

Funeral services for Lewis G. Daugherty, 74, widely known area banker and civic leader, were held at 2:00 p.m. Friday in the Avenue B. Church of Christ with O. B. Proctor of Abilene officiating, assisted by Tom Coffee. Burial was in Gaines County Memorial Park under the direction of Singleton Funeral Home.

Mr. Daugherty, a thirty year resident of Seminole, died about 5:15 a.m. October 14, 1970 in Methodist Hospital at Lubbock. He had undergone surgery on Monday.

Mr. Daugherty, retired, had served as president of the Seminole State Bank from 1951 to 1959. He was chief executive officer at the bank nineteen years.

He was a past president of Seminole Chamber of Commerce and of the Seminole Rotary Club. He was secretary of the Rotary Club and secretary-treasurer of the Gaines County Golf Club at the time of his death. He was a retired elder of the Avenue B Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife, Wilma; two daughters, Mrs. Nell Lucas of Mexia and Mrs. Anna Knight of Lake Jackson; a son, Jones of Irving and ten grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Tommie Roberts, Howard Deen, L. L. Moore, Allison Gainey, Jack Bonner, A. G. Blackmon, Horace Jones, Jim Rash and Calvin Holcomb.

## \*\*\* FRESHMEN WIN FIRST GAME 14-12

### ONE DIES IN FIRE \*\*\*\*\*



J.C. (Jake) Tate, 56, died at approximately 9:30 a.m. Monday morning just outside the Seagraves city limits on the Denver City Hiway, Texas 83, when the 1966 Dodge butane truck he was driving left the highway and turned over, hitting a farm house, burning up the house, the truck and himself. The truck was owned by Big 3 Butane Co., Inc.

The occupants of the house, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Lynn Taylor (Laquita), received first and second degree burns on their backs but got out of the house unassisted before one of the tanks that was on fire exploded. The Taylors were asleep in the front bedroom when the Tate driven vehicle traveling east, for some unknown reason, left the roadway on the north side and hit the stucco farm house facing the pavement. The Taylors, age 22 and 19, gave their address as Route 1, Seagraves, Texas. Tate's address was 1201 Ave. I., Seagraves.

The farm house was completely demolished and burned. Seagraves firemen began to work the blaze about one hour after the accident. An eye witness said, "I saw the explosion and then I heard it. The Taylors had already gotten out. There was no hopes of saving Mr. Tate."

Tate brought to three the number of people killed in Gaines County on highways in freak accidents, one a horse-car accident, another caused by a pile of caliche, and it is thought that this accident was caused by a blow out on a front tire of the truck. The quick thinking of Mr. Taylor probably saved his wife's life as she had on nylon bed clothes. She received only slight burns, a late report said, because he wrapped her up and carried her out.

Tate is survived by his wife, two sons, of the home; a stepson, his mother and three brothers and three sisters.

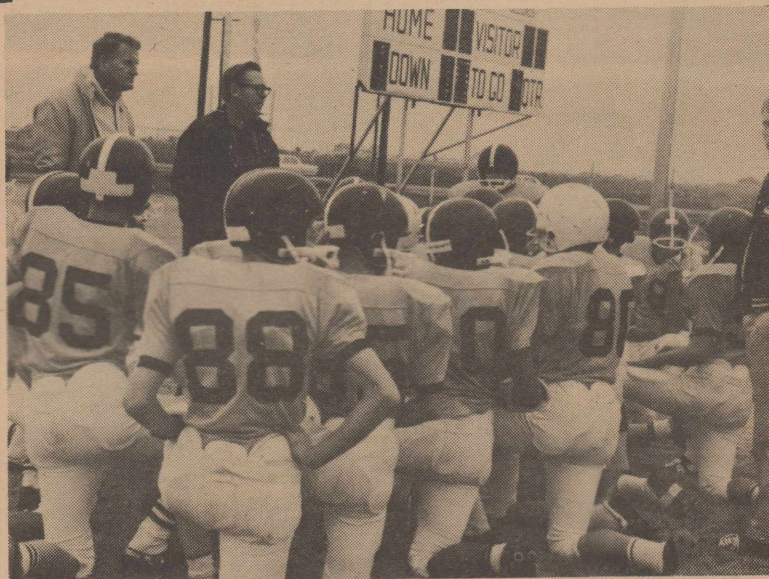
### EDITORIAL

The Seminole Area Chamber of Commerce recommended a 50 bed hospital for the following reasons.

1. A three or four doctor unit. It seems that the time is coming and may be here when very few doctors want the entire medical burden of one town or one community on their backs. This is the size unit it seems the chamber thinks is important to have happy doctors.
2. The Health, Education and Welfare people have been quoted as saying that not less than a 50 bed hospital should be built. Dr. Price from Lamesa said, "Under no circumstances build less than a 50 bed hospital."
3. The requirements for staffing a 50 bed hospital are exactly the same as staffing a 20 bed hospital.
4. The survey originally made for the county recommended one hospital for the county where the larger population existed.
5. Chamber officials are of the opinion that in future years two small hospitals cannot be supported in Gaines County.

Last week the Commissioners Court asked that two issues be placed on the ballot - one issue for a 50 bed hospital in Seminole, another a 35 bed hospital in Seminole and a 20 bed hospital in Seagraves. A petition will be circulated and it will need ten percent of the qualified property owners signatures before an election can be called by the court.

The publishers of the Seminole News think that the hospital issue could be a determining factor as to the future of Gaines County and this area. The following questions must be answered. (1) Can Seminole voters ignore the pleas from the north part of the county for a new 20 bed hospital? (2) Can the voters from Seagraves conscientiously answer what they would do if they suddenly faced the possibility of no doctor and/or staff members to operate a hospital? (3) To all voters in both towns: can we support two hospitals ten or fifteen years from today?

It's a long way to Pecos - 131 miles - especially if you've been over on Friday night and have to go back for a 10 o'clock game Saturday morning. It turned out to be a short way home however, when the Seminole Freshmen won their first outing in 18 tries, 14-12.

From one end of the Seminole roster to the other they played a good ballgame. What keeps a team up after losing 17 straight? The parents got behind them was one big reason. Coach Hicks got behind them and Coach Charley Wrenn got behind them. They ran with power, they tackled with power and it paid off with sweet victory. This is the same team that won two ballgames as 7th graders. They tied one in the 8th grade and lost their first 4 this year, to Brownfield, Lamesa, Denver City and Andrews. There were stars aplenty. There were Lacy, McNew, Montandon, McIlwain, Lilly, Eudy, Aten, Norris, Squires, Mason, Bunk, Carson, Flud, Wrenn, Jordan, Atkinson and others.

Although the 9th graders were playing it tough the defense let a receiver get behind them and fell behind 6-0 with 12 seconds remaining in the first quarter. They duplicated the fete with 14 seconds to go in the 2nd quarter and the score was 0-12. It was a see-saw battle during the 3rd period. Seminole carried the ball down the field, only to fumble a wet ball and fumble again. In the 3rd period the Freshmen put together their first real drive from their own 47 yard line. Charles Wrenn carried for 12, then it was a combination of Jordan and Wrenn. Then a screen pass from Wrenn to Squires. Wrenn ran for a first on the 5 yard line. Benny Flud hit for 2 and then Squires carried it in for 3 and Rory Lacy came on with a big play when he caught the P.A.T. good for 2 points and the score read 8-12.

It was a desperation drive in the 4th quarter and the Freshmen were moving the ball but it was tough going with only a minute and 15 seconds to go. Wrenn called his own number. The Pecos Freshmen had a flag thrown on them on the 3 yard line for pass interference. Wrenn played it safe for 2 1/4 yards and called his own number

This is a time when voters will need wise counsel and good leadership. This is the time when judgment is needed and not a flare of tempers. No doubt the time is coming when education officials say you may have only one high school for 20,000 people. The time is ripe, not for who's right or who's wrong or who did what thirty years ago, but for what's going to be good for Gaines County today, tomorrow and the next day. We have the wealth but time is short. What we build must be built while wealth is being mined out from under us. We would prefer seeing a hospital in Loop, Seagraves and Seminole to no hospital at all. We would prefer seeing a high school in all three places. We would prefer the best of facilities for every resident of this county, but the time is here when Gaines County cannot control the whims of HEW, the Federal Government and their decisions.

Chester Browne, County Judge, notified the News yesterday evening that an order had gone out to have the petition drawn and that it would be ready the latter part of the week or the first of next. A 50 bed hospital in Seminole - \$1,916,000.00, a 35 bed Seminole hospital and a 20 bed Seagraves hospital - \$2,195,000.00.



# Farm hand

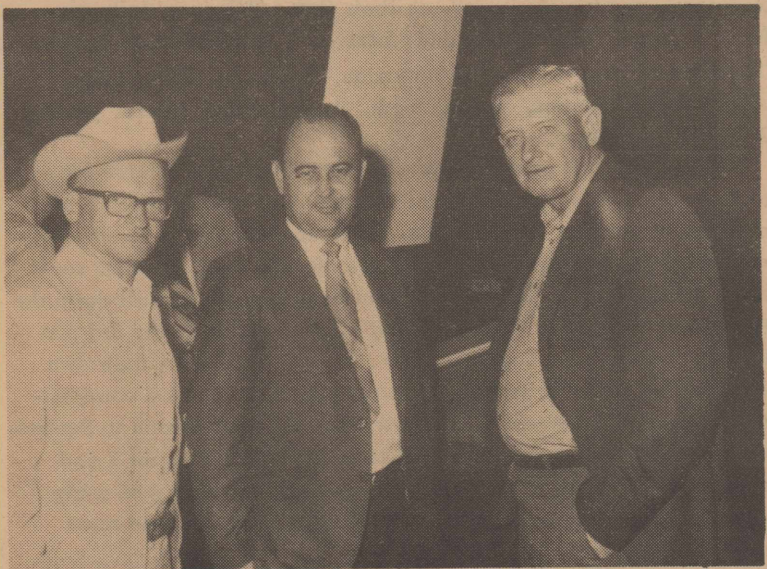

Jack Condray, vice president of Lubbock P. C. A., gave these figures Monday night in Seagraves, "In Lynn County alone, farmers have decreased from 2100 in 1930 to 775 in 1970. In the last nine years we have lost 25% of our farm population. In the past three years farmers showing a loss have advanced from 20% to 38% in 1969 with 73% of the total farmers in our organization making less than \$5,000.00."

He listed these four reasons why loans go bad - (1) management, (2) lack of applying knowledge, (3) lack of planning and (4) attitudes and outlook on life. "We must turn our operations around," he said, "so that more than 3% of our farmers will be in the \$20,000.00 plus profit bracket."

touch football and we were having the best time. All of a sudden we heard this terrible pounding and Kenton was bearing down on us on his uncle's big fine horse at full speed. He even had a saddle and that black horse was much horse. Of course we scattered.

He'd wait awhile on the other end of the football field and here he would come again, wide open. Nobody's gonna tackle a horse. He must have weighed 1150-60 pounds. We couldn't believe it. Every time we'd get started here he'd come again. He didn't want to play football, he wanted to keep us from playing.

This went on for fifteen minutes, thirty minutes, and every five to ten minutes he'd charge again. I wore a little semi-western hat. The crown on it was turned down kinda like a sailor's hat. It kinda resembled a pancake except where it set on your head.

After awhile Kenton came through wide open again and someone hollered "throw something at him". Somebody threw the football and all I had was that hat and I sailed it. Now I could have sailed that hat the rest of my life but I could have never stuck it on that horse's nose again.

Whether the hat actually stuck on that horse or he was breathing

at such force that he sucked it up on his nose, I'll never know, but that horse quit running. He lowered his head and started bucking. He put on quite a rodeo. Kenton's hat flew off first, he flew off second and hit the ground with such force it looked like it might have killed him. That black horse wasn't through. He kept pitching. He threw the saddle off. The last time we saw the horse he was headed toward home, minus saddle, minus saddle blanket and minus his rider. Evidently he finally had to breath out and I retrieved my hat. Kenton drug home.

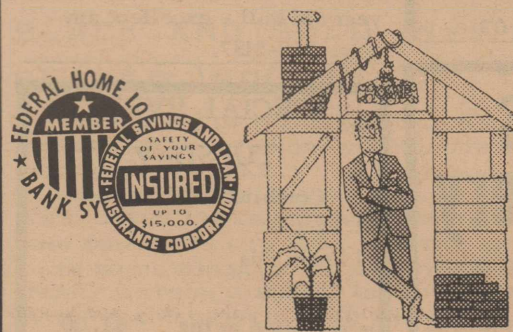

What the salesman is attempting to do is get you to make what he represents as a highly profitably investment which turns out to be an extremely expensive and highly concealed series of premium payments on a very limited insurance policy.

Most of the "deals" include a profit sharing dividend feature with implication that these dividends will continually increase in size as the company grows and makes better profits, but it will, in nearly every case, take years to even recover the original investment.

Highly polished, canned sales presentations with exaggerated emphasis on the themes of profit investment, dividends and the like often leave buyers unaware that they have merely bought an insurance policy.

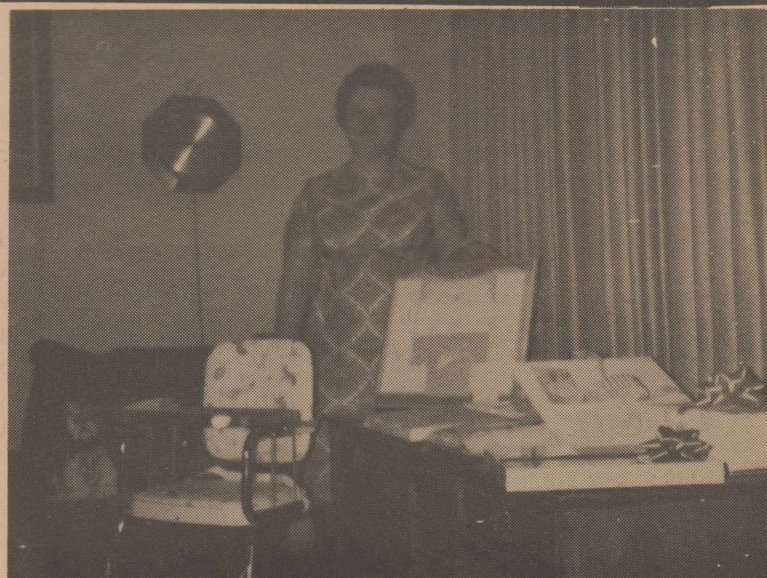

He had no plan and I decided to get in politics and start to consolidating schools and bring them in on busses.

That was the first time I ever saw Preston Smith, about a fifteen year old boy, hungry for an education, with a slim opportunity to work his way through high school. He managed to get him a part time job and work his way through the Lamesa High School, then on through Lubbock Tech College by working in picture shows, filling stations and any other honest employment. I am near 88 years of age now and it is still a pleasure to watch Preston Smith climb up to be of service to his State and Country. He has served so well in every capacity. I only ask for two terms and I have a warm place in my heart for the people of the Loveland School District and voting precinct, as I received every vote and transferred the school into Seminole with eight others by bus. The county had 17 schools when I was elected and now we have only 3. We have over 800 sections in the Seminole School District. We have over \$5,000,000.00 in school buildings and have a cheap school tax, still - a Common Consolidated School District rate set by the Commissioners Court and collected by county officers at no expense.

I am still asking you to vote for worthy Preston Smith for Governor of Texas November 3, 1970.

VOLUNTARY TOTAL ABSTINENCE FROM ALL INTOXICANTS IS THE TRUE GROUND OF PERSONAL TEMPERANCE, AND COMPLETE LEGAL PROHIBITION OF THE TRAFFIC IN ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES IS THE DUTY OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT.

THANKS FOR YOUR COMMUNICATION OF RECENT DATE WITH REGARD TO THE PLIGHT OF THE SMALLER HOSPITALS IN MEETING CERTAIN MEDICARE REQUIREMENTS. THIS IS A TOTALLY UNACCEPTABLE SITUATION, AND THE WHOLE MATTER HAS GIVEN ME A GREAT DEAL OF CONCERN.

AS YOU KNOW, MANY COMMUNITIES HAVE ENCOUNTERED PROBLEMS WITH MEDICARE CERTIFICATION FOR THEIR HOSPITALS, AND I HAVE BEEN DOING EVERYTHING POSSIBLE IN AN EFFORT TO BE HELPFUL. I HAVE REMAINED IN TOUCH WITH OFFICIALS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, EDUCATION AND WELFARE IN REGARD TO THE INTERPRETATION OF REQUIREMENTS FOR MEDICARE CERTIFICATION, APPEALING FOR EFFECTIVE ACTION TO PROVIDE RELIEF FOR THE SMALLER HOSPITALS.

I REGRET THAT OFFICIALS HAVE NOT, AS YET, TAKEN A MORE REALISTIC APPROACH IN MEETING THE HOSPITAL NEEDS OF THE SMALLER COMMUNITIES. I AM SUPPORTING LEGISLATION AND OTHER STEPS WHICH WOULD PROVIDE CERTAIN RELIEF FOR THIS WHOLE PROBLEM, PARTICULARLY WITH REGARD TO THE REGISTERED NURSE REQUIREMENT.

I AM VERY OPTIMISTIC THAT SOME HELPFUL CHANGES ARE IN THE OFFING AND THAT AN ARRANGEMENT CAN BE WORKED OUT SO THAT THE SMALLER HOSPITALS WILL BE ABLE TO CONTINUE ACCEPTING MOST MEDICARE PATIENTS. THERE IS NOTHING SPECIFIC AS YET. YOU MAY BE SURE OF MY CONTINUED BEST EFFORTS.

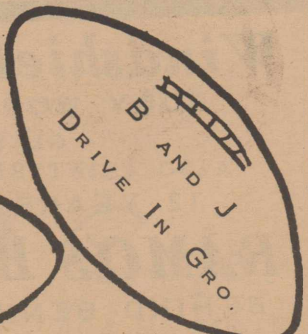
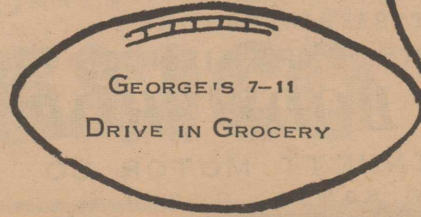
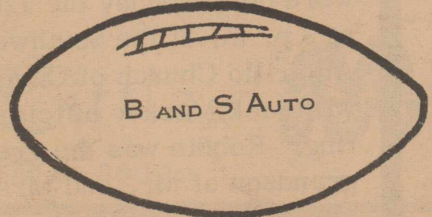
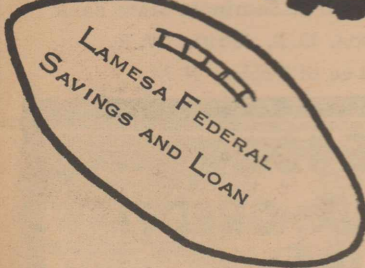
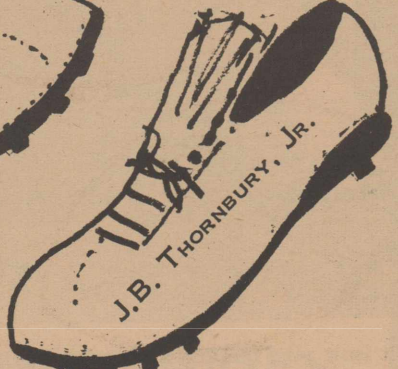
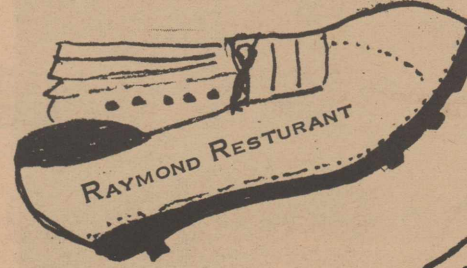
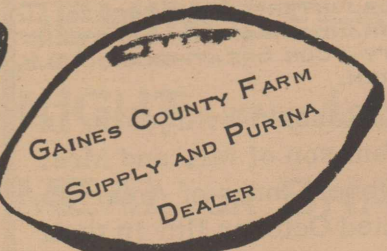
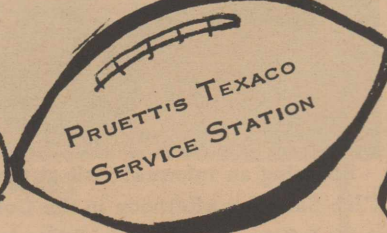
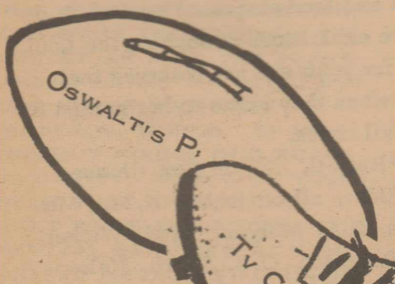
## 8th GRADE

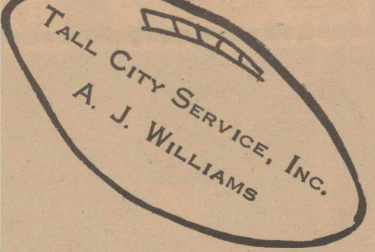
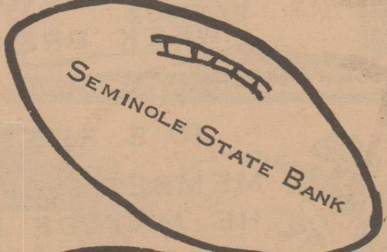
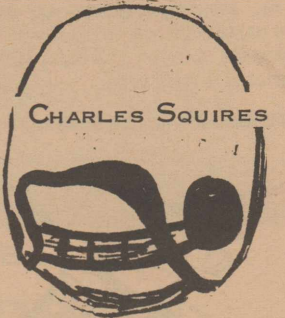


## 7th GRADE

## Should Peace Be Expensive?

Out of the debate and controversy over the war in Vietnam emerges a most disturbing line of reasoning.

A major thrust of those opposed to the war is that if the nation pulled out of Southeast Asia the money being spent there could be used for a variety of domestic programs.

This is the disturbing factor in all these discussions.

Obviously, the war in Vietnam costs money, as do all wars. Yet if the war is ended why is it necessary to find some programs to spend that amount of money on?

It would seem but the logical approach to the matter is along the lines if the war is ended, then the government does not need as much money, thus why not reduce taxes accordingly.

However, this idea in many circles is regarded as unorthodox radicalism. Without government spending, there are less government jobs. And unfortunately, this does not mean only less jobs in the Federal government.

The rise of Federal spending goes down to the county and

city level. Unless these local government units adopt some matching spending programs, then the Federal money is withheld.

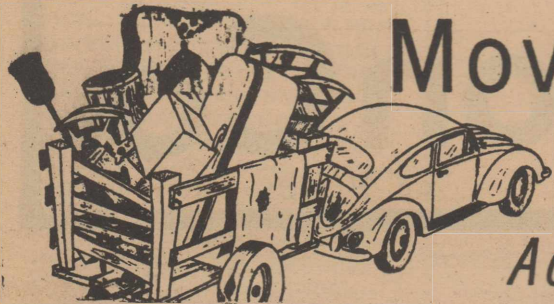
This in turn, creates more jobs in all government.

The figures can be quite revealing. As of June of this year the government figures show 75,174,000 people were employed. Of the total, slightly over 12,000,000 were employed by government of all levels.

This, then, means that 20 percent, or one out of every five people is working for government, and their paychecks come out of taxes.

Thus in all this discussion of how to spend the money that would be saved with Vietnam ending, it appears the cart is being put before the horse.

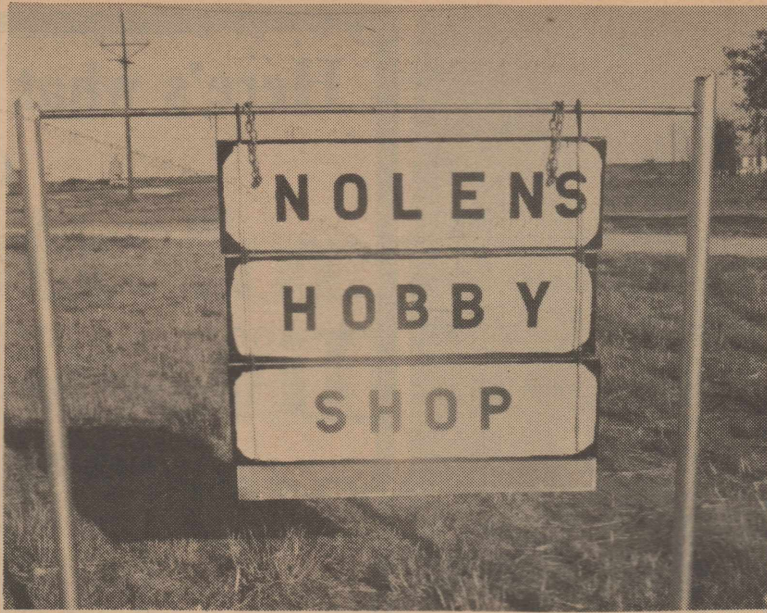

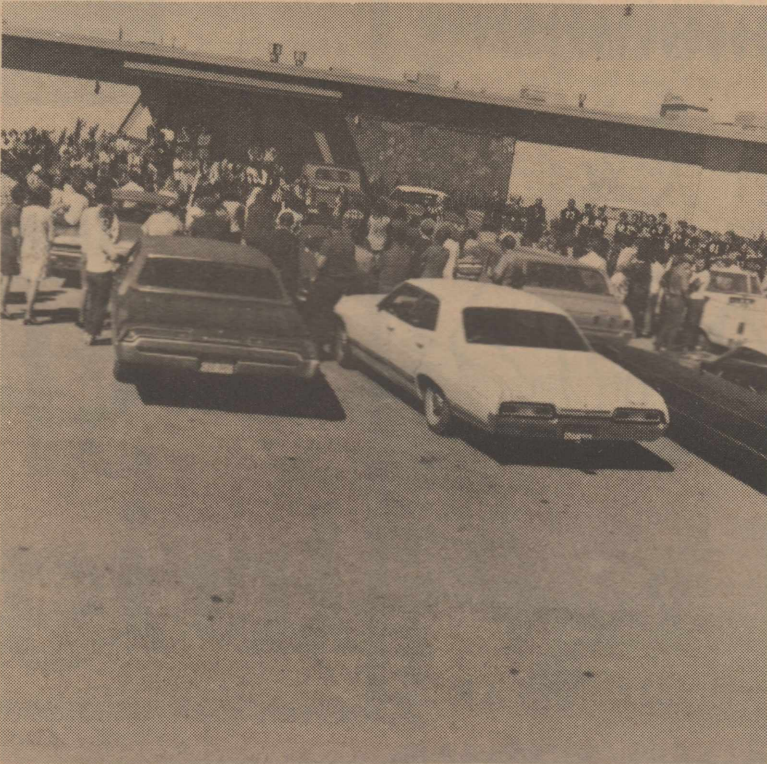

## Information From Social Security Office

THE RED, WHITE, AND BLUE MEDICARE IDENTIFICATION CARD IS A PASSPORT FOR BETTER HEALTH CARE FOR OLDER AMERICANS. THESE CARDS ARE ISSUED TO PEOPLE ELIGIBLE FOR MEDICARE WHEN THEIR CLAIM IS PROCESSED AND SHOULD BE KEPT WHERE THEY MAY BE EASILY FOUND.

THE MEDICARE CLAIM NUMBER, ALONG WITH OTHER VITAL INFORMATION IS PRINTED ON THIS CARD. IT SHOULD BE PRESENTED WHEN SOMEONE ELIGIBLE FOR MEDICARE BENEFITS GOES TO THE HOSPITAL OR TO HIS DOCTOR.

HOSPITAL ADMISSION STAFF PERSONNEL AND DOCTOR'S SECRETARIES CAN OBTAIN THIS INFORMATION FROM THE SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE IF THE IDENTIFICATION CARD HAS BEEN LOST, DESTROYED OR IS ILLEGIBLE. HOWEVER, IT IS MUCH FASTER AND MORE CONVENIENT IF THE CARD IS AVAILABLE.

WHEN A MEDICARE CARD IS LOST OR DESTROYED, IMMEDIATE REPLACEMENT SHOULD BE REQUESTED. REPORT THE LOSS TO THE NEAREST SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE OR REPRESENTATIVE AND ASK TO HAVE A REPLACEMENT CARD ISSUED.

Money isn't everything--but neither is poverty.

There's nothing like a woman to bring out the boast in a man. YOU DON'T HAVE TO LOSE YOUR SHIRT IN A SUIT OVER PERSONAL LIABILITY

If a good neighbor gets a bad injury on your property, he may look at you through money-colored glasses and begin a liability suit. And you might end up holding the bag, a disastrously dented pocketbook--unless you also are holding an insurance policy that protects you.

Suppose a visitor steps on a negligently placed skate, as depicted in the cartoon, and suddenly embarks on an impromptu excursion climaxed by a nose dive that leaves you up to your neck in a lawsuit.

or suppose some leaves you're burning in your backyard flutter next door and start a fire, one that could incinerate your bank account.

Or suppose your dog forgets where he buried his bone and romps off to put the bite on somebody's leg. Or your cat stops purring and starts clawing, and somebody's left lacerated.

Those are suppositions. This is for real: When such incidents, and many other similar ones, occur, whether on or off your property, if you have personal liability insurance, your insurance company pays for your legal defense whether or not you are liable. If you are adjudged liable, your insurance company pays your penalty up to the limit of your policy.

Personal liability coverage is included in your homeowners policy. It's an effective asbestos shield to keep you from getting financially burned when a personal liability lawsuit flares up.
