

EDITORIAL

"Recently I picked up an old magazine for January, 1960. It was filled with the hopes and possibilities of the 'fabulous Sixties.' What went wrong? First, we heard about a 'new' morality. It turned out to be a campaign against morality. We heard about a 'new' religion. This religion turned out to be a campaign proclaiming God is dead. We heard of a new, militant, but non-violent program to achieve civil rights and equality. The next thing we knew this country was engulfed in a whirlwind of burning, bombing, looting and violence greater than anything the United States had witnessed since the draft riots of the Civil War.

"We heard about hundreds of millions which would be spent to eliminate the roots of crime. Crime sky-rocketed in the very areas where the hundreds of millions were spent. We heard about a new Free Speech movement and soon found ourselves wading in the slop of hard-core obscenity and a flood of four-letter words. We heard about a movement for the 'free' university, then discovered that its advocates wanted a free rein to plunge youth into every conceivable form of human depravity, drug addiction, perversion and intellectual emasculation. We were told by certain people that the only threat from Communism was 'external', and then discovered these same people busily disarming the United States and wooing Communist bosses by selling them practically everything forbidden by the strategic material embargo act.

"A half-million American youth were shipped to Asia and commanded to fight Communist aggression in Vietnam while a hard core of five men on the Supreme Court proclaimed that it was all right for identified Communists to work in U. S. defense plants, teach in American schools and boss American Labor unions. - - - Somebody has been tampering with the soul of America." - - - By W. Found Dead

Mr. and Mrs. Robert William Kelley (Nora) of 506 S. W. 15th were apparently asphyxiated sometime in the early hours of last Sunday morning. He was 62 years of age. They were seen at approximately 8 o'clock Saturday night, also Mrs. Kelley baby-sat with the children of Marcus Crow until about 10:30 p. m. Saturday night. Their bodies were found about 2 p. m. Monday.

W. E. Cox, Jr. coroner, reported that a final autopsy report had not been received but it was thought that they died by asphyxiation.

Sheriff Ed Welch and Chief of Police Shorty Blackmon were of the opinion that there was a malfunction in the hot water heater or the furnace.

The Kelleys had lived in Seminole three years, moving here from Plains. Prior to that they lived in Lamesa for 22 years where he was an implement dealer. He was a salesman for Ross Irrigation, also owning a

Gaines County Fat Stock Show Starts

Seminole 77- Andrews 53

Seminole fans returned joyfully last night from Andrews with their eleventh straight win after the Indians bested the Ponies from Andrews by 24 BIG POINTS, 77-53. It was little David Henderson that led the Indians with 28 points. Steve Hatley got in foul trouble in the first quarter and did not score a point in the first half. He got 12 after returning. Livingston picked up the slack, getting 3 field goals and 8 free throws, for 14. Steady Whisenhunt and steady Donohoe got 8 each. The sixth man, Roberts, scored 7. Horton from Andrews led the losers with 15.

The score was tied 3-3 and 7-7 before Seminole broke to an 8 point lead at the end of the first quarter, 19-11. With Hatley on the bench the lead shrunk to 4 by halftime, 31-27. In the third quarter the Indians were at full strength and shot in 21 compared to 10 for Andrews and claimed a 15 point lead and were never headed.

The Ponies, in trying to stop the Indians, got in foul trouble. The Indians cashed in on 27 of 33 free throws. The Mustangs got 3 points at the free throw line. The big story - the Indians are 2-0 in district play and will catch Kermit here Friday night.

The B-team lost by 24 to the Andrews B's, 52-76.

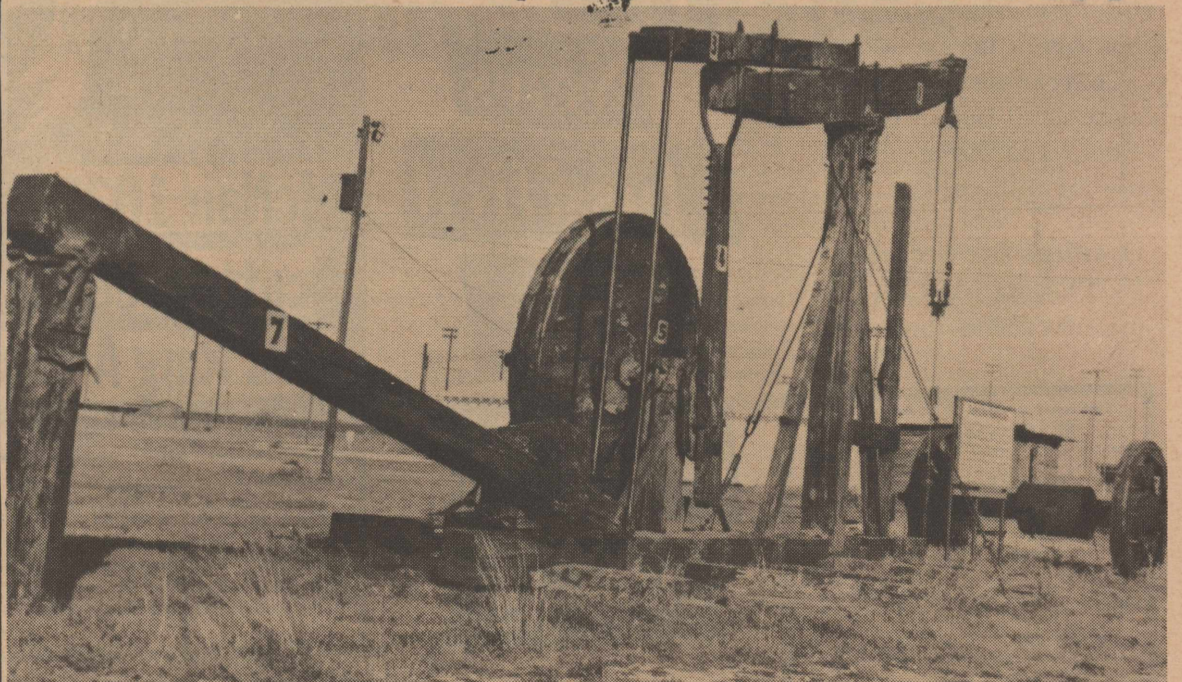

This particular pumping apparatus was moved from the Santa Rita #1 of Texon, 14 miles west of Big Lake. A number of the working parts are listed - 1. Walking Beam, 2. Samson Beam, 3. Topmost False Beam, 4. Pitman, 5. Band Wheel, 6. Crank, 7. Counter Balance Beam, 8. Jack Post, 9. Bridle, 10. Polish Rod, 11. The Stuffing Box, and 12. The Bull Wheel. The wealth of the Permian Basin was kicked off with just such rigs as this. Good schools, good highways, and good jobs can all be attributed largely to the success of early day pioneers who dreamed up just such a pumping unit as this to get the job done.

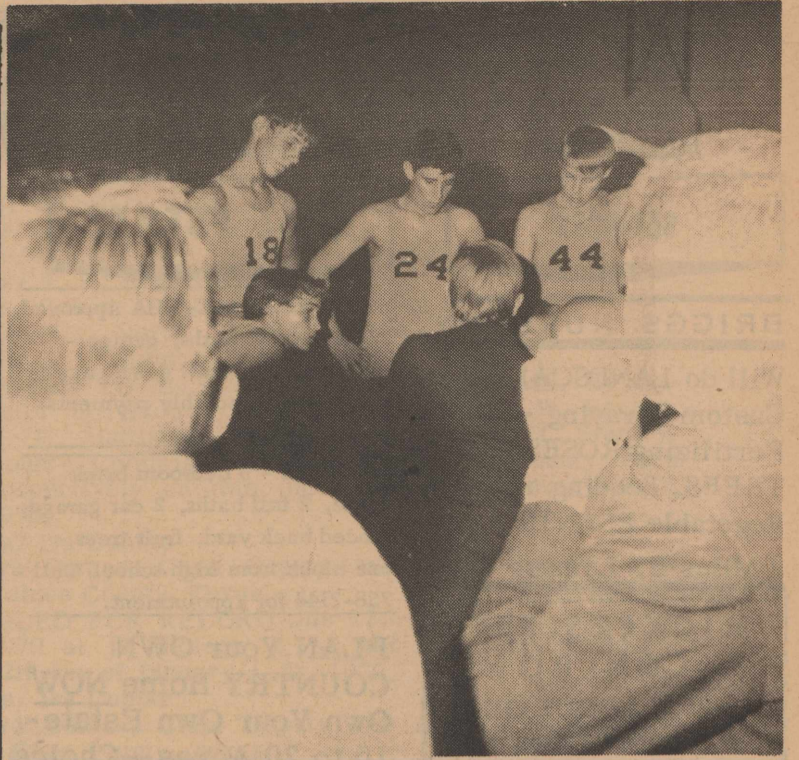

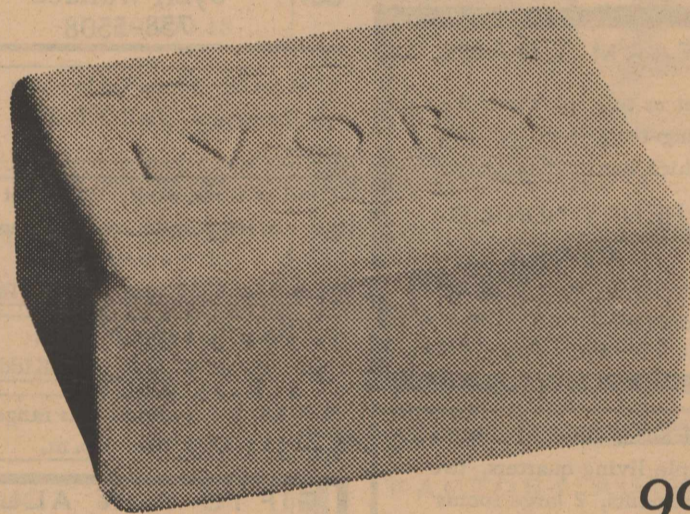

It was pointed out in the course of the meeting that 6% would be paid on all savings accounts, 2% would be returned on all borrower's accounts. The organization has been growing at the rate of about \$3000 per month. As of December 19, 1969 assets equaled \$109,833.19.

SEMINOLE INDIANS WIN FIRST DISTRICT GAME OF SEASON

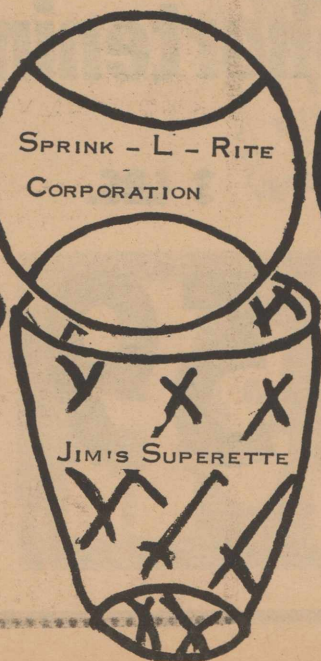
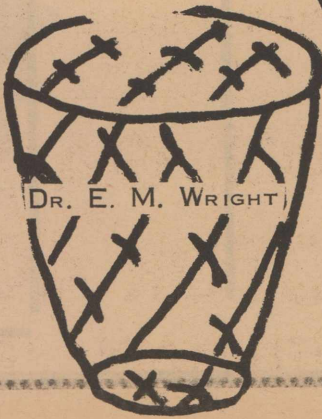
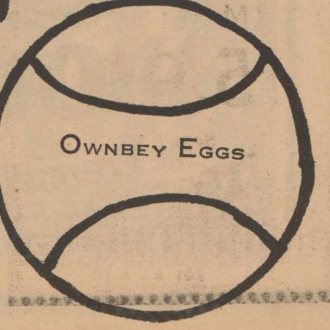
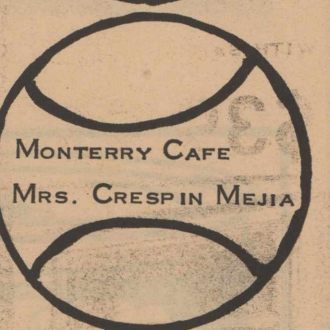
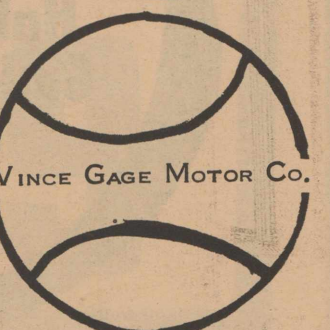
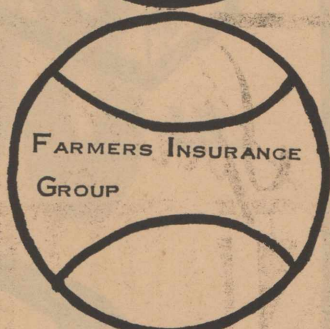
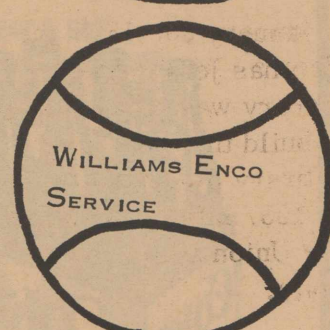
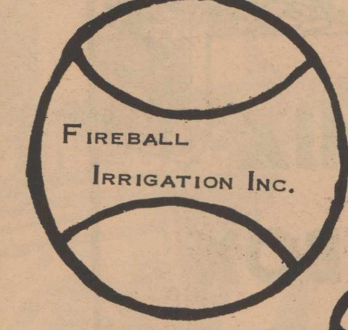
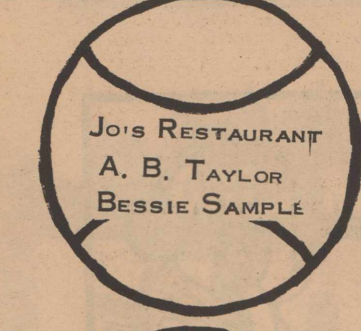
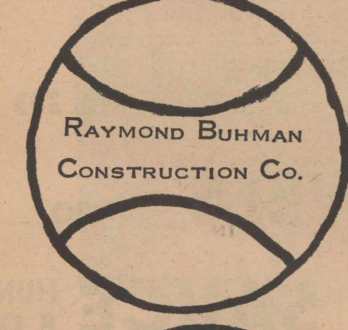
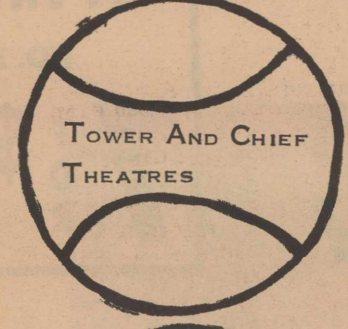
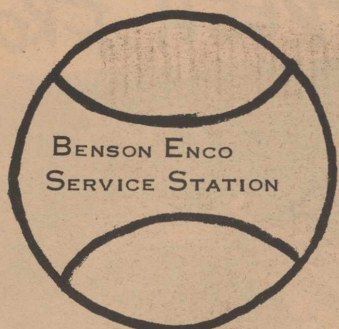
