If there's anything worse than trying to ride a pitching horse, it's trying to ride a pitching mule. If there's anything worse than being bitten by a dog, it's being bitten by a mule. If there's anything worse than being kicked by electricity, it's being kicked by a mule after you thought you trusted him.

If there's anything worse than being awakened by a train bearing down on you, it's the scare of being awakened by a mule and his hee-haw that he only and only him knows about. If there's anything more graceful than a cat rolling over, it's the rolling over of a mule.

William Faulkner once wrote: "He will draw a wagon or a plow but he will not run a race. He will not try to jump anything he does not indubitably know beforehand he can jump; he will not enter any place unless he knows of his own knowledge what is on the other side; he will work for you patiently for ten years for the chance to kick you once."

I'm not sure anyone could work mules and go to Heaven. Finally he flew back too far, stepped into one of those turning discs and it almost cut the heel string on his left back foot.

My brother Paul, being the great farmer he was, simply put the whip to old Jack and made him plow one round on three legs and he whipped him nearly every step of the way.

The father was waiting at the end of the plowed round and Paul was still laying the whip to that crippled mule. The daddy said to his son, "You oughta be ashamed working that mule like that," and the little brother who was hiding in the barn, heard the older brother yell out loud and clear, "I hope he dies! I hope he bleeds to death, I hope this is the last time I ever have to work him."

But, being the mule he was, he got a holiday, lived to work again, kick again, bite again, balk again and run away again. What kind of mule was he? One old timer said "A cussed mule!"

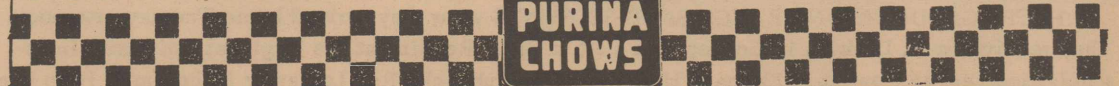

**THE MAGIC OF PRAYER**

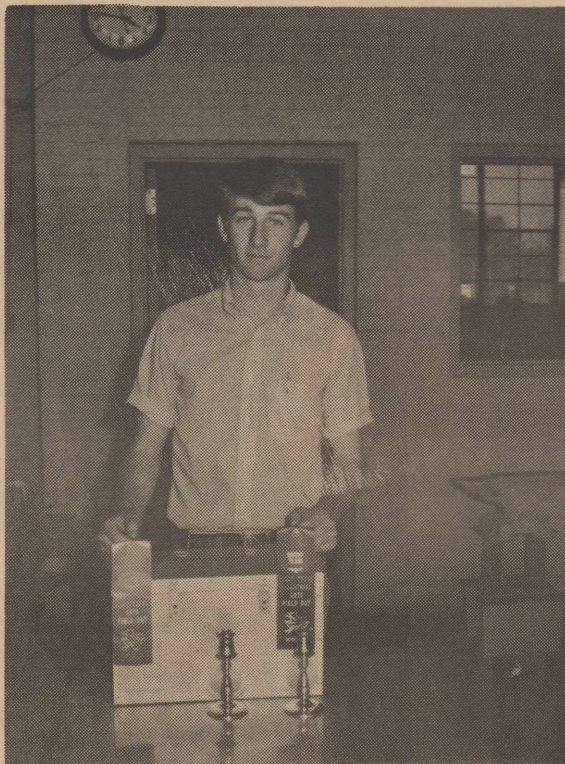

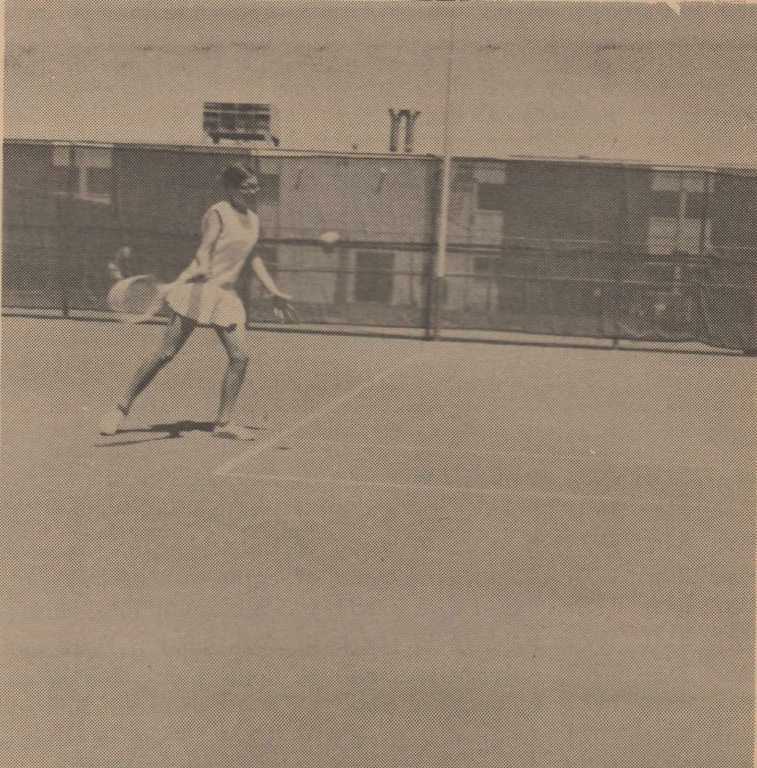
## LONG TIME SEMINOLE RESIDENT BURIED

## School Board Meets

The School Board met Monday night with the staff of the Jr. High School presenting the curriculum activities and policies of that building under the direction of L. L. Moore, principal. They gave this as their Philosophy and General Statement. - - The needs, interests, and abilities of our students should be the controlling factors in determining the curriculum, activities, and policies of the school. It is the duty and privilege of the faculty and community, in cooperation with the students, to find and develop the best in each individual, to lead him through a normal growth and development which will instill in him the fundamental knowledge, skills and tools with which to continue his education throughout adult life, to guide him in establishing personal relationships that are satisfying both to himself and his associates, and to enable him to understand and appreciate the privileges, and assume the responsibilities, of our democratic way of life. - -

2. A summer program for grades 4 thru 12 was discussed and the following program was approved beginning June 7th and ending July 2nd. Students will attend 4 weeks, 5 days per week, 3 hrs. per day for a total of 60 hours. Classes will be held in any field where as many as 10 students sign up. The cost will be \$15.00 per subject to students.

3. The summer recreation program was planned for track, baseball and tennis. These programs usually last 6 to 8 weeks and the sponsor is paid \$100 per week.

4. The swimming pool, it's management, it's opening and closing was discussed and past-over until the next meeting.

5. The procedure was discussed with the board how monies would be borrowed through the local bank in lieu of an estimated \$609, 120.03. This represents a total evaluation of tax due from Amerada Oil Company, Hess Division, Atlantic Richfield and Mobil concerning law suit now pending.

6. Virgil Keyes, principal of the high school was present, giving the following figures on the D.E. and I. C. T. program. He gave the following information. 68 signed as of Monday. 34 in D.E. and 34 in I. C. T. This program would give on the job training to Juniors and Seniors in the high school.

7. Rayford Bates was appointed by the local board and will seek a position on the Texas Association of School Board executive committee that has become vacant.

8. The fireman's volleyball tournament has been re-scheduled for the 13th, 14th and 15th of May due to a conflict in schedule. An O.K. was given by the board.

9. Several School Board members will attend the Texas Tech workshop that begins April 28th in Lubbock and completed the same day.

10. Automatic transmissions for three buses received a no vote because of cost and dust problems in this area.

11. A request was granted to rent a 3M "209" Automatic Copier. The machine will copy everything from ball point signatures, full color pages in bound books and magazines, blueprints, photographs, or anything on paper. The copy will be on white 20# bond paper. Our rental cost will be \$37.50 per month.

12. 88 air conditioning window units were authorized to be put in the primary, elementary, Jr. High and High School buildings. The school is to do it's own installation. The cost of 88 evaporative units will run approximately \$12,000.

13. Mrs. Whippo submitted her resignation effective May 28th and was accepted by the board. She has purchased Allean's Baby Shop and will assume management May 31st.

14. The board O.K. 'd \$1,450.75 worth of football equipment that needed to be ordered in order that it might be received in time for football practice.

15. The Industrial Arts Department was granted approximately \$500 above their budget so that 14 entries could be sent to Austin to the state meet.

The three men served as a panel last Thursday night at Jo's Restaurant on "The Error of Responsibility in Crime Prevention". Sheriff Welch reported to the club that 1034 had been arrested during the calendar year 1970, 91 of those driving while intoxicated. During the year there were 278 wrecks in the county, 23 of them violent. What to do about the terrible jump and rise in crime was discussed. The sheriff reported on his work with juveniles. The county attorney reported how they are handled in juvenile court, trying never to send one to Gatesville.

The following statistics were available from The Texas Business and Professional Woman. "Cost of crime 1968: \$20,980,000,000. Almost 4.5 million crimes were recorded in 1968, a 17 percent rise over 1967 and it is growing at an accelerated ratio each year. The risk of becoming a victim of serious crime increased 16 percent in 1968, with more than two victims per each 100 inhabitants. Firearms were used to commit more than 8900 murders, 65,000 assaults, and 99,000 robberies in 1968. Since 1964 the use of a firearm in murder was up 117%; armed robbery 113%. Daytime burglaries of residences rose 247 percent from 1960 to 1968. Narcotic arrests in 1968 were up 64% over 1967. The percentage of police solutions of serious crimes declined 7% in 1968; since 1960 this aspect of crime fighting has shown an overall decline of 32 percent. Total crime rate (number of offenses per 100,000 Population) up 99% from 1960 through 1968. Crimes of violence (limited to murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) up 106% over the same period.

The three panel members pointed out probably the greatest asset to crime prevention would be for parents to know where their kids are, whose party they are in and how much money they have to spend.

THIS IS WEST TEXAS --- A camera's eye can only see one thing at a time. These seven pieces of pipe hauled in from West Gaines County to Ross Irrigation had six rabbits in them. It was a peculiar load coming down the highway with six rabbit heads sticking out the ends of the pipes. The five pictures tell the story of the protection of the pipe and the rabbits' home. Coyotes and dogs have a terrible time trying to get the cotton-tail rabbits out. This is also the time of the year when teenagers and adults alike stand the pipe up on end to try to shake the rabbits out, only to damage the pipe when it falls and what is much worse is to let it fall on a high line and tragedy strikes, to ruin what started out to be real fun. 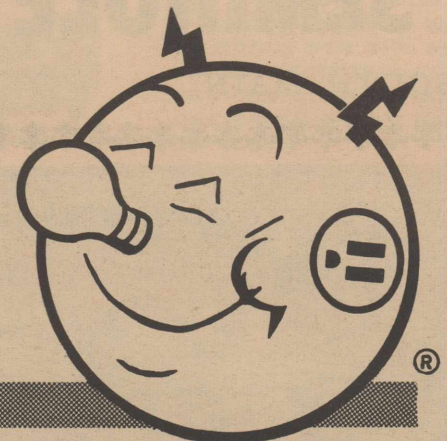

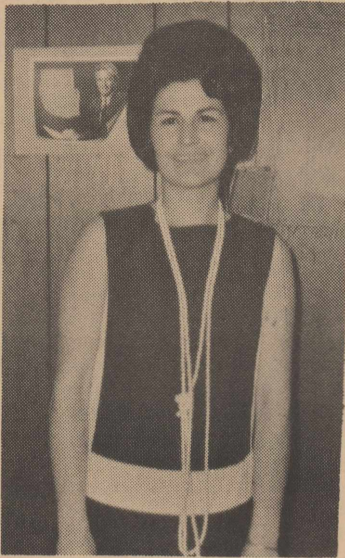

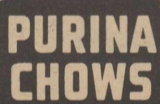
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### 4-H DISTRICT

#### CONTESTS

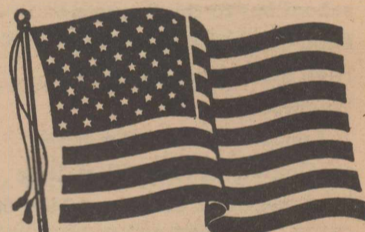

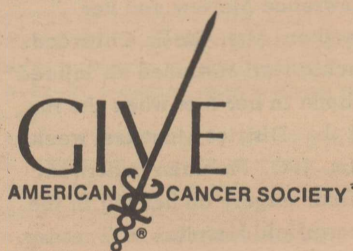
