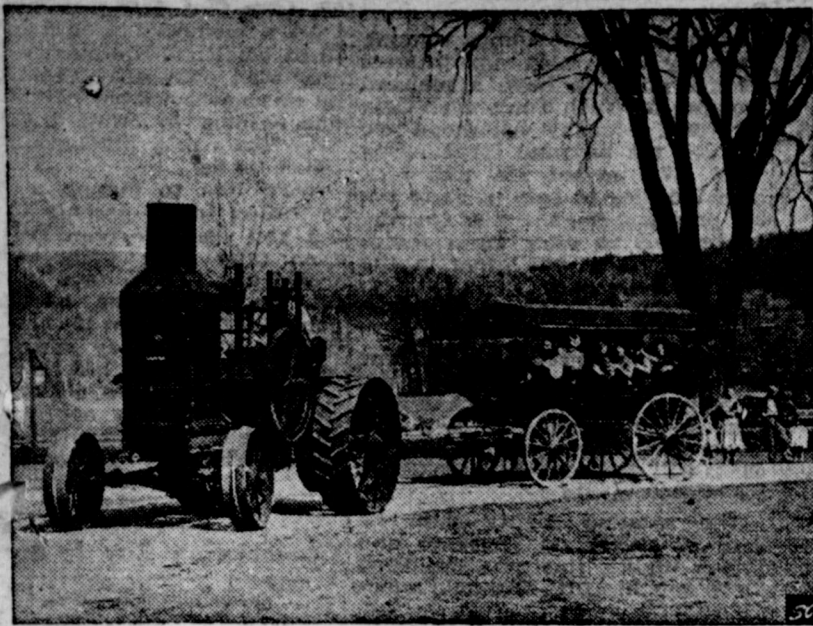

First Gasoline Tractor



Once around and then to bed was the last "pull" for the first gasoline-driven tractor ever built in the United States. The 19,000 pound agricultural mechanical giant shown above, the Oliver-Hart-Parr, was recently presented to The Farmers' Museum of Cooperstown, New York. Built in the winter of 1902-03 by Hart and Parr at Charles City, Iowa, the tractor has two horizontal cylinders. Gasoline is ignited through a make and break ignition system. Oil circulating through the huge stack acts as a coolant. Since no spark plugs are used, a 1,000 pound flywheel is used to keep pistons in motion during misfiring. After making the "final run" - pulling the ancient O-TE-SA-GA Omnibus carrying visiting 4H Club girls... the Oliver-Hart-Parr was assigned an honor spot in the Cooperstown Farmers' Museum Hall of Fame.

Farmers Waste 21 Million Gallons Of Fuel Each Year In Texas Alone

COLLEGE STATION, June 20.—Right on the farm is the place for fuel conservation to begin. And the farm tractor is the first machine on the farm to begin it with. Tractor owners in Texas own nearly 215,000 tractors, and from this number, it's estimated that 21 million gallons—just a hundred gallons a tractor—is wasted every year. That's just in Texas alone.

W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer of Texas A. & M. College, says there are at least seven good ways to save gasoline in order to cut down on the large amount wasted. Here they are:

1. Don't let the motor idle when the tractor is not in use. Cut off the engine when hooking up equipment.
2. Look ahead. Figure out about how much you'll need and when you'll need it. Then tell the tank wagon salesman well in advance.
3. Prepare all the farm storage possible ahead of time, and see that all drums are in good repair. If you need more storage, get the new drums ready before hand.
4. Make one trip to town do for many. Keep on hand a supply of spark plugs, fan belts, tools, gaskets and other day-to-day tractor repair parts.
5. Haul full loads whenever possible.
6. Tune up the engine during slack periods when it isn't needed in the field. And don't forget to adjust the carburetor.
7. Put your equipment in the field in the best possible condition. By doing so you'll prevent costly breakdowns when in use.

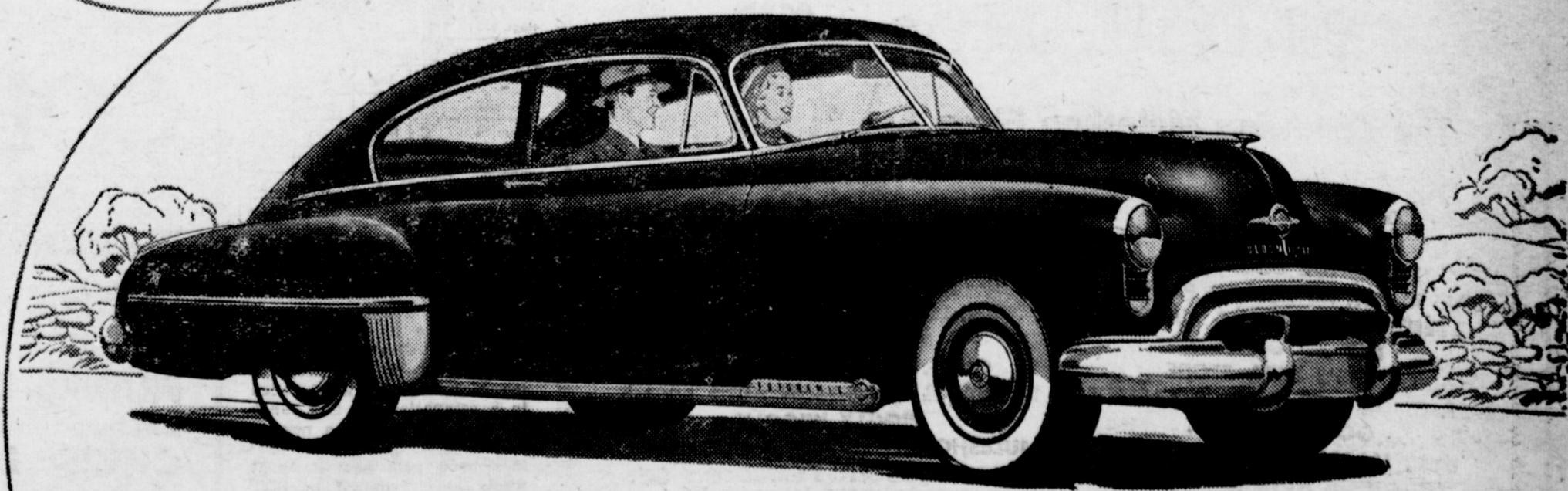

Produce Magic Mud With Multiple Uses
Ever since Belle Fourche, S. D., was a rip-snorting cattle town at the end of the old Chisholm trail its residents have been damning the "soap holes" that plagued the area.

Fast-riding cowboys often took a nasty tumble in this super-slippery mud and cattle were forever getting bogged down in them.

But now, like a man discovering his hives are really a blessing, Belle Fourche has found its soap holes are one of its biggest assets.

Every one of them is filled with an odorless, tasteless, soapy mud with a thousand uses and scientists are thinking up new ones every day.

Most of us already are using it a half dozen times a day, but almost nobody has heard of it. Men use it in shoe polish and hand cleaners. Women use it in face

powder, lotions, beauty creams. Bentonite also is found in many types of paint, plaster and cleaning agents. It's handy for filling holes in giant dams and for casting moulds for molten metal. Forced down thousands of feet into the earth this magic mud lubricates the drills in oil wells and sends the debris up to the drillers.

Its new uses and increasing popularity for its older uses all add up to a boom such as Belle Fourche hasn't seen since the gold rush.

In the past 10 years the population has practically doubled and bentonite now pours \$600,000 a year into the town in the form of additional purchasing power.

Fifteen years ago Belle Fourche shipped out three carloads of bentonite. Last year its production was 6,187 carloads and this year they expect carloadings to go considerably higher.

Scientists say that bentonite, a strange mixture made up mostly of dust from prehistoric volcanos, is found almost nowhere in the world except in the Black Hills of Wyoming and South Dakota.

It is the most absorbent material nature ever has devised, they say, and a half dozen teaspoonsful will soak up a glass of water.

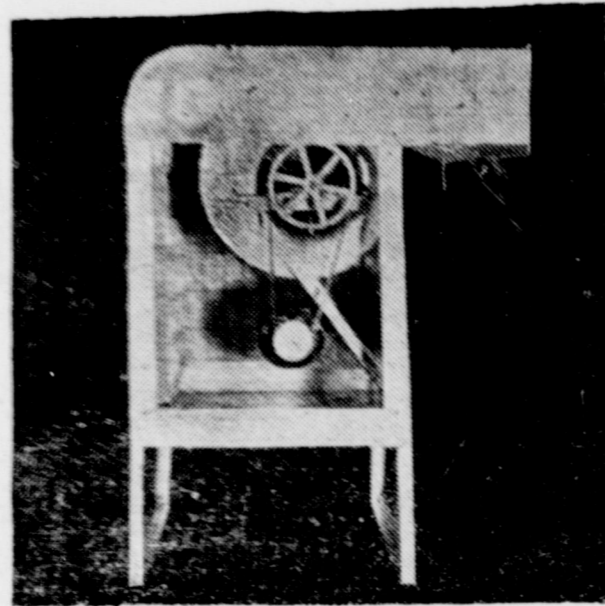

Insect Killers Made By Synthetic Means

New pyrethrum-like chemicals that kill insects have been made synthetically for the first time in the laboratories of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, it has been announced by the U. S. department of agriculture.

The chemical makeup of the synthetic materials is almost identical with that of the insect-killing principle in pyrethrum, according to the chemists.
