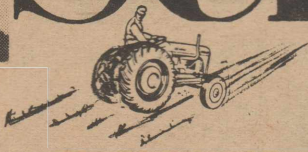

Pocket Picker

An article from the Manhattan Heights and West Texas Times - a Lubbock Negro Newspaper -

"Would you believe that an enthusiastic Panther fan could lose their billfold? Well, it did happen last Saturday night at the Panther Homecoming when M. C. Harkey of 1701 Teak Avenue reported that he had lost his wallet at the game.

According to Harkey, his billfold contained a social security card, driver's license and \$25.00 in cash.

Good the Panthers won, but too bad about Harkey's wallet. At least he can feel it was lost in the huge crowd that had come to watch the Panthers clinch a play-off in their district play.

All I can advise you to do, Harkey, is to be more careful about your valuables."

Everybody who works and earns a pay check is aware that income taxes and social security is withheld from their check.

In this office for each dollar earned, there is 8 and .8cents or nearly 9 cents out of each dollar for social security alone. Social security in this office equals to 60% of the income tax withheld. Social security and income tax withheld at present is running 23.36% of total salaries paid or nearly 1/4 of total income.

Mr. Harkey was advised to be more careful with his valuables - - Mr. American, we advise the same thing.

Since the taxpayer never had the pleasure of feeling of the money that was withheld, the pain is not nearly so great. This withholding system might turn out to be one of the greatest comforts to our enemies and a misfortune to Mr. and Mrs. Average American.

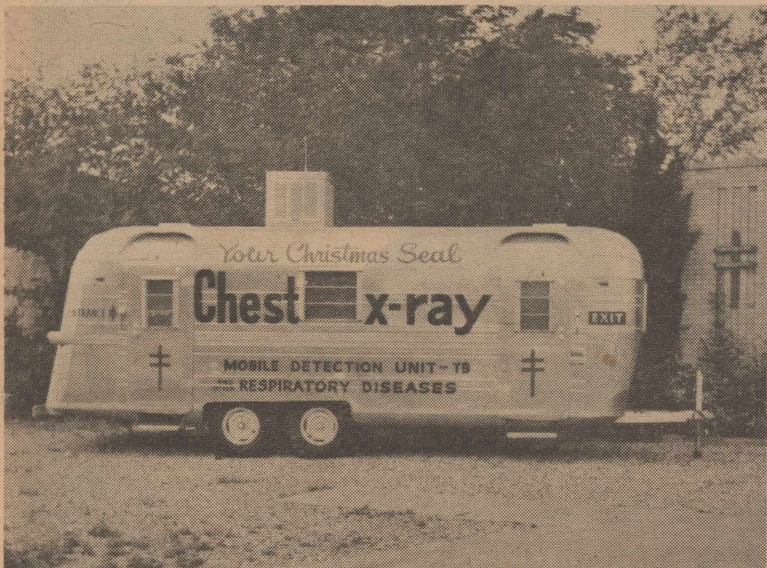

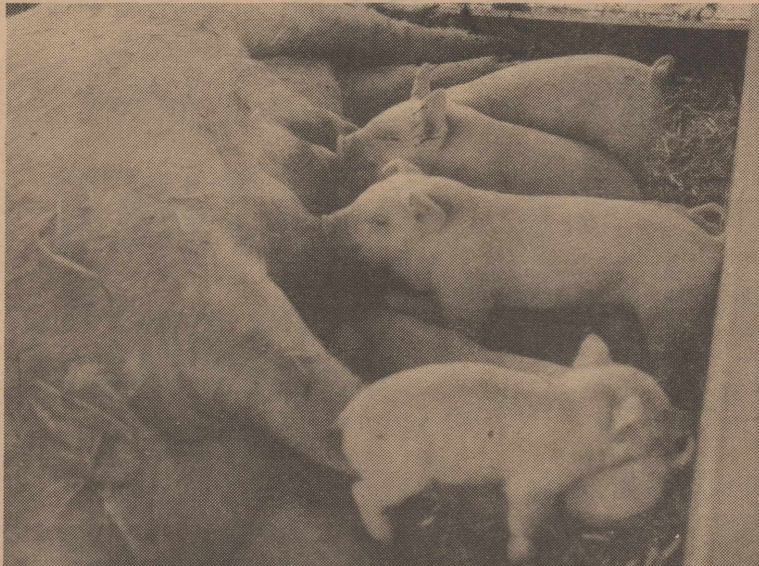


This is a nest of brand new pigs. 9 have arrived and more are expected.

Seminole collected a multitude of fouls in their first outing, but went on in Indian tradition to win in an overtime over Brownfield last Friday night, 63-58.

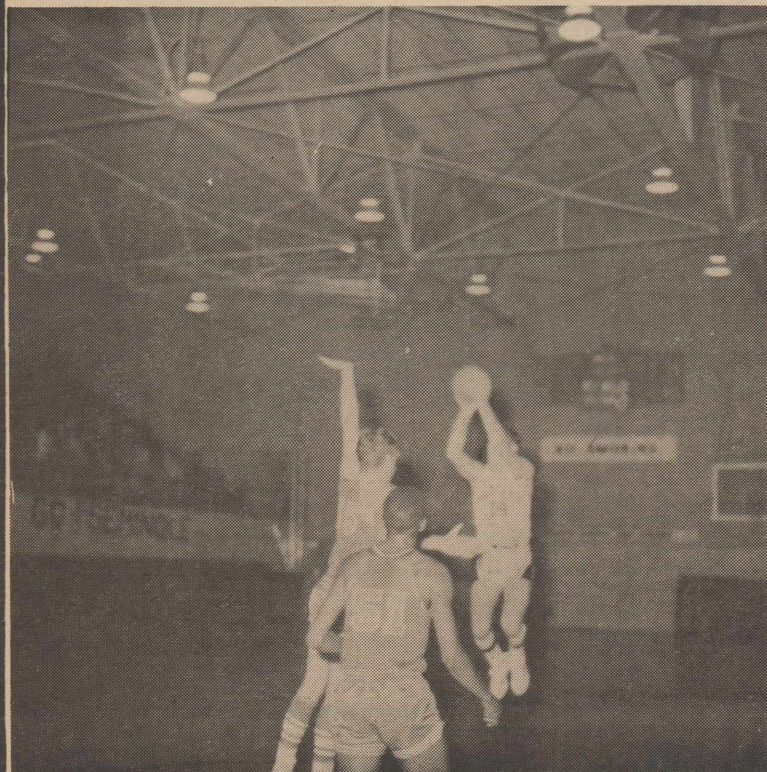

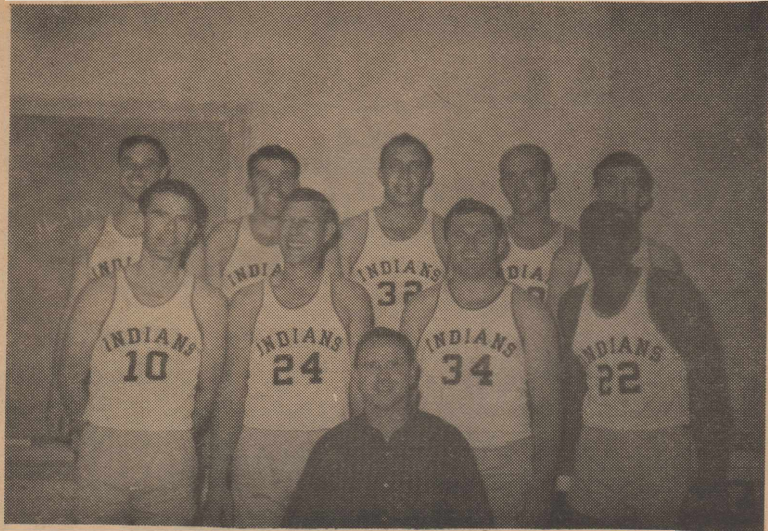

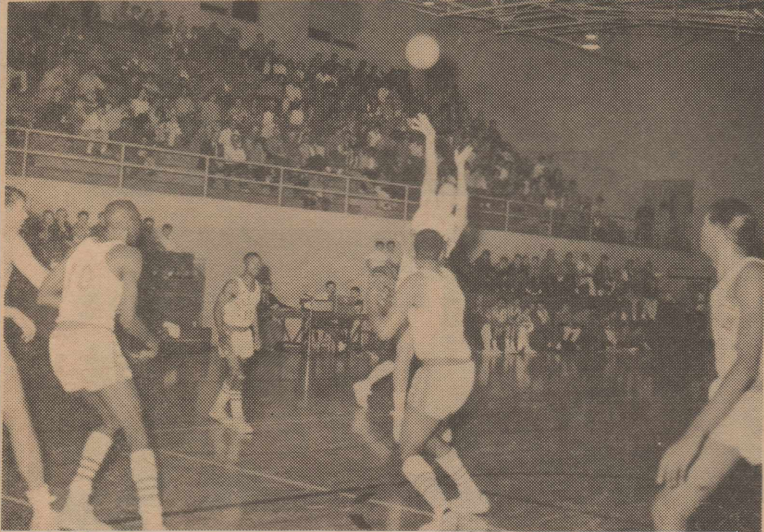

J. Walter Hammond, 79, former president of the Texas Farm Bureau, died at his home in Abilene Saturday following a long illness. Funeral services were held Monday in that city. Mr. Hammond, known as the "Father of the Texas Farm Bureau," is survived by one daughter, Mrs. W. D. Wofford, Abilene, and two grandsons. His wife died Nov. 22, 1964.

Mr. Hammond was elected president of the fledgling Texas Farm Bureau in 1939, when it was still known as the Texas Agricultural Association. The name was changed shortly after he became president when the organization affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation. The Taylor County farmer served as president of the TFB for 18 years, until 1957. Nationally known in agricultural circles, he was a member of the AFBF board of directors for 17 years during that time.

During Mr. Hammond's tenure, the TFB grew from less than 5,000 members in a few organized counties to more than 70,000 members in almost 200 counties.
