Santa Claus Is Coming Friday





Christmas lights are going up. Holiday season is in the air.

"They have been putting them up every since I've been here, since 1949." This was a statement made by Bob Whippo, local manager of Southwestern Public Service Company, when he was asked how long the employees of his company had been putting up the Christmas lights for Seminole. He further stated that the city helped put them up and that the lights were stored in the city barn. There are between sixteen and eighteen lineal blocks of lights put up and something around one thousand bulbs. The bulbs are from twenty-five to forty watts. In addition to the lights, about six hundred feet of unlighted decorations are installed.

The Chamber of Commerce furnishes the funds for new bulbs, replacements, and repairs. The County is responsible for the decorations and lights surrounding the courthouse itself. Southwestern Public Service Company furnishes all the electricity for the lighting which stays up about five weeks. If any of you would care to know about the cost of the electricity, contact Junior Thornbury at Thornbury's Barber Shop. One string crossing the street was hooked onto his meter a few years ago. It was soon corrected.

There are overhead suspension wires that were put up in the past that the lights and decorations are hung on.

The company has a six-man crew working. They are: Wayne Thomas, foreman; Alfred Sims, line-man; Malcom Martin, lineman; Walter Ellison, driver; Jimmy Baker, serviceman; Norris Jones, meter reader. Other company employees are Jimmy Pierson, serviceman; Mrs. Porter Fitzgerald, office; and Mrs. Sue Cristy, office.

School Board Meeting

The school board met Monday night with all members present. Mr. Carl Gummeson of Denver City was available to answer questions which arose.

NEWS ITEMS OF INTEREST TO FARMERS

Farmers in this area were reminded that annual reports of the earnings of their farm workers are due in the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue by January 31, 1968.

H.P. Thomas, Odessa Social Security District Manager, noted that the earnings of many farm workers are covered under social security. A farm employee, to be covered, must be paid at least \$150 in cash wages during the year by his employer, or work for the employer on 20 or more days during the year for cash wages figured on a time basis (rather than a piece-rate basis).

For 1967 the social security tax rate is 4.40 percent each for employer and employee on cash wages up to \$6600. The tax amount must be entered on Form 943 (Employer's Annual Tax/Return for Agricultural Employees) together with the total amount of cash wages paid to each farm worker.

The procedure to be followed in the treatment of water wells that have been tested by the labora tory and found to have 'coliform present' is as follows: For the normal size well, mix l gallon of clorox or purex to 5 gallons of water, or drop 8 to 10 HTH tablets in the well, and let stand 12 hours.

Pour your liquid into well, then open each hydrant one at a time and let the water run until the smell of chlorine comes through, cut hydrant off. Then cut pump off and let it stand 8 to 12 hours.

DO NOT DRINK THE WATER IN THE PRO-CESS OF TREATING IT. Water should be used for the bath room only. After 8 to 10 hours, open hydrants, and let water run for $1-l^{\frac{1}{2}}$ to 2 hours or until chlorine odor is gone. Now the well is ready for normal use. After this procedure has been followed, take another sample in four days to make sure the water is safe to use.







Then against Brownfield on Monday, they beat Brownfield 36 - 17. Ray had II, Barbee - 9, and Calderon - 6.





SEMINOLE SANITATION DEPARTMENT

The Sanitation Department of Seminole requires five trucks to haul off our trash and refuse. One of these trucks works only on Monday and Friday. The other four trucks work five days per week.

One is a flat bed. One handles the Dempster Dumpsters and the other three are pack-mors.

There are 37 Dumpsters (the big metal containers that they pick up and carry to the dump ground) in Seminole. These are dumped on an average of three time a week or 18 - 20 loads a day, five days a week.

The oldest one of these trucks will soon be 13 years old (1955 International). The youngest is near five vears old (1963 Chevrolet). The three pack-mor trucks (with the bighydrauliccylinder that continually packs the trash as they load) loads two to three times a day. The 1960 model flat bed truck varies to the amount it carries off. So Seminole's refuse amounts to 30 or 40 loads a day besides what individuals carry out to the dump grounds.

As we Americans demand better foods we demand better packaging, as we demand better packaging we have more throw aways. This takes more trucks and more men. IF YOU CARRY REFUSE TO THE DUMP GROUND, PLEASE DUMP IT IN THE PIT AND NOT ON THE ROADSIDE.

GAYE FOOTE WINNER OF DAR GOOD CITIZEN AWARD



On December 12, I am going to vote for a city one percent sales tax for the following reasons:

- 1. To grow, a city always needs more money.
- 2. I think it is the fairest tax that can be paid.
- 3. The city needs new equipment.
- 4. The city needs the streets repaired.
- 5. The water field and water equipment needs up-dating.
- 6. It is the first relief from ever-increasing ad valorem taxes.
- 7. Seminole and Gaines County taxes have always been small in comparison to other places where I have owned property.

Five more Texas cities have given overwhelming approval to one per cent city sales tax levies.

Huntsville, Uvalde, Seguin, Commerce and Llano voters asked for the tax by margins ranging from two-to-one to eight-to-one.

So far, 33 cities have approved the local revenue-raising method passed by the Legislature this year although it was believed to be highly controversial. Only two. Lufkin and Electra have turned it down.






CHURCH TO HAVE GUEST SPEAKER



A Story About Your School

SPECIAL READING PROGRAM

In every school there are normally intelligent children who do not learn to read and spell satisfactorily by the regular classroom methods. Children learn all skills in ways unique to themselves. Therefore, reading methods suitable to the majority of pupils completely miss some hard working intelligent children. For many years these children were reproached for their lack of industry or ability. Increasingly, conscientious teachers and parents are realizing that these children often learn to read if given special help.

The Special Reading Program in Seminole Primary School was organized this year. It was designed to help children attain their fullest potential in reading. The principal, John Golmon, and teacher, Mrs. Gerry Hunt, selected materials and methods that lend themselves to individual needs of the pupils. The program serves second and third grade pupils who are reading both below grade level and believe ability. Classes are kept small since individual attention is the key to success of such a program.



Spelling: These children are "coding" sounds into words. The purpose is to help the child hear the sequence of sounds that make up words. The steps are (1) Hear the word, (2) Repeat the word, (3) Say the sounds in sequence heard, (4) Write the word repeating each letter as it is written.



Games: These children are reinforcing vowel sound recognition through a game: Minnie Gauna, Cathy Kelley, Ernest Ramirez, Johnny Escabedo, and Robert Sinclair.
