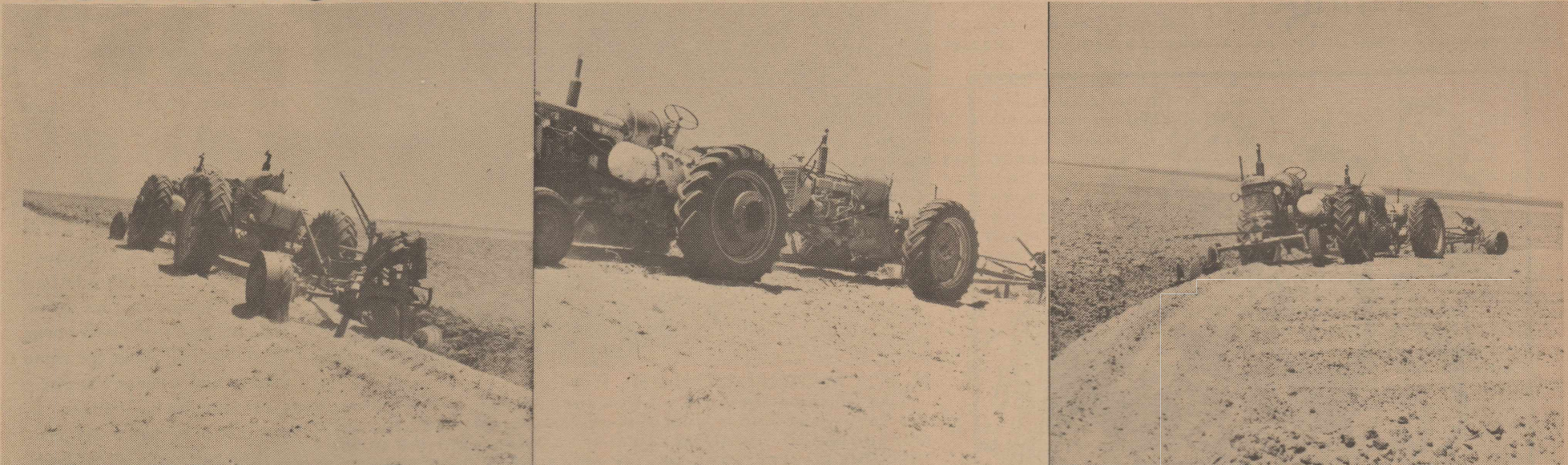


LOOK MA! NO HANDS

There is a guide running in the furrow on the front tractor that keeps the units in a constant circle. There's a kill switch going to the guides to stop the tractors if they get out of the furrow. They've been known to jump out of the furrow and take off across country. However, they're easy to follow because of the furrow that's left behind. SEMINOLE STATE BANK SOLD

Doyle Hankins, President of the Seminole State Bank, has announced his resignation as President of the bank at a special meeting of the board of directors, called Friday, July 9.

The board accepted Hankins resignation as president and elected him Vice Chairman of the Board. Neal Hefner, Chairman of the Board, and J.J. Christmann, Vice President, also announced their resignation at this board meeting.

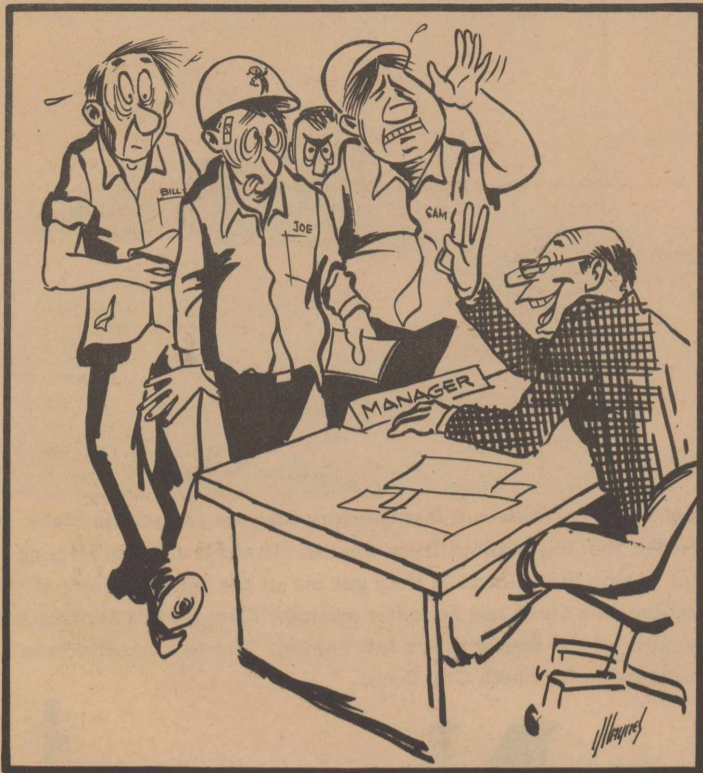
Hankins announced that a majority interest of the Seminole State Bank had been purchased by Jack Daniels and Associates. Jack Daniels is now Chairman of the Board of The First National Bank of Hobbs, and President of Daniels Insurance, Inc. of Hobbs, New Mexico.

Sam Spikes, former Vice President and loan officer of the First National Bank of Hobbs, was elected to the Board of Directors, after which the board elected Spikes Acting Chairman of the Board, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Seminole State Bank. Spikes will assume his duties effective July 12, 1971. The directors will remain the same with Spikes replacing Neal Hefner as chairman. Other directors are Joe W. Anderson, C.R. Cothes, Alton Freeman, Doyle Hankins, J.D. Mitchell and Walker Dearing, Jr.

Spikes, a native of Snyder, Texas, attended Texas Christian University in Fort Worth and is a graduate of the Graduate School of Banking, University of Colorado in Boulder, Colorado. He began his banking career with the West Texas State Bank in Snyder and for two years was with the First National Bank of Grants, New Mexico. Spikes was employed by the Comptroller of the Currency as a National Bank Examiner for four years, the last two of which, he was Examiner-in-Charge of the New Mexico sub-regional office of the 12th National Bank Region, located in Albuquerque. For the past five years Spikes has served as Vice President and Loan Officer and member of the Executive Committee of First National Bank in Hobbs, New Mexico. Spikes is past Secretary and Vice President of the

LAST MONDAY A WATER WELL ON THE ROY DAVIS FARM 7 MILES WEST AND 3 MILES SOUTH CAVED IN. THE PIPE MEASURING 14" IN DIAMETER CAN BE SEEN RUNNING DOWN INTO THE CAVITY. THE CAVITY MEASURING 4' BY 6' AND IS ABOUT 14' DEEP. MANY WATER WELLS PUMPING IN GAINES COUNTY HAVE BASINS BENEATH THEM MEASURING 50 TO 100'. SUCH CAVE-INS AS SEEN IN THE PICTURE ARE UNUSUAL. Hobbs Lea Lions Club, Past Treasurer of the Hobbs Jaycees and Conquestor Council, Oil Patch District of the Boy Scouts of America. He has been an active member of Hobbs United Fund, where he has served as co-chairman of both the commercial and executive divisions. Spikes and his wife, Patty have three children and are members of the First Baptist Church, and plan to move to Seminole immediately.

Spikes states that a more cooperative and concentrated effort will be made by the Seminole State Bank and The First National Bank of Hobbs, to service the respective trade areas' financial needs.

The close proximity of the two banks and their respective trade areas will be mutually beneficial to both banks and their customers. The Seminole State Bank has a borrowing limit of \$125,000, the First National of Hobbs \$190,000. At the close of business June 30, 1971 the local bank showed resources totalling \$9,775,485.01.

he jumped not far away from that cotton patch and he floated back toward town. We lived a way out in the country, about 1 1/2 miles. "Just the size of a match," one of my brothers said.

My mother didn't say a word when everybody quit picking cotton. He fell and he fell and he fell, looked like for miles, and someone said "He's gonna hit the ground," but the chute opened and if there was ever a great man, in my opinion, it was that man that in all probability had come out of a cotton patch and had enough nerve to take the big step.

Those were exciting days when roller skaters, airplane lovers and card players were all sinners.

We've come a long ways in this forty years and our thinking on what's right and what's wrong has become about as commonplace as airplanes.

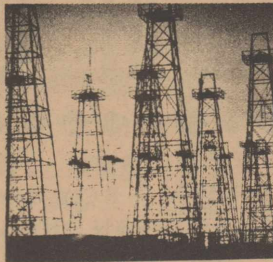

GAINES COUNTY FARM BUREAU WILL HELP SPONSOR ONE VOLUNTEER FIREMAN TO THE 42ND ANNUAL TEXAS FIREMEN'S TRAINING SCHOOL JULY 18-23 AT TEXAS A AND M UNIVERSITY, ACCORDING TO VESTER SMITH OF LOOP, TEXAS, PRESIDENT OF THE LOCAL FARM ORGANIZATION.

PLANNING TO ATTEND FROM THIS COUNTY IS MR. OTIS FINCH OF SEAGRAVES, TEXAS.

THE LOCAL COUNTY FARM BUREAU AND THE TEXAS FARM BUREAU INSURANCE COMPANIES OF WACO PROVIDE MOST OF THE MONEY FOR REGISTRATION FEES, ROOM AND BOARD WITH EACH VOLUNTEER FIREMAN PAYING A NOMINAL FEE. COUNTY FARM BUREAUS ACROSS THE STATE ARE HELPING SPONSOR APPROXIMATELY 100 FIREMEN AT THE SIX-DAY TRAINING SCHOOL.

"FARM BUREAU IS GLAD TO PARTICIPATE IN SUCH A WORTHWHILE PROGRAM BECAUSE THE SKILLS LEARNED IN THE TRAINING SCHOOL HELP HOLD DOWN PROPERTY LOSSES AND INJURIES DUE TO FIRES," THE COUNTY PRESIDENT SAID. HE ADDED THAT FARM BUREAU ALSO HAS A CONTINUING PROGRAM WHICH PAYS \$75 TO A FIRE DEPARTMENT WHEN THE DEPARTMENT FIGHTS A FIRE ON A FARM BUREAU-INSURED'S PROPERTY IN A RURAL AREA.

THE ANNUAL FIREMEN'S TRAINING SCHOOL AT COLLEGE STATION IS EXPECTED TO ATTRACT SOME 3,000 MEN ENGAGED IN FIRE PREVENTION, CONTROL AND SAFETY, FROM MUNICIPALITIES, INDUSTRIES, AND ARMED SERVICES, REPRESENTING MORE THAN 700 CITIES FROM APPROXIMATELY 40 STATES AND 20 COUNTRIES. THE FARM BUREAU HAS BEEN SPONSORING VOLUNTEER FIREMEN FROM RURAL AREAS TO THE SCHOOL FOR THE PAST 8 YEARS.

PRACTICALLY ALL OF THE TRAINING, EXCEPT FIRE PREVENTION AND ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES, WILL CONSIST OF FIELD OPERATIONS WITH APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT.

THE TEXAS FARM BUREAU HAS TWO SPECIAL CONFERENCES PLANNED FOR THOSE RURAL FIREMEN SPONSORED BY COUNTY FARM BUREAUS. TFB PRESIDENT J.T. WOODSON WILL SPEAK TO THE GROUP ON THE EVENING OF JULY 19 ON THE SUBJECT, "TEXAS FARM BUREAU'S INTEREST IN RURAL FIRE PROTECTION." JOE SMETANA, TFB SAFETY DIRECTOR, WILL PRESENT A DEMONSTRATION ON ELECTRIC SHOCK PREVENTION. WARD CROSS, ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT, TFB INSURANCE COMPANIES, WILL TALK TO THE GROUP ON THE EVENING OF JULY 20 ON THE TOPIC, "PREVENTING RURAL FIRES."

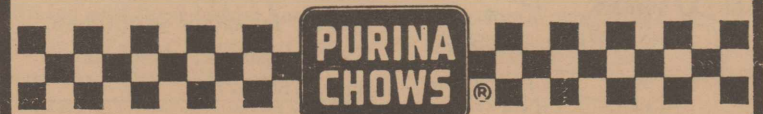

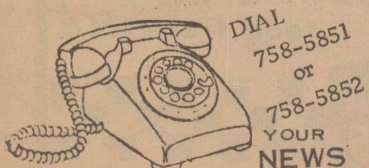

Lots of barbecue was devoured for supper. Stanton and John are pretty good Chuck Wagon cooks.

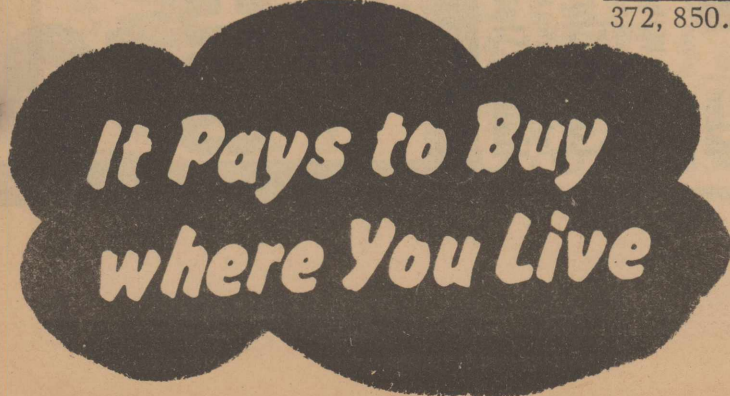

8. Alton Freeman, city attorney, reported to the council that a fire ordinance recommended by the state would give councilmen more power concerning old houses and buildings. Each council member will be given copies to be studied for a decision at the next meeting.

The group discussed workman compensation on employees. The hospital officially opened Monday. D.K. Fleming, D.O., of the medical staff was the only doctor present.



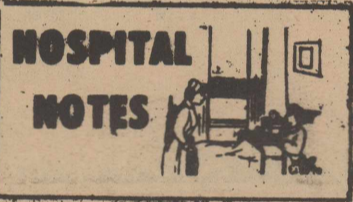
