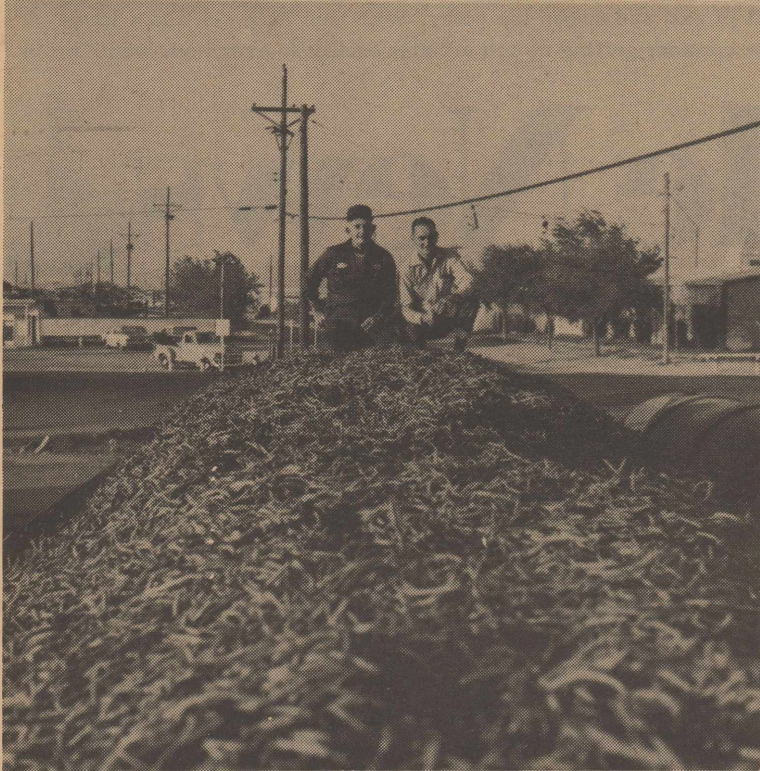

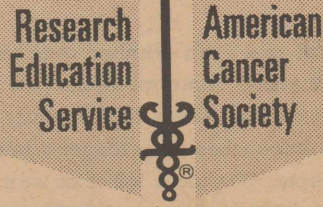

spell it but I can sure SMELL it!" Now, it's tough to do an article on something that you can't even spell and you can't get close enough to the spelling to find it in the dictionary. A visitor passing through Seminole, Mrs. J. E. Vandergriff, heard the discussion and wrote it down on a paper - EASOPHEDIA. Her husband said "That's not right, you spell it ASPAIPHITA." "How ridiculous" said their friends across the table, Mr. and Mrs. M. B. O'Bryant, 312 N. Mesa, Carlsbad, New Mexico, "let us spell it." His spelling - ASAPHIDITY. (I especially like the DITY everyone puts on it.) Her spelling - ASAFETIDA.

John Golmon, who was raised in Southern Mississippi and was at one time the principal of the school at Mentone, Texas, spelled it OASAFADITY. Now, if some of you other teachers think that's kinda funny, here's some of your spellings and you begged me not to use your names so I won't - asphidity, axefidit, asphytetic, asfidity, aesphidy, aspity, asafetida, asfittity, assiffity, asfidity, assiffity,

asphoedity, asafeteda, acidifidity, asiphadite, asyphedty. The correct spelling from Webster's dictionary is ASAFETIDA or ASAFCE-TIDA. The makers of asafetida spell it ASAFOTETIDA.

Believe it or not the spelling of it has been almost better than the story. With each spelling

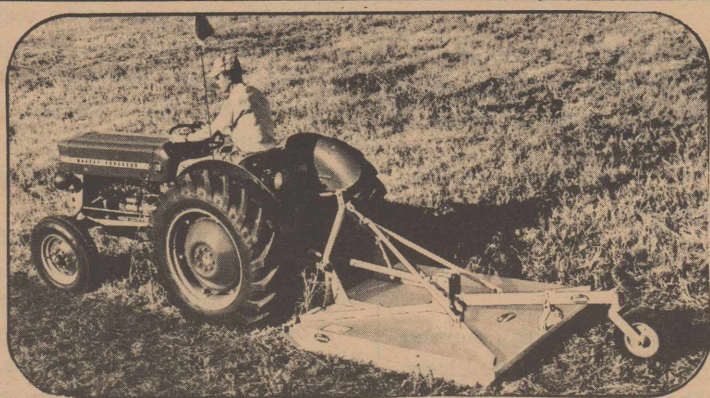
Castor oil smelled good compared to the smell of asafetida. Black Draught was a delight to smell of compared to asafetida.

Asafetida kept away all evil spirits. Coach Bill Hicks said "I don't know what it is but I want to wear some at my next ballgame."

I've had long distance calls, letters and conversations concerning castor oil. Please don't call me or come to see me about asafetida, simply get you a little sack, put some in it, wear it around your neck and I'll leave you alone.

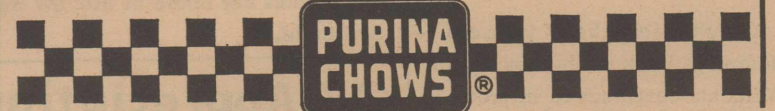

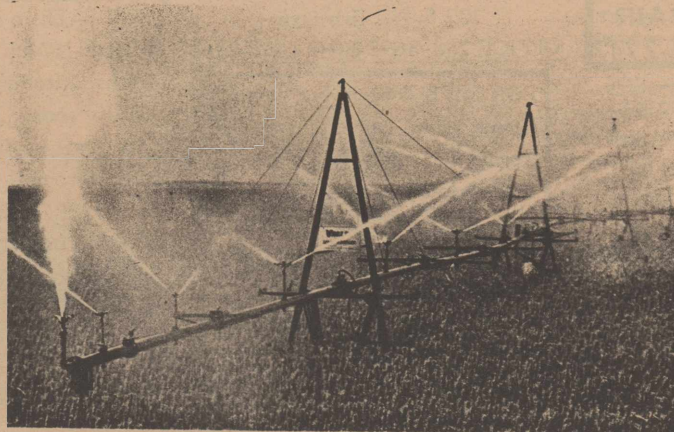

Score Big FRESHMEN

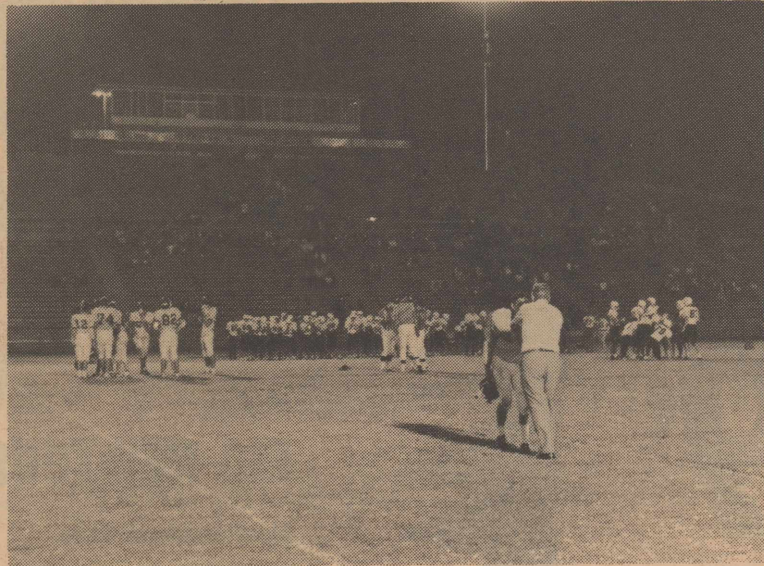
SEMINOLE 0 ANDREWS 3

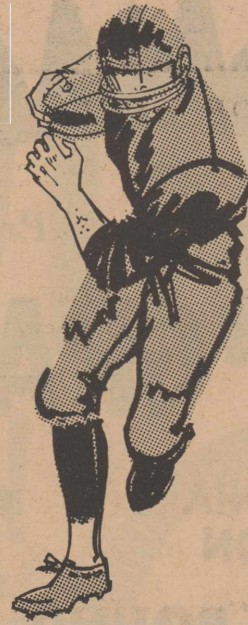

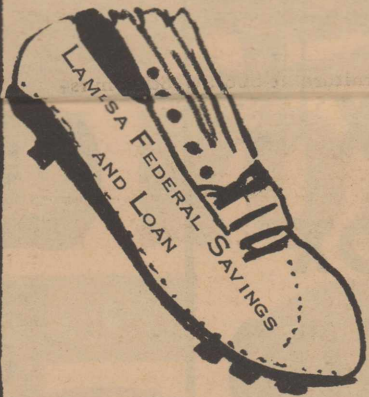
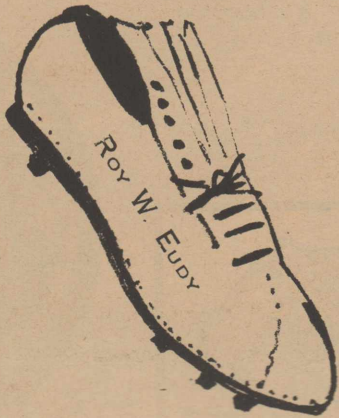


Coach Hicks talks over strategy in the latter part of the Freshman game last Thursday with Andrews.

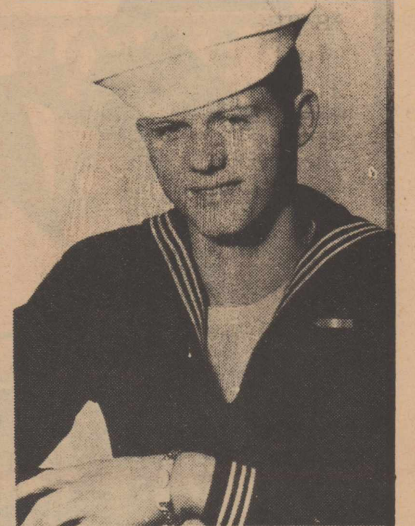

BARLEY INCLUDED IN 1970 FEED PROGRAM

BARLEY WILL BE INCLUDED IN THE 1970 FEED GRAIN PROGRAM IT WAS ANNOUNCED TODAY BY THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE. DECISION TO INCLUDE BARLEY IN THE PROGRAM FOLLOWS THE SEPTEMBER 10 CROP REPORT WHICH INDICATES A RECORD NEW NATIONAL AVERAGE YIELD OF 44.4 BUSHELS PER ACRE.

UNTIL 1960, ANNUAL BARLEY YIELDS SINCE 1866 HAD AVERAGED LESS THAN 30 BUSHELS PER ACRE. IN 1960 THE CROP AVERAGE WAS 30.9; IN 1965, IT WAS 35.1; IN 1967, 40.6; AND THIS YEAR 44.4. ALTHOUGH HARVESTED ACREAGE HAS BEEN DECLINING, THE LARGER YIELDS HAVE RESULTED IN PRODUCTION INCREASES.

CURRENTLY, THE 1969 CROP OF BARLEY IS INDICATED TO BE 416 MILLION BUSHELS. CARRYOVER AS OF JULY 1 THIS YEAR WAS 198 MILLION BUSHELS - UP ABOUT 60 MILLION BUSHELS OVER A OVER A YEAR EARLIER. THE TOTAL SUPPLY WOULD BE 624 MILLION BUSHELS FOR 1969-1970. TOTAL UTILIZATION IN 1968 WAS 368 MILLION BUSHELS. IT APPEARS A FURTHER INCREASE IN CARRYOVER IS PROBABLY AS OF JULY 1, 1970.

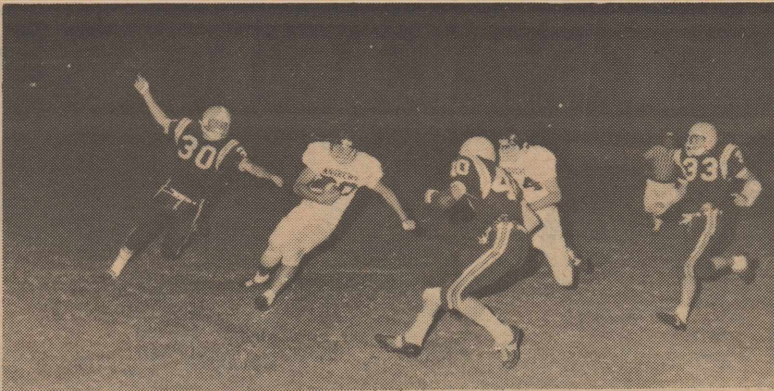
