# NEWS DITORIAL

Gaines County's petroleum industry produces 40, 181, 646 barrels of crude oil valued at \$128, 952, 741 and 51, 844, 892 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$7, 102, 748 for an annual economic value of \$136, 055, 489.

These figures, just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, show the county ranked 7th among state counties in oil and gas production during 1969.

Texas production which has registered an increase over each previous year during the past decade hit another all-time high in 1969 with 1, 151, 775, 000 barrels, according to U.S. Bureau of Mines statistics. This is a production increase of 24.2% since 1960.

"Production from Gaines County helped meet this record demand," says Kenneth E. Montague, Association President. "We are now calling on it and the rest of Texas to meet an even greater demand as events in the Middle East have again forced us to dip into our declining reserves. Unfortunately, the price for Texas oil is inadequate to stimulate enough exploratory drilling to replace reserves."

Gaines County landowners and others with mineral interests received \$17,006,936 in royalty payments last year. Texas received

\$5, 931, 826 from crude oil production taxes and \$504, 295 from natural gas production taxes.

Estimated drilling expenditures totaled \$3,065,030 with \$1,928,342 of that amount spent on dry holes yielding nothing for the driller. Ira Rinehart's Yearbook showed drillers completed 17 oil wells and 26 dry holes. Nine wildcats were drilled and all were dry.

The county's oil and gas processing plants also added to the economy. The Oil and Gas Journal listed I carbon black plant, 2 petrochemical plants and 3 natural gasoline plants with a capacity of 108.0 million cubic feet daily.

Reports from the Texas Emplyment Commission show some 496 persons were directly employed by the oil and gas industry in the county with an annual payroll of \$3, 527, 440.

## JAMES E. BRAMLETT NEW CONTRACT

James E. Bramlett, Superintendent of Seminole Public Schools, was given a new three year contract Monday night in a special called board meeting. The new contract calls for expiration June 30, 1974. It was the only item listed on the executive meeting held in the regular meeting room in the administration building. Salary was not discussed but will be taken up at the regular review of salaries in a future meeting.

## TAX SUIT CONTINUED

It was reported yesterday that the new suit brought by oil companies would probably be called to trial in the early part of 1971, or after the first of this next year. This suit came about when the Atlantic-Richfield Co., Amerada division of Amerada Hess Corp., and Mobil Oil Corp., chose to further their suit in restraining county officials from taxing them unjustly on the re-evaluation of surface properties in the county.

# COMMISSIONERS RECEIVE PETITIONS

The Seminole Area Chamber of Commerce has presented to the commissioners court 668 signatures requesting an election on the two propositions concerning the new hospitals. The court presented the list to the county clerk. There are approximately 4, 000 registered voters in the county and 10% of the registered voters that are property owners, or 400, are necessary to petition for an election. County Judge Chester Browne speculated that it would take about one week to qualify signers of the petition.



I was so shocked to find out when I got grown and went through Wise County that Decatur was its county seat.

But, back to the story, Ader was working for the Tompkins. (Not their real name because they do have kinfolks living in Seminole.) And I guess she was a faithful servant and Mrs. Tompkins talked to her like she was a companion. "Ader, " (Ada) she would say as she was talking about her false teeth, "I'm going to have to get me some new false teeth, " as she placed her hand upon her false teeth and shook the uppers and shook the lowers."These teeth are getting so loose I just can't wear them anymore. I'm afraid they're going to fall out. " She kept on talking about the teeth and mentioned to Ada her necessity.

Finally, Ada made her plea. "Mrs. Tompkins, would you gimme your old teeth when you buy new ones?" "Why, Ada, what in the world would you do with my false teeth?"

Her answer was a good one. It was a sound one. It was a reasonable one. "Oh, Mrs. Tompkins," she said, "they just fits." Mrs. Tompkins' mouth flew open, she removed the false teeth. She made her a present of them right then.

I don't know what ever happened to Adar. Decatur's still the county seat of Wise. Dice shooters are still trying to make eight and this story lives on in fond remembrance.


# **Big Land Deal**

Last week the Seminole Farms sold equipment and tried to sell what was probably one of the larger farms in Gaines County at auction. The land consisted of 8141 acres approximately 14 miles southwest of Seminole. Of this amount approximately 6900 were irrigated, with 1200 acres dryland. Included with the land was 21 miles of Johns-Mansville high pressure underground pipe, 8" to 14".

The property had 31 irrigation wells on it and had been growing the following crops: cotton, peanuts, milo, corn, grain sorghums, soybeans, wheat, watermelons, alfalfa, rye, Spanish onions, peaches, green beans and other vegetables, plus various row crops. Also sold were various pieces of equipment and five tractors.

The allotments included 1.9 acres cotton, 1.8 acres wheat and 96 acres grain sorghum. The land also included a number of automatic Valley sprinkler systems. The successful bidder could assume the existing first mortgage indebtedness with unpaid balances totaling approximately \$1,387,000.00 said indebtedness is payable \$69,000 per year on the principal through 1973, then \$61,000 per year thereafter, plus interest each year at the rates of 7-8 3/4%. Additional principal payments are as follows: 1983 - \$27,000, 1984-\$282,500, 1986-\$12,500, 1989-\$120,00.






## CHICKEN OREGANO

Mrs. Alex Zotos, 3622 Maple, Odessa

Quarter 2 fryers. Wash and dry; and squeeze juice of one lemon over pieces. Salt, pepper and paprika chicken on both sides. In large skillet melt 1 stick butter and quickly brown chicken pieces. Place in oblong pan. In butter left in pan add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup red wine,  $\frac{1}{2}$  can tomato paste (3 oz.), 2 cups water, 1 tablespoon celery flakes, 2 cloves garlic. Bring to boil. Pour over chicken. Sprinkle about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoons oregano over chicken. Bake covered for one hour at 350 degrees; uncover last 10 minutes for browning.



Saute 2 onions, chopped, in  $\frac{1}{2}$  stick butter, add 1 cup uncooked rice; saute together until golden. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs. ground round and brown. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon comino, pepper to taste,  $\frac{2}{2}$  teaspoons salt, add  $\frac{1}{3}$  cup sliced mushrooms,  $\frac{2}{2}$  cups water and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup red wine. Cook until done about 20 minutes. When cooked toss in toasted pecans and almonds, if desired. Serve sauce from chicken over all.

The freshmen will host the Kermit Yellow Jackets here this Thursday night in their last game of the season. We would like to see you all out at the game.




