



I hate to tell this story because it's on someone else but those are the best kind I know, anyhow. I guess there's few people that ever ran an irrigation pump and watered with aluminum lines that haven't lost their end plug. A lateral sprinkler line always had an end plug in it so it could be removed to pump out the sand, the sticks, the family cat, the skunks, little dogs and anything else that got in the line that had a tendency to stop it up. Ground squirrels, mice and rats were the very worst because they had a tendency to break up and go partially through a sprinkler from 1/8 inch to 1/4 inch in size.

Back to the end plug. Now a fellow that had really practiced could wash out his lines and put the end plug back in with the pressure on, but you HAD TO BE CAREFUL! I've known of that thing coming out under fifty to sixty pounds of pressure and breaking arms, hands, feet and legs. And you multiply that a few times when the water compresses the air in the line and you've got real pressure. Some main lines reached up to 1/4 mile and farther and then the lateral lines up to 1/2 mile long. If the end plug wasn't set in real good and tight, it would blow off.

On this particular day I remember my neighbor building up the pressure in his line only to lose the end plug. He stopped the pump, killed the motor and hurried to put the end plug back in. He had to drive about a mile to get to it, not being able to see over the hill.

He replaced the end plug and headed back to his motor to start the water. I was hiding close by. I walked over to the pipe about four or five joints from the end, walked the pipe down to the very end, carefully leaned over and lifted the latch on the end plug. I walked back up the pipe, crossed over and hid again.

The cloud of dust approached much faster the second time. He used a few choice words, put the end plug back in and headed back for the second time. I repeated my performance and hid again. His pickup approached, hitting the ground on just the high spots. He not only put that end plug back in, he was talking to himself and I hope he didn't know it, but to me in particular. He brought a bunch of wire and wired the end plug back in.

I intended to tell my neighbor I'd pulled a dirty trick on him but that man was MAD! If I catch him on his death bed I'll make the great confession but never while he's strong and healthy.

I've made the trip to replace the end plug many times but a Bracero, working for 50¢ an hour, taught me a whole lot. He simply unjointed the last two joints, drained the water out of them, replaced the end plug and slid the lightweight aluminum pipe back into place quickly and latched it before it could get loaded with weight and water. TOMATOES ANYONE?

How many tomato plants can you put in a building that's 100 feet long and 120 feet wide? "If you string them to the roof, put them close together, approximately 2500," so Raymond Buhman and wife Willadean say.

At present the Buhmans are selling tomatoes in Seagraves, Seminole, Midland, Andrews and Odessa. The varieties grown in the hot house are Manpel and Floradel. The plants are irrigated in small aisles down between each row and are fed with nitrogen, potash and phosphorus in pellet form. "I run my own soil analysis. It's necessary to keep the soil in balance to produce a tasty tomato," he said. The plants are kept pruned and entwined, blooming on the top side as they advance up the string. A pollinator is used on each plant. Between 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. is the best time of day, so the grower said. A pollinator is simply a small battery driven machine that looks like a vibrator with a paddle type extension held against the plant.

At night the hot house cools to approximately 60 to 65 degrees, daytime 95 to 98 degrees. The plants have upwards of twenty tomatoes large and small on them, with harvest peak yet to come. Mr. and Mrs. Buhman readily admit that there's a thousand things about the business they do not know but it's a most enjoyable and interesting business. John Stevens, a long time employee, spends approximately eight hours per day watering, fertilizing, pruning and picking the tomatoes twice per week.



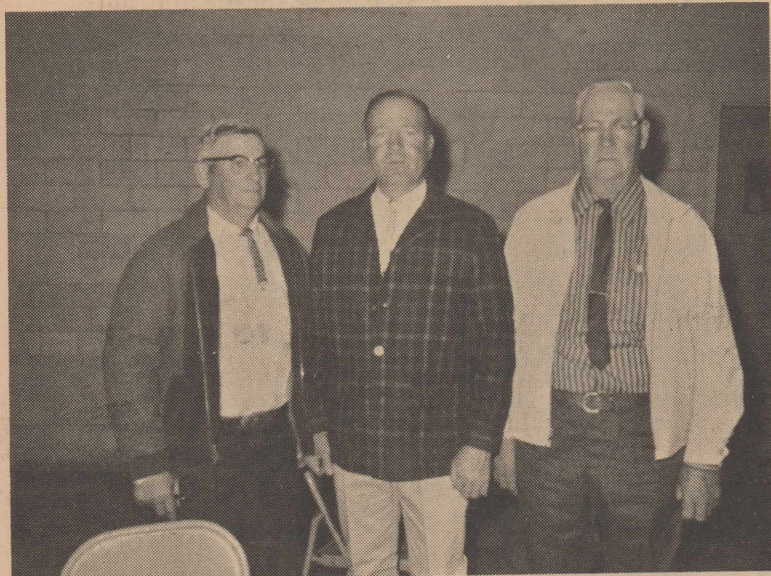
John Stevenson working with freshly picked tomatoes in the green house. Note the ones hanging on the vines to the left.

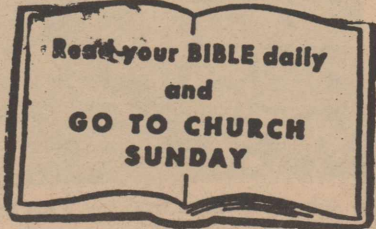

WHILE MANY AREAS OF FARM INCOME WERE BEING LOWERED BY THE PROVISIONS OF THE NEW FARM BILL, THE TOTAL LOAN AND PRICE SUPPORT PAYMENTS WERE RAISED FROM \$2.14 PER HUNDRED WEIGHT IN 1970 TO \$2.25 PER HUNDRED WEIGHT FOR 1971. THIS IS AN INCREASE OF 11 CENTS PER HUNDRED WEIGHT INCOME PROTECTION ON ALL GRAIN GROWN. GRAIN SORGHUM IS NOW RELATED AT 92 PER CENT OF THE NUTRITIONAL VALUE OF CORN, AND TESTS ARE BEING CONDUCTED TO SUBSTANTIATE THAT THE NUTRITIONAL VALUE IS AT LEAST 95 PER CENT OR GREATER THAN THAT OF CORN. THIS WOULD MEAN AN ADDITIONAL 8 CENTS PER HUNDRED WEIGHT INCOME PROTECTION FOR ALL GRAIN SORGHUM GROWN.

THE PRODUCTION YEAR OF 1969 SAW 16.8 PER CENT OF ALL GRAIN SORGHUM GROWN GO INTO EXPORT MARKETS AS CASH SALES. THE GRAIN SORGHUM PRODUCERS ASSOCIATION, SINCE ITS ORGANIZATION IN 1956, HAS BEEN THE RECOGNIZED SPOKESMAN FOR GRAIN PRODUCERS. IT HAS SEEN NATIONAL PRODUCTION GO FROM 22 BUSHELS PER ACRE TO A HIGH OF 66 BUSHELS PER ACRE, WHICH DEMANDED NEW MARKETS, AND THESE MARKETS WERE FOUND IN THE LOCAL FEEDING AND EXPORT INDUSTRY.

COUNTY FIGURES

As far as Gaines County is concerned, the overall irrigation picture shows only slight changes from 1969. A total of 311,600 acres were irrigated on 815 farms. There were 2,300 wells in operation. Of these 400 lift water less than 125 feet and 1,900 more than 125 feet. 1,500 yield under 700 gallons per minute while 800 are over that mark.

Surface irrigation accounted for 4,000 acres in the county while 307,600 acres were sprinkler irrigated, points out Holcomb. Most of the wells are powered by natural gas. 368 farms used 1,687 miles of underground pipe to irrigate 56,128 acres.

Looking at the irrigated crop picture, grain sorghum topped the list with 150,000 acres. Second was cotton with 115,000 acres. Grain sorghum was the leading crop under dryland production with 200,000 acres while cotton was next with 5,000 acres.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR AN ACT CREATING HOSPITAL DISTRICT COTERMINOUS WITH THE BOUNDARIES OF THE SEMINOLE COMMON CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1, GAINES COUNTY, TEXAS. TO THE RESIDENTS OF THE SEMINOLE COMMON CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1, GAINES COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that after due publication, hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1971 for the passage of an act creating a hospital district coterminous with the boundaries of the Seminole Common Consolidated School District No. 1, Gaines County, Texas under the authority granted by Sec. 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

AN ACT providing for the creating of the SEMINOLE HOSPITAL DISTRICT OF GAINES COUNTY, TEXAS. With boundaries coterminous with those of the Seminole Common Consolidated School District No. 1, Gaines County, Texas, pursuant to authority granted by Sec. 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, providing for election on the questions of the creation of such DISTRICT, and the levy of a tax not to exceed 75 cents (\$.75) on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property in the District for the maintenance, support, and the payment of bonds issued by it, and the indebtedness assumed; providing for the transfer of hospital facilities and the assumption of indebtedness and assets; providing the district with power to issue bonds, and method for authorizing same, for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and for any and all such purposes, and for the refunding of such bonds providing that the bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds, providing a governing body for such District; its powers and duties and the tenure of its members withdrawing authority for the sale of bonds for hospital purposes by Gaines County within the boundaries which are coterminous with the Seminole Common Consolidated School District No. 1, Gaines County, Texas, or any city located therein; inacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject, purpose of this act; providing a severance clause and declaring an emergency. Dated this 15th day of January, 1971.

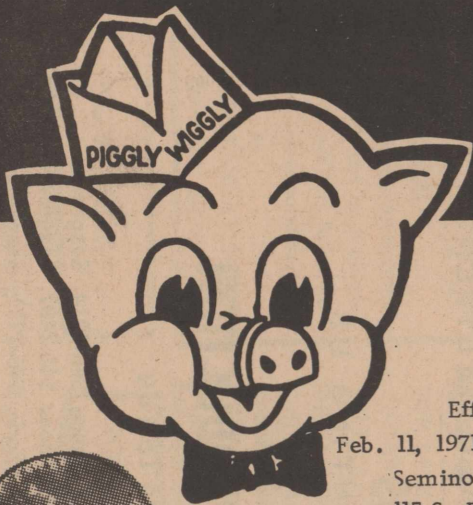

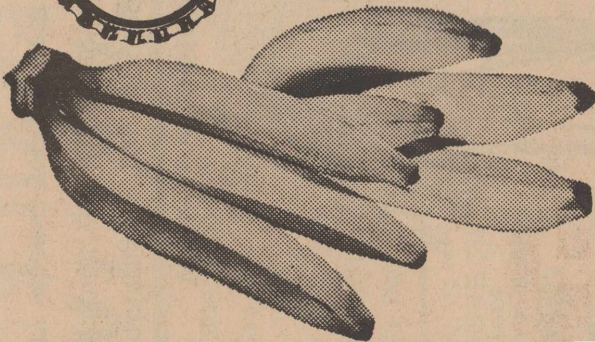

IN DECEMBER, SEMINOLE HAD 3,545 TELEPHONES IN SERVICE, HARRY SAWYER, MANAGER FOR SOUTHWESTERN BELL TELEPHONE COMPANY, SAID TODAY.

REVIEWING TELEPHONE PLANS AND PROGRESS, SAWYER SAID THAT FOR THE DECADE JUST ENDED, SEMINOLE'S TELEPHONE SYSTEM GREW BY 1,300 TELEPHONES -- A 58 PER CENT INCREASE OVER THE 2,245 PHONES IN USE HERE AT THE END OF 1960.

"SEMINOLE PEOPLE TALK MORE, TOO," SAWYER SAID. "IN NOVEMBER OF 1970 A TOTAL OF 14,813 CALLS WERE DIALED HERE ON AN AVERAGE BUSINESS DAY. THIS IS A 12.0 PER CENT INCREASE OVER NOVEMBER OF 1969."

IN THE CENTRAL OFFICE A JOB IS SCHEDULED TO EXPAND THE MOBILE TELEPHONE FACILITIES. IN ADDITION, DIAL SWITCHING EQUIPMENT WILL BE ADDED TO PROVIDE FOR 200 NEW TELEPHONE NUMBERS FOR ANTICIPATED GROWTH. SAWYER SAID A \$114.1 MILLION CONSTRUCTION BUDGET HAS BEEN SET FOR THE COMPANY'S SAN ANTONIO AREA, OF WHICH SEMINOLE IS A PART. THE AREA COVERS THE WESTERN HALF OF TEXAS, EXTENDING FROM AMARILLO TO BROWNSVILLE AND FROM WACO TO THE BIG BEND.

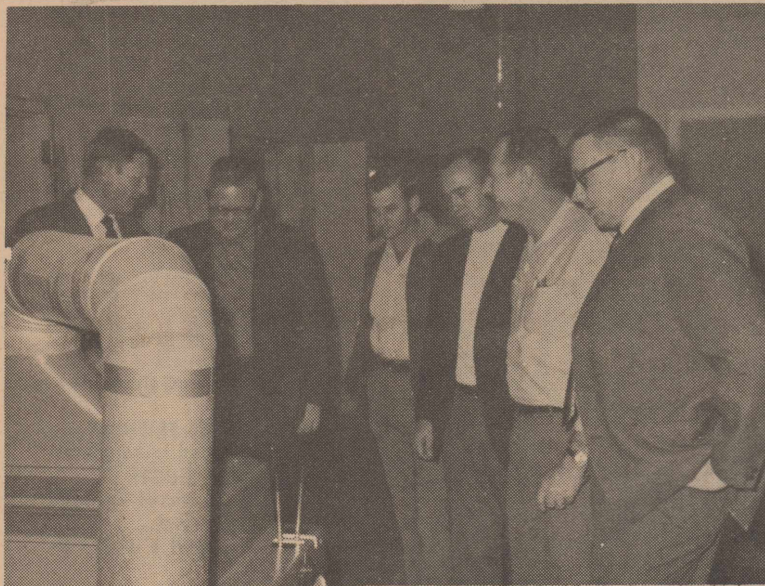

SCHOOL BOARD

School Board members visited the Industrial Arts Building Monday night for the first part of their meeting. The group is looking over the new planer machine purchased this year for the Industrial Arts Department.

2. In other action, the resignation of Neal Aten was accepted as high school custodian and Hiram Bingham was employed.

3. The board turned down the request of the Classroom Teachers Association to use one day of their sick leave each year to perform personal obligations which cannot be handled during the time when employees are on duty. Some reasons given for the request were (1) funerals of close friends, (2) personal business such as estate settlement, (3) employing of professional help that is not available in our town such as CPA and tax attorney, and (4) subpoenaed as witness in court of law. It was pointed out that usually these things could be worked out without making this a school policy by a teacher paying a substitute.

4. Burglar insurance was given an okay by the board for the safes and vaults on school property. It was pointed out that this type insurance had gone up about fifty percent over the past year.

5. The band department was given permission to buy the following items at a cost of \$111.25: two Teltac Metronomes - \$30.00, one Seth Thomas Electric Metronome #1110 - \$25.00, and one 18" paper cutter - \$31.25.

6. All principals and assistant principals were given new two year contracts until August 1973, along with the athletic director and football coach. The coach's salary was raised from \$12,500 to \$13,250.

7. The Avenue B Church of Christ was given permission to use the junior high gym every Thursday night to play volleyball.

8. Texas Public School Week will be March 1 through 5 with Open House March 2.

9. The enrollment on February 5, 1971 was 2030, compared to 2129 on February 6, 1970 and 13 in kindergarten.

10. The board is in the process of appointing a committee to study the availability of on the job training. It is hoped that jobs will be available in different fields for students who need to work and can work for school credits and on the job training.

SCHOOL FARM NEWS

Mr. Hollis Shults, Vocational Agriculture teacher, and Virgil Keyes, Principal, reported to the school board on Monday night that of 305 boys in high school 11.8% are in vocational agriculture classes at present. This compares to 304 boys in high school in 1969-70, 10.8% and 303 boys in high school in 1968-69, 8.9%. In 1969 and 1970 15.8% of all boys graduating will have had one or more courses in vocational agriculture. On a five year average of 270 boys graduating, 19.2% have had one or more courses in vocational agriculture.

They pointed out that the first year courses are animal science, soil science, plant science, agricultural mechanics, supervised experience programs and records and leadership training. Second year courses are animal science, soil science, agriculture mechanics, supervised experience programs and records and leadership. Third year courses are animal science, soil science, plant science, agricultural mechanics, agricultural management, supervised experience programs and records and leadership.

The motto of the Future Farmers of America is Learning to Do, Doing to Learn, Earning to Live, and Living to Serve. On the school farm four boys in 1970 farmed 20 acres of cotton and 30 acres of milo each. This year this tillable land will probably be divided up among five boys. The school farm has available pigs, lambs and calves for boys to purchase for their projects. This year there are three boys with lamb projects and three boys with pig projects at the farm. The livestock at the farm is used to practice judging and grading when students are training for judging teams. Boys in classes are used to dehorn calves, tattoo calves, spray livestock for parasites, dock lambs, ear notch pigs and castrate livestock on the school farm.

INDUSTRIAL ARTS NEWS

David Shuler and David Anderson, along with Principal V.N. Keyes, reported to the school board last Monday evening that of 305 boys in school in 1970-71, 52.1% are in industrial arts classes.

**Juan Mercadal, Classical Guitarist, to Perform
In Lubbock Symphony Orchestra Concert**

Lubbock—The Lubbock Symphony Orchestra presents the second concert of the season Monday, February 22nd, at the Municipal Auditorium adjacent to the Texas Tech University Campus. Conducted by William A. Harrod, the program will feature the magnificent violin artistry of Dona Lee Cherry and Juan Mercadal, master of the classical guitar.



Juan Mercadal was born February 12, 1925 in Guanabacoa, a town four miles from Havana. When he was five years old, he began his guitar studies with his father and later continued with his father's teacher, Dr. Severino Lopez. He showed interest in the guitar at the early age of two when he would stay close beside his father and the teacher, lying on the floor listening to them rather than out playing elsewhere. He was educated at the Escolapios College in Havana. His music education was completed at the Conservatory of Mateu.

His first stage appearance was at the age of six and his first formal recital was at the age of 13. He studied French horn with Manuel Zaeczumaga and played the French horn with the Havana Symphony Orchestra when he was 15 years old. In his native Cuba, he performed extensively for almost all the music clubs and music societies.

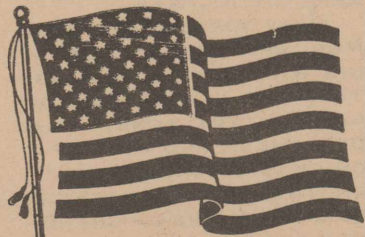
Mr. Mercadal has performed recitals and radio concerts in Brazil and was soloist with the Brazilian Symphony Orchestra. One of the most distinguished Brazilian composers, Radames Gnattali, a good friend of Mercadal, composed a concerto for him that was premiered in Rio de Janeiro with the Brazilian Symphony Orchestra in 1953. Composer Terig Tucci also has written several compositions for him.

In Argentina Mr. Mercadal played a series of 17 television concerts—most unusual for commercial television—on Channel 13 in Buenos Aires.

Juan Mercadal has performed with the Miami Philharmonic, with the Jacksonville Philharmonic, and with Fort Meyers and the Florida West Coast Symphony Orchestra, Sarasota, Florida. He has performed with the University of Miami Orchestra, and has performed most chamber music that includes the guitar. Together with Victor Stern, Violist, (Stern—Mercadal Viola-Guitar Duo) he has performed extensively both original and adapted repertoire.

The program February 22nd will be the third in the 1970-71 concert series presented by the Lubbock Symphony.

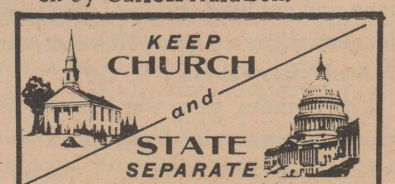
2. Committee heads have been set up and were encouraged to get their committees appointed and in workable condition by the next meeting date, March 9th.

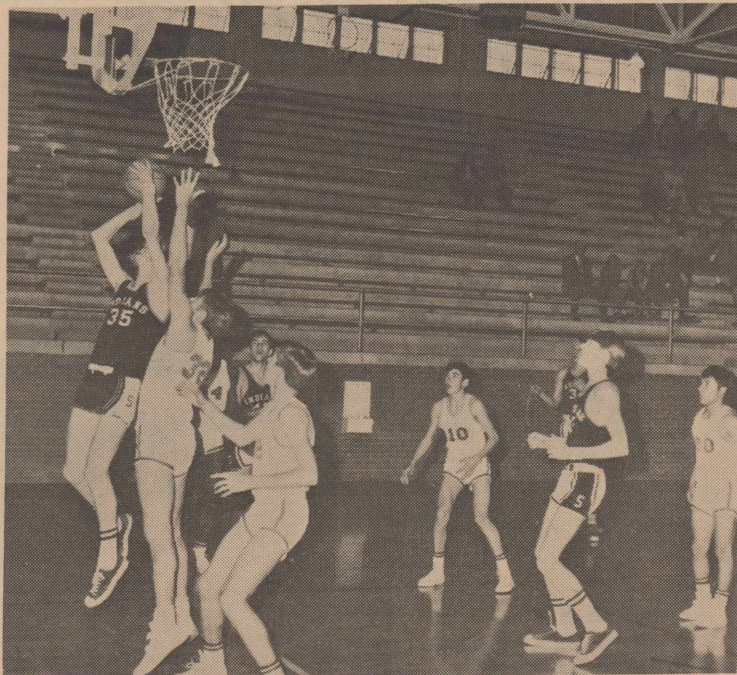


How's this for a basketball shot? Larry Jackson came back to play again after being injured last Friday night in Pecos.

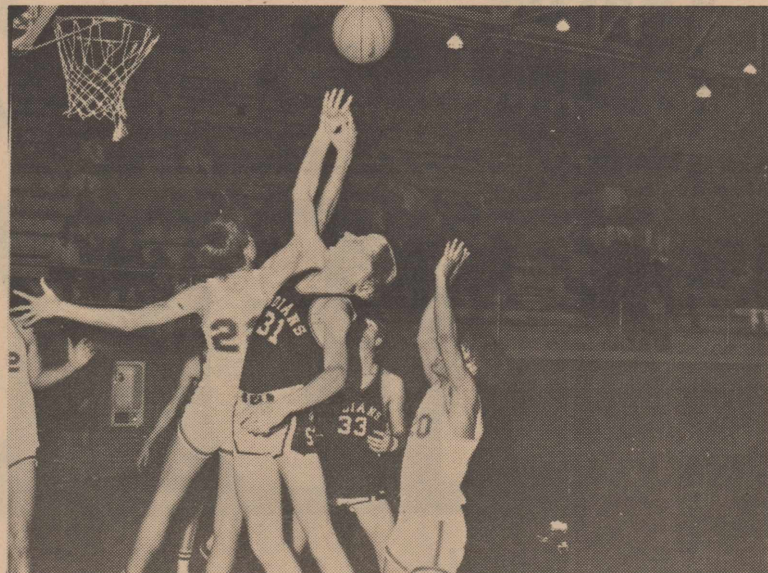

Montandon scored 8 points for the freshmen, Jordan 7, Mason 6, Hughes 4 and Carson and Lilly 2 each.

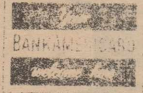


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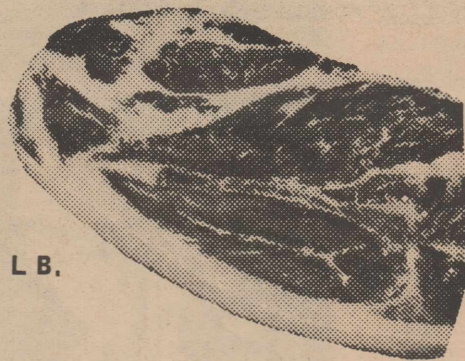
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
