School Board Meets

The Seminole School Board held their regular meeting on Monday, June 26. The board had a Dinner at the Raymond Resturant and at that time H. B. Patterson, Jr. was presented a certificate in recognition of his tenure of service on the School Board. All members, except Dr. A. J. Mabry attended the dinner meeting. Dr. Mabry attended the regular meeting. Also present was a guest, Fred Barbee.

In the Monday night meeting, the Seminole School Board raised the pay scale for local teachers \$550. The action followed the Legislature's recent raise of \$630 for teachers who are paid under the State Minimum Foundation Program. Since the Seminole schools are budget balanced and do not receive State Aid under the Minimum Foundation Program, this action was necessary if local teachers were to receive a raise comparable to the one passed on by the Legislature.

The new salary schedule will start teachers with a B. A. degree and no experience at \$5770 and go to a maximum of \$7170 for these teachers with 12 or more years of experience. Teachers with a M. A. degree and no experience will start at \$6070

Farm hand

Machines now harvest 95% of Texas Cotton

Machines harvested 95 percent of Texas' 3,111,000 bale cotton crop during the 1966-67 season, an increase of five percent from the previous year. This compares with a national average of 89 percent mechanically harvested according to a report prepared jointly by the Economic Research Service and the Consumer and Marketing Service.

HERE IS A BREAKDOWN by the various methods of harvesting for the 1966 Texas crop; Machine picked - 18 percent; machine stripped - 76 percent; machine scrapped - one percent; hand picked - one percent and hand snapped - four percent.

Texas growers paid an average of \$19.65 for saw ginning and wrapping a 500-pound bale of upland cotton during the past season - up 81 cents from the previous year. Beltwide the average charge was \$18.30 per bale - up one dollar from the 1967-66 crop.

THE POUNDS OF SEED cotton required for a 500-pound bale this past season in Texas by methods of harvest were: machine picked - 1544 pounds; machine stripped - 2339; machine

scrapped - 2111; hand picked - 1502 and hand snapped - 1970. Per bale storage charges at Texas warehouses of 52 cents per month were slightly below the national average of 53 cents.

EMERGENCY LOAN

Due to adverse weather conditions from October 1, 1966 to June 1, 1967 Gaines County has been designated at Emergency Loan Area for period July 1, 1967 to June 30, 1968.

Farmers and livestock producers with sound plans that are unable to get production credit from other sources should contact Farmers Home Administration, Room B-1, Courthouse, Seminole, Texas to discuss their plans and credit needs.

Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Pence were at church and Sunday School. They are among our faithful church members.

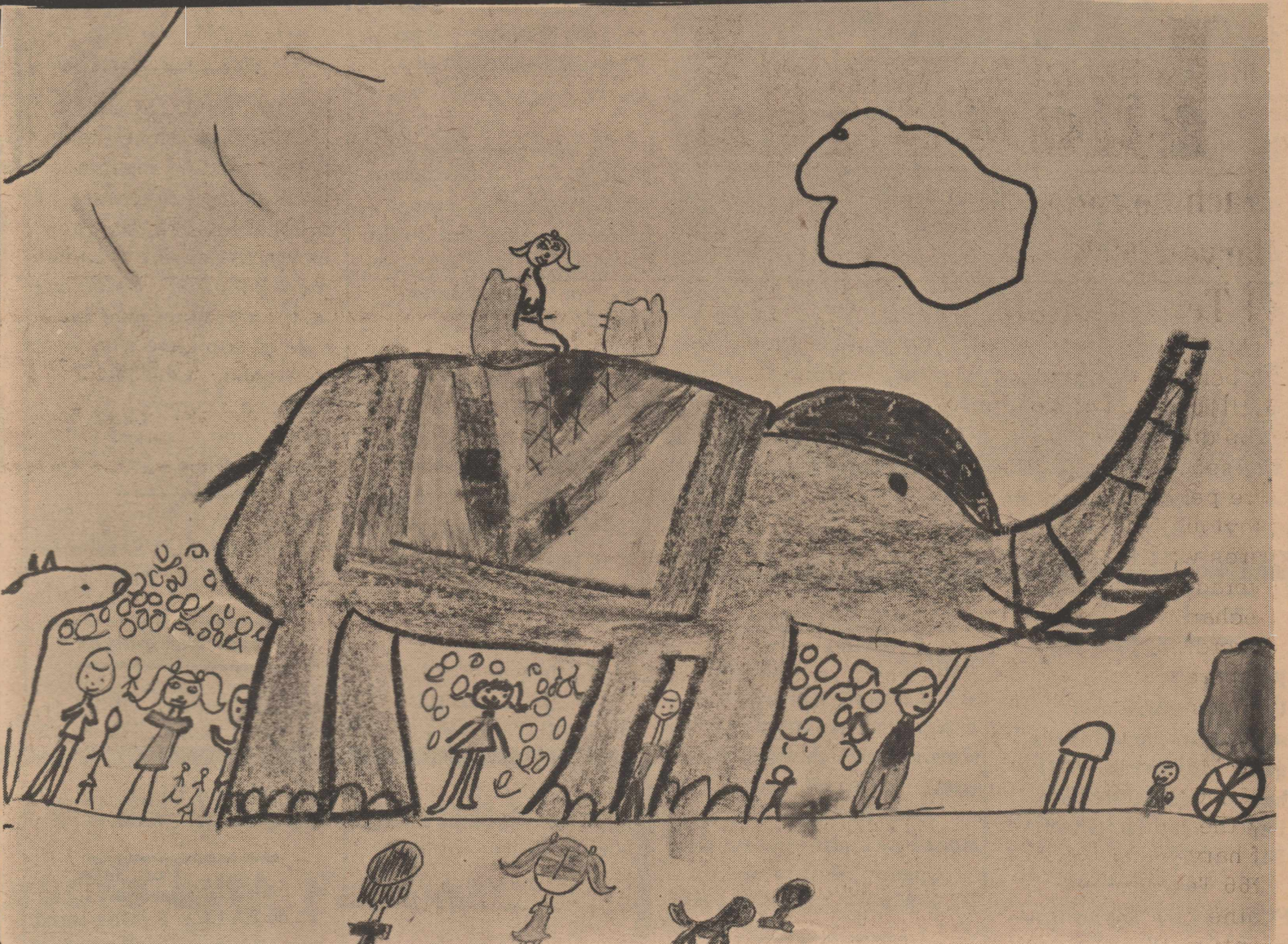
Mrs. Hugh Castleberry has been real sick. We do hope she will be back in church next Sunday and okay.

A TEXAS ARTIST:

Joe Ruiz Grandee is one of the outstanding Texas artist of our time. Joe Grandee is a son of the West. Joe Grandee was born in Dallas, Texas in 1929. He attended Dallas City Park School

Unlike the Western painters of a century ago, Grandee has not had the advantage of seeing the hunters slaughter buffaloes on the plains and Indians dance with bloody scalps. Yet he has raised cattle and has ridden horseback among buffaloes. He reconstructs authentic scenes from his reading of history and his study of relics and artifacts. Grandee catches on canvas the life lived on the Great Plains and the Rockies. The viewer feels the enduring strength of the bearded mountain men, the implacable fierceness of the Comanche warrior, the patience of the hide hunter who crawls through the grass and takes careful aim at the shaggy bull that leads the buffalo herd. His brush depicts the dramatic moment in branding a calf, the clash with redskins, the holding up of a stagecoach, or the downhill plunge of a twenty-mule team.

The far best-known painting by Grandee is THE TWENTY MULES OF DEATH VALLEY. The artist showed the team rushing downhill toward the viewer, pulling two heavy borax wagons and a water wagon. On one of the animals, is a man with a whip in his hand, (riding on the first mule nearest the wagon), urging the mules forward. He knows that the brakes on the giant wagons loaded with seventy-three tons wouldn't hold on a steep downgrade, so he lashes at the mule to keep them from being run over.

This painting has been widely displayed over the country and is presently on permanent loan in the Cowboy Hall of Fame at Oklahoma City.

Pioneer Gas Asks Hike In Rates

A rate increase that would add 72 cents to the average home owner's monthly gas bill--and more than double the annual net operating income of Pioneer Natural Gas Company in this region--was requested Friday.

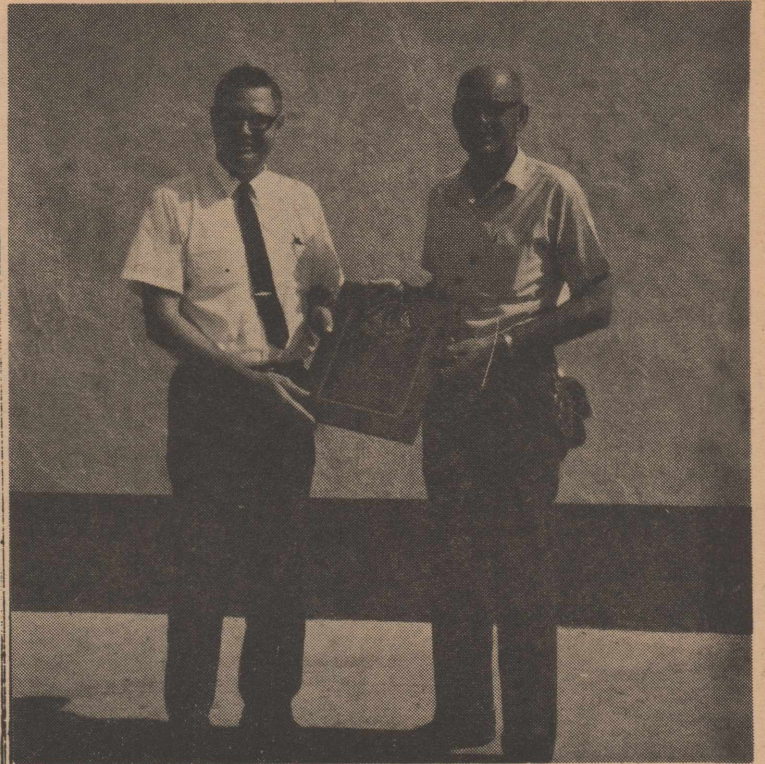
Seminole and 54 other towns would be affected by the rate hike. City Councils in each town have 60 days in which to approve or reject the application.

C.I. (Stony) Wall, Amarillo, president of Pioneer, said "increased operating costs necessitated" the request for the second rate boost in a decade.

If approved, the minimum monthly charge for gas service in each affected town would climb 20 cents, from \$1.65 to \$1.85. For the average domestic user, the new rate would mean an annual outlay of \$83.25 for gas, up \$8.61 from the current \$74.64, Wall said.

Pioneer asked that the new rates become effective on meters read August 15 and thereafter.

"Our wages, taxes and other expenses of doing business have increased substantially since our last rate increase in 1961," Wall said.

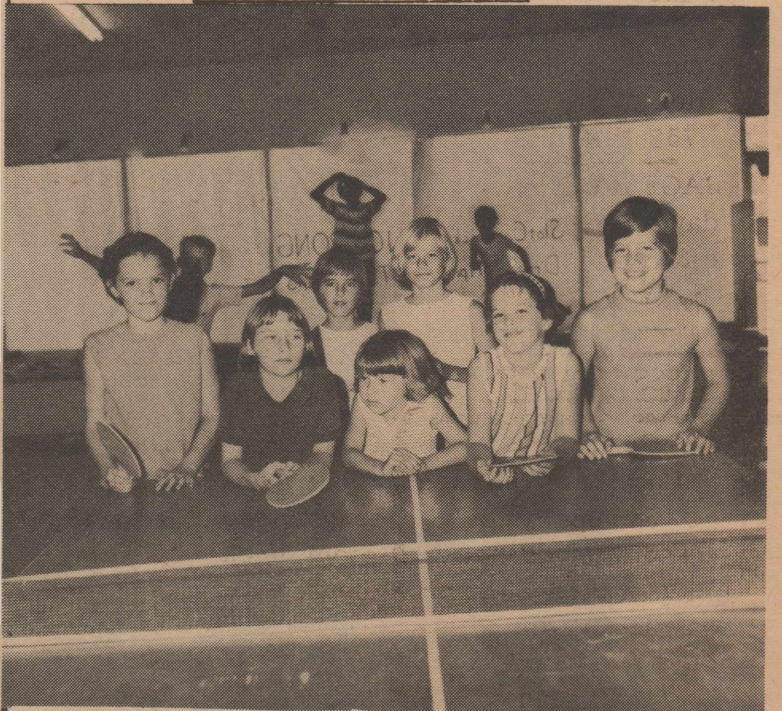
SEMINOLE LIONS CLUB MEETS

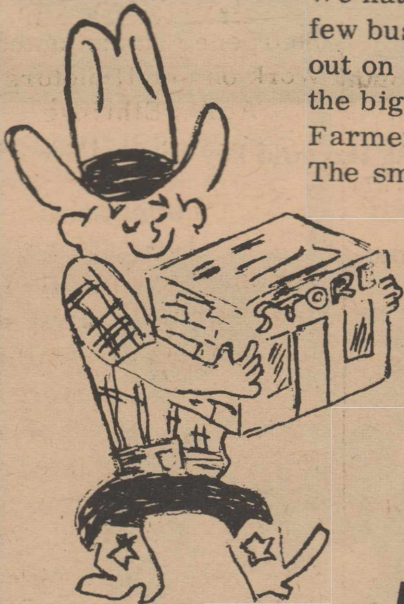

Nila Norton Honored

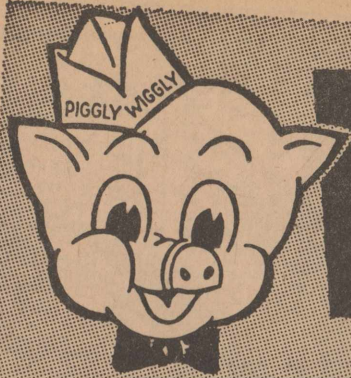

LETTERS HOME FROM THE
TRAVELING FOLK OF SEMINOLE

Dear Cowtown Kin:

On Tuesday we toured San Francisco. From Mill Valley we crossed the Golden Gate Bridge and turned directly back under it and visited Ft. Point the first fort in the area built by the Americans. The Building still stands, with the bridge directly overhead. A shot was never fired from this fort in anger. We saw a portion of an old building left by the Spanish. Friday morning began with the Second General Session. Reports from the officers' meetings Thursday afternoon were given.

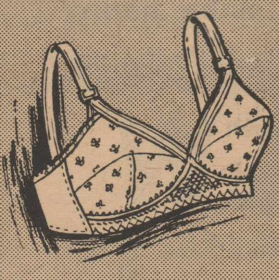
