

Editorial

Can you remember when they built the courthouse and a lot of Seminole citizens and a lot of county citizens did not like it? Can you remember when they built the local golf course and picnic and pavilion area between Seminole and Seagraves and a lot of people threw hisses about it? Maybe you're one of those that can remember the present junior high building being built in 1931. (I've been told that the story of the day was "We can never pay for it and we'll never have enough kids in Seminole to fill it.") There were visitors in Seminole yesterday and they were being shown the school, they were being shown the M. S. Doss Youth Center, the new M. S. Doss Scout Center, the courthouse, the new fieldhouse, the new track, the tennis courts and the baseball field and parking lot. Seminole and Gaines County should count their many, many blessings that they live in an area and in a town that cares enough to want good streets, good government, and something a town can be proud of. In seeing these facilities a visitor said, "Oh, I see you're paving more streets. I'd like to live here where people are still growing and the town is still growing. Why, I didn't know you had a college here." "It's not a college," I said. His next question - "A junior college?" I'd liked to have told the visitors "Yes, that is a junior college." We headed north and passed the hospital. "The people here sure must be healthy," he said. "No, we just don't have a very big hospital."

Why don't we have a junior college if we need it? 400 students times \$1,000 adds a \$4 million worth of local business. Why can't we have a new wing to the hospital if we need it? We can if we want it! (It looks like we might get the railroad and it's because people wanted it.) Very few towns in the state boast a school system that equals ours. Very few towns the size of Seminole boast added facilities of a community building, meeting rooms, a golf course, a courthouse, and on and on. Whatever our wants we'd better satisfy them while there is taxable property available so we can build for the tomorrow, whether it's a school, a park, a hospital, a railroad, or a courthouse. We thank those nice contributors, Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Doss, who have contributed so much to the growth of Seminole and Gaines County.



I never was a scaredy-cat, I never was a big coward but then I was not the bravest in the community either. During my lifetime I've had three knives pulled on me, two pistols aimed at me and looked down one rifle barrel. I've been whipped, out-boxed, out-wrestled, Indian-beat and won a few. I've had the day-lights scared out of me but never like the time when Simon Parks got the bull whip after six of us. I do mean "Bull Whip". It was not one of those nice, store bought ones. It was a rough, short homemade one.

Simon Parks was mean. He rode the planter or cultivator and made one of his boys walk and drive the team. He whipped his older boys and left them tied to the wagon wheel until morning. He was mean. He was big. His hair always needed cut. He did not let his kids go to school much. Neither did he let his kids visit the neighbors.

On this particular day we boys were all horseback riding to the river for a swim and an outing. We were riding down the lane that passed the Parks farm when one of the boys saw Simon Parks and immediately the conversation turned to how mean and terrible he was. He was some distance away and one of the boys suggested what he needed was a good 'cussing out.'

Now five or six boys can give anybody a good 'cussing', especially if they're on good horses and a safe distance away. "Wait till we get through the gate", they said.

Now Truett Polk and myself were never much for 'cussing' anyway, but there was Baker Owens, George Allcorn, and Dallas Fish. Now they could cuss! The gate was put up and they cussed Simon Parks real good then immediately spurred their horses into a dead run. We expected any minute to hear the blast of a gun behind us so we cussed and rode with vigor.

We'd forgotten one thing - - we had to go home the same way. We started to ride the long way around. It was a bad decision, but without incidence we rode by the Parks farm, went through another gate and entered another narrow lane. We closed the gate and Simon Parks stepped out from behind the trees with that bull whip coiled up on his left arm.

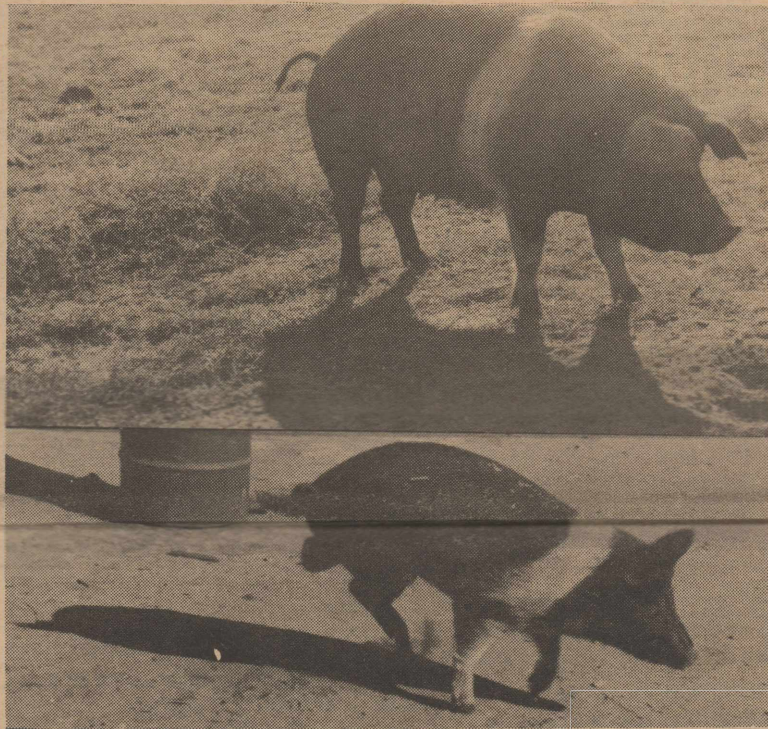
Now to a twelve or thirteen year old boy that was probably the worst weapon that was ever seen. He approached. See page 2

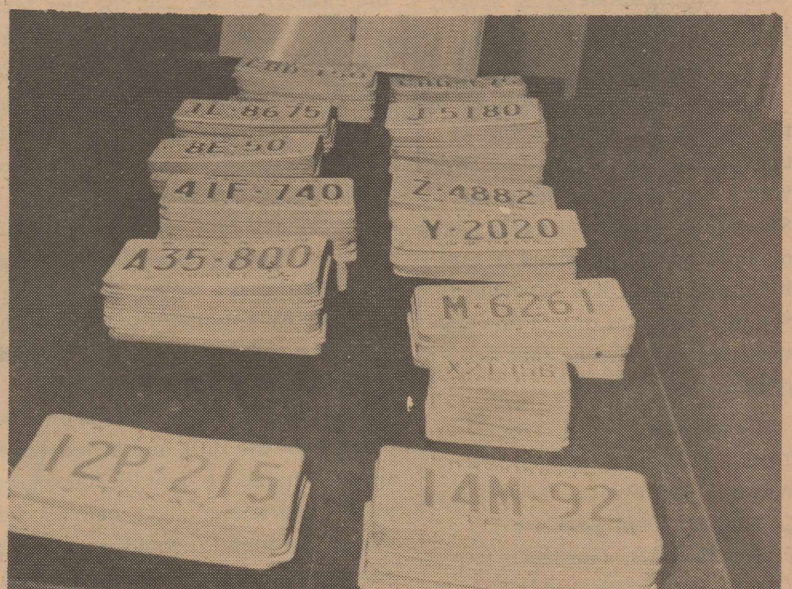

TAGS FOR SALE



Twelve different tags are displayed in the above picture and are now on sale in the tax collector's office. Mary Baldwin, tax assessor-collector, displays the ledger which has tabs on it to stick on the license plate renewal applications which people received through the mail from the Texas Highway Department Motor Vehicle Division.

This year there are three trailer tags available - one up to 10,000 pounds, another from 10,000 to 18,000 pounds and the third one - 18,000 to 32,000 pounds. The assessor has for sale house trailer tags, motorcycle tags, and machinery tags. Also there are special tags for well servicing units only. There is a farm trailer tag, a truck tag or a truck trailer tag, along with a straight farm tag.

The auto tags will begin with a prefix of CBD through CBK. For a special fee of \$10.00 one can get a personalized tag with no more than seven letters (by sending the application to Austin).

Simon Parks went on to a bad end, but that's another story. When I think about being scared I can still see that bull whip.

There are many stories which have been told about the weather and the seasons. People have thought that they could tell what kind of winter they would have. Often there is no reason back of these signs, and the stories are not true. One of these is the story of "Ground Hog Day."

The story says that on the second of February, the ground hog, or woodchuck, will come out of his hole where he has spent the winter. If the sun does not shine on that day the ground hog will not see his shadow. This means that it will be a mild winter. Spring will be early. If the sun shines on that day, the ground hog will see his shadow and go back into his hole for six more weeks. This means that there will be six more weeks of winter.

An industrious ground hog digs tunnels 40 feet long in summer but sleeps away the winter.

Facilities open for inspection will be the new fieldhouse, new track, remodeled east stands of the football stadium, new lights at the baseball field, and the new tennis courts north of the junior high school. Refreshments will be served in the fieldhouse during the afternoon by the wives of the coaches.

Coaches will be in each room of the fieldhouse to guide visitors and to explain the use of the facilities.

Unless inclement weather interferes, a short exhibition track meet involving performers from Lubbock Christian College, Odessa Junior College, and New Mexico Junior College at Hobbs, will start at 3:00 o'clock. Runners from these schools will run two relay exhibitions - a 440 yard and a mile. Also an exhibition of javelin throwing will be given by a member of the New Mexico Junior College squad. This athlete is rated as one of the best in the nation among junior college performers in the javelin throw.

Approved by local citizens on a bond issue vote on February 15, 1968, total building and improvements costs come to \$361,998 plus architect's fee. A new 10,200 square foot fieldhouse was built, the track was widened and a new all-weather surface put on it, the east side of the football stands received new seat covering and were enclosed underneath, the baseball field was lighted, and four new tennis courts were built.

Prime contractor on all the work was Knox, Gailey, and Meador of Lubbock. Architect was Stiles, Roberts, and Messersmith, also of Lubbock.

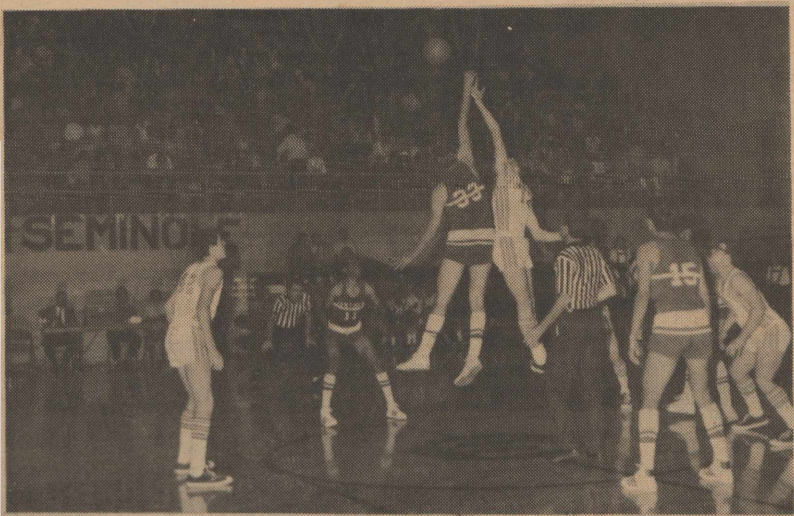


SEMINOLE DEFEATED BY FT. STOCKTON 68-58

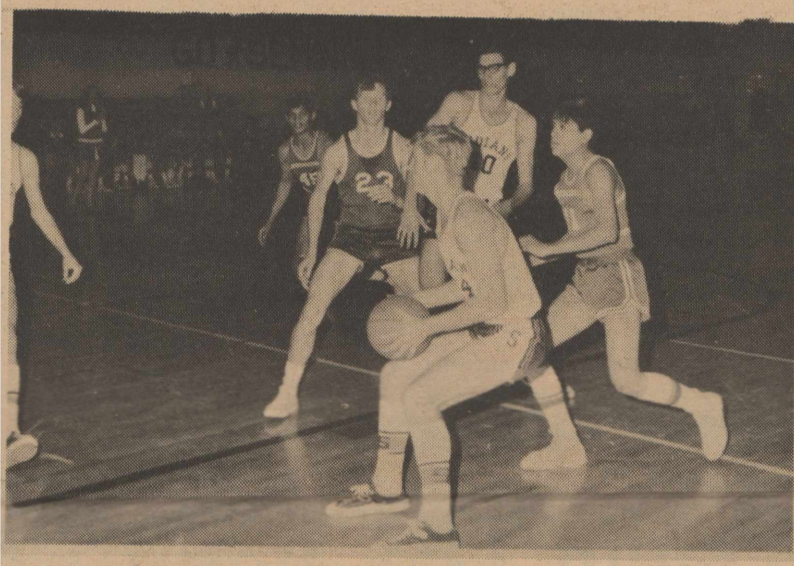

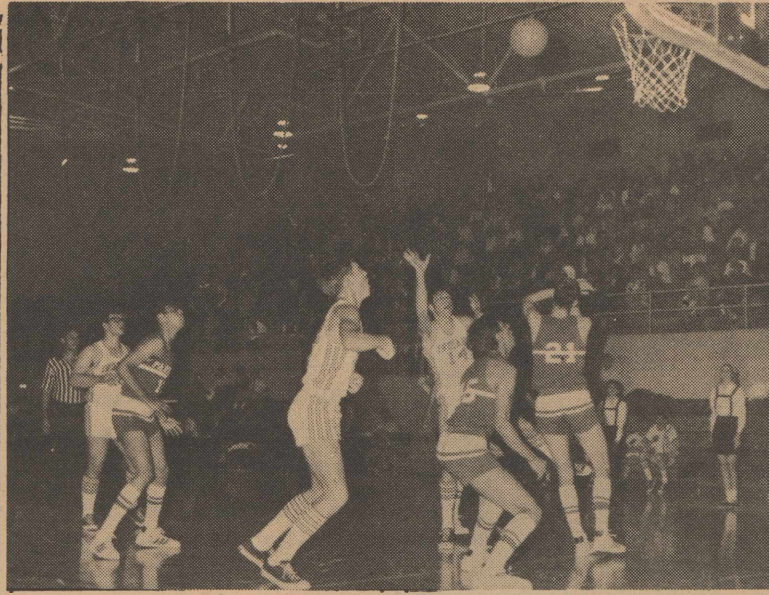
