THIS IS GAINES COUNTY. Yes, the fields are round. Each circle represents approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ section of 160 acres and is $\frac{1}{2}$ mile across it. The sprinkler system is usually 1320 feet long and can be set to make a circle each three days to two weeks, depending upon how much water is needed on that crop being watered. In the above picture are beans, cotton, alfalfa, milo and castor beans. The 25 to 40 acres that are not covered with irrigation (the light spots shown in the picture) are planted in cover crops of small grain or farmed dry land. 106th District Court Hearing

The 106th District Court last Wednesday, Thursday and Friday probably drew the most lawyers of any case in the court's history. Judge Truett Smith was hearing the case concerning the Amerada division of Amerada Hess Corporation, Atlantic Richfield Company and Mobil Oil Company. Defendants in the case were the Commissioners Court made up of the judge, four commissioners and the tax assessor.

The oil companies were trying to prove that the recent re-evaluation of surface properties were set up on the county's tax roll at $\frac{1}{2}$ of their actual cash market value while they alleged the oil companies' properties were set up at 100%. They requested a restraining order against the county judge, the commissioners court and the tax assessor. There were lawyers representing each of the companies, area lawyers and interested lawyers from other oil companies present. Lawyers representing the court, the county judge and the county tax assessor were William O. Sheaffer, an Odessa attorney; Vernon Townes, Denver City; and Joe McGill, county attorney of Gaines County.

It seemed to the representative of the Seminole News quite evident that the appraisal firm of Southwestern Appraisal Company had missed appraisals in several instances. It was also brought out in evidence that there were over 12,000 pieces of property appraised, that the appraisal was made at a cost of \$75,000, which was only about \$6.00 each. In mass appraisals it was pointed out that some inequities would exist. On the other hand it was pointed out in the evidence given that in one particular instance a major oil company had rendered an asset, not at 16% for tax purposes, not at 8% for tax purposes but less than 5%.

Two local men, Seth Woltz and Finley Moore, testified to the value of farm property, in one instance as much as \$200 a part per acre and scaled down to \$100 per acre apart. Woltz testified it was his opinion that the property was worth much more than it was worth in the opinion of Finley Moore. An independent oil engineer, a Mr. Netherland, testified that the Seminole oil field had a value of near \$116,000,000.00 where the Thomas Y. Pickett Evaluation Company had reported it for the tax roll at \$88,000,000.00. This represents $\frac{7}{8}$ ownership.

It seems as presented in the court evidence that there were certainly mistakes made in the re-evaluation of the top side real estate and also in oil properties. When the briefs of other similar cases are all in to Judge Smith he will make a ruling.

CITY COUNCIL - FAMILIES MOVING BACK

The public hearing on the budget was held Monday night in the meeting room at the City Hall. Not one single objection was voiced. The proposed budget was accepted, the final figure being \$360,250.00.

2. The audit was accepted as prepared by Mr. Wilton, CPA from Lamesa.

3. Mr. Ed Edwards of Pak-Mor, Inc. was present to further explain to the council the cost of a new system on commercial trash hauling (downtown). The new system will include a Handi-Lift at a cost of \$3480.00, a new truck body at a cost of \$4000.00 and 56 four yard trash boxes at a cost of \$18249.50. These boxes will replace the Dempster boxes. In all probability this system will be extended to residential use sometime in the future. This would get away from blowing papers, dogs, rats, mice and no doubt be a much better system. The new system will be 60 to 90 days in delivery. These were acquired on a lease purchase agreement.

4. Bill Barrett was sworn in yesterday as the new fire marshal. The state requires a sworn in fire marshal at a salary of at least \$40.00 per month. Barrett averaged this amount from the volunteer department.

5. Amerada Hess Oil Company requested permission from the council to use 20 feet of the street in Block 27, adjacent to their office building. Permission was granted, also to close the alley behind the building. A new shop building is to be built on the location and 20 feet of the street area fenced off for parking. (Editor's note: Several Amerada families have already moved back to Seminole; others probably forthcoming.)

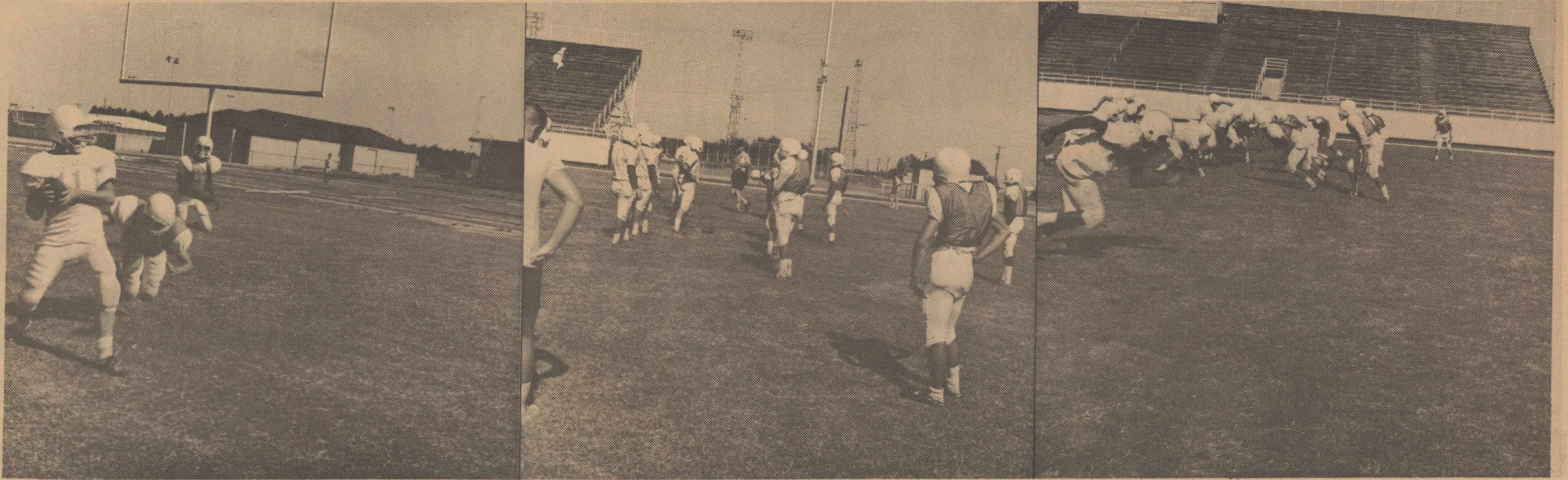

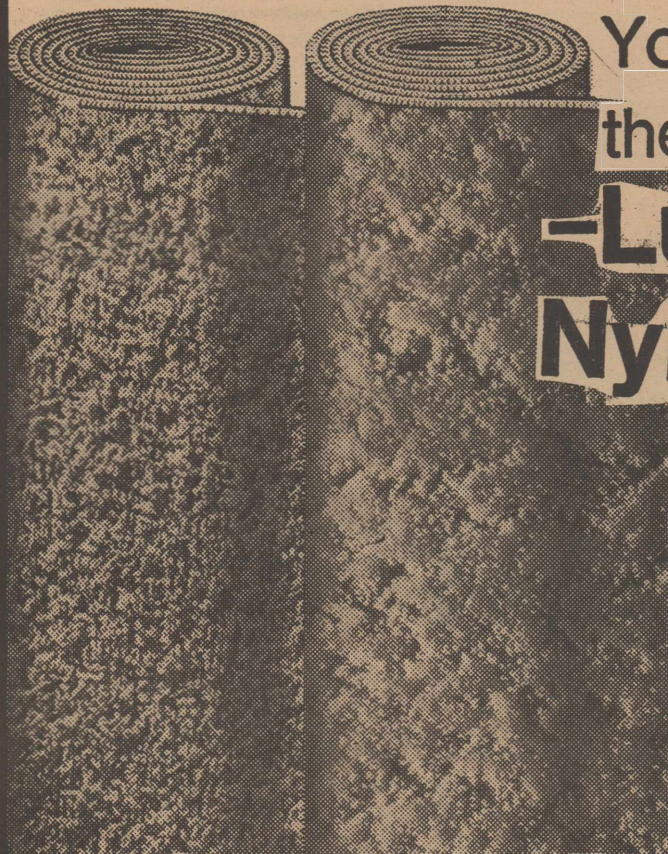

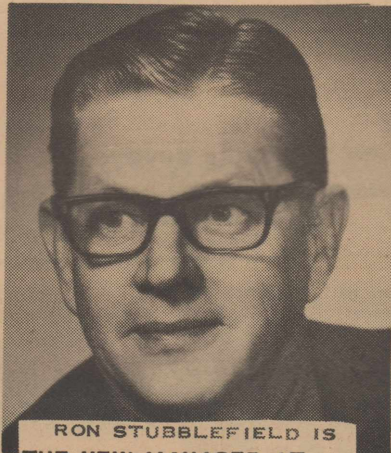
He also was elected to a three-year term on the Society's council just before the banquet concluding the three day meeting. Abbott has been active in the society for the past 10 years.

LOST - ONE FIRE TRUCK

The following log was taken from the dispatcher on the local fire department and their conversation between different fire units. Never in West Texas (we're sure) has the fire department been called to three different fires and each of them rained out before the firemen could arrive. This happened last week.

- 11:34 p.m. Andrews reported a grass fire East of Seminole. FD units were advised to go to FM road 7 miles east of Seminole, turn South, go to Bill Cox Gin, and the fire could be seen from there. All FD units 10-8 at 11:36 p.m.
- 11:57 p.m. FD 10 advised he can't get to the fire through the pasture he's in. All units advised to turn around.
- 12:09 a.m. FD 12 told FD 10 and FD 11 that the road he's on goes to a prairie dog town and not to the fire. Turn around again.
- 12:10 a.m. Andrews advised a subject would meet FD units at the radar station and lead the way to the fire. FD 10-11-12 advised that they were lost in the field and could not find their way back out.
- 12:14 a.m. FD units were completely lost in the wrong pasture. Andy advised that subject could see FD units and that they were going in circles.
- 12:17 a.m. FD 11 told 12 to back up and turn around. FD 12 told 11 that he didn't have room to turn truck around. Both units had to back straight out of pasture.
- 12:20 a.m. FD 10 told both units to go to the windmill and take a hard left turn. FD 11 requested 12 to be sure that the gate was closed and then asked what a windmill was.
- 12:25 a.m. Both 11 and 12 did as advised by 10. Lead truck missed the turn as evidenced by loud screeching sound (as if made by brakes) heard on fire radio. Dispatcher was later advised Billy Houston was just singing and had mike on.
- 12:30 a.m. Fifty-six minutes after the report of the fire, FD 10, 11 and 12 were finally 10-23. They advised the fire had nearly burned itself out, so they'll just stand and watch it for a few minutes. - 12:56 a.m. One unit advised he has finally found the pavement, but he is not for sure that he turned vehicle towards Seminole. FD units request I be prepared to send city units out to look for them.
- 12:59 a.m. FD 10 requested me to attempt to contact FD 11. I was unable to do so. Apparently FD 11 got tired of listening to FD 10 and 12 gossip, and decided to go buy a beer.
- 1:13 a.m. FD 12 asked FD 10 to turn them *%X#@?red and blue lights off. He advised that all he could see was red and blue and red and blue and red and blue (spoken like a true Aggie with no appreciation for good colors).
- 1:25 a.m. FD 10 and FD 12 were 10-7 (finally) at the station. Still no word from FD 11. Units and surrounding towns were alerted to be on lookout for a stray, lost fire truck.
- 1:30 a.m. FD 11 found the station at last. Firemen reported a lot of BS missing since last seen at the fire. Also the smell of hot dogs was in evidence inside the cab. Houston advised he took wrong turn trying to get out of his own pasture (Earl must have been directing the driver).

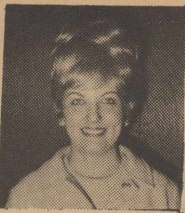

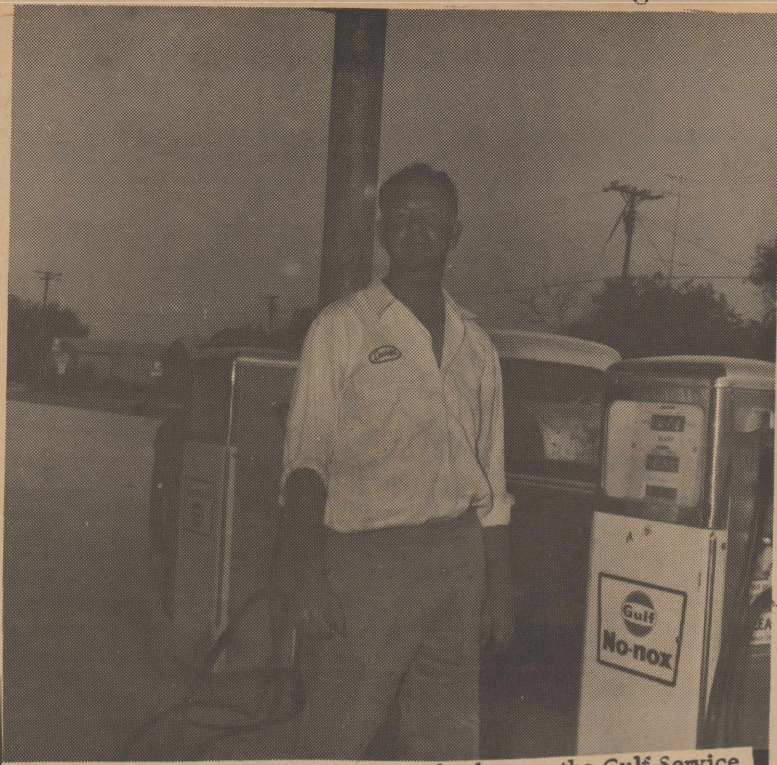

THE SECOND DAY MEMBERSHIP LAGGED EVEN FARTHER BEHIND LAST YEAR'S AS TUESDAY'S FIGURES SHOWED NINETEEN HUNDRED AND SEVENTY FOUR STUDENTS THIS YEAR AS COMPARED TO LAST YEAR'S SECOND DAY ENROLLMENT OF TWO THOUSAND AND SEVEN. SUPT. JAMES BRAMLETT SAID THAT THE EARLY STARTING DATE THIS YEAR MAY HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO A SMALLER OPENING ENROLLMENT AND THAT HE EXPECTS THE FIGURES TO CLIMB AS SCHOOL PROGRESSES.

THE LARGEST GRADE IN SCHOOL TUESDAY WAS THE THIRD GRADE WITH A COMBINED MEMBERSHIP AT THE PRIMARY AND F.J. YOUNG ELEMENTARY OF 196. SMALLEST CLASS, AS USUAL, IS THE SENIOR WHICH SHOWS 116 ON THE ROLL.

THIRTEEN WERE ENROLLED IN THE TWO SPECIAL EDUCATION CLASSES. KINDERGARTEN, NEW THIS YEAR, HAD 7 PRESENT.

LARGEST GAIN WAS IN THE HIGH SCHOOL WHICH HAD AN OPENING DAY JUMP OF 23 OVER LAST YEAR WITH 594 ENROLLED AS COMPARED TO 571. LARGEST LOSS WAS IN THE JUNIOR HIGH WHERE 317 WERE HERE THIS YEAR AGAINST LAST YEAR'S 353.
