

TELEPHONE COMPANY GRANTED RAISE

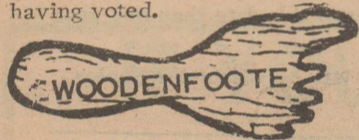
The City Council met Monday night. In attendance was Edd Edwards from Packmore. He explained to the council the great advantage and cost of a different type garbage disposal boxes. These would be placed throughout the town with one for every four houses, pointing out the great improvement to the department and fewer man hours. A lo-boy truck with a lift on it would carry a large number of these to the dump ground at one time, making fewer trips than the trash haul trucks are making at the present. Three yard or four yard dump boxes would be available. He pointed out that the equipment would cost \$12,955.00 F.O.B. Seminole.

- The council granted a raise to the telephone company on the basis of 5.16% of their investment. (Previous 3.68% or a 1.48% increase.) This means a business phone will be raised from \$10 to \$13 per month, an extension from \$1.50 to \$1.75, residential one party \$5.50 to \$6.25, two party line \$4.25 to \$4.65. The new rate will be effective on the May 15 billing.
 - The council accepted a bid of \$3396.32 from L M H Truck and Tractor for an International Carryall for the fire department.
 - New residents deposits for water were raised from \$10 to \$15.
- All members of the council were in attendance.

House Lost To Fire

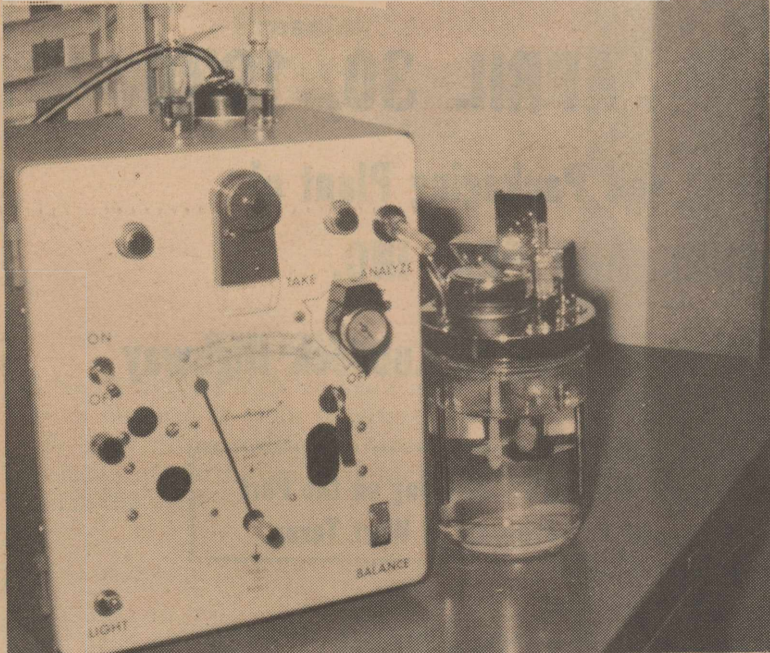

The breath is bubbled through one of the small vials shown on top of the machine to determine alcohol content. Section 22 (a) Chapter 173 of the 47th legislature, Article 6687B points out when people drive consent is given for such tests. If a driver refuses to take a test the law further says that the director of Texas Department of Public Safety may suspend license for one year.

Art and the other part of the crew loaded out some of these tanks in the west part of the county, carrying them in an upright position on their trucks.

They stopped at a high voltage electric line. Art was driving one of the trucks. Someone sighted for him and motioned him under, telling him he had plenty of room. Sure enough, he did, but as he started under, one of his tires ran over a rock and lifted the tank up into the wires.

Mr. Moser was nearby and he rushed up to the truck and told Art, in his high pitched voice, "Art, you're in the wires. If you you'll sit in that truck, you'll live. If you try to jump, you're gonna die."

Art told the story. "Mr. Moser went ahead and talked to me and told me 'I'm sending a man in my Chrysler to get the power company to shut off the power. You just sit there and talk to me and we'll get out of this all right, but you can't jump far enough to keep from grounding yourself out and killing you.'

"Well, Walter, I started talking and smoking. I ran out of cigarettes in fifteen minutes and they pitched me some more. I never did like Lucky Strikes but I want you to know, I got with them. I thought about my wife and my kids. I thought about the mean things I'd said to her and I promised her and my kids if I got out I'd do better. I thought about the few things I'd taken that weren't mine and wished I could return them. I tried to think about Heaven, but mostly I just smoked and listened to Mr. Moser talk.

"Thirty minutes passed. Thirty-five minutes passed and forty minutes passed. Mr. Moser hadn't told me that the rubber off the tires was melting and sliding down to the ground. Mr. Moser hadn't told me that when all that rubber was gone and there was a blow out that I was a dead Art Mangus.

"Fifty minutes rolled by and I was still smoking and wishing it was over - one way or another. I'll tell you, Walter, I was scared but Mr. Moser kept talking. He talked about all the jobs we had to do, how far behind we were, what all the trucks needed done to them and how good a hand I was.

"We heard his Chrysler coming. Boy, what a relief! The driver said 'Mr. Moser, it's cut off.' Mr. Moser told me, 'Art, it's cut off now.' I didn't feel very good. I stepped off the running board and that's the last thing I remember.

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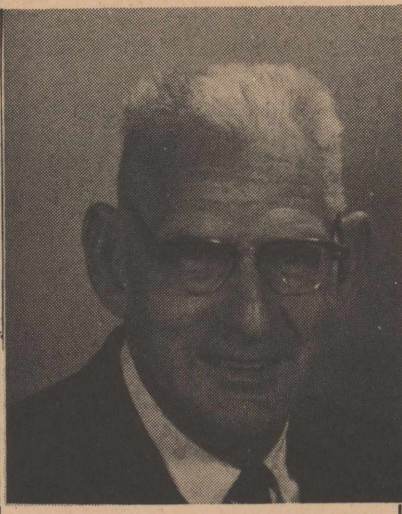

SCHOOL BOARD IN LONG SESSION

The School Board of Education met Monday night and, in an extended board meeting, discussed and authorized the summer baseball program.

2. The proposed budget for the calendar year 1970-71 figured in excess of two million dollars, \$2,037,559.00. This compared to last year's budget of \$1,789,004.00. The big raise in the proposed budget would be the difference paid teachers of \$194,582.00. The proposed budget will be further studied at the next board meeting.
3. Elected for another term as officers were Rayford Bates, president; Leon Foote, vice president; and Horace Jones, secretary.
4. A summer school program for grades 3-8 was given an okay and to be run as in past years.
5. Four librarians were in attendance - Wanda Watson, Dorothy Decker, Elizabeth Grubb and Janelle Sullivan - to ask for additional time in their respective libraries after students and teachers were gone and before students and teachers return.
6. Miss Judy Bugher and Miss Sandra Ward were denied their request for permission to attend the state volleyball tournament in Austin, May 1 and 2, referring to Policy #905. (No students participating.) J.C. Collins and Ricky Mantooth, likewise, for the state track meet, same policy. The board granted permission for them to be off if they paid their own expenses.
7. Ross Moore was appointed as insurance service agent for the school.
8. A Burroughs F9503 Accounting Machine was purchased at a cost of \$7500.00. It was pointed out that the present machine was 12 years old and used.
9. Jackie Earl and his group of volleyball players were granted permission to use the Junior High gym one night each week.
10. A request for a raise for J.C. Collins and Ricky Mantooth was rejected for their duties with the swimming pool this summer. Their present salaries - \$18.00 and \$16.50 per day.
11. Mr. R. E. Caffey, high school custodian, reaches retirement age this year. The school board voted to abide by policy and retire him.
12. Mrs. David Perkins was employed to fill the position of school nurse for the 1970-71 school year. Mrs. Annie Boyd is retiring.
13. The school has three more students as of this date than one year ago.

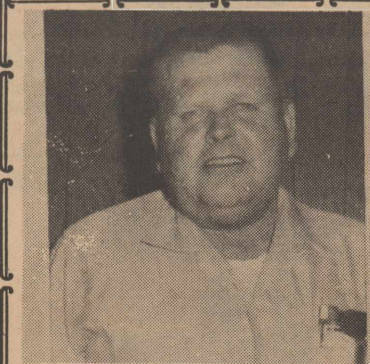
ADULT DRIVER TRAINING SCHOOL TO BE HELD IN LAMESA

NEW LAWS WHICH PERTAIN TO GAINES COUNTY

ON JULY 11, 1969, GAINES COUNTY WAS ADDED TO THE LIST OF COUNTIES REGULATED BY THE TEXAS HERBICIDE LAW AND REGULATIONS. THIS ACTION WAS TAKEN BY THE COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE AT THE DIRECTION OF THE GAINES COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT, AFTER THE COMMISSIONERS COURT HAD HELD A HEARING AS PRESCRIBED BY LAW. THIS LAW REQUIRES THAT ALL PERSONS WHO APPLY HORMONE TYPE HERBICIDES (2,4-D; 2,4,5-T OR THEIR DERIVATIVES) TO MORE THAN TEN ACRES IN ANY ONE YEAR OBTAIN A PERMIT FROM THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE BEFORE APPLYING THIS HERVICIDE. THE FORMS FOR MAKING APPLICATION FOR THE SPRAYING PERMIT ARE FURNISHED BY THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND CAN BE OBTAINED FROM ANY LICENSED HERBICIDE DEALER OR BY CONTACTING THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AT 1924 34TH STREET, LUBBOCK, TEXAS. THE FEE FOR THE SPRAYING PERMITS IS TEN CENTS PER ACRE.

THE HERBICIDE LAW AND REGULATIONS ALSO REQUIRE THAT ALL APPLIERS FOR HIRE BE BONDED AND INSURED AND OBTAIN A LICENSE FROM THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE BEFORE MAKING ANY COMMERCIAL APPLICATION OF HERBICIDE. THEY MUST ALSO OBTAIN A SPRAYING PERMIT FROM THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE BEFORE APPLYING HERBICIDE. THESE REGULATIONS STATE THAT NO PERSONS SHALL SPRAY HERBICIDES WHEN THE WIND VELOCITY EXCEEDS TEN MILES PER HOUR. THE MAXIMUM OPERATING PRESSURE FOR APPLYING HERBICIDES IS 40 POUNDS PER SQUARE INCH FOR GROUND EQUIPMENT AND 30 POUNDS PER SQUARE INCH FOR AIR-CRAFT EQUIPMENT.

PERSONS WHO APPLY HERBICIDES TO LESS THAN TEN ACRES IN ANY ONE YEAR DO NOT HAVE TO OBTAIN SPRAYING PERMITS BUT ARE REQUIRED TO FILL OUT A NOTICE OF INTENT TO SPRAY AND SEND IT TO THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE. PERSONS WHO APPLY HERBICIDES TO LAWNS ARE EXEMPT FROM OBTAINING A PERMIT OR GIVING NOTICE OF INTENT TO SPRAY.

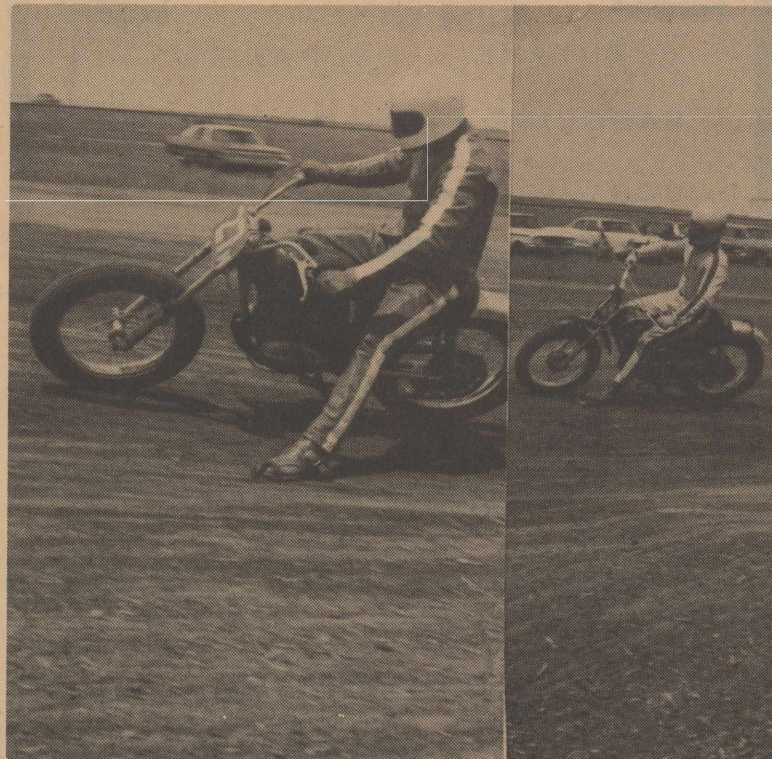

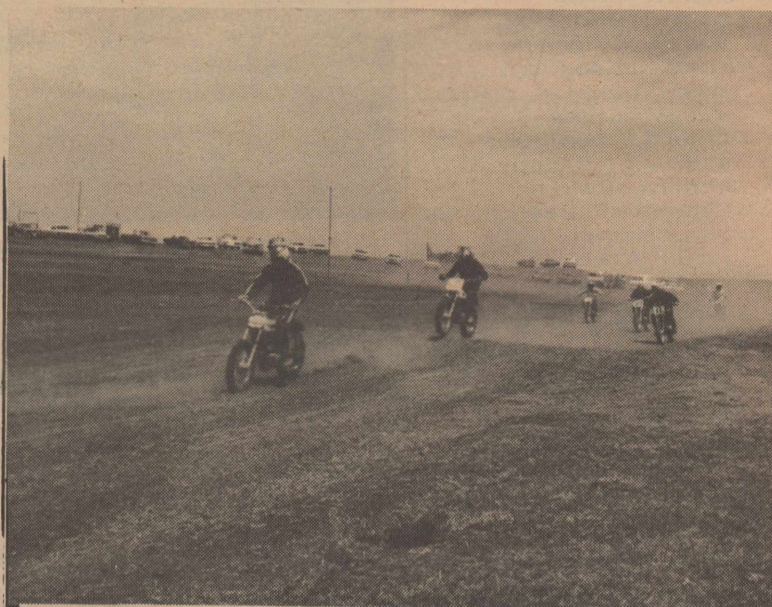
