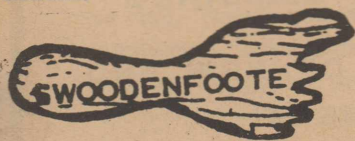

## DRESS AMENDED



SEMINOLE HAS A NEW DRESS POLICY FOR GIRLS IN SEMINOLE HIGH SCHOOL. As one man high school teacher said, "I love it!" The five girls with slacks on are Susie Smith, Loretta Bevers, Cheryl Buck, Virginia Newman and Cathy Tynes. Jan Worthington can be seen behind the girls with slacks.

Regulations for school dress were amended by the school board last Thursday night. Under number 2 of the dress policy for girls add the following: Pant dresses or culottes that give the appearance of a skirt are acceptable. Add number 5. Slacks and coordinated slack suits may be worn to classes. (Blue jeans and tight fitting pants are not considered as slacks. Sweat shirts are not considered as appropriate.) Under number 1 for boys add that socks must be worn.

In other board action the resignation of Guy Peters as school custodian was accepted. He was replaced by Richard (Dick) Lauderdale.

The board further amended the school budget for the 1969-70 school year. Total funds available for the year were \$1,821,578.00. Total expenditures for the year \$1,798,536.00. Estimated balance of all funds as of August 31, 1970 \$23,042.00. Estimated cost per pupil for 1969-70 on 1,928 average daily attendance \$776.00.

The superintendent's report pointed out the following enrollment: 1987 on August 27, 1970, compared to 2012 on September 4, 1969.

A summer reading report was given by Wilma Stanley.

The School Board meeting was Thursday night after the buffet dinner with the teachers.

The Seminole Volunteer Fire Department was called out Monday at 12:55 p.m. 11 miles west and 1 mile south on the Sinclair lease, Section #394 to a heater treater blaze. At 1:18 p.m. the blaze was extinguished. The fire was on the Elvov N. Thomason farm.

They're after honey -- Jack Rhea on the left and Woodie Bice on the right. It takes two pieces of equipment to rob beehives. Sometimes more if the bees have brown eyes instead of blue. The little dark bee is the mean one (German) and he has brown eyes. If the bees are likely to sting bad, gauntlet gloves with rubber bands around them are used. A heavier coat, another pair of pants and boots with the pants leg pulled down around the outside with rubber bands around them.

Woodie Bice is a wise one when it comes to robbing the bees. He said "These are the tame ones and went about his business with the assurance that they would not sting. The comb was not quite full to the top, so there will be chapter two to the story in the late Fall. The bees were housed in May and have been working to fill the 3 ft. tall beehive. In the above picture Jack Rhea operates the smoker, the handle of which is a small bellows that produces the air going through the lower container that is partially filled with burning cotton rags. The top is a funnel shape, protruding downward so the smoke will drive the bees away, so the man robbing can get the bees away from the rack of honey he's removing.

The bee hat is made of screen wire, covered on the top with a ducking or plastic, dropping down to the shoulders so a heavy coat will come up over it. Another piece is sewn onto the bottom, dropping down over the shoulders. The screen wire could have been sewn onto an old felt hat. This type of hat works fine until it slides over against an ear and gives the bee an excellent target.

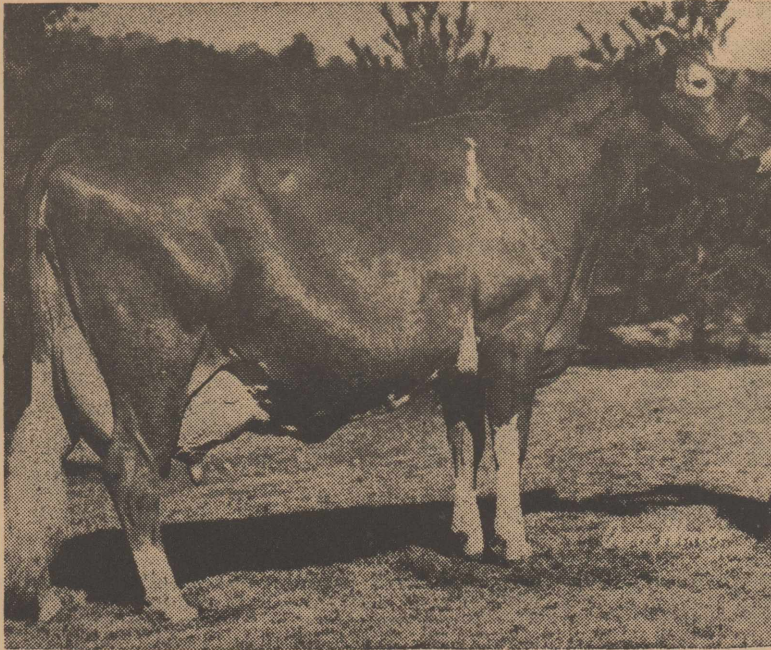

Time has sure changed. A good milk cow used to give a syrup bucket full (foam and all) and the calf got the other half. A syrup bucket held 3 good quarts and just think, she could fill 40 of them per day. She was later named, so Hoarde's Dairyman said, for the All American aged cow. Her production started when she was 5 years and 4 months old. She's doing her part. At \$1.20 a gallon for milk, she would have brought in \$5,018.00 per year. The reason she's doing her part - she could not qualify for government aid and relief would not be too good because she's only produced 2 sons, 1 daughter and is expecting number 4. One nice man stopped one day, walked up over the high fence row and said, "Son, can I get a watermelon? I never saw them grow wild like this on the fence row before." "Yes Sir," I told him, "just help yourself, but please don't eat any here. If coyotes get started on them in the early Fall we will hardly get a melon."

That man was so pleased. He got one under each arm and he carried them to the car, opened his trunk and put a couple of suitcases in the back seat and he really carried melons. He carried two, he carried four, he carried six, eight, twenty. I just kept sharpening my hoe, sitting in the shade.



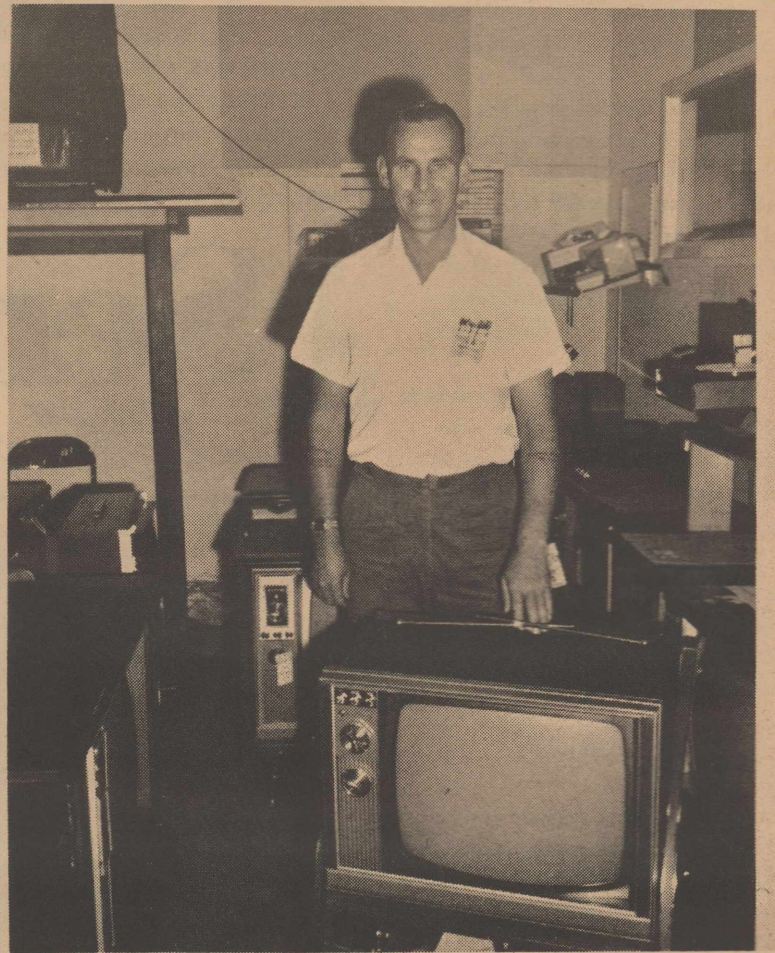
And if you think this is a sad story, you wait till I tell you about that other traveler that drank all that gyp water.

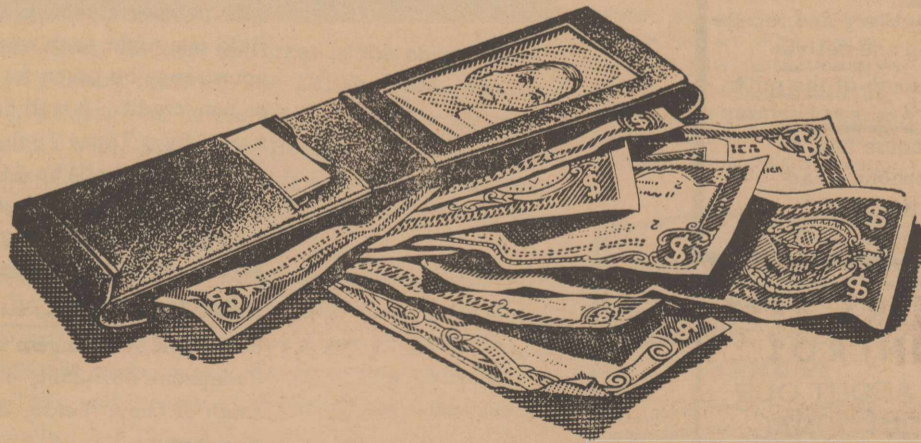

TODAY I WANT TO ANSWER A FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTION... "IF I APPLY FOR DISABILITY BENEFITS, DO I HAVE TO BE EXAMINED BY A SOCIAL SECURITY DOCTOR BEFORE I CAN GET ANY CHECKS?"

THE SOCIAL SECURITY LAW REQUIRES THE APPLICANT TO SUPPLY THE MEDICAL RECORDS ON HIS CONDITION, WHEN YOU APPLY FOR BENEFITS, A REPORT MUST BE PROVIDED BY YOUR ATTENDING DOCTOR OR HOSPITAL. THIS IS USUALLY OBTAINED FOR YOU BY THE SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE. HOWEVER, IT IS NECESSARY FOR YOU TO SIGN A RELEASE FORM IN ORDER FOR US TO SECURE THE REPORTS.

INFORMATION FROM THE ATTENDING DOCTOR AND THE HOSPITAL IS GENERALLY ALL THAT IS NEEDED. HOWEVER, IN SOME INSTANCES, A SPECIALIST'S REPORT MAY BE NECESSARY TO CLARIFY A QUESTION OR RESOLVE A BORDERLINE SITUATION. YOU MAY THEN BE ASKED TO GO FOR A SPECIAL EXAMINATION TO HELP PROVIDE THE EXTRA INFORMATION.

IF SUCH A SPECIAL EXAMINATION IS REQUIRED, THE SOCIAL SECURITY ADMINISTRATION WILL PAY FOR IT. THIS IS DONE ONLY TO SUPPLEMENT OR CLARIFY THE INITIAL INFORMATION YOU HAVE ALREADY PROVIDED.

WHEN YOU APPLY FOR DISABILITY BENEFITS, BE READY TO GIVE THE NAMES AND ADDRESSES OF ALL YOUR SOURCES OF MEDICAL TREATMENT FOR YOUR DISABLING CONDITION. YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE WILL BE HAPPY TO HELP YOU GET REPORTS FROM THESE SOURCES.

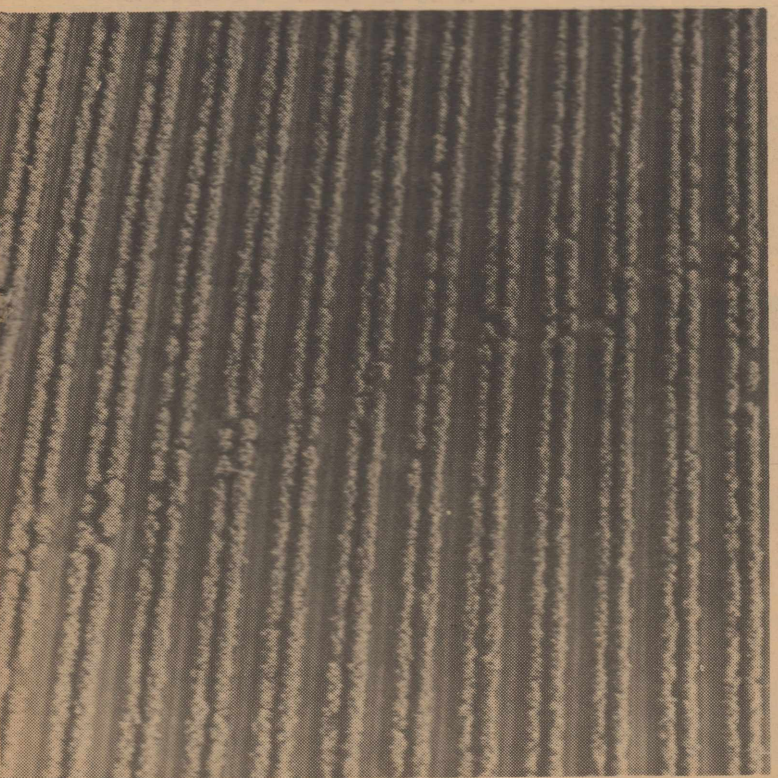

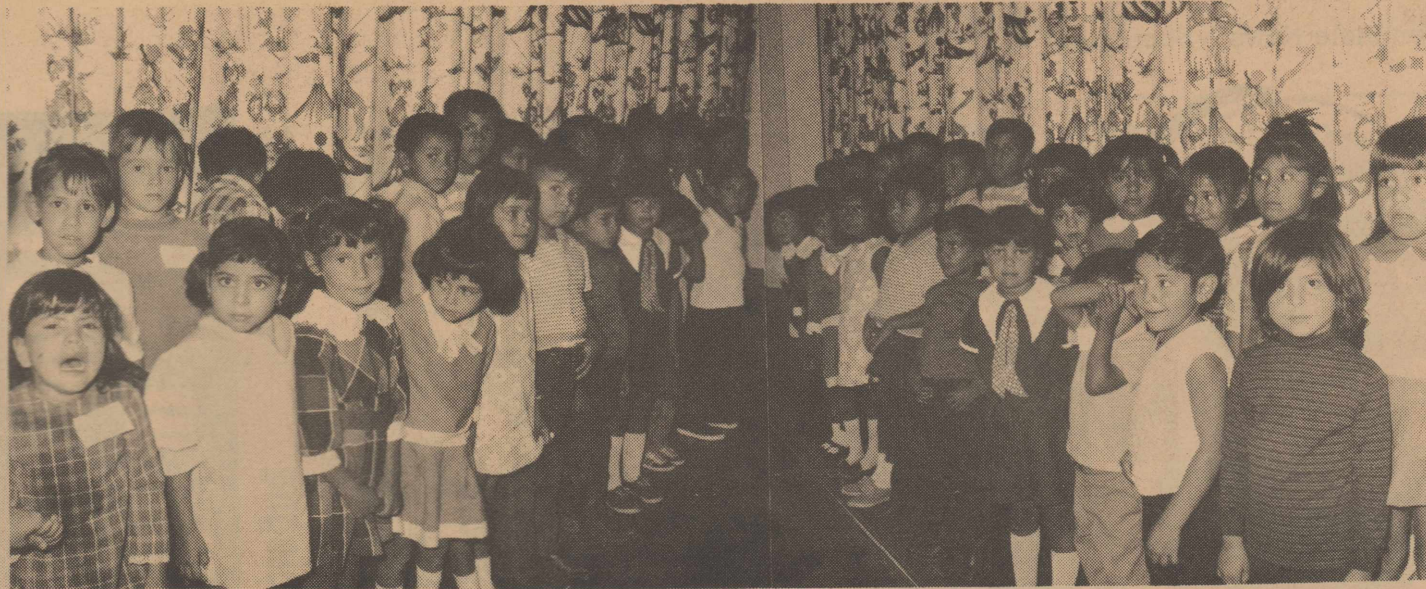

Rules will be the official State 4-H Horse Show Rules. Only one rider per horse and one horse per rider. The "B" point system will be used for official points.

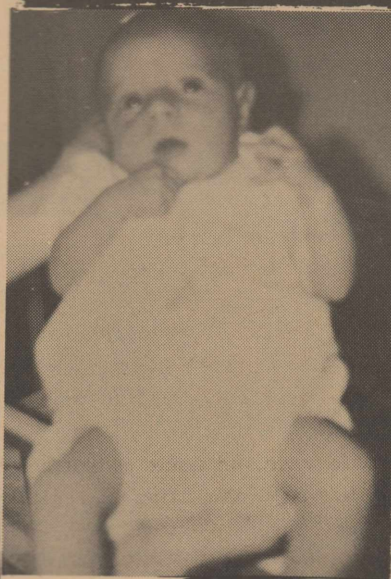

All area counties are invited to participate. 100-150 entries are expected.

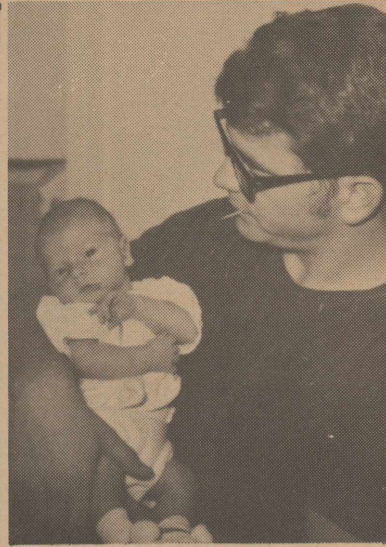

## EDITORIAL

Dear Sir:

This is to notify you that you have been selected as a Petit Juror to serve at the next term of our County Court beginning on the 24th day of March, 1970, 10:00 A.M., at the Court House in Seminole, Texas. Please acknowledge this summons by signing and returning the attached card. Please answer by return mail.

It's nice that they attach a 5¢ card to return which says :  
Ed Welch, Sheriff, Gaines County, Seminole, Texas

This acknowledges receipt of your summons to appear as a Juror before our County Court on the 24th day of March, 1970.

Now it's a real honor for any American citizen to live in a country where jurors are still needed and citizens can be tried before their peers. I've sat on Grand Juries, Petit Juries and other juries, but the best jury that I've ever known of is the one that Charlie Earl sat on. Everything was pretty dry on that particular day. It was hot and the jury was having a little trouble trying to stay awake until Charlie reared back in his seat and the chair came unscrewed from the floor and Charlie literally fell out of the jury box. This will liven up any court room - the 106th District, Petit, Grand or Federal Jury. Even the judge waked up. Lawyers got tickled, sheriff's deputies left the room to laugh and poor Charlie gathered himself up.

It never did make me mad but it always has griped me to sit on a good, nice, juicy jury and have them make the big settlement out of court just before the jury retired for the big decision. Also it aggravates me no end to see judges that represent the law and the courts to sit on the bench but act like they have such little interest in the case. (If I were being tried before a judge I'd want him to act like he's alive.) I love to watch dedicated lawyers work but have never enjoyed one putting on such a show that it became a deterrent to seeing justice done. (Example: When a lawyer in District Court kept shaking his finger within 1/2 inch of the witness' nose finally the witness pretended he was going to hit him, shook his chair and stomped the floor and the lawyer ran six or eight steps before he could recover.)

Well, so much for last Tuesday's Court proceedings. I was called down at 10:00. I was called down at 2:00. Thank goodness, someone doesn't like the way I cut my hair either. I wasn't chosen for any of the cases. I still like to hear the jury panel questioned. Are you a voter? A free holder? Can you read or write? Under 65? A doctor? A nurse? A teacher? It just makes one feel clean again to have offered his services for \$1.00 a day or \$3.00 a day.

I've got a better deal than that this time. I was called to serve on the district court; I got \$5.00 and didn't have to serve. (Leon Foote was called but he never showed up.)

**HAROLD DRUMMOND  
SPEAKS ON SCOUTING**

Harold Drummond, an area man for Boy Scouting, pointed out recently in a talk that 1 out of every 4 boys in the United States is in scouting, that scouting has come a long way in the last 58 years since its inception, also that only 1 out of every 14 boys in Seminole is in scouts. He said if Seminole did not have the finest facilities in the U. S. for scouting it ranked among the very top.

He pointed out things happening to young people that were not happening in years gone by - jet age, civil rights, music, drugs, space age, communism, assassinations, Vietnams, draft dodging, college demonstrations, teachers striking and the general breaking down of laws and courts. 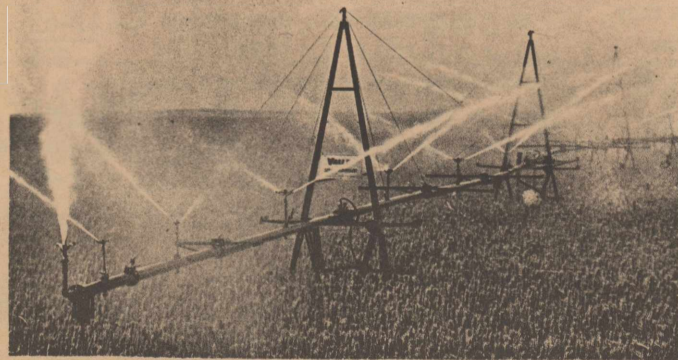

Gaines County's first annual Sew it With Cotton Contest, sponsored by the Gaines County Cotton Promotion Club, will be held Saturday, September 12. The contest will be held in the Seagraves High School Auditorium at 2:00 p. m.

Admission is free. First and second place winners in each category will receive gift certificates, to be used in Seagraves and Seminole. More than \$100 will be presented according to Mrs. Weyland Mullins, president of Gaines County Cotton Promotion Club.

A set of contest rules follows.

**GENERAL RULES:**

- A. Seamstress must be at least 9 years of age by date of contest.
- B. An original design or commercial pattern may be used.
- D. Not more than 2 garments per model.
- F. Model gets the prize.

**MATERIALS:**

- A. All cotton materials must be 100% domestic cotton. (not imported)
- B. All parts of the outer garment or garments, except trimming, must be 100% cotton.
- C. Trimming of rhinestones, fur, sequins, etc., will be accepted.
- D. Lining, innerlining and inner facings may be your choice of fabric.
- E. Cotton bonded to a synthetic is not allowed.
- F. A portion of your ensemble may not be bought ready-made. (For instance, if a blouse, shirt or similar item is needed, a ready-made one will not be accepted.)

**JUDGING:**

- A. Appearance-100%
  - 1. Fit-25%
  - 2. Eye Appeal-25%
  - 3. Suitability of style, fabric, and color to model-25%
  - 4. Suitability of fabric to style-25%
- B. Contestants modeling ability will not be judged.
- C. Impartial judges will be chosen.
- D. Detailed workmanship will be considered in case of a tie.
- E. Prizes will be given in each category.

**ENTRANTS:**

- A. This contest is not limited to Cotton Club or Cotton Promotion Association members.
- B. Professional seamstresses MAY NOT enter. (Currently employed Home Economics Instructors, Home Demonstration Agents, etc., who through their profession come in constant contact with the 4 judging points listed under appearance.)
- C. Women who sew for the public ARE NOT considered professionals and may enter garments for themselves or make garments for others.
- D. First Place winners in each category or designated alternate from county contests will enter the district contest to be held in Crosby County. Time and place not official yet.

To be sure of purchasing U. S. manufactured materials, keep in mind that all reputable textile mills have the brand, location and name of the mill printed on the end of the bolt or on a tag attached to the end of the bolt.

Entry blanks may be picked up at the stores within the county which handle patterns and dress fabric.

**OFFICIAL COUNTY RULES:**

The garments described in the first 4 categories may be made by any qualified seamstress.

- 1. Sugar Plum: Model, ages 6 through 12....better dress.
- 2. Sports: Model, ages 13 and over....Short suits, pant dresses, pants and tops, and western suits. (Long pants may include regular or bell bottoms.... party pants suits NOT included.)
- 3. School Time: Model, ages 6 through 12....school dress, pant dress, or pant suits (long pants.)
- 4. Lollipop: Model, BOYS and GIRLS, ages 1 through 5.... better dress clothes.

The following three categories must be modeled by the seamstress.

- 5. Junior Miss: Ages 9 through 13.... one or two piece school dress. (Pant dress not included.)
- 6. Teen Time: Ages 14 through 18.... street dress or school dress. (Pant dress not included.)
- 7. Make and Model: Ages 18 and over.... better dress, suit or ensemble.

Entry blanks may be picked up at any of the following places: Anthony's, Seminole News, Grayson's Fabric, or the Seminole Sentinel in Seminole; Barrons Fabric or Collins in Brownfield; Lamberts or Ben Franklin in Seagraves; and Loop Grocery Store in Loop.

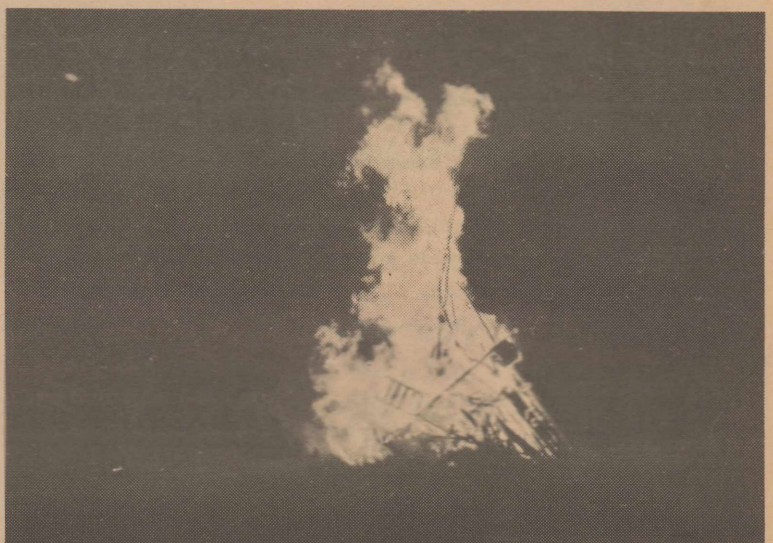
