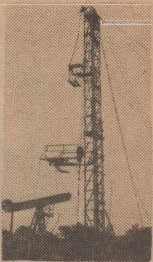

Before you have too much to say about the dishonesty of many car salesman, you should wait on the public for awhile and see what they will do to a salesman.

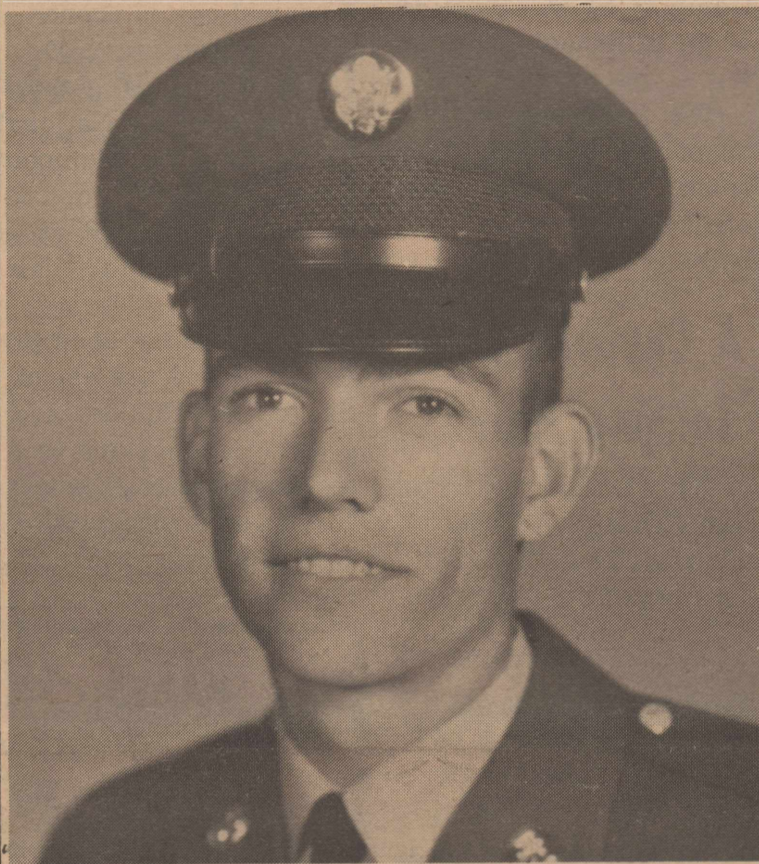

\$1,000,000 Rain Falls

Gail Hargrove



"December to December is a long time even if you say it fast -- especially if you are in an Army hospital," said a new Seminole resident, Gail Hargrove.

Gail and Carolyn Hargrove were married in Brownfield in June, 1964. They moved to Seminole where Gail was employed by Ross Irrigation Company. After four months, the Hargroves returned to Brownfield, and in March, 1965, Gail went into service. After basic at Ft. Bliss and two months at Ft. Polk, Louisiana, he left from Oakland, California, for Saigon (September 3, 1966). In Saigon he was with the First Infantry Division at Phauc Vinah, which is 35 miles north of Saigon. Con't on P. 3

Postmaster Vacancy

A Postmaster's vacancy in a Post Office has been considered a long time a Congressman's appointee. U. S. Senators affirm the appointee, but do not make the appointment himself. Ordinarily recommendations are made by the local county committee or city committee where the vacancy occurs.

Civil Service exams are given by the U. S. Post Office Department. The three highest grades made are submitted to the Congressman and he makes his choice from these three on the recommendations of the local Democratic or Republican Committee.

All veterans are automatically given a courtesy - five points on a 100 point score -- disabled or partially disabled veterans 10 points. The only time exams are not given is when some Civil Service employee has years of seniority. Then his name is submitted to the Congressman along with those three names that have taken the exam and whose years of service and recommendations would merit a promotion. Con't on P. 8

Seminole and Gaines County have been blessed during this winter with the best moisture that we've had probably since 1960. The area farm land is easy to break this year because of moisture and freezing that makes the ground crunchy when walked on.

The moisture is not nearly as much as we've had in other years but the weather has fallen so much better.

A lot of places in the county have not had over 4 inches of moisture but it all stayed exactly where it fell.

Service people that are in the ditch digging business have stated that moisture is good down to five feet. Also, we have had few high winds that rob our top soil of moisture so the rains and moisture have been accompanied by ideal weather conditions so as to leave all the moisture that has fallen in the soil.

It's most difficult to make money on an irrigated farm without some lower moisture to begin a crop on. Yes, our county has enjoyed a \$1,000,000 worth of rain, snow, ice, and moisture this winter.

Lengthy Agenda Faced School Board Monday

At the regular school board meeting Monday night the Ostwald Company was awarded the band uniform bids for a total of \$17, 544.74. In 14 to 21 days the company will have one uniform ready for final okay with the other 150 Junior High uniforms and uniforms for the twirlers, two directors, and the drum major to be completed and delivered in 45 to 60 days. It was recommended that a non-performance clause as to delivery be included in the bid.

The board called for an election April 6, 1968 for trustees. (Those interested in filing for a place have until March 6 or 30 days before the election.) Terms of Lloyd Coates and Leon Foote expire this year. Mr. Coates said, "I do not choose to run for re-election."

The board approved expenses for one car, one night's accommodations, and meals for three to six coaches to Region IV Texas High School Coaches' Association meeting in El Paso, February 17, 1968. (Money was approved in budget 1031.1, and it was thought that this meeting would be held in Midland this year. This trip now becomes an overnight one.)

The recommendation of Mrs. Kate Webb was okayed by the board to hire Mrs. City to replace Mrs. Azalea Lockridge (who has resigned) at the F.J. Young cafeteria and Mrs. Paul Landrum to replace Mrs. Edna Todd (who has resigned) at the primary cafeteria.

The school board discussed at length the suspension of two young men. The people of Seminole School District should be proud indeed of the time spent by administrators and school board members in discussing for 2 hours what was best to do and about school

The program begins at 7:30.

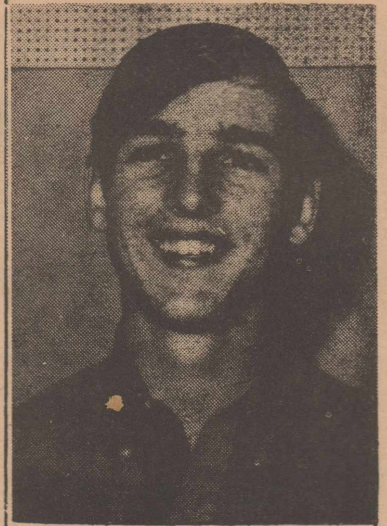
TOPNOTCH COTTON CONFERENCE SLATED FEBRUARY 15

South Plains cotton producers and agribusinessmen will get firsthand information on the production of quality cotton at a conference to be held at the KoKo Palace on Feb. 15.

The program is slated to kick off at 9:30 a. m., according to Billy C. Gunter, Extension District 2 agricultural agent, Lubbock.

Leadoff speaker at the session will be one of the foremost cotton economists in the nation, Dr. M. K. Horne, Jr., chief economist of the National Cotton Council, Memphis, Tenn. Horne will discuss the world cotton situation and the demand for quality cotton.

The boys were on "C" rations. "One day some tall cans of salmon showed up. There was no way to cook anything and some of the boys could not eat the salmon straight out of the can -- so I traded two little cakes that were canned also for two cans of the salmon. I ended up with three cans. My mother thought that was really funny," said Gail.

On the third of December, the boys went on a sweeping mission (search and destroy). That was the day a claymore mine exploded and Gail was wounded. A piece of shrapnel went through his right thigh leaving a gapping hole approximately one inch by three inches. He was conscious and rational after the accident and requested that Carolyn not be notified. Gail called her on the 9th of December on arrival stateside at Travis AFB, California. On the tenth of December, Carolyn and Gail's parents met him as he arrived at Brooks Army Hospital in San Antonio. That was home for the next year and 11 days. Some of the ordeals of that year in the hospital included being in traction for eight weeks and three days, confined to a body cast from the arm pits down to his right ankle for two months, skin grafts, and leg casts.

In June, Gail began to walk on crutches. Mrs. Hargrove returned to San Antonio on Christmas Day, 1966, and stayed the following year in the guesthouse (only three blocks from the hospital). Ft. Sam Houston had three guesthouses, each accommodating about 30. Families of servicemen confined to the hospital had priority for the rooms, but often others stayed there. Visiting hours at the hospital were from 2-4 p.m. and 7-9 p.m. each day and Carolyn was always there.

One incident that Carolyn and Gail recalled was the water in Saigon. "It was terrible! Carolyn sent pre-sweetened koolaid in her letters. I had made a canteen of strawberry koolaid the morning that I was hurt. I gave it, canteen and all, to the medic who was looking after me."

The Hargroves are farming eight miles south of town on the Andrews Highway. It is really nice to welcome fine young people into our community. Welcome, Hargroves!!!

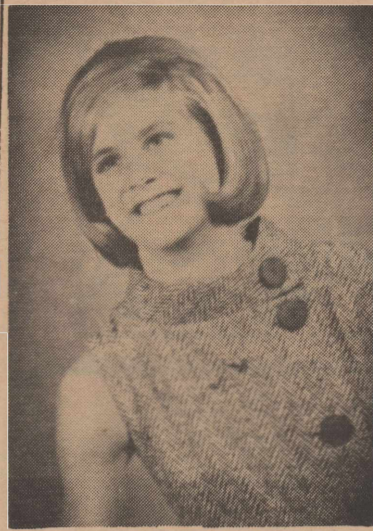

The board approved the following motion: That Richard Wallace and David Cockrell be readmitted to school with the understanding that the next unexcused absence for either student would be an automatic suspension for the remainder of the school year---- that each student be expected to follow rules and regulations as set out in the student handbook.

The board discussed requests from different schools to send someone to their schools to discuss the non-graded high school program. Other schools, it was discussed, would be asked to pay expenses and also give a progress report periodically if their schools went into a similar program. Mr. Bramlett, School Superintendent, will use his judgment as to how many schools and where school personnel might go. It was pointed out that other than San Antonio and Lamesa, that Amarillo, Tahoka and others had made requests. A group of teachers from the State of Mississippi will visit our system to study the non-graded high school program.

Concerning school policy for substitute teachers, the policy was amended to read, "In emergency situations when a fully qualified substitute cannot be secured, a person with as much as sixty hours college credit may be used. A roster of such persons must be approved annually by the Texas Education Agency and the person's name must be on the approved roster for him to be eligible to substitute."

7. Contracts for teachers will be discussed at the regular board meeting on March 11.
8. Bobby Tipping, one of our eighth grade basketball players, broke his leg during the Brownfield-Seminole basketball game in Brownfield, February 8. The break is midway between the knee and ankle and occurred during a pileup under one of the baskets. The game was very rough. Postmaster appointees are not always popular. Congressman and local committees can create more enemies by making one appointee out of numerous applicants than they make friends.

It is good that such appointees were put under Civil Service and Postmasters are not appointed anew with a change of each administration as it was in the 1920's and early 30's.

Salaries range approximately from \$500 a year for the smallest post office in the United States to 20,000 - 25,000 in the largest post office. A residency of a certain length of time is required. (It is believed to be one year.)

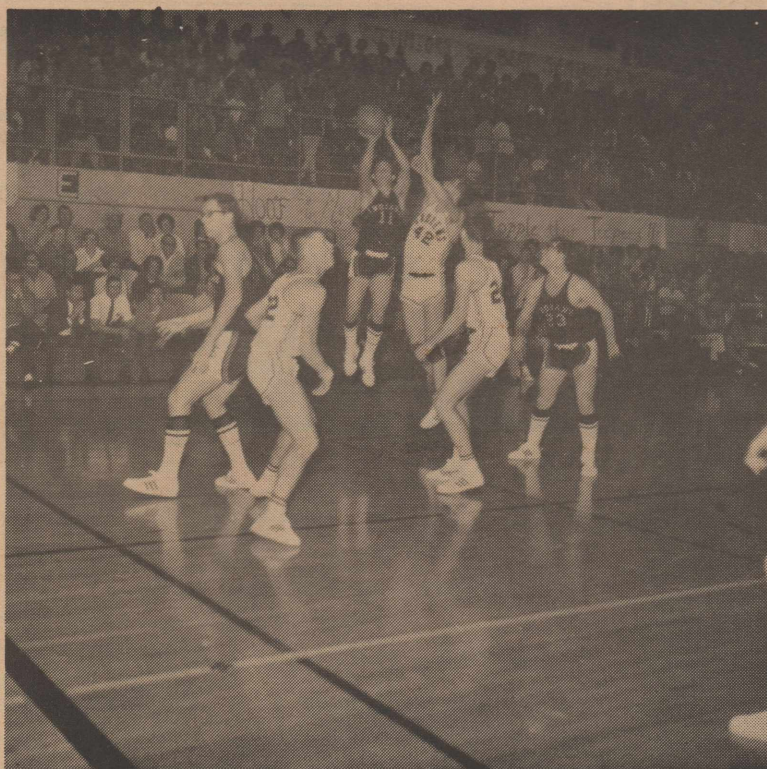

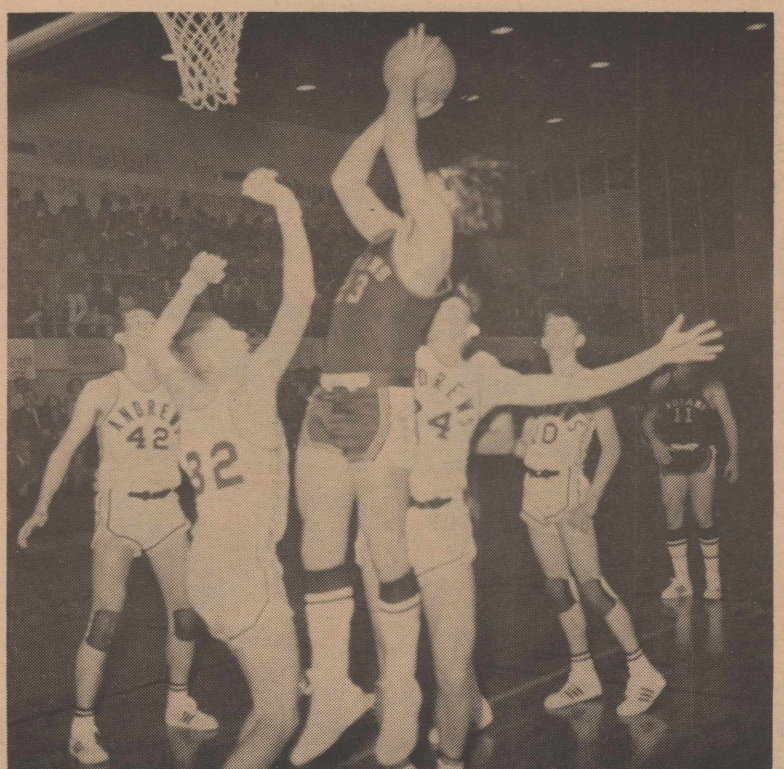

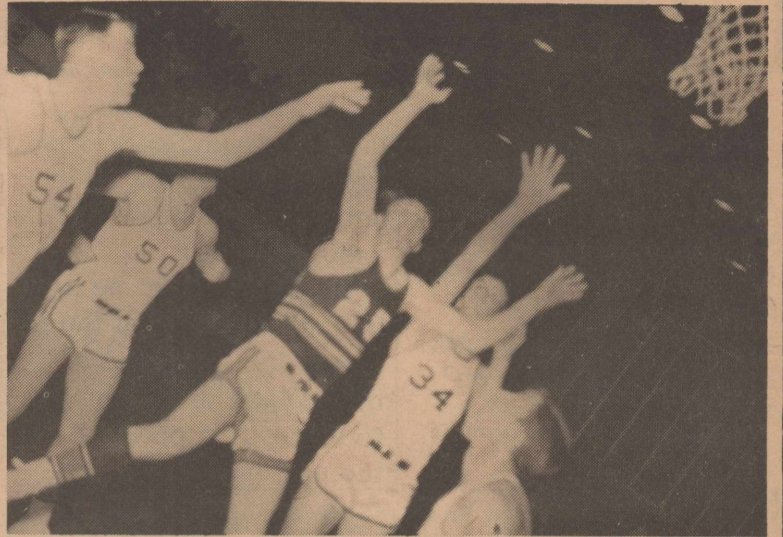
SEMINOLE B-TEAM

Finally by the half Seminole had a 7 point lead, but only led by one point in the first quarter.

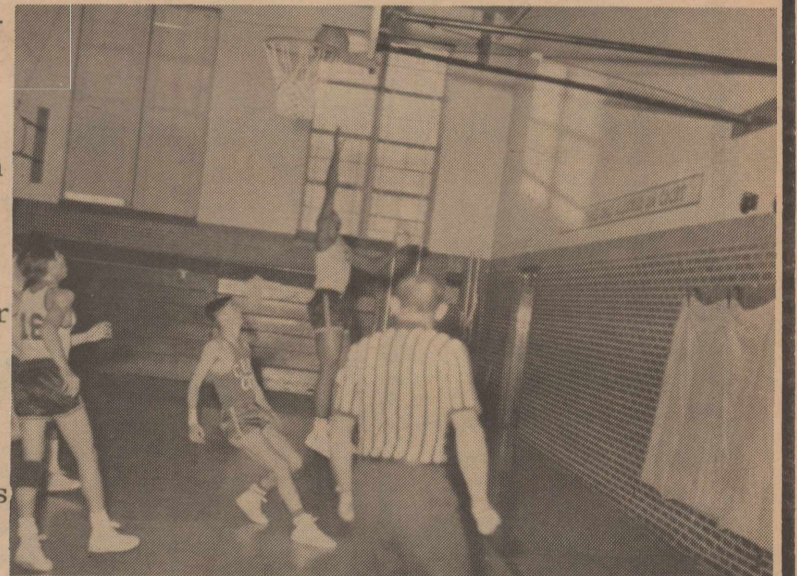
