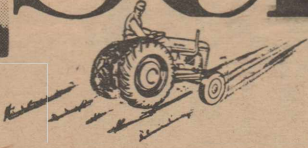

She said, "Me and you are going to get along fine."

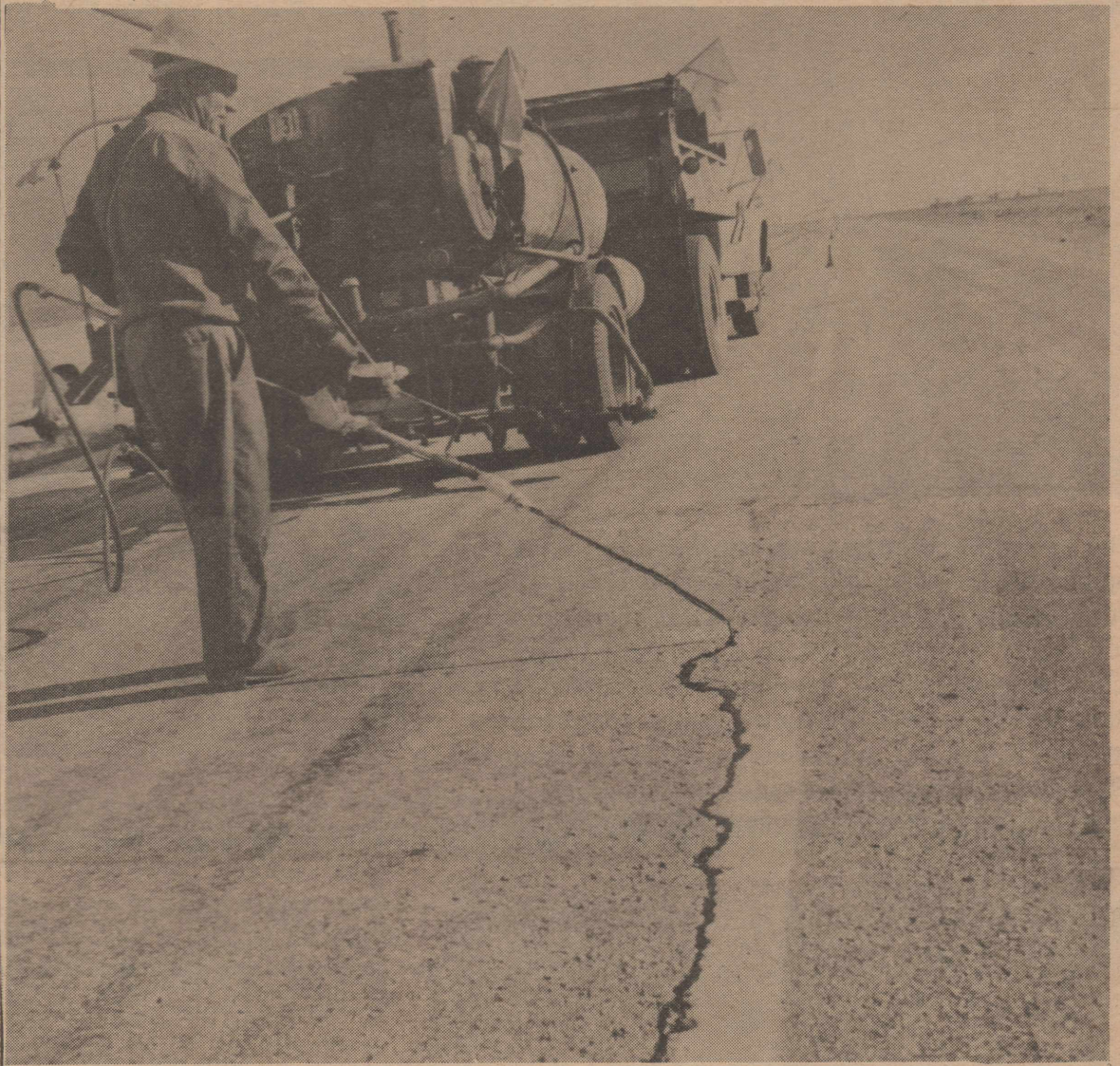
To this day every Tuesday is made easier by her coming in for an hour or two.

TEXAS

HIGHWAY

DEPT.



The Texas Highway Department is undoubtedly one of the unsung service agencies of our day. One of their responsibilities is the checking of 270 miles of highways in our county. It also takes a continuous reworking of signs, patching the highways, mowing the right-of-ways in the summer, and maintaining the shoulders of the highway. They also sealcoat the roads as needed, some every year, some every two or more years, to keep water from running underneath, freezing, and making chug holes. They issue all permits for over-length or over-weight vehicles.

The seventeen men, including their foreman, Jess Hale, use two maintainers, five dump trucks, two pickups, one car, six tractors and mowers, snow plows, drag blades, two loaders, and other small equipment.

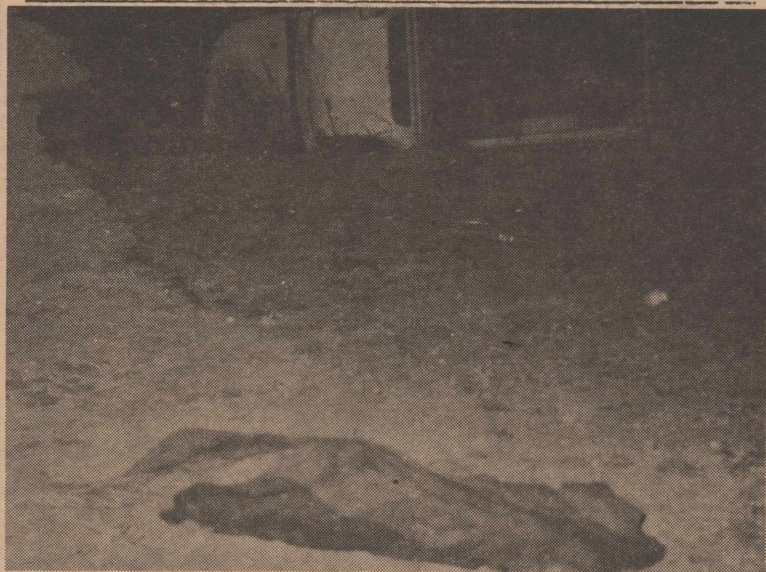
ONE KILLED

At 2:55 A.M. on Sunday morning Ronald Howard Scott turned the pickup in which he was driving over 2½ times, killing himself.

Larry Arthur Simmons is in fair condition in the local hospital after being thrown from the same pickup. They were both from Owego, New York. The deceased worked for Dale Johnson and was driving his pickup without his consent. Scott and Simmons were headed east 16.6 miles west of Seminole.

Harold Price, a witness, said that they passed him and the pickup skidded sideways, the right rear wheel coming off.

Charles Mueller reported that from the place it started to skid it was 297 feet to its final resting place, partially in a cotton field. He further stated they were driving an excessive speed and evidently were intoxicated.



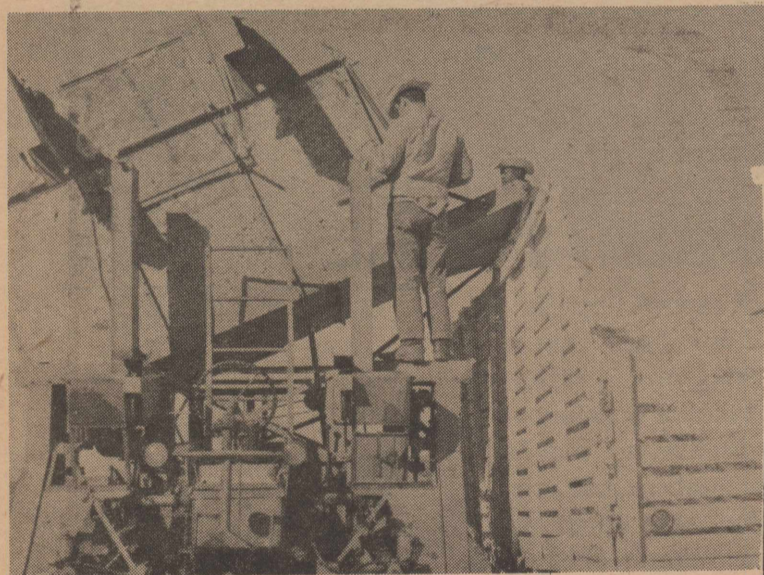

The cotton harvest has started off in Gaines County. Loop has ginned over 200 bales, and the gins around Seminole have begun. It has been estimated that between 90% to 95% of the cotton this year will be machine harvested. So many of the fields have begun to look like the one in the picture where the leaves have been killed and the sunshine could not reach the bolls and make open cotton quicker.

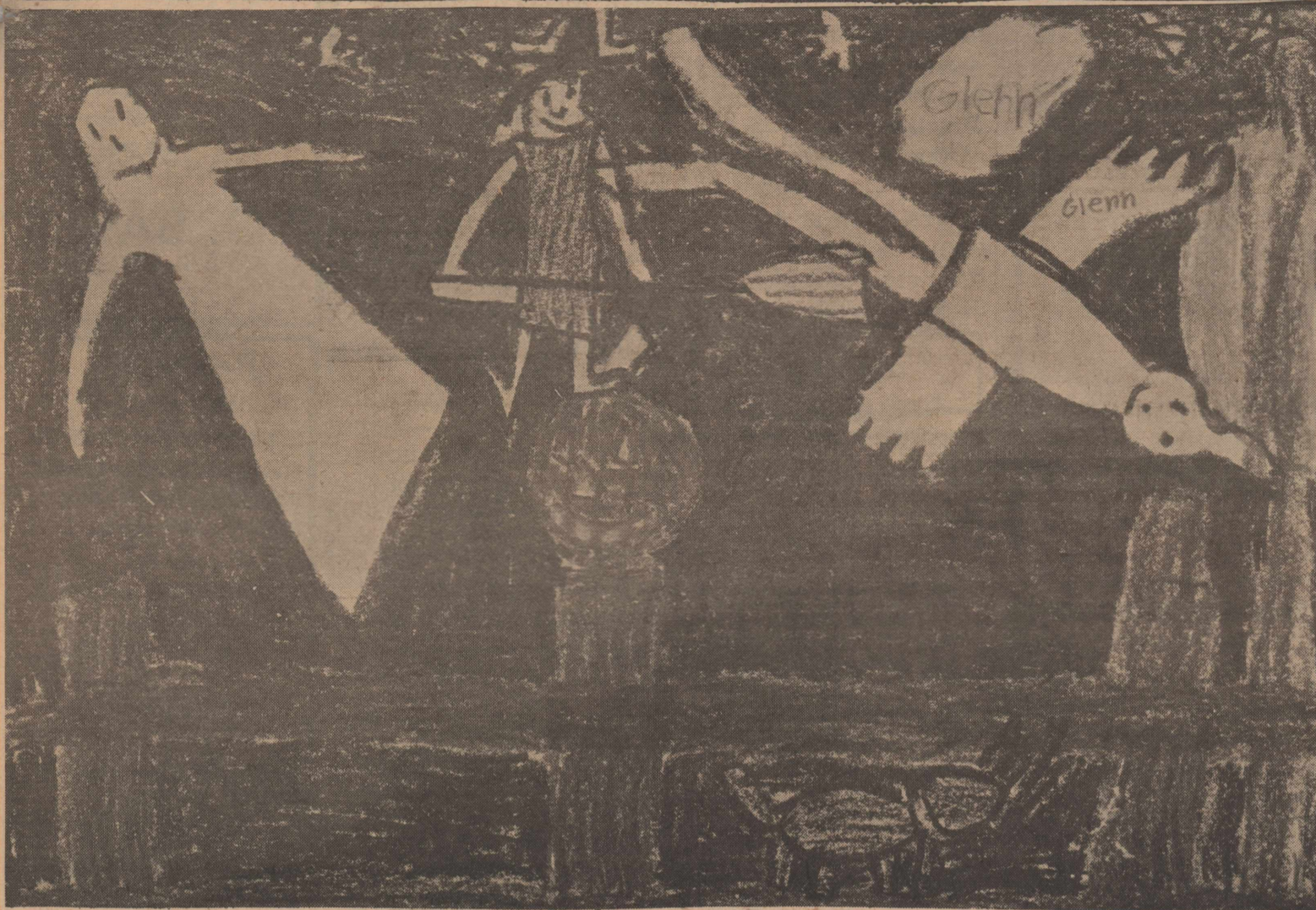

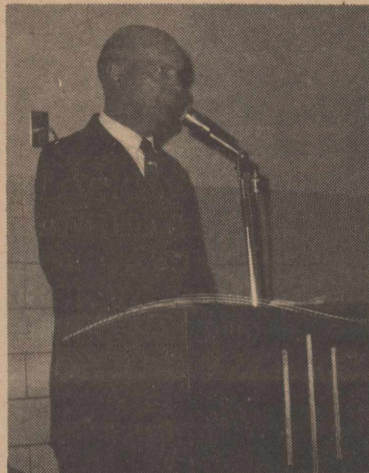

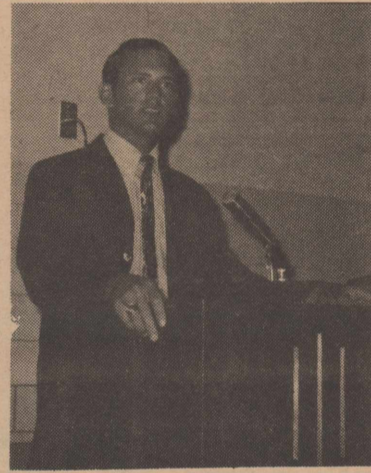

The Association voted to support an Evangelistic Crusade in California in April of 1968. This Association will work with the Redwood Empire Baptist Association in California by supplying

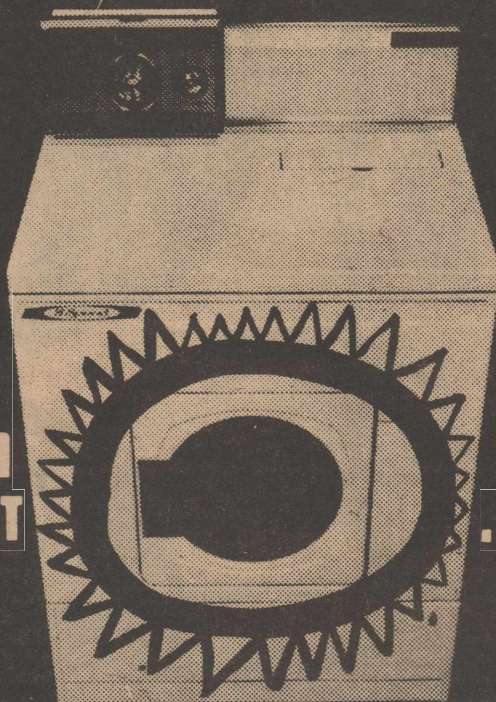

TEXAS HIGHWAY DEPT.

They remove drifting sand from the highway and are always available when deep water is on our roads. They plow off the snow and ice, and patch damages to the highway where there has been a wreck. They furnish stands for all mailboxes.

Any time you see any piece of equipment, truck, trailer house, or house over eight feet wide, over 13 feet six inches high, or over 55 to 65 feet long, the permit man from the Highway Department has licensed him to travel a certain route to his destination.

Did you know that they use between 300 and 500 tons of material a year to patch our roads? They prepare their own permix locally from asphalt, rocks, and rock dust.

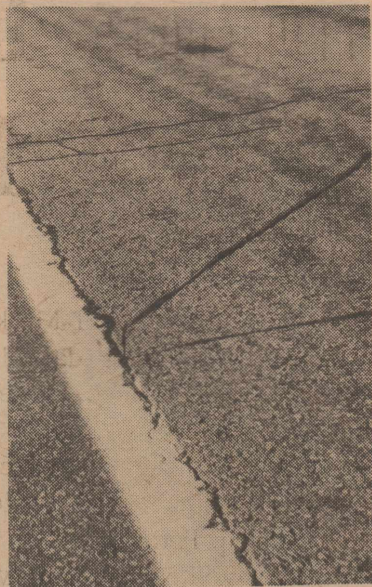
It has been said, and wisely, that this department of our government has done the best job, received the least criticism, wasted the least amount of money, and received the least amount of pay of any of our government agencies.

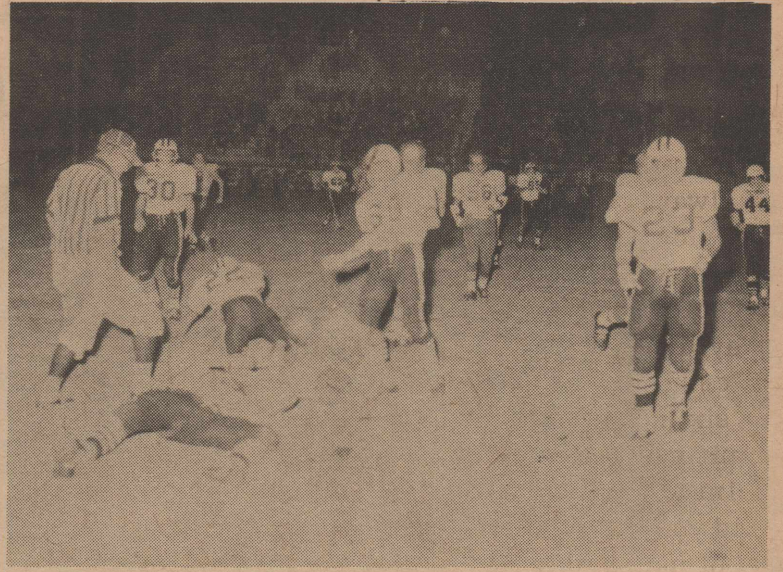
Seminole filled the air with passes in the second quarter. They scored again on a pass play to Terry Kuykendall from 25 yards out. Seminole led at half-time 12-7.

In the fourth quarter Mickey Ray found the range again and passed to Richard Jones to complete the Indians scoring for the night.

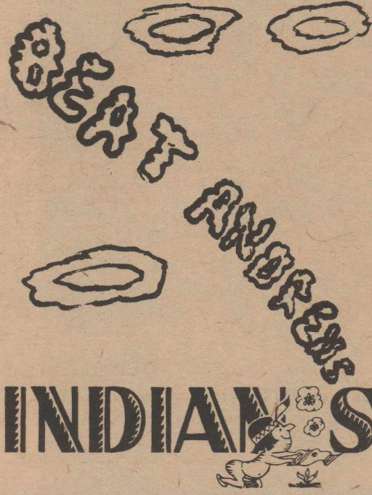
Pecos would not play dead. They scored again and added the point to make the score 18-14 in favor of the Indians.

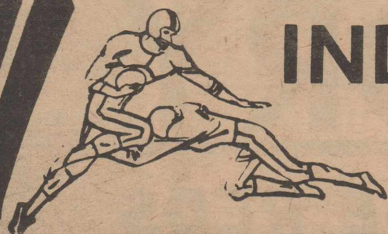

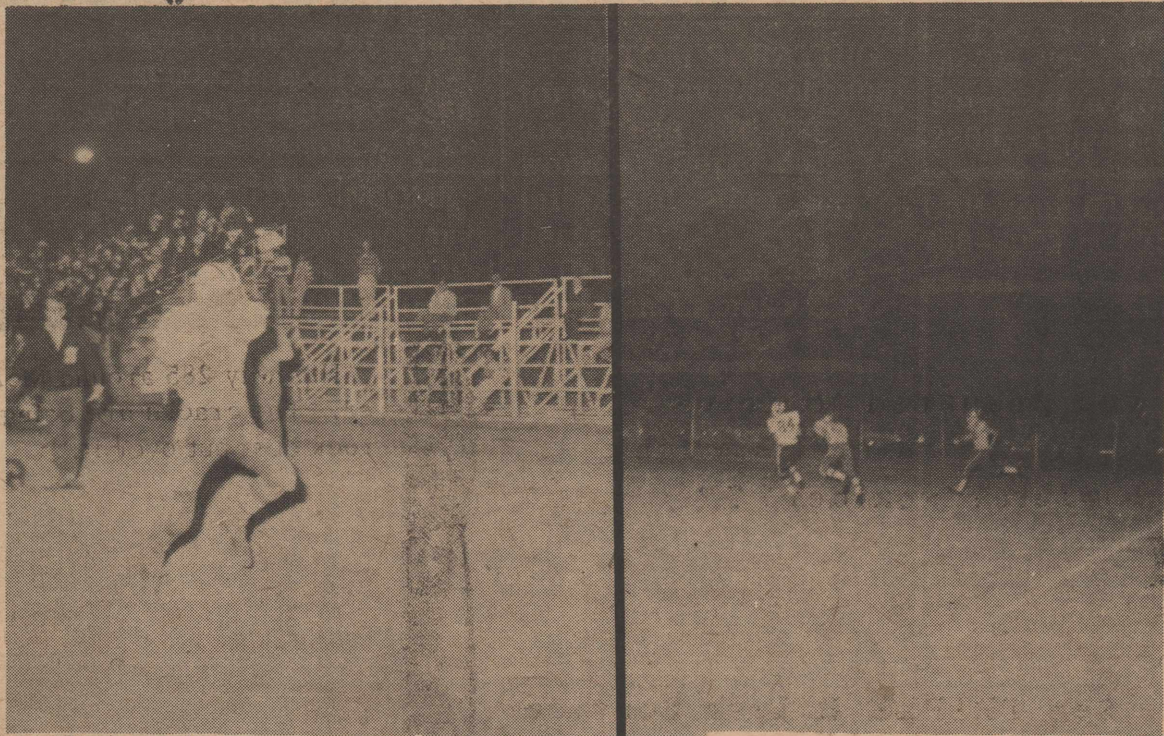


Larry Cottrell puts Seminole on the scoreboard as he runs across for the first touchdown.




You have seen the picture previously of the Court House Square. This week in the foreground is the old Gaines Hotel where the Cattle Inspectors were killed. The Hotel sat on the corner across from Forrest Lumber Co. where the Post Office is today. (We are sorry we can not identify the people in the picture.) The 1914 Model 'T' Ford belonged to Mr. J. E. Woodard. The building directly over the top of the Model 'T' was the old Austin Building and sat where Montgomery Ward's sits today. (The little house out behind is either Men's or Women's.) To the right of the Austin Building is the windmill and watering place. The old Court House is directly behind it.

In the front of the old Hotel is a partially used bale of cotton, we expect used for quilts and etc. On the street are other old cars that are difficult to identify. The building on the other side of the Gaines Hotel was the Bank building.



This picture was made in December, 1922, in front of the Gaines Hotel. Shown on the left is Forrest Lumber Co. and the Methodist Church and the school on the right. The high line poles were not electric lines but telephone lines. Notice the two cows grazing in front of Forrest Lumber Co. Both pictures were taken from the same location, one up the street west and the other east.

CLUB NEWS

JUNIOR STUDY CLUB
MEETS

The Seminole Junior Study Club met Thursday, October 19th at 4:00 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Hilburn Briscoe, Route 4, Seminole. Co-hostess was Mrs. Kent Denson. Members and guests were served hot spiced tea, cokes, and apple-spice cake.

After the social, the program chairman, Mrs. Eugene Dew, introduced the guest speakers, Mrs. E. W. Gray and Mrs. Henry Hicks, Special Education teachers, and Mrs. J. L. McCrummen, speech therapist in the Special Education Department in the Seminole schools.

Mrs. Gray, who teaches the younger group, said, "Every individual born has certain potentialities and certain limitations. Education has one primary purpose, to help the individual to realize his full potentiality that he may function completely as a contributing member of society, and to help him understand, accept, and compensate for his limitations. In this respect, education for children with special problems is no different from education for all children.

Mrs. Gray explained that there were over 200 known causes of retardation. She said that those who are educable are much more like ordinary children than they are different, and that many times no problem is seen until after the child has started to school.

Children in the special education classes are allowed to progress as rapidly as possible in each area of work. They are not required to keep to a certain "grade level".

As all education should be, Special Education is functional, with the children being taught the things they will need in everyday life.

The older group, which ranges in age from 11 through 14 years, is taught by Mrs. Hicks. She says the students in her class respond well to handicrafts and art work. These things satisfy their need to see results. From the act of producing something comes a feeling of confidence and achievement. Also, when co-ordinated with art, the subject matter of regular studies becomes more interesting and meaningful. Certain arts and handicrafts work, such as painting with a large brush, hammering, and modeling with clay provides a release of tension while it develops muscle co-ordination. Many of the subjects are taught on a "lab" basis, such as typing, which is used to teach both spelling and muscle co-ordination, as well as imparting a skill which can be used later. Most of these students will be totally self-supporting when they take their place in the adult world.

Mrs. McCrummen, speech therapist, said that speech improvement for the elementary child involves much more than drills or tongue twisters. Many problems such as shyness, lack of interest in school work, inability to get along with others at school or at home, may be a simple problem, which if not corrected can become so complex that he may go through life handicapped both socially and educationally.

Often these problems are related to speech. When a teacher spots a student with a defect in articulation, she sends him to the therapist who tests him to determine the cause of the problem. In many cases, the cause is impaired hearing, but in any case a teamwork approach, including clinic, class-room, and parent counseling is necessary to correct it.

Many methods of correction are used, but one of the main points to remember is to let the child proceed at his own rate. He must be encouraged, never hurried.

There were no fumbles in the game by the warriors. Gary Don threw the ball six times and completed four passes.

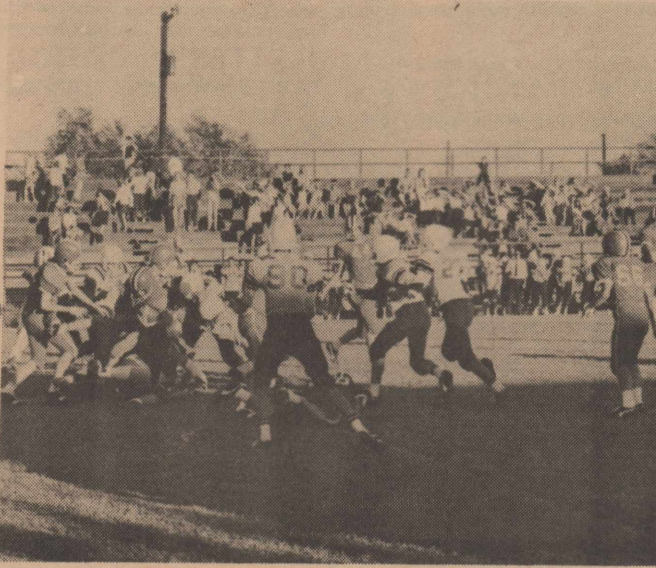
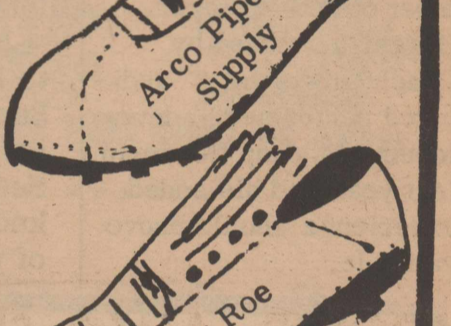
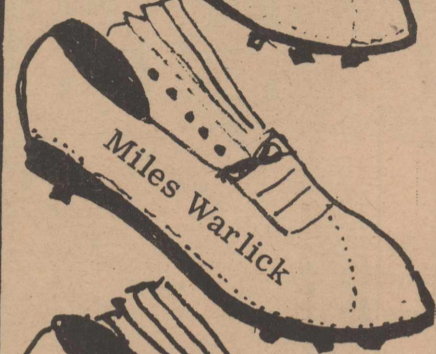
