# Lewd & Obscene Material Discussed In Meeting

"If someone were to tell us that there was a worm in a can of beans in our store, we could not afford to open every can to find the worm." Such was the opinion of Club Estep concerning lewd and obscene reading material on magazine racks. He further stated, "Books come in on Monday and magazines on Thursday, and to read all the material in them would be looking for the one worm. We do need some help to keep them out of our stores. We get three westerns (which are ok) and the rest sex, and we can sell all of the sex magazines we get."

In the meeting Monday night of interested people concerning such literature, there were 58 people present. It was pointed out that people distributing or selling to minors could suffer twice the penalty as selling to adults. (It is against the law to sell such material to adults.)

Joe Smith, acting as chairman, stated, "A few people cannot accomplish the purpose, it will take everyone's help that is interested in getting rid of such material.

The owners of some ten stores will be contacted to enlist their help and further check with them so they will not resent people from the Monday night meeting visiting their store. It was further suggest ed that all interested citizens call to the attention of owners and people on this committee made up of Joe Smith, Jim Savell, Howard Deen, Dr. E. M. Wright, Dan Cocke, and Jim Kennedy. If in your checking you find material that shocks you, please call it to their attention. Again it was suggested that the purpose of this meeting was not to advertise such junk, but to examine books and magazines with the intention of keeping them out of Seminole.

"There was such a contrast between what I used to think was obscene literature and what I found on the shelves recently in Seminole, "stated Rev. Kirk. (The magazines and books are so much worse today than they were 8 to 10 years ago.)

# Hospitals

Hospital costs receive another plank in the floor that continues to push them upward Thursday when the Fair Labor Standard Acts minimum wage requirement for hospital employees becomes \$1.15 per hour. This is the second of five such graduated minimums which will continue to push costs up until at least February l, 1971 when the hourly wage of the least skilled worker must be \$1.60.

The hospital employees were included in federal minimum wage coverage for the first time last year. The minimum base of \$1 an hour became effective February 1, 1967 and is to be increased 15¢ an hour on February 1 of each year through 1971.

As payroll expense is hospital costs, Texas Hospital Association Executive Director O. Ray Hurst of Austin, points out that salary increases have a marked effect on the patient's bill. For instance, he (20 employee hours). As a result, even a minimal 15¢ pay increase results in \$3 a day additional that must be charged to the patient or his third party payor.

"Of course, " Hurst explained, "the minimum wage requirements do not directly affect the professional and technically skilled employees of the hospital. However, the result is the same as if the law did require raises for all.




Coach Hicks instructs Bennett, Sims, Smith, Hearne and Pendleton.







## ED WELCH ANNOUNCES FOR SHERIFF


Ed Welch, 43, a veteran of more than ten years in various departments of law enforcement, has authorized the Seminole News to announce his candidacy for the office of Sheriff of Gaines County, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 4.

A native of Alabama, Ed Welch has lived in Seminole since 1954. He lives at 608 S. W. 15th Street with his wife, Rosa Ray, and four step-children, Richard, a senior, and John, a Sophomore, in Seminole High School; Shelia, an eighth grader and Donna, a seventh grader, in Seminole Junior High School. For the past three years Welch has been employed by the Seminole Police Department. He has been Chief of Police in Seminole for the past thirty-three and one-half months. The 'ripple' effect is set into motion by the mandatory increases for those at the bottom of the scale and the result is not merely a straight line, across-the-board increase, but rather an adjustment of salary scales throughout the hospital organizational structure to provide, so far as possible, adequate compensation for the level of services rendered."

Ed Rodgers, manager of the local hospital, stated, "We cut our forty-four hour work-week to a forty hour work-week to balance the pay schedule, but we had to hire extra help to take care of the lost hours. The first of the year, we went up on our private rooms \$2 per day."

"Actually, the wage law only made our rooms go up about \$1 per day compared to the \$3 Texas wide, but with other continually rising expenses, we had to raise \$2."



#### NEWS RELEASE

Tuberculosis is on its way out!

Amazing though the statement may seem, this breakthrough - the beginning of the end - will unfold very simply, very quietly, very undramatically Wednesday at noon at the Lubbock City-County Health Department.

Wednesday marks the first day for an Out-Patient Clinic in this county. Other counties will surely follow. On that day, Isoniazid (INH) will begin an allout attack on the "Tubercle bacillus" - the germ which eventually activates tuberculosis.

Control and eradication of the disease will not be overnight, but the beginning is here.

Out-Patient clinics will be held at the City County Health Department in Lubbock County on a weekly basis. In other counties, the plan will be similar. The West Texas Tuberculosis Association will help to staff these clinics by furnishing doctors, nurses, a health educator and clerical workers. On Wednesday, the Lubbock clinic will open with thirty-three patients who have appointments to see the doctors.

INH has been recommended for use by the National Tuberculosis Association, the American Thoracic Society and the United States Public Health Department. Private doctors will soon begin prescribing the drug to their patients. The cost is very little approximately four dollars per month.

INH qualified for this recommendation on four counts. These were effectiveness, acceptability, toxicity and cost. The Lubbock County clinic is but the first. It is hoped that such a clinic will shortly exist in each of the 23-county area served by WTTA. The idea is first adopted by the county medical society, then the county health unit - and finally the drug is received in ample quantities needed for appli-become active. Then a TB drug was given. cation.

What is INH?

Approximately 25 million people are infected with tubercle bacillus. In past years, the rate of these infected people has increased, and in the period of one year, at least one percent will become active tuberculosis patients. It takes only one tubercle bacillus to cause infection. Yet, in from two to ten

weeks, the reproduction of this bacillus can turn a negative reaction into a positive one. These are called "converters".

Previously, all doctors could do was what they called "watchful waiting", meaning that they could only keep a surveillance on the patient until he did

Now, INH, under the new recommendation, will be given to all positive reactors. This will prevent them from going into a clinical state of the disease more simply, INH will attack the bacillus and prevent it from ever becoming tuberculosis. INH given to all positive reactors in the country could cut down the disease rate between 75 and 80 percent. All positive reactors are considered infected persons.

It was only recently proven, after nine years of research, that INH will keep positive reactors from becoming active. In eight of those years, WTTA, actively participated and cooperated in the program.

INH actually kills the tubercle bacillus, but at the same time has no harmful side effects since it does not effect the body. It is the least toxic of the TB drugs, and applied alone to positive reactors promises to be a long-awaited miracle in the eradication of tuberculosis.

In the Lubbock County clinic, the long range treatment will begin with all positive reactors who are children under the age of 20 years and all known recent converters, regardless of age. It was also decided that all household contacts of a reported active case of tuberculosis should receive chemoprophylaxis for a minimum of twelve months if their reaction to the test is positive.

The Health Department takes the large x-ray film of the patient. Radiologists from the WTTA read the film free of charge. Public health nurses visit in the patient's home and provide the doctors with medical history of the patient. They also make home visits and notify the patient of an upcoming appointment at the clinic.

Radiologists, internists, pediatricians, and thoracic surgeons - along with clerical workers, health educators and nurses will be provided by WTTA on volunteer basis to all county clinics.


The second defeat for the Maidens eliminated them from the tournament but Gloria Calderon made the alltournament team.
