## City Council

The City Council met Monday night with all members of the council present. Meeting with them were Chamber of Commerce representatives, Charles Ray, Earl Bartley, Dink Aryain and Bob Clark, asking for the use of the old City Hall for a Chamber office. The details of the upkeep and arrangements are to be worked out under a contract later. It looks like the Chamber will have a new home.

2. In other important business the Council voted to extend the water field and authorized testing to be done so the City would be assured of ample water supply during the coming summer.

3. Another important step was the retirement program entered into by Council members for the City for city employees' retirement. Employees will pay five percent (5%) of their full salary into a retirement fund. If employment is terminated or they leave, they will receive the money paid in, plus interest. The City will participate in a like manner, but of course there will be no expense to the City at this time. Retirement age will be at 65, compulsory at 70 and the amount of money received on retirement will be according to the amount paid in and years of service.

4. (Hooray for the City Council.) The Council passed an ordinance to get rid of all abandoned vehicles on streets, vacant lots and residential lots.

5. The Council voted further to pay the annual fire payment, which amounted to \$9,942 this year. This amount takes care of a \$3.00 fee for each fireman, each fire and \$2.00 for each drill he attends.

## Cotton Picking Time

Gaines County has gone to work in earnest during the past week to harvest its cotton crop. Rains that plagued the cotton farmer have turned into sunny harvesting weather. The fifteen gins in the county are in high gear and hope to roll twenty-

Cotton farmers have been encouraged in various parts of the county because of turn-out per acre. This issue of the News will show pictures of cotton picked by hand, by machines, cotton being weighed, hauled, stored on the lot and ginned.

## Commco, Inc.

When the TV Cable of Seminole was purchased last July by Commco, Inc. Seminole viewers were promised more channels and improvement of local facilities. Mr. Lloyd Coberly, manager, is interested in everyone knowing the facts surrounding work done. The complete town of Seminole has new cables up, except for 300 houses.

Still to be reworked is the receiving sets at the local tower. A tower crew is expected in the next ten days to two weeks. When this work is complete then new channels will be available. The

manager went on to explain that when this was done there will be a change in the numbers of each channel. More new equipment is to be added and the TV Cable viewers are asked to be patient until new amplifier levels and other equipment is installed.

"A lot of people are upset because they know we've been working on the cables in the alleys and the leads to their houses. They think better services should have started immediately, plus the new channels. This is not so", said Coberly.

Working with Coberly on new installations are Mike Ray, Bob Tunnell, Manuel Flores, Efram Flores and George Boyd.

## SCHOOL BOARD

The School Board met last Monday night and granted Miss Judy Bugher permission to hold a volleyball clinic in Seminole January 10 or 17. Approximate cost is \$60.00.

2. The board voted to pay David Cavitt \$353.38 for instructing one of the boys' elementary P. E. classes from 2:10 to 3:00 p. m. each day for the rest of the year. This is to relieve an overloading condition and to make for a better schedule for the boys and girls in physical education.

3. The Board decided to comply with the Tort Claim Act and took out additional liability insurance of \$238 so that every school vehicle and every school driver would have additional liability coverage.

4. Mr. R. E. Robinson was employed at \$150.00 for a Junior High B-team basketball coach.

1. School will be dismissed at 3:00 p. m. on November 26 for Thanksgiving. Students return to classes December 1.

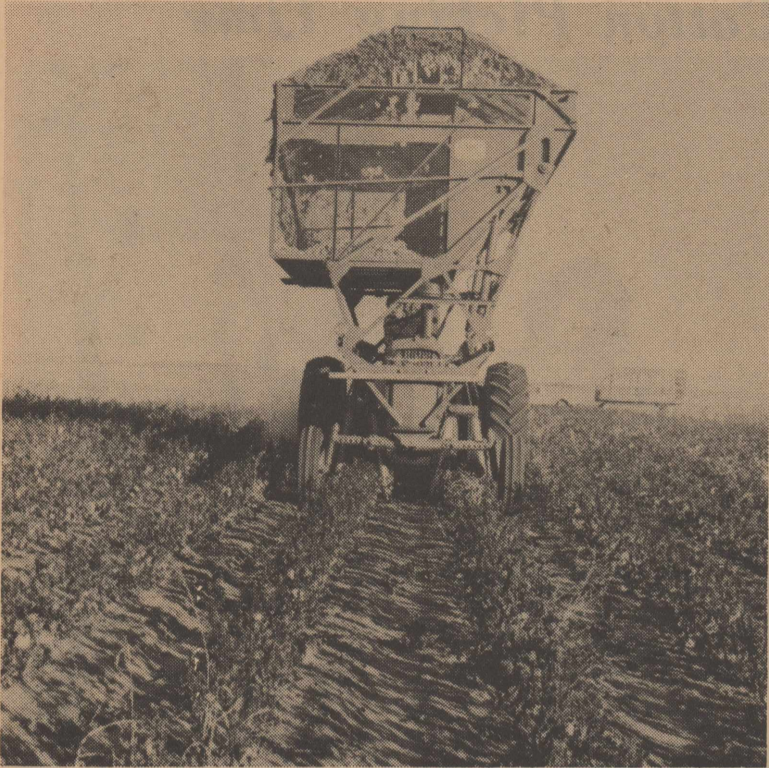
2. Christmas holidays are December 20 through January 4.

**TRANSATLANTIC CABLE NEAR COMPLETION**

Work is near completion on the American end of a transatlantic cable that will provide telephone service to Spain, Portugal and Italy.

About 95 nautical miles of the cable are being buried by the Bell System two feet beneath the ocean floor off Rhode Island. Burial of the Spanish end will begin as soon as the American end is buried.

Installation of the deep water section of the cable will begin in October and the cable is expected to begin service the first quarter of 1970.

The cable is designed to carry 720 simultaneous conversations -- five times the number possible on any existing transatlantic cable.

More than 15 million overseas calls were placed last year from the United States. Popularity of such calls has increased 455 per cent since 1956, when the advent of undersea cable made clear transmission possible. All overseas calls previously had been transmitted by radio relay, subject to interruption caused by atmospheric conditions.

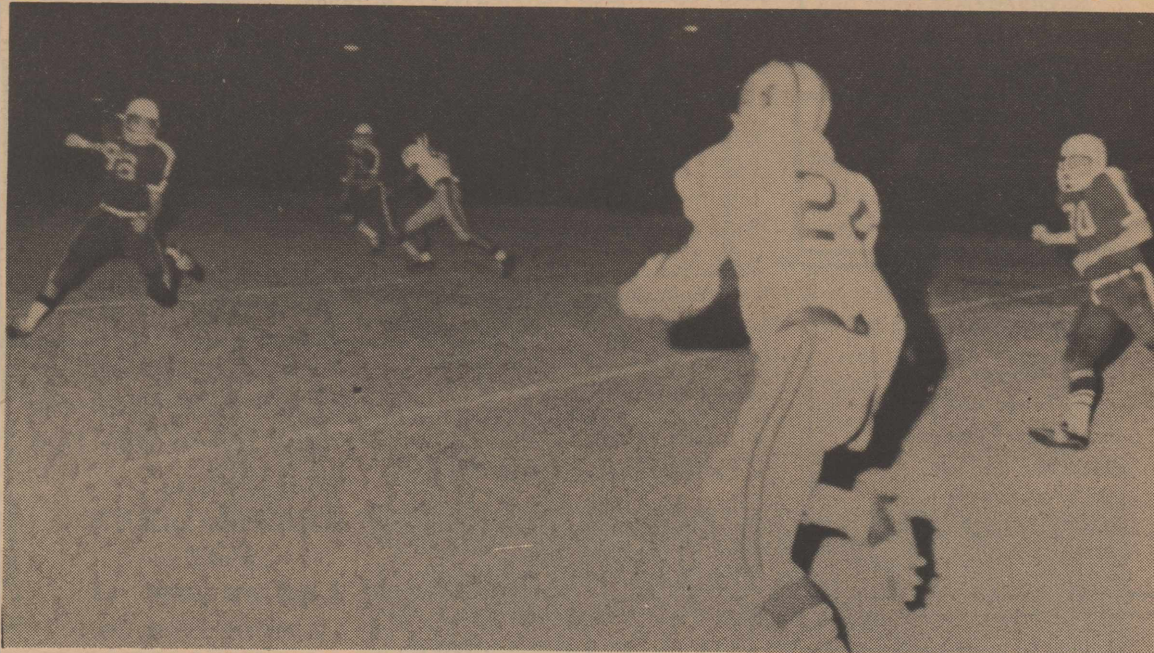
The new cable is 3,500 miles long and is part of a \$99 million, 5,000 mile communications system. The system includes another underwater cable and two radio relay installations.

The cable is a result of 63 million hours of work by 32,000 employees of five Western Electric plants. A 15-ton sea plow was developed by Bell Telephone Laboratories to bury the ends of the cable under the ocean floor to protect them from accidental damage by commercial fishing activity. The deep water section will lie on top of the ocean floor.

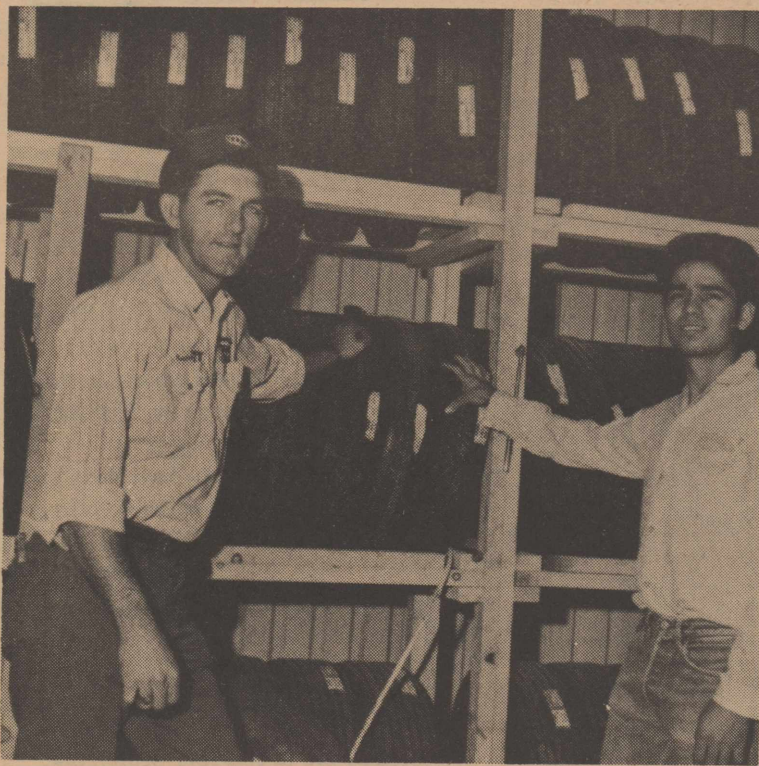

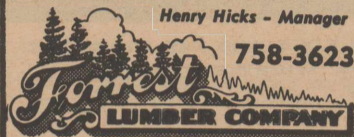

## LOOP NEWS

The biggest activity in the community is the pretty weather and the cotton harvest. The gins are operating at full capacity and farmers are filling every available trailer. Farmers are hoping the good weather will continue. Most of the grain and peanuts have been harvested although some late maize is being combined.

It was not a real good week for the Loop athletic teams. On Monday both boys and girls Junior High teams lost basketball games at Union although the boys' game went into overtime. Boys' score was 13-11 and girls' score 19-17.

On Tuesday night the High School played two girls' games on the home court against Meadow. The B-teamers lost by a score of 18-48. The A-teamers got off to a fast start to lead at the end of the first quarter but lagged behind in the second quarter and trailed at halftime by a score of 20-31. Loop scored 14 points to Meadow's 10 in the 3rd quarter and out-scored the opposition by one point in the 4th quarter but it wasn't enough to erase the deficit and Loop lost 48-54.

It was the same story Friday night as the Loop Longhorns met the Borden County Coyotes on the home field for the last game of the season. In spite of the cold weather there was a good crowd on hand, though many fans watched the game from their cars. The Coyotes scored three times in the first half to lead 22-0. It was late in the third quarter before Loop got on the scoreboard with a 40 yard touchdown run by Eddie Aldridge. Loop scored twice in the fourth quarter, once on a 28 yard pass from Danny Yocom to Larry Caughron in the end zone and on another pass from Yocom to Roy Tovar in the end zone. Both conversion attempts were good for 4 points. The Coyotes also scored 18 more points in the

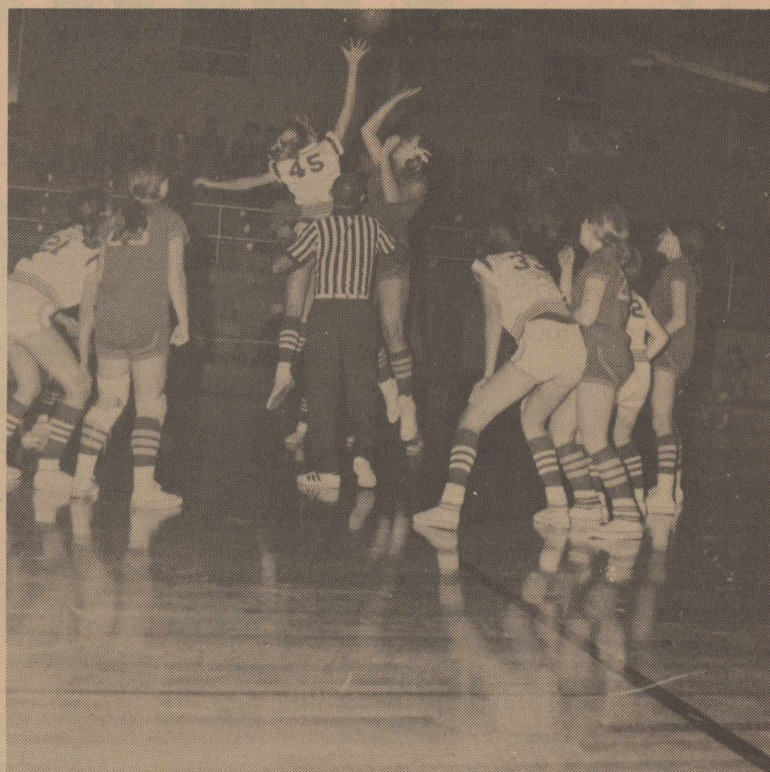

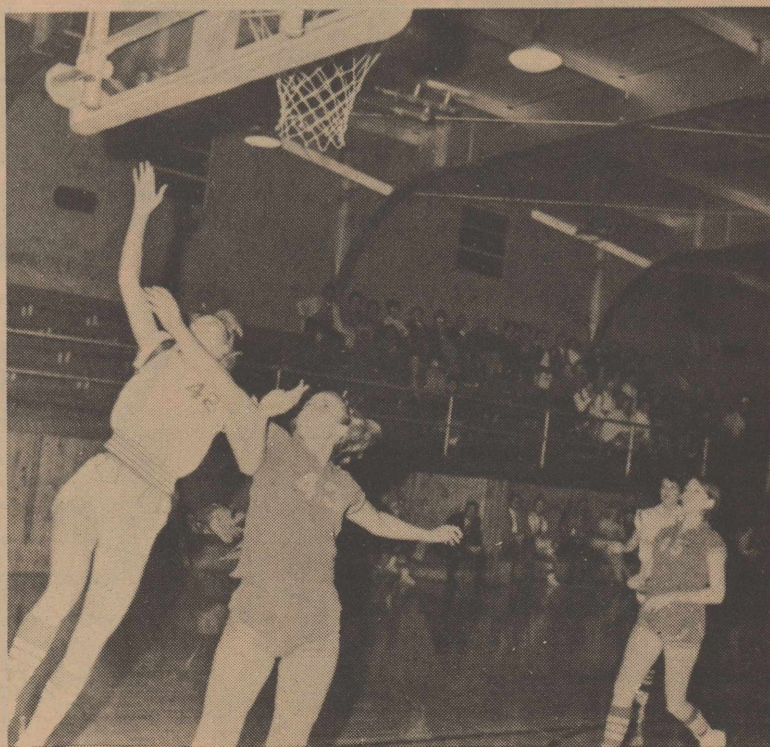

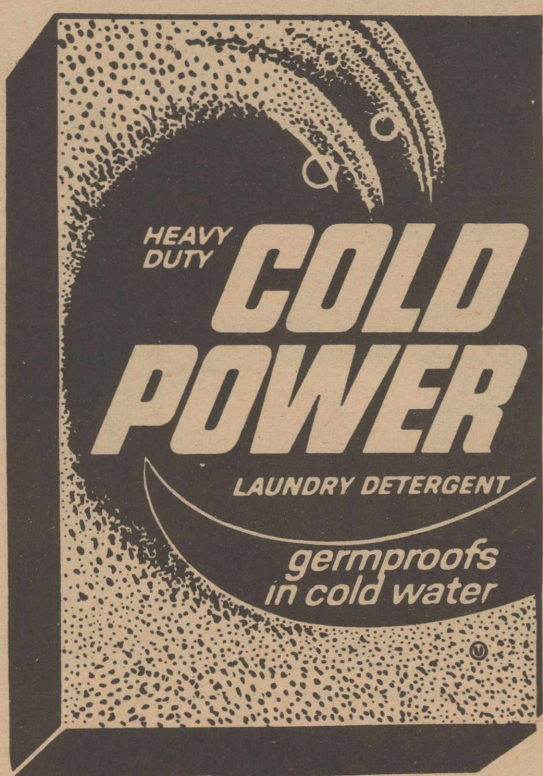

STUDENTS BETWEEN THE AGES OF 18 AND 22 WHO RECEIVE SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFITS SHOULD NOTIFY THEIR SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE IF THEY CHANGE SCHOOLS.

UNLESS WE ARE PROMPTLY INFORMED OF A CHANGE TO A DIFFERENT SCHOOL A STUDENT'S CHECKS MAY BE STOPPED AND THERE MIGHT BE A DELAY BEFORE THE CHECKS COULD BE STARTED AGAIN. THIS HAPPENS WHEN A STUDENT LEAVES HIGH SCHOOL AND STARTS TO COLLEGE OR WHEN STUDENTS CHANGE FROM ONE COLLEGE TO ANOTHER.

TO AVOID DELAY IN A STUDENT'S CHECKS, HE SHOULD NOTIFY HIS LOCAL SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE JUST AS SOON AS HE KNOWS HE WILL CHANGE SCHOOLS. A CARD FORM, "NOTICE OF CHANGE IN SCHOOL ATTENDANCE", IS AVAILABLE FOR THIS PURPOSE. IF THE STUDENT DOES NOT HAVE THIS CARD HE CAN REQUEST ONE TO KEEP ON HAND IN CASE HE NEEDS TO MAKE A REPORT BY MAIL.

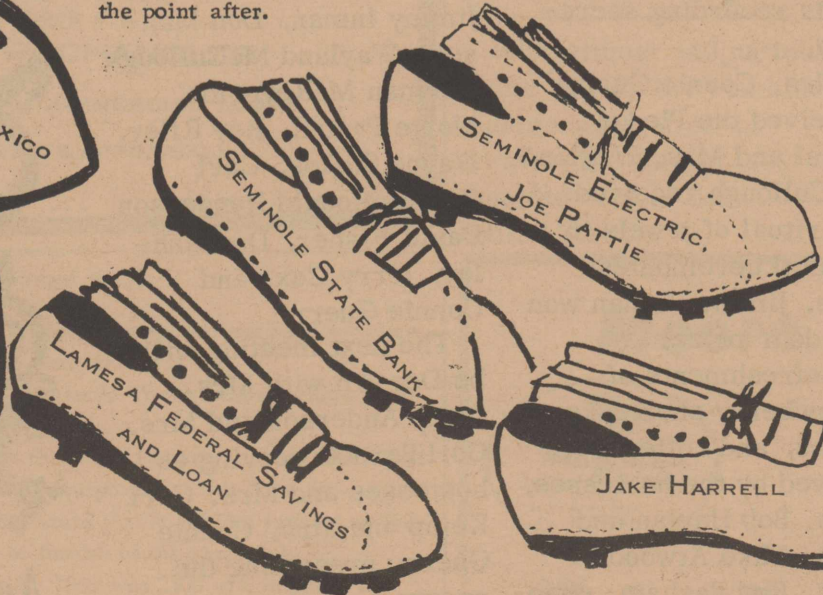
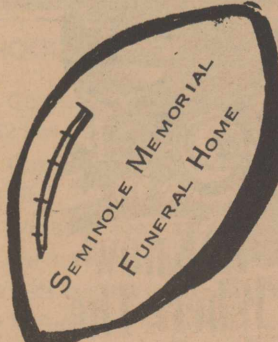
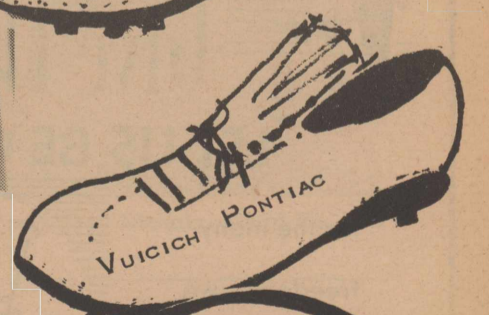
### Editorial

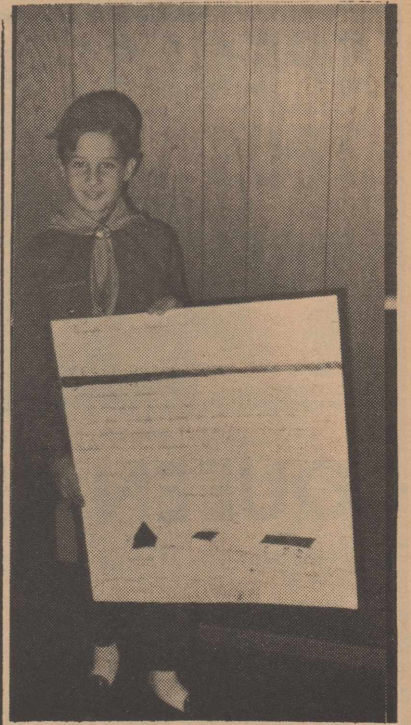

(Who's interested in a school board meeting when you can get this kind of information?)

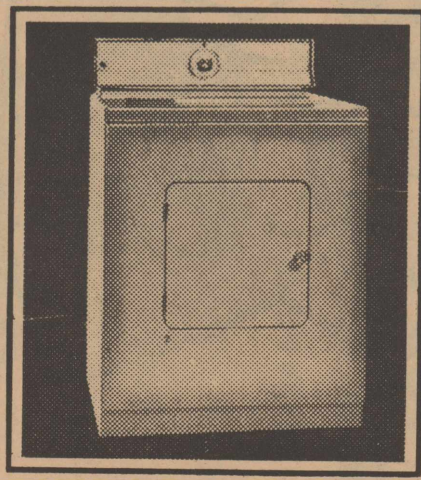

#### FIREFLOODING - A NEW METHOD OF RECOVERING OIL BY PROPAGATING A FLAME THROUGH THE ROCK

In producing oil from many oil reservoirs, it is frequently found that the oil operator has to abandon the reservoir when only twenty percent of the oil-in-place has been produced. It is a simple matter of economics as it is not profitable to continue to try to produce more oil using the best available equipment and techniques. This means that we leave a lot more oil in the ground than we are able to produce. The unrecoverable oil presents a real challenge to research.

This article describes fireflooding, a method which has been proposed and tried in the field to recover a part of our presently unrecoverable oil. Fireflooding consists in initiating a fire at an air injection well and propagating a flame through the oil-bearing rock, pushing the oil to the producing wells.

##### IGNITING THE WELL

The fire may be started by several methods. Electrical heaters have been used successfully. The heater is lowered down the well, and the current is applied. After a short period of time the temperature rises to approximately 1,000°F, and air is injected. This high temperature is sufficiently great to ignite the oil in the oil-bearing rock, and by continuing to pump air into the well the flame will go through the oil sand from the injection well to the producing well.

The wells may also be ignited by use of downhole gas burners. These burners use a sparking device at the bottom of the hole somewhat similar to a spark-plug in an automobile. An electrical circuit causes the spark to occur which ignites the air-fuel mixture. Wells may also be ignited by the use of hot air, and some wells will ignite spontaneously.

##### COMBUSTION TEMPERATURES AND OIL RECOVERY

The combustion temperature ranges from about 700 to 1,000°F. The combustion zone is quite narrow. In the laboratory, it has been found that fireflooding will produce about 85 to 90 percent, and burn about ten to fifteen percent of the oil-in-place. The burned sand is cleaned of its oil content, and the sand may flow freely through your fingers like dry beach sand.

##### OIL FIELD APPLICATION

The fireflooding process is indicated to apply to oil reservoirs having API gravities ranging from approximately 12 to 30° API gravity. It should be kept in mind that API gravity alone is not a sufficient criterion to determine economic feasibility of the process, but is one indication of reservoir suitability. The permeability of the reservoir should be fairly great and the porosity quite large. The oil-in-place should be quite high and will usually be thick and viscous.

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
