It was believed after the hard freeze that maybe as many as 90% of the peaches had been frozen but a report on Tuesday offered an encouragement of maybe 35 to 40% survived the 25 degree weather.

School Board

The Seminole Board of education met Monday night and reorganized the school board after the re-election of Glen Cavitt and Leon Foote. Horace Jones and Rayford Bates exchanged jobs in the election - Horace Jones, president; Rayford Bates, secretary.

2. The board voted to employ the firm of Stiles, Roberts and Messersmith to look into the remodeling of the present homemaking facilities. This department was built in about 1947 for approximately 60 students and one teacher. The department presently averages 118 students with two teachers.

3. Barry Norton, commissioner of Precinct 3, asked for a new location for a caliche pit on the southwest corner of the school farm. He was granted a location up to 3 acres with no charge for caliche, the only stipulation being no resale of caliche, the board pointing out how well the commissioners court had served the bus route roads and other areas for the school.

4. Mr. Bramlett, Superintendent, pointed out that the budget for the new school year would be ready for study April 26. That meeting will begin at 7 p. m. in the Junior High Library where that portion of the school's activity will be explained to the group. May meetings will begin at 8 p. m.

5. Teachers were granted their request to wear coordinated slack suits that present a professional appearance.

6. The lease agreement with Ford Motor Company, Tractor Division, for 51014C Diesel tractor and cultivator for the school farm at a cost of \$617.58 and B1022A tractor with flair mower for maintenance at a cost of \$375.50.

7. The trustees approved of participating in United States Department of Agriculture commodities for 1971-72 at a per capita cost of 40¢ per annum per capita recipient, at a cost of \$448.80.

8. Faye Starkey was hired as a two-hour cafeteria employee to replace Wilma Allen. She was recommended by Mrs. Betty Davis.

9. The 7th grade athletic dressing room program was discussed, also air conditioning for the balance of the school rooms that do not have them.

10. Dale Earl had sent in a request for the fire department to hold a volleyball tournament for both men and women on May 6, 7, and 8. Request granted.

11. The District 2AAA Literary events will be held in the Seminole High School Friday, April 16. Students will be dismissed on this date.

12. The Regional Volleyball Play-Off will be held in Lubbock on April 17. The first game will be at 12 noon, second game at 1 p. m. and the finals at 4 p. m. Four teams will be present.

13. Regional Literary, Track, Tennis, Golf, etc. will be held at Odessa College on April 23-24.

14. Our enrollment on April 8, 1971 was 2025 as compared with 2075 on April 9, 1970.

3. Charles Squires was appointed to make a planned study concerning the Board of City Development, as the chamber is still in dire need of financing.

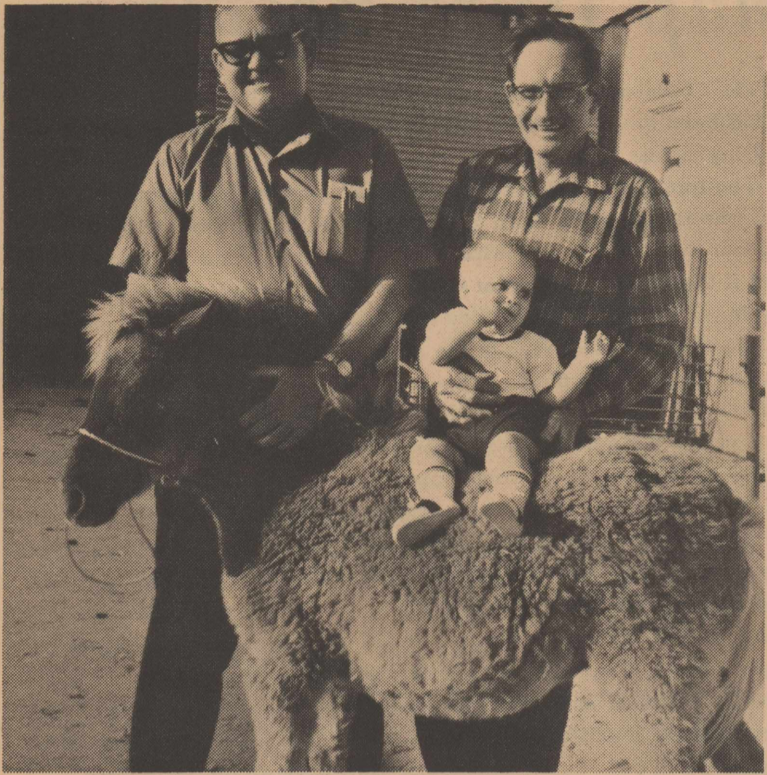

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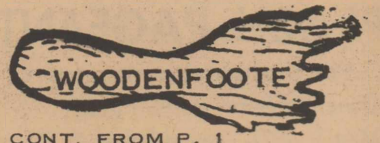

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NEWS RELEASE GAINES COUNTY FARM BUREAU

FARMERS AND RANCHERS ARE BEING URGED BY VESTER SMITH OF LOOP, TEXAS, PRESIDENT OF THE GAINES COUNTY FARM BUREAU, TO LET THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT KNOW HOW PROPOSED FARM TRUCK DRIVER REGULATIONS WOULD AFFECT THEIR OPERATIONS. LETTERS SHOULD BE ADDRESSED TO JOHN A. VOLPE, SECRETARY, U.S. DEPT. OF TRANSPORTATION, WASHINGTON, D.C., 20515, SMITH SAID.

PROPOSED U.S. DEPT. OF TRANSPORTATION REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO FARM TRUCK DRIVER QUALIFICATIONS WILL BECOME EFFECTIVE ON JULY 1 UNLESS FARMERS AND RANCHERS CAN CONVINCE THE GOVERNMENT THAT THEY SHOULD NOT BE PUT INTO EFFECT. THE REGULATIONS WERE SCHEDULED FOR LAST JANUARY 1, BUT WERE POSTPONED TO PERMIT FARM BUREAU AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS TO STUDY THE REGULATIONS AND FILE STATEMENTS.

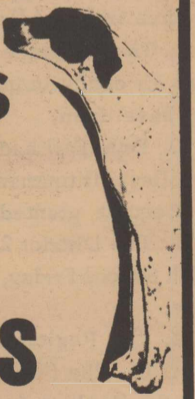
THE REGULATIONS WOULD AFFECT DRIVERS OF ALL FARM TRUCKS--INCLUDING PICKUP TRUCKS, SMITH SAID. ALTHOUGH THE NEW REGULATIONS WOULD BE APPLICABLE TO INTERSTATE COMMERCE, RECENT COURT DECISIONS INDICATE THAT THE INTERSTATE COMMERCE CLAUSE APPLIES TO ANYTHING AND EVERYTHING WHICH MIGHT AT SOME TIME ENTER INTERSTATE COMMERCE, SMITH SAID.

THE LOCAL FARM LEADER SAID THAT FARM TRUCK DRIVERS HAVE AN EXCELLENT SAFETY RECORD. IN TEXAS, FOR EXAMPLE, THE AMOUNT OF BODILY INJURY CLAIMS PAID PER FARM TRUCK POLICY IS ONLY ONE-TENTH OF THE AMOUNT OF BODILY INJURY CLAIMS PAID PER POLICY FOR ALL NON-FLEET COMMERCIAL TRUCKS, HE SAID.

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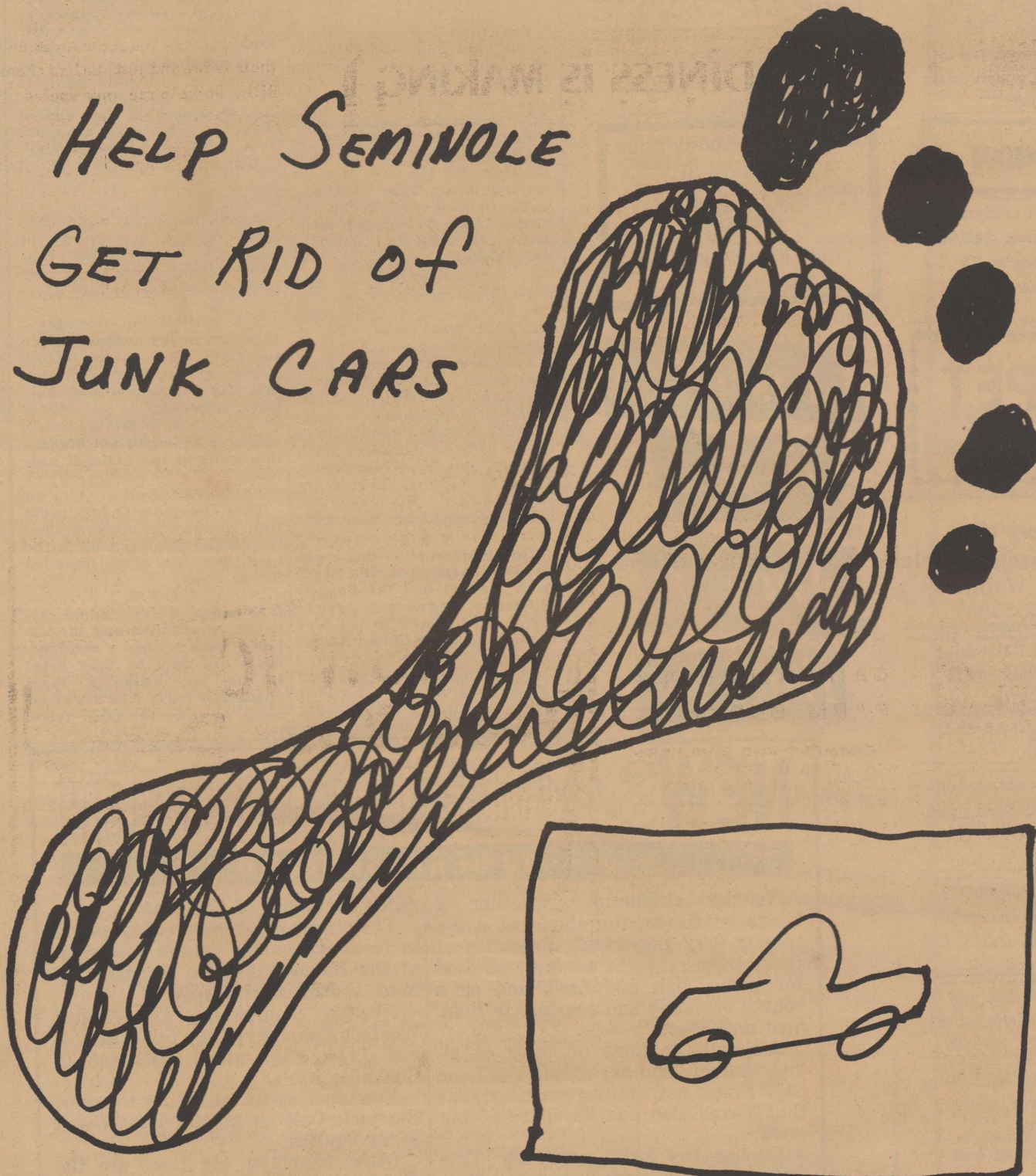

COLLEGE STATION

COLLEGE STATION, APRIL 1--THE TEXAS ANIMAL HEALTH COMMISSION HAS ORDERED A 60-DAY RESTRICTION ON THE MOVEMENT OF SWINE IN TEXAS, EFFECTIVE MARCH 29, TO CONTROL HOG CHOLERA.

THE MOVEMENT OF ALL FEEDER AND BREEDER SWINE WITHIN THE STATE WILL BE ALLOWED ONLY PERMITS ISSUED AFTER INSPECTION OF THE HERD FROM WHICH THEY ORIGINATE.

HOGS FOR SLAUGHTER CAN MOVE TO A PACKING HOUSE OR TO A PUBLIC MARKET WITHOUT INSPECTION AND WITHOUT WRITTEN PERMITS, ACCORDING TO WOODROW W. BAILEY, EXTENSION LIVESTOCK AND MEATS SPECIALIST. HE CAUTIONED PRODUCERS THAT HOGS LEAVING THE FARM WITHOUT A PERMIT MUST BE HEADED FOR SLAUGHTER.

ONCE AT THE MARKET THEY CAN'T BE LEGALLY TAKEN HOME OR SOLD AS FEEDERS. OFFENDERS ARE SUBJECT TO FINES, ACCORDING TO BAILEY.

BAILEY ALSO SAID THAT ANY SPECIAL BREEDER OR FEEDER SALES MUST BE CLEARED WITH AUTHORITIES IN THE ANIMAL HEALTH COMMISSION. WRITTEN PERMISSION CAN BE GRANTED WITH CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS, INCLUDING ON THE FARM INSPECTION.

HOGS GOING TO SHOWS MUST BE INSPECTED ON THE FARM, EARMARKED OR TAGGED, AND ACCOMPANIED BY A WRITTEN PERMIT.

BAILEY ADDED THAT HOGS CAN BE MOVED ONE TIME WITH NO DIVERSION ENROUTE FROM ONE FARM TO ANOTHER IF THEY ARE INSPECTED ON THE FARM AND MOVED UNDER PERMIT.

THE USDA ANNOUNCED MARCH 24 THAT PRODUCERS MAY NO LONGER REMOVE APPARENTLY HEALTHY ANIMALS FROM THEIR SWINE HERDS INFECTED BY OR EXPOSED TO HOG CHOLERA.

OFFICIALS OF THE USDA ANIMAL HEALTH DIVISION SAY THAT ALL ANIMALS EXPOSED FROM INFECTED OR EXPOSED HERDS MUST BE DESTROYED BY BURIAL, RENDERING OR SPECIAL PROCESSING. HERD OWNERS ARE PAID STATE AND FEDERAL INDEMNITIES TO HELP COMPENSATE FOR LOSSES.

UNDER THE OLD SALVAGE PROCEDURE, ALL ANIMALS FROM INFECTED OR EXPOSED HERDS WERE EXAMINED BY ANIMAL HEALTH OFFICIALS. THOSE SHOWING NO SIGNS OF HOG CHOLERA COULD BE SENT OUT FOR IMMEDIATE SLAUGHTER.

WITH SALVAGE THERE WAS NO DANGER TO HUMAN HEALTH IF TRACES OF HOG CHOLERA VIRUS SHOWED UP IN CONSUMABLE PORK PRODUCTS. HOWEVER, THERE WAS THE RISK OF SPREADING THE INFECTION TO SUSCEPTIBLE HOGS.

THE 60-DAY TEXAS RESTRICTION AND THE DISCONTINUING OF THE SALVAGE PROCEDURE ARE DESIGNED TO HELP IN THE COMPLETE ERADICATION OF HOG CHOLERA BY THE DECEMBER 1972 TARGET DATE.

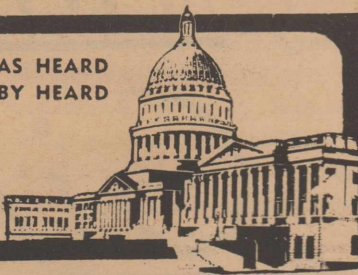

WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS
AS HEARD BY HEARD



The Road Turns

There is an old saying, it is a long road that never ends.

For quite some time the concern of government has largely been what might be called big business.

But there is now coming about a growing awareness that if people are to have jobs, big business is not the answer.

A benchmark in this new trend will be registered in Washington, D.C. on December 15 when for the first time in national history, the chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers will meet with representatives of small and independent business.

This meeting, the first of a series of quarterly meetings with Dr. Paul McCracken was arranged by President Nixon at a conference with small business leaders. At that time Wilson Johnson, president of the National Federation of Independent Business asked for a closer entente between small business and the White House. The President responded by instructing Dr. McCracken to hold these quarterly meetings.

The significance of this could be easily overlooked, due largely to the fact that the Council of Economic Advisers is a fairly recent development in the government of these United States.

Calvin Coolidge, for example, would have been puzzled if such a group had been recommended during his administration.

But that was before the American economy became so tied to that of the world. Because of the many complex problems that this involves, the Council of Economic Advisers has become most important to any President of the United States in formulating the economic policies of the nation.

However, there developed a system not unlike the old saying that the Cabots spoke only to the Lodges. The Council of Economic Advisers were concerned solely with the trends in big business.

But with rising unemployment, increasing automation, skyrocketing welfare costs, there has come about the realization that small and independent business, employing 60 per cent of all who work in private enterprises, is an important foundation stone of the national welfare.

Thus, December 15, 1970, could well go down in economic history as the turning point in the road that has been travelled for so long.

A closer understanding between government and the nation's independent entrepreneurs can only be most helpful to all, including those youngsters today who are about ready to enter the labor force.

NEWS for OUTDOORSMEN

To the outdoorsman, whether he hunts or fishes, the shade of a big tree is very important. Branches of these trees serve as a supply of food for game, fish and fowl, and as a source of shade and comfort to man, bird and beast.

Although millions of acres of almost barren land are within the Lone Star State, not many persons realize that Texas also has its share of big trees.

During the past year Big Tree sleuths have recorded almost a hundred species of trees, a third of which are recognized in the national register as the largest in the nation.

American Forestry Assn. keeps the register.

Within the past year, the sleuths have discovered a record breaking Long Leaf Pine in Texas. It is in Sabine County in East Texas and measures 111½ inches in circumference at 4½ feet above the ground. That's nine feet, three and one-half inches around! It is 134 feet high above the ground level and has a crown diameter of 34 feet. Until this tree was measured for national competition, an Alabama one held the championship. Surprisingly, this new record breaker can be seen at a popular roadside park on SH 184, five miles northwest of Hemphill.

The Texas Sophora (Coral Bean champion) is on the Kaolin ranch, 4½ miles west of Leakey, off Ranch Road 337.

Texas now has a Black Tupelo champion on the east bank of Eight Mile Creek, near the Harrison-Panola County line. Mississippi formerly held this champion.

A new Allegheny Chinquapin of monster size is found on FM 2022, 10 miles northeast of Crockett.

The champion Pyramid Magnolia is in Newton County, behind the office of the Newton Wildlife Kingdom, 10 miles southeast of Jasper.

Newton County has the largest Western Soapberry, two miles east of FM 1414, 6½ miles southeast of Burkville.

Newton County also has the new Bluejack Oak champ on East Court St. in Newton.

Other champion big trees are the Water Tupelo, 12½ miles northeast of Bon Wier; Bitterroot Hickory, 12 miles north of Bon Wier; Carolina Laurel Cherry, eight miles north of Burkville; Overcup Oak, seven miles north of Martinsville; White Fringetree, near Magnolia Springs; and a Silk Tree and Black Locust, located in the town of Jasper.

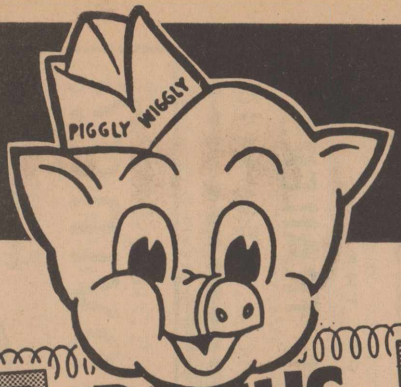
Among the other state champions are Southern Red Oak, Angelina County; Black Cherry, Jasper County; Hercules Club, Austin County; Osage Orange, Bowie County; Loblolly Pine, Rusk County.

Newton County also boasts of the remaining nine Texas Champs. They are American Beech, Eastern Hophornbeam, Chinaberry, Mockernut Hickory, American Hornbeam, Swamp Chestnut, Post Oak, Yellow Poplar and Red Maple.

With more than 200 species of trees in Texas, the Texas Forest Service at College Station is looking for additional champs. They are working with owners to preserve the trees as landmarks and to stimulate greater interest in trees.

A list of these big trees is available from the Texas Forest Service. It should be of interest to all Texans who love the outdoors.

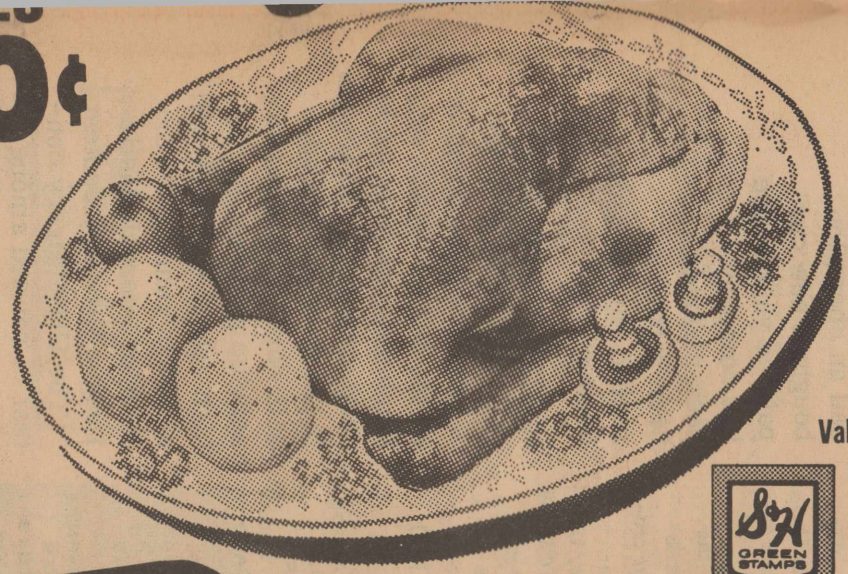

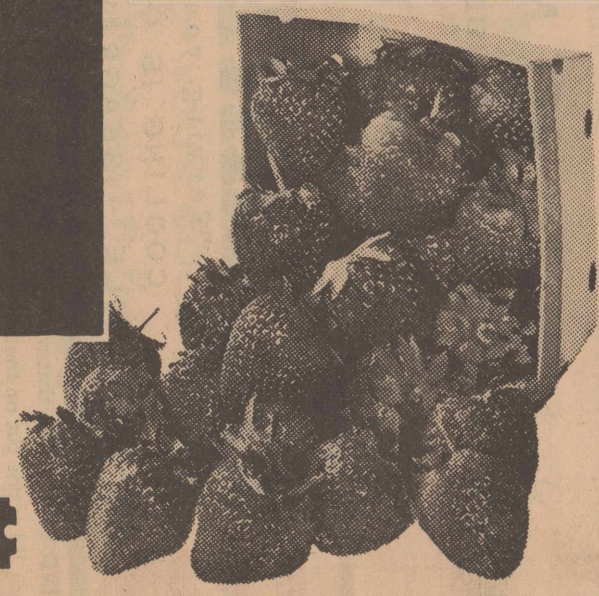

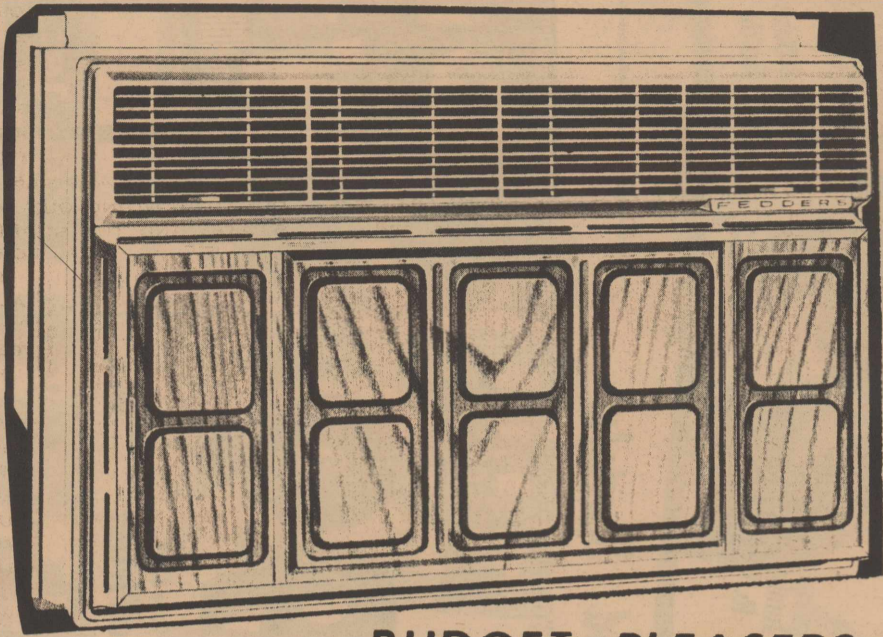

EACH SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFICIARY WHO HAS MEDICARE COVERAGE SHOULD HAVE RECEIVED A BOOKLET ENTITLED, "YOUR MEDICARE HANDBOOK". THIS BOOKLET CONTAINS A WEALTH OF INFORMATION, AND SHOULD BE HELPFUL TO BENEFICIARIES IN UNDERSTANDING WHAT SERVICES ARE COVERED AND HOW TO CLAIM PAYMENT.

ALL OF YOU WHO HAVE BOUGHT INSURANCE POLICIES KNOW HOW IMPORTANT IT IS ALWAYS TO HAVE A COPY OF THE POLICY AVAILABLE. THE POLICY ITSELF TELLS WHAT IT COVERS AND WHAT THE BENEFITS ARE AND HOW TO CLAIM THEM. FOR MEDICARE BENEFICIARIES THE MEDICARE HANDBOOK DOES THE SAME THING. IT TELLS IN DETAIL WHAT IS COVERED AND HOW TO CLAIM BENEFITS. IT IS AS VALUABLE TO HAVE AS A COPY OF AN INSURANCE POLICY.

FOR EXAMPLE, PART B, YOUR MEDICAL INSURANCE (THE DOCTOR BILL PART) IS DISCUSSED ON PAGES 15 THRU 24. IN ADDITION TO LISTS SHOWING SERVICES WHICH ARE, OR ARE NOT COVERED, THERE IS GENERAL INFORMATION CONCERNING DENTAL CARE, AMBULANCES, OUTPATIENT HOSPITAL BENEFITS, AND OTHER RESOURCES THAT BENEFICIARIES WILL WANT TO KNOW ABOUT.

THE FORM TO BE USED WHEN REQUESTING REIMBURSEMENT FOR MEDICAL EXPENSES IS ON PAGE 25. MEDICARE BENEFICIARIES ARE ENCOURAGED TO BRING ITEMIZED BILLS OR RECEIPTED STATEMENTS FROM THEIR DOCTORS TO THE NEAREST SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE WHEN THE FIRST CLAIM IS FILED. THE EMPLOYEES THERE WILL BE HAPPY TO ASSIST IN FILLING IN THE FORM AND FORWARDING YOUR CLAIM FOR PAYMENT.

REPRESENTATIVE SHORT FURTHER QUOTES THE TESTIMONY GIVEN TO HIS COMMITTEE, "THE REASON FOR THIS HUGE DROP IN GAS RESERVES WAS BROUGHT ABOUT BECAUSE SIXTY PERCENT OF TEXAS GAS PRODUCED IS GOING OUT OF STATE, AND THE SUPPLY AND DEMAND IS REACHING A STRATEGIC POINT. SOME COMPANIES TOTAL SALES REPRESENT HIGHER PRICES PAID BY OUT OF STATE BUYERS, THEREFORE, PIPELINE COMPANIES SELLING TO THE TOWNS IN TEXAS ARE BURDENED WITH LONG TERM CONTRACTS TO THE CITIES WITHOUT AMPLG GAS TO DELIVER TO FULFILL THESE CONTRACTS. THE BILL IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES IS DESIGNED TO LET THE RAILROAD COMMISSION ADJUST THE CONTRACTORAL RATES, AND IN EFFECT WOULD VOID THE CITIES AND PIPELINE COMPANIES CONTRACTS. 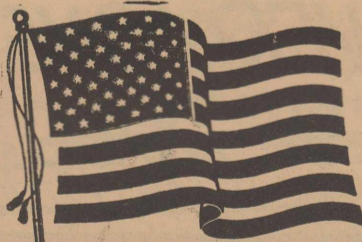
