

2. To provide a program that will challenge each student, yet one that is not so far beyond his level of achievement that he becomes discouraged or lost and one that is not below his level of achievement to the point that he is bored.

3. To provide a flexible program so that the individual student can advance to higher levels of achievement or be placed on a lower level of achievement whenever such change is indicated at any time during the semester.

<u>Literature Study</u>: The goals in teaching literature are the same as those set forth in Bulletin 615 from The Texas Education Agency.

In regard to reading lists, it is not intended that all students study all the works listed. Classroom sets of certain books are available and are studied by the entire class. The higher the phase the more independent reading the student is expected to do. A much greater depth of study and discussion is expected of the Phase Four students than of those in lower phases. Some of the books on the reading lists for the various phases might be too difficult for some of the students, but it is so intended. Some books of this type are on the lists for the ambitious student who might want to read them. Especially is this true for the Phase Three students, many of whom will be going to college.

During the four year span that a student attends high school he will study all areas of literature that are normally covered under a conventional program. In 1965-66 units of study were composition, fiction, non-fiction, and poetry, with emphasis on the works of English writers. In 1966-67 the units of study were linguistics, the American novel, Shake-spearean drama, and mythology. Units for 1967-68 are grammar and rhetoric, the short story, contemporary drama, and poetry. The final year of the four year program will have units on the foreign novel, classical drama, research techniques, and mass communications.

The materials also covered Composition Study, Language Study and Levels of Instruction. Under Levels of Instruction was discussed:

Phase I: The work on this level is remedial reading. The achievement level is well below normal, and students working in this phase are generally below the 20th percentile in achievement on nationally standardized tests. These classes are small, and the instruction is individualized. It is a laboratory situation with each student working on his own level on materials of interest to him in an effort to raise his reading ability to the level necessary to do satisfactory work in English and other areas of study. As soon as his reading level is satisfactory, he is moved to Phase Two.

Phase II: These classes are concerned with the development of the basic skills. The achievement level is below average with students generally ranking between the 20th and 40th percentiles on nationally standardized tests.


Phase III: These classes are designed for those students with an average background in English. Normally, students on this level will rank between the 40th and 70th percentile on nationally standardized tests.

Phase IV: These classes are designed for extremely well prepared students desiring education in depth. Students working on this level will generally rank above the 70th percentile on nationally standardized tests and will be quite mature in their attitude toward education. Although the units of study are the same as those in Phase Three, the depth of study is much greater.

Everyone, including ladies and wives of interested men, are asked to attend.

It was pointed out the necessity of an organization of citizens of our community be set up for the purpose of aiding the prosecuting authorities to eliminate this type of material. The material in question, it was further stated, was not good for mature adults much less for the younger and our children.

The following men were asked to serve as a steering committee with Joe Smith, local attorney, as temporary chairman, Jim Savell, Howard Deen, Dr. E. M. Wright, Dan Cocke, and Jim Kennedy.

"Every interested person in this community is asked to check the news stands where they trade for such literature and the name and author of such book be given or called to the attention of this committee.

Article 527-509, Section II. Whoever shall knowingly offer for sale, sell, give away, exhibit, televise, or otherwise distribute, make, display, or exhibit any obscene book, magazine, story, pamphlet, paper, writing, card, advertisement, circular, print, pictures, photograph, motion picture film, image, cast, slide, figure, instrument, statue, drawing, phonograph record, mechanical recording, or presentation, or other article which is obscene, to a minor shall be fined not more than Two Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) nor imprisoned in the county jail more than two (2) years or both.

"Cotton trade journals, processors and handlers are distributing informaare making outlandish predictions of higher cotton prices next year to provoke farmers to 'throw caution to the wind' in figuring their own and plant 95 per cent of their allotment. There is certainly nothing about current markets to inspire optimism, and the textile mills are not offering contracts at high prices.



Above is a 16' tower - Dowd Walking Irrigator, recently installed on the Johnny Jones farm that is 2 miles North and 2 miles East of Seminole on the Seagraves Highway. The water, fed by three small wells, is being delivered into the gathering tank by the two inlet lines shown above the tank. To the right of the gathering tank can be seen the Berkeley Centrifugal Pump, the small water level tank of the engine throttle control system, the 292 Chevrolet engine with the oil hydraulic pump driven by the engine crankshaft, the oil reservoir along with the pressure control valve and filter, and the Dowd Walking Irrigator pivot point and tower system. Being mechanically driven, the Dowd uses all of its water to water the crop. Not being dependent upon water to drive the system, the Dowd Walking Irrigator can be moved "dry" from one position to another without even starting up the irrigation wells.
