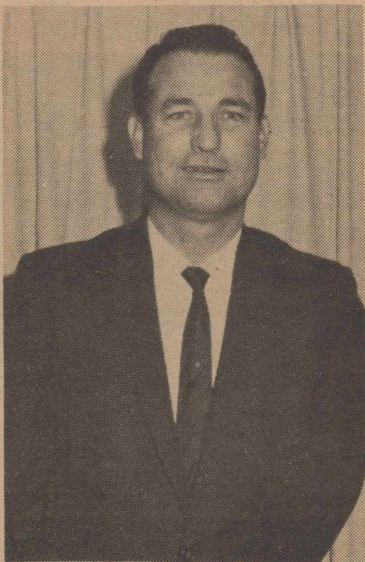

Some Where-Viet Nam

The following article is a portion of letters received from somewhere -South Vietnam. These are being printed in hopes that we'll not forget our service men there and the nasty war that they are engaged in. The letters are to a man's family that live here in Seminole.

January 31, 1968

Dear Ones,

As you have probably heard, the V.C. tried to take over the base last night. I got to bed about midnight last night, at 2:00 a.m. the Air Police came by and told us to get under our beds as they expected a mortar attack. About 9:20 an Air Police came back by and told us to let no one leave the club as there was a sniper in our area. About 20 minutes later they had gotten him, on the roof.

The boys would have enjoyed being here. All sorts of war games with live sound was going on here. I for one pray they never have to be in this type of mess. The helicopters have been up all night. We are told we will have this for another 3 or 4 days. I sure hope they are wrong.

We were watching a f-105 scuffling something. He made about five passes over the same spot and must have gotten something as there was a big cloud of smoke after the last pass. We just got word over our radio that 17,000 V.C. had been killed in our area in the last 24 hours. Since the V.C. are hitting every base in Vietnam and have been for the better part of two days, they finally got around to calling off the Truce.

It sure gets lonesome around here. Once in a while an Air Policeman will come by, I know he feels more alone in the world than I, right now. I must be getting old as I do not recall ever having this feeling when I was in Korea. One of the men here in the club, Don, has never been in a war zone before. I am carrying the only gun we have in the club and he doesn't know how to shoot it.

2-1-68

Here I go again just so you will know I am all right and wishing I was with you rather than in this little place. Last night made my third night with little or no sleep. You know I do believe there is a war going on, over here. It is probably a very good thing we have a bit of heavy equipment as there was one weapon for one of every fifty-six men on the base, when this 'New Year' celebration started.

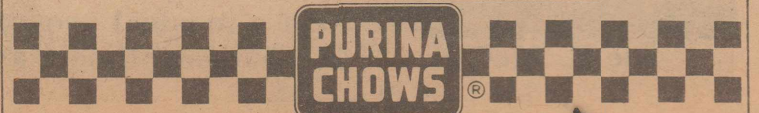

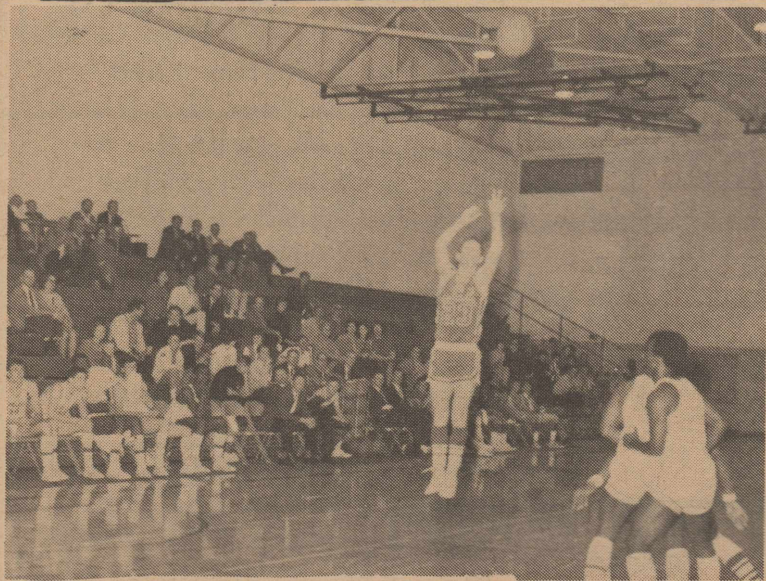

BREAK DOWN ON DEMOCRATIC FILING COSTS

Following is a break down of the amount of money it cost the candidates to file for offices under the Democratic Primary. It is based on 7% of the annual salary for a four-year term. The Justice of Peace, this time, is based on $\frac{1}{2}$ of 7% due to the short term. The 19th Congressional District, representing twenty-five counties, is \$125, State Representative \$10, District Attorney \$175 (representing four counties), County Attorney \$567 (\$189 each for three running), State Board of Education \$2.00, Sheriff's office \$567 (\$283.50 each for two running), Tax Assessor Collector \$567, Commissioners #1 \$567, Commissioners #3 \$567, Justice of Peace #1 \$150 (short term).

This money is used to pay for holding elections and paying Judges and Clerks in that election. The county doesn't pay for the elections in the primary, it is paid for by the party that receives their money from the candidates running. There is no charge on party officers because there is no salary paid to them. Also this newspaper doesn't charge them for announcing, nor to men running for the School Board because they receive no salary.

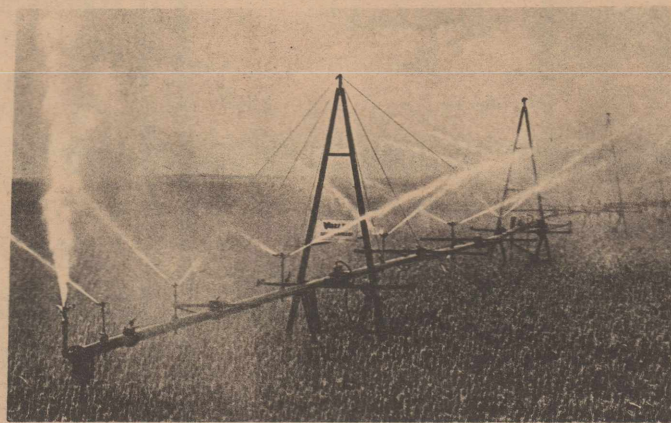

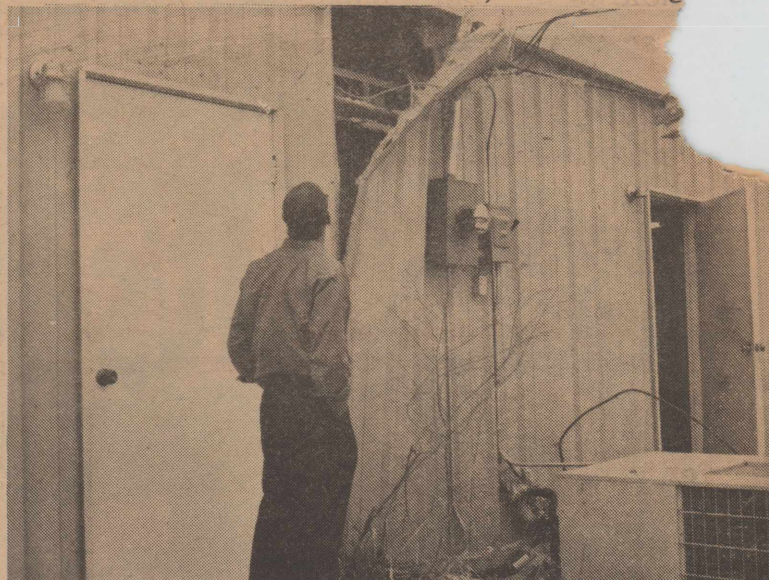
LOOP NEWS

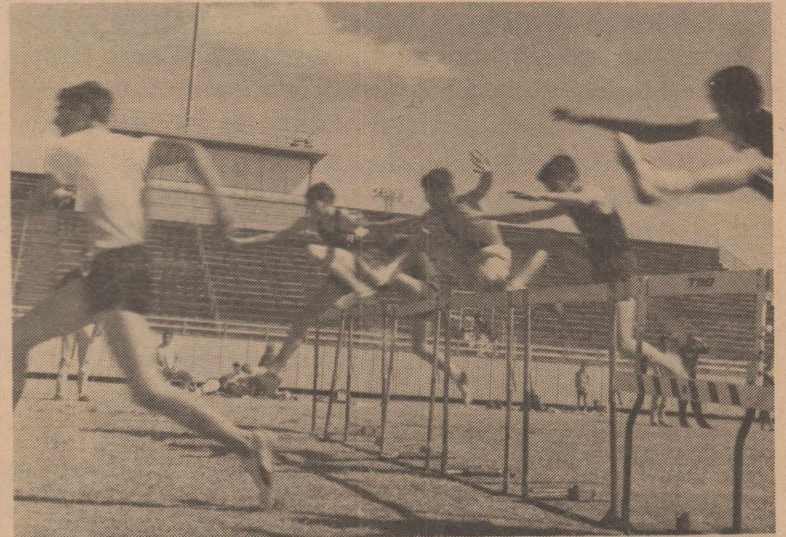
TRACK MEET

In 1955 or 56 Judge Lawrence made application to study and take exams. The qualifications included (where one did not have a law degree): 1. A degree with courses in government and history. 2. Begin study as an apprentice lawyer for not less than 3 years. 3. Apply to study or take this crash course. 4. Application to take bar exams. 5. Approval by all local lawyers or local bar. 6. Approval by District Judge. 7. All records of all major activities since 16 years of age. 8. All then has to be approved by State bar examiners and applicant must take the bar examinations which lasted 3 days, March 4, 5, and 6 and were taken by 300.

"If I am never admitted to the bar, what I learned will be worth my time, effort and money spent to my office here in the county."

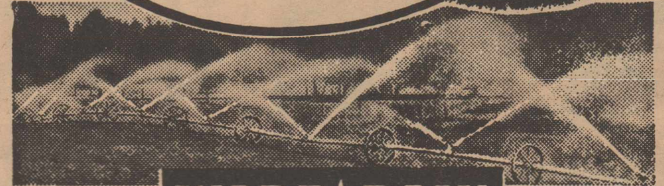
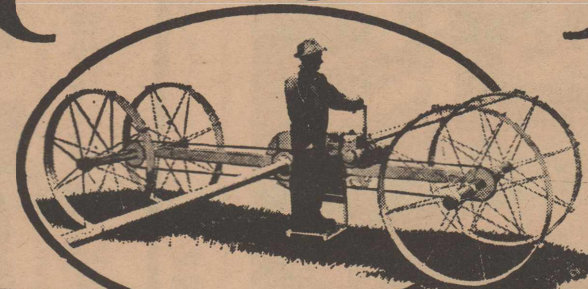

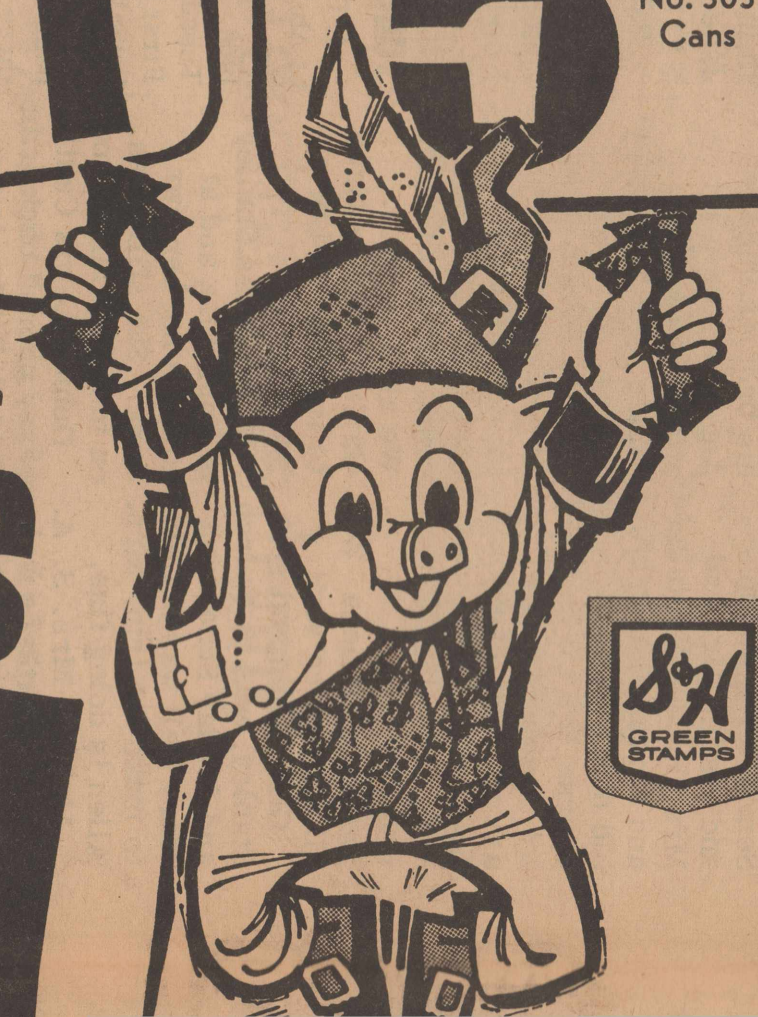

"IN TOURING TEXAS" PROGRAM FOR SEMINOLE JUNIOR STUDY CLUB

The Seminole Junior Study Club met Thursday, March 7th at 4:00 p. m. in the home of Mrs. Kenneth Willis, 204 S. W. 16th. Co-hostess was Mrs. Charles Mickelson.

The program for the day was entitled "... In Touring Texas." Mrs. Shafter Bailey, program chairman, introduced the speakers, Mrs. Herbert Hicks, who spoke on "Texas Parks", Mrs. Hilbern Briscoe, who discussed "Historical Texas," and Mrs. Mike Jenkins, who gave some highlights of the top twelve "Texas Cities."

Mrs. Hicks said there are fifty-nine state parks in Texas encompassing some 61,000 acres. They can be divided into three classes, historical, such as San Jacinto State Park, scenic, as Palo Duro Canyon, and recreational, such as Possum Kingdom.

Speaking on "Historical Texas", Mrs. Briscoe said there are 2,200 historical markers in our state. Four types of markers are used. Rectangular aluminum markers direct interest to sites of historical importance. Historical buildings are marked with a round medallion. Information about the building is inscribed on a metal rectangle beneath the medallion. An inscription in an upright granite marker denotes an event prior to the end of the Civil War. County information markers have a brass circle enclosing a star on the front of a granite marker. A brass rectangle on top of the marker gives a brief history of the county.

Of Texas cities Mrs. Jenkins said, "For a state that likes to brag about its wide open spaces, Texas has a greater number of major metropolitan areas than any other state." She went on to say that of the "elbow-room loving Texans themselves" 75% of them are urban residents. An even dozen Texas cities number a population of 100,000 or more each. Activities and business in our Texas cities range from outer space projects at NASA headquarters in Houston to cows in Fort Worth and banking in Dallas.

Door prizes given by the hostesses were won by Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Dean Smith.

Guests, besides Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Phillips were Mrs. Roy Garrett and Mrs. James Phillips of Seminole and Mrs. R. S. Higgins of Midland.

Daffodils gave a gay spring atmosphere to the serving table laid with a linen cut-work cloth with china and silver appointments. During intermission a covered dish dinner was enjoyed by 12 members and 5 guests.

Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Phillips taught china painting lessons from Tuesday through Thursday in the home of Mrs. A. Ray Russell, where they were house guests. Mrs. Phillips' specialty is shells and marine life, and this was a new field for many local artists. In classes many beautiful pieces of china were painted by Mrs. Jones and these may be seen at the next Llano Estacado exhibit in Seminole.

State P. A. C. convention is in Tyler April 4-7. Seminole has 3 elected delegates besides the president, Mrs. Gay. These are Mrs. Russell, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Jimmy Markham. A display of china painted by each club member will be taken to state convention for exhibit. A history book for the year will be in competition.

Next regular meeting of the Seminole Club will be April 20, when a workshop is planned, as well as reports on the convention.

Mrs. Jones both paints in, and wipes out to achieve desired results. The ambition of every china painter is to "cut out" or wipe out high lights on a rose to give it a beautiful soft natural look. Each flower and each fruit has a different technique used for building it. While the initial painting of a lilac before wipe out must be done in short heavy strokes, the wild rose will be done with as few, and as smooth strokes as can be made.

Circular fruits must be painted with circular strokes and shiny fruits must have sharp highlights and reflected light. Each composition whether flower, fruit, scene or animal, etc. must have a sunshine area in the open part of the china, with the strong light coming from one side, usually upper left and repeated in a small third place for interest.

Mrs. Jones is especially famous for her mums and blackberries. Several plates with these motifs were painted in her Seminole classes and of course were painted in the Wednesday Seminar. In a "football" mum the flower must be painted in the proper perspective with correct lights and petal formation. Each tiny seed of the blackberry must have light to give it that luscious, ready to pluck look. Equally well Mrs. Jones paints many subjects and has many guides and patterns published for painting these. Learning to do them, though takes some talent and an awful lot of hard work and practice, even though you know you'll never be able to paint like a professional.

This hobby is wonderful therapy for anyone as well as a productive hobby, and can be enjoyed by everyone.

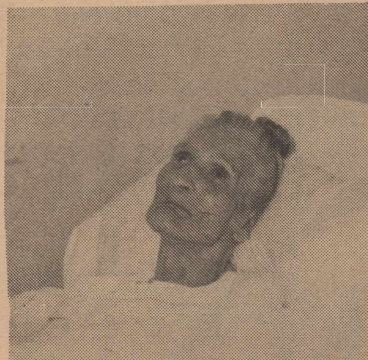

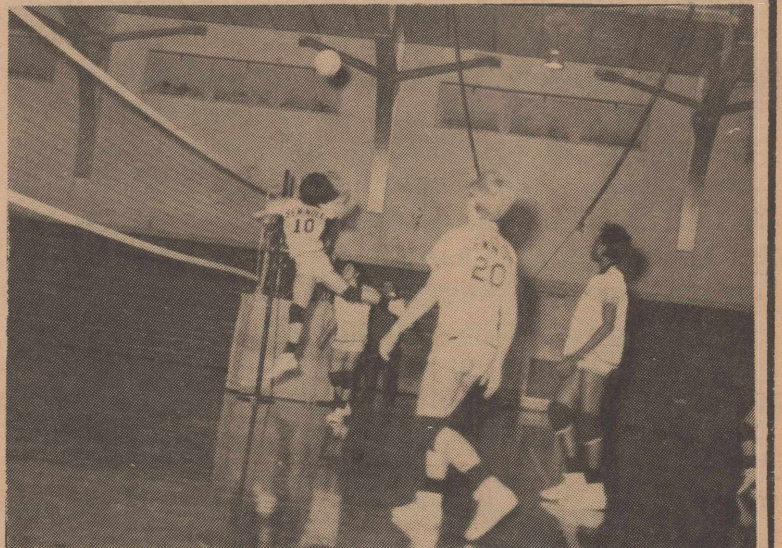
SEMINOLE MAIDENS

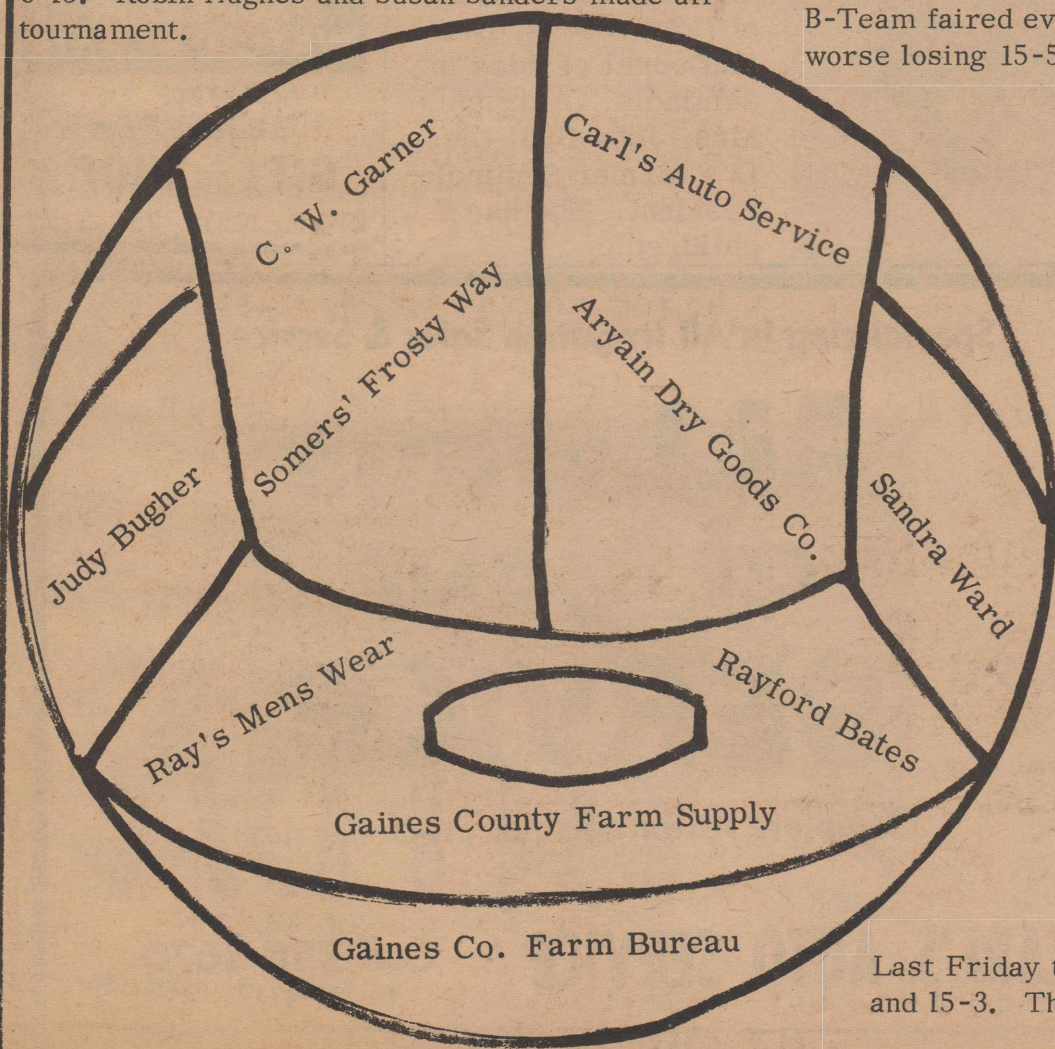
