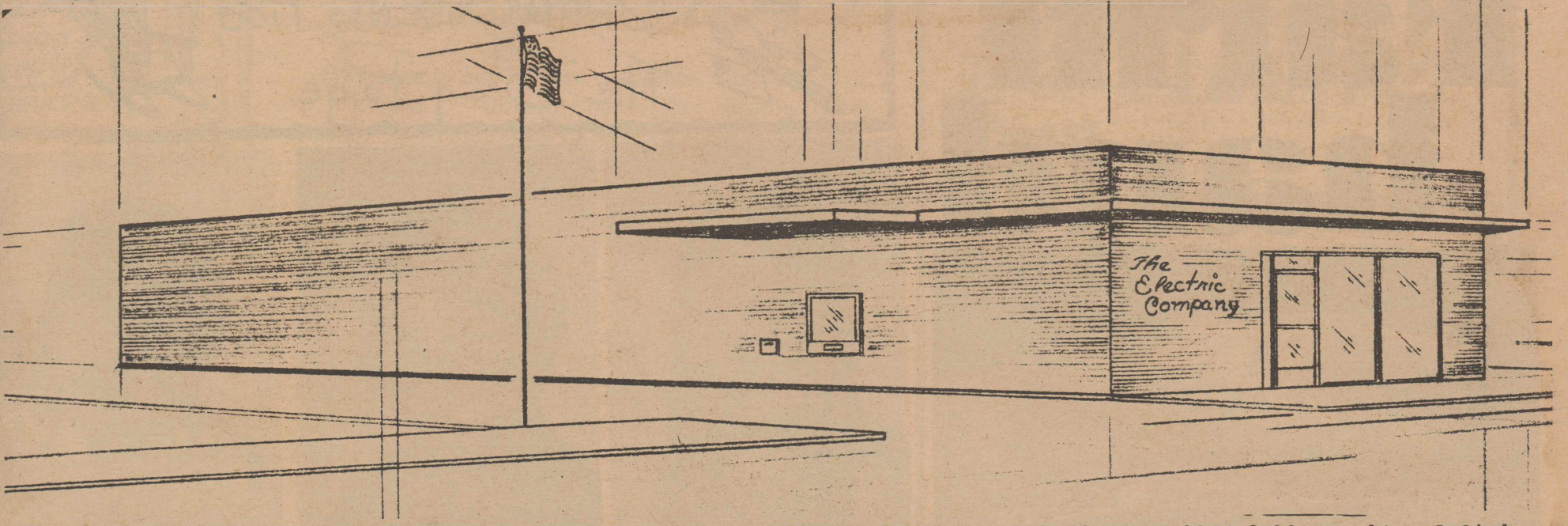


NEW LOCATION FOR SOUTHWESTERN PUBLIC SERVICE



Southwestern Public Service Company, furnishing electric service to this area, is building a new 2,040 sq. ft. office at the corner of S. W. 2nd Street and Ave. C. It's the location that's been cleaned off east and across the street from the Joe Dennis residence and south of the post office. The new office, according to Bob Whippo, district manager, will house seven people, six other than himself; Viola Fitzgerald and Sue Cristy, bookkeepers and cashiers; Jeff Wiggins, district engineer, moving here from Seagraves; Tom Wynn, engineer estimator, also from Seagraves; Jimmie Pierson and Jimmy Baker, servicemen. The leasee will be Hyle Doss. Barnes & Hitch will build the new structure. It is scheduled to be completed August 1, 1971. The building, setting on the corner, will face north. It will be complemented with a drive-in window, a meeting room and a coffee bar. The company district will include Seminole, Seagraves, Denver City, Wellman and Loop, serving approximately 6700 accounts. "How long have we been in the present location? At least since 1949 when I moved here." The new building will not only be a good addition to Seminole but will be such an added attraction where an old building had been torn down to make room for it. In making the announcement to move, Mr. Whippo went on to say that an open house announcement will follow when the new quarters are ready.

Consequently the reaction was in way of great elation and jubilation when a follow-up short distance phone call to Miss Wescott brought the favorable reply. Miss Wescott is the husband of Mrs. Bill Wescott of Seminole.

The public will doubtless receive the news of Miss Wescott's forthcoming emergence from retirement with eager anticipation. Certainly this will be the case with all who saw her in person when two years ago she gained the enthusiastic plaudits of the audience, as well as the judges, in capturing the title of "Miss America" in the Lions Club sponsored "Miss America" pageant. to maintaining unaltered her classically proportioned figure, and to according her complexion the care essential to maintaining its creamy softness. They also note that her unique ability to captivate an audience with her talent remains as great as ever. In this respect, at the request of the pageant committee, Miss Wescott has agreed to perform once again her memorable titillating rendition of "Harper Valley PTA". All whose pleasure it was to witness her stirring and sterling version of this smash, gold record hit, will doubtless relish the opportunity to see and hear this encore performance. And certainly anyone whose misfortune it was not to be present on that earlier occasion will be desirous of making every effort to get a seat as close to the front of the auditorium as possible to take full advantage of this second chance.

Since Stephanie Jones, Miss Sluminole of 1968, will be unable to attend the pageant and crown her successor, Miss Wescott has also graciously consented to undertake this ceremonial function. Miss Jones, in declining an invitation to appear, expressed her sincere regret, explaining that she would on that date be participating in spring training, as a member of the West Texas State Buffalo football team. Had Miss Jones been able to come, pageant planners could conceivably have been confronted, however, with something of a quandary as to whether she should also be requested to perform her talent winning number. Miss Jones, in the course of her 1968 presentation, managed to divest herself of the greater portion of her attire, provoking in the process an appearance by local police officers, who finally escorted her from the stage. As it developed she was subsequently released in time to hear the announcement of her selection as the first Miss Sluminole, and to be honored at the concluding ceremony of coronation. Miss Wescott's number, brilliant though it is, is nevertheless of an essentially uncontro- versial character.

This second staging of the Miss Sluminole Pageant is set for 8 p. m. on April 1st, at the high school auditorium. Tickets are \$1.00 for adults and 50¢ for students. The pageant is being sponsored by the Gaines County Unit of the American Cancer Society, and all proceeds will go to the society for use in its battle against cancer. Miss Wescott has generously expressed her desire to contribute what normally would be a very substantial fee for such an appearance to the benefit of this cause.

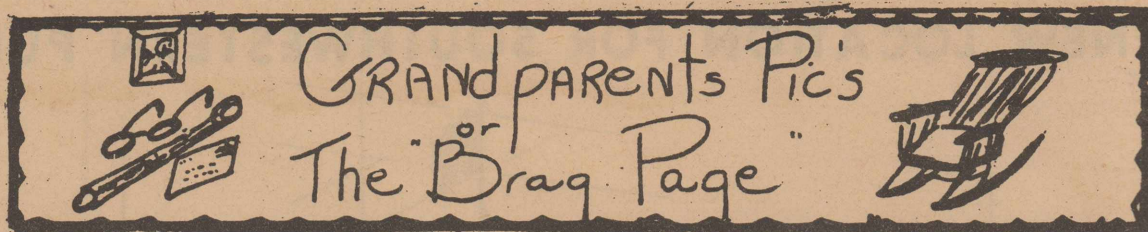

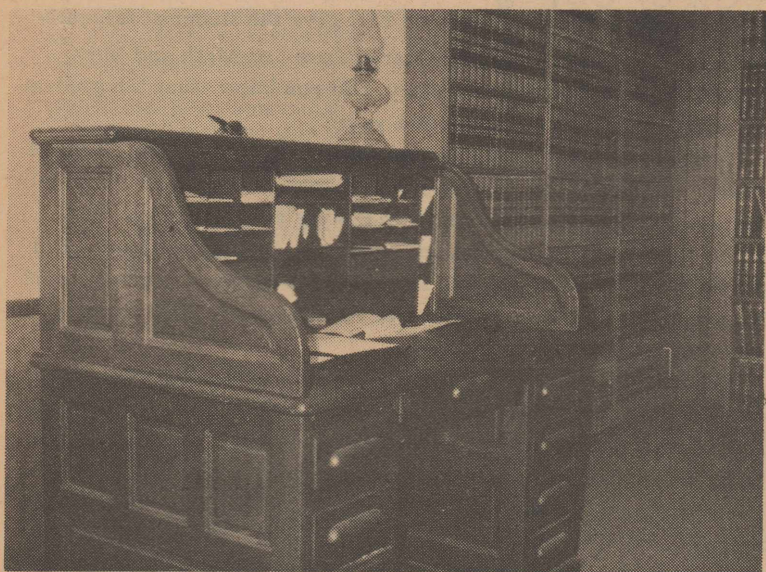

In sight reading only one school made a No. 2, three made No. 3, (Seminole one of them) and four made No. 5.

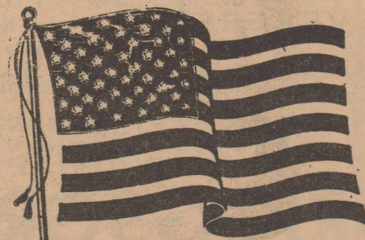
SEAGRAVES RESIDENT BURIED

Survivors include his wife, Essie, four brothers and four sisters.

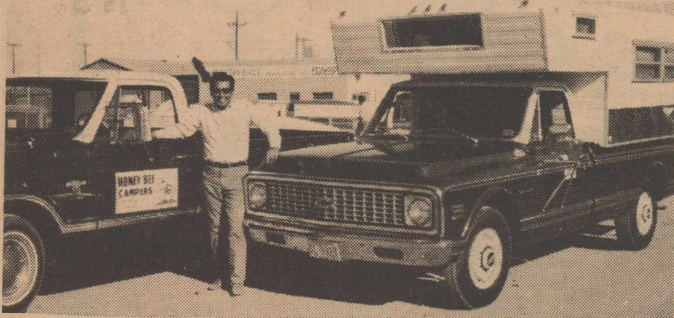

Now, I'm pleased that our adult children that have left Seminole have fond memories of volleyball, basketball, football, track, tennis and also there's a few others. There's choral, band, speech, future teachers, future homemakers, future farmers, student council, senior plays, junior plays, one act plays and library council. It's no great mystery to me that a family of four has to have two cars, it takes one car for taxi service. As I said before, I believe in involvement but add to this list reading, writing and arithmetic and somebody somewhere is involved.

Where's the time, when is the time for involvement in the family circle? It gets harder for students to find time to do their homework, help with the dishes, clean the house, mow the yard and carry out the trash. How many of our children are involved in going to church? Being regular in Sunday School attendance? Or have had the time to enjoy a good book? How many of our kids are involved in trying to please their mothers and their fathers? How many of our kids are involved in sitting down to three meals a day? No wonder they don't recognize authority in the house, some go for extended periods without seeing the head of the household. "No, we don't eat breakfast at our house, no one wants to eat breakfast." How many of your kids are involved in eating a noon day meal with parents? It's 6 p.m. The father comes dragging in. The mother's lying on the divan. "Let's eat a sandwich. Mary's gone to the ballgame. Johnny's leaving to practice, he doesn't have time to eat." He's involved!

It seems to me that we'd better get back to the old adage - reading, writing and arithmetic, taught to the tune of a hickory stick! That we'd better start teaching our daughters to sew again, to cook again, to be responsible for little brothers and sisters again. That we'd better teach our sons full enjoyment of having done a day's work, of having earned a day's wages with the bending of a back and enjoying the strength of a hand that is calloused with honest toil. Involve them, YES, but not in all play!

2. A report was given on the detachment of school district territory and equalization tax. Representative E. L. Short will be notified by the Board of their opposition to House Bill #1441 which concerns division of the county-wide equalization tax.

3. Dress Police #2387 was discussed at length.

4. The trustee election is April 3rd.

5. Our enrollment on March 19, 1971 was 2014, compared to 2088 on March 20, 1970.
