Old people of 50 are happier when they're still making payments, when they're still buying presents for the grandchildren, when they're still able to buy Mama a box of candy, enjoy working in the yard and are intensely jealous of those gap fillers who are 27.7 years old. (Your hair is distasteful - I don't have any; I don't like your loud music - there's nothing wrong with my ears; I don't like your low lights - I can't see anything; and most of all I don't like the speed you travel - I can't keep up.)

'Nuff said for middle age. After all our money is spent who will support our government?

COTTON ★★★★★★★★★★★★★★★★★★ HOSPITAL MANY ATTEND PUBLIC MEETINGS



This group of farmers made up of Hilbern Briscoe, Marcus Crow, Robert Scott, Mike Jenkins, Troy Martin, A.K. Hancock, Weyland R. Mullins and H. L. Hill, are thinking about the problem of what to do about the tremendous cut that Gaines County farmers received in a recent ruling over cotton acreage lost.

Troy Martin, chairman of the ASC committee, said, "Why couldn't they have told us last November before 204 farms and farmers bought 100 acres of cotton?" This will cost the 204 farms approximately \$2,000 each. The cut amounted to 8% and 204 times the \$2,000 will amount to a loss of \$408,000.00. The real tragedy of this is that in a growing country like Gaines County and where cont. farmers are desperately looking for a cash crop, the most of this p. 9

COUNTY RE-EVALUATION

Maburn L. Harris, president of Southwestern Appraisal Co., Inc. of Dallas, Texas, explained to a joint meeting of the Rotarians and Lions yesterday the re-evaluation and appraisal of surface of Gaines County. "I assure you," he said, "the equalization will be as equal as humanly possible." He went on to say that everybody would pay equal and uniform taxes.

Land will have twenty-seven classifications, according to Harris, and will be equalized with sales being a factor, productivity a factor, soil types a factor and location a factor. Approximately 15 percent will be lowered, 15 percent will stay as they are now and 70 percent will

be raised. "Our appraisal will be 14 percent under mortgaged loan appraisal." He went on to say that his company would be finished by May 1 but until they were finished he had NO IDEA as to the dollar raise because the court would have to set it after his company was finished. "We are 80 percent finished with the work, the information is on the cards, but they have not been run up." A fair market value of land and homes will be given. "We will ring your doorbell, measure your house, check the built-ins, inside finish and how many baths before making our appraisal." Notices will be sent, then the board of equalization will meet.

One hundred twenty six people were counted last Thursday night in the 106th District court room when interested citizens met to discuss new hospital facilities, building on, location, taxes and hospital bonds. Dr. Harold D. Dow was present along with Dr. Carlos Alexander and Dr. Fred Petmecky. The Commissioners Court, made up of Judge Chester Browne, B. C. Norton, Robert Matthews and A. C. Stanley, was present. The Hospital Board, made up of Brom Marchbanks, president; John Pillow, Seagraves; E. D. (Six) Calfee, Seagraves; and Don Moore, was present. Other members of the Hospital Board not present were James Phillips (who was sick) and Doyle Hankins. Other County officials present were Joe McGill, County Attorney; and Woodson Jones, County Auditor. Mr. Roberts and Mr. Stiles from the architect firm of Roberts, Stiles and Messersmith were also at the meeting.

The conclusion of doctors, board members, county officials, commissioners court and interested citizens was the great need that exists at this time for additional hospital facilities. Many questions were discussed. (1) Is the present hospital paid for? Answered by Ed Rodgers, Hospital Administrator, "Yes, about 1965." (2) How many rooms are available in the present structure? Twenty-three. (3) How many beds? Twenty-eight. (4) How many rooms are sub-standard? One. (5) How many operating rooms? One. (Andrews has 74 beds in their new hospital. Yes, the present facility might be used for a nursing home or Medicare patients.) (6) How much space do the hospital bedrooms take up in a new facility? Between 25 and 40% of the overall space. (7) Can a radiation therapist be had in our size town? Answer - In all probability, not practical. (8) Can we get government aid to build more room through the Hill-Burton Federal Grants? Answered by Brom Marchbanks and Ed Rodgers - Probably not because of the area we're in. The government requires so many beds for so much population. This area is short only six beds. (We are not in the Andrews area.)

Mr. Rodgers went on to say "The cornerstone at Memorial Hospital says 1952 and represents both money and many hard hours of work. Should our patient load continue to remain at its present level, then Memorial Hospital can no longer continue to meet the need of our community as it now exists. In January, 1968 there was an average of 21.8 patients in the hospital at midnight, compared to 20.0 January, 1969 and 27.9 January, 1970. Seven days during January we had 33 or more patients in the hospital at midnight. At peak periods during the day there were more."

Dr. Petmecky pointed out the need of new facilities, the sad situation of the location of the emergency room and entrance and his great concern over staffing any hospital this day and time. He went on to say the present structure was too small, that hospitals were not set up to make money and that a new medical school going into Lubbock would certainly help. He further asked the people not to satisfy themselves with just enough to get by or just enough to satisfy Medicare, but to build something that we'd be proud of for many years.

Brom Marchbanks stated that if a start was made in the near future it would probably be two years before it was ready for operation.

M. Woodson Jones, the county auditor, used two schedules using cont. on page 11

36th ANNUAL MEETING

The 36th annual stockholders meeting of Lubbock Production Credit Association was held last Friday in Lubbock at the Fair Park Coliseum. The Morton office won the plaque for having the largest percentage of their members present. Seminole was represented by 48% of their members. Returned as directors were the out-going members - Dewey E. Wells, Jr., Ralls; and Cleve Littlepage, Tahoka, Texas. Leonard Kelley, PCA member from Seminole was elected to the nominating committee for a new year.

W.H. Calkins, vice president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank in Houston, pointed out that we are still in a period of inflation. "I am pleased to announce that the national money market went down from 8.75% to the Houston Bank February 1 to 8.20 this coming March 1."

Earlier C.E. Hicks, Chairman of the Board from Meadow, Texas, pointed out the association made 7 less loans in 1969 than in 1968, but had loaned \$3.5 million more to 1156 members. The banker from Houston, Calkins, further told the membership of Lubbock Production Credit Association that because of taxes and especially inheritance taxes that each generation was having to buy again and again. "By 1980 we will lose one out of every three farmers." There are approximately 3 million in the United States today. Of the remaining 2 million farmers 1 million will produce 90% of the food and fiber grown in this nation. Ranches and farms will be owned by big businesses and by stockholders in them. Capitol requirements for any farmer in the future will be from \$100,000.00 to \$250,000.00. "It will take five things," he said, "for farmers to stay in the future - (1) planning, (2) organization, (3) directing, (4) coordination and (5) control. You can help yourself to credit if you will help yourself change and adapt to our changing times."

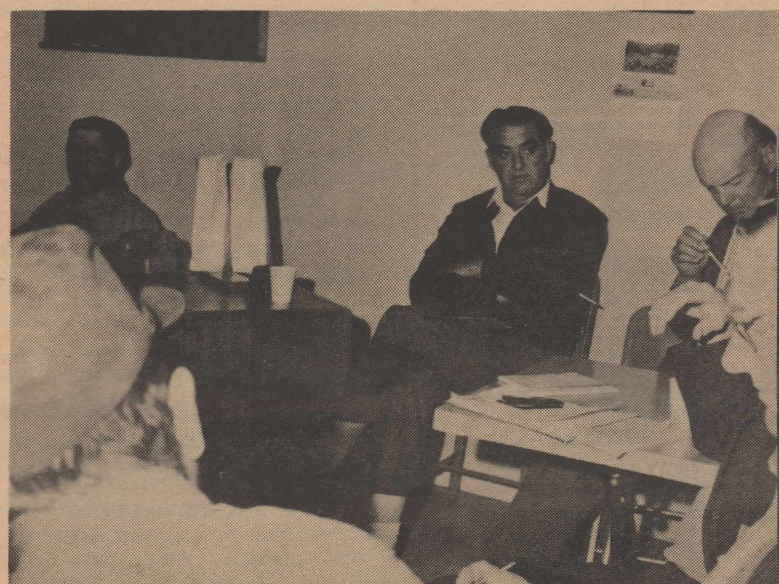

\$400,000 plus represented borrowed money at a high rate of interest that Gaines County farmers can ill afford to lose.

Mr. Martin went on to say "They keep telling us how much authority we have, but actually we just amounted to a rubber stamp for their program." Had the government program guideline followed a reasonable practice, area farmers would have saved their money and a great deal of respect. "I simply refuse to sign the directive to farmers," Martin said.

Actually 600 farms were affected in the county but the ones taking the worst loss were farmers having bought up to 100 acre limits. This cotton allotment had been bought from other counties in Central and South Texas where cotton yield has been going down the last few years.

Gaines County farmers suffered much worse than other counties because of low allotments and the need for other income on irrigated land.

In another farmer's meeting Monday night at the Seminole Community Building it was reported that cotton brought to this county would probably not be cut this year as previously reported. It was reported that 600 farms in Gaines County would be cut another 8% after having received a 12% slash last November.

Farmers contributed \$692 toward expenses to send Paul Condit, Harshell Hill, Troy Martin and Joe Anderson to Washington to see what could be done. If you would care to participate in this expense please send money to Dwayne Herman at the Seminole State Bank and mark it "Cotton Trip to Washington."

It was pointed out that 18,000,000 pounds of extra cotton was assigned to Texas, that it was all distributed before reaching Gaines County. Only 194 farms out of approximately 1,000 in the county have proved their yields. Government spokesmen say this is the reason for an additional 8% cut. Mr. Farmer, if you can prove your yield, do so immediately with your county office.

Since 1951 Gaines County farmers have only had their yields raised from 385 pounds to 515 pounds, another injustice. As farmers prove their yields the county will be in much better shape to ask for additional pounds.

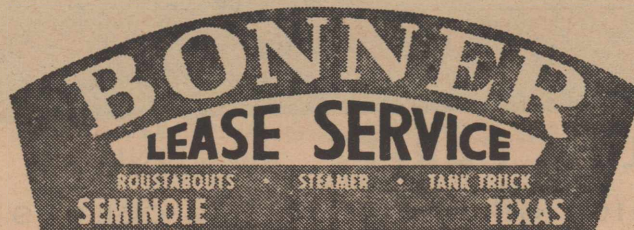

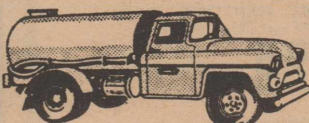

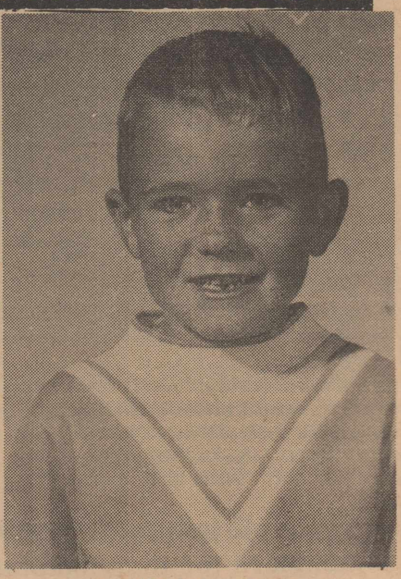

The Pates were former Seminole residents. While living here he served as pastor of the Fairview Baptist Church and was also owner and operator of L & H Furniture.



It was nice to hear from Dr. James L. Shipman, Odessa, with an article from San Angelo Times, dated February 18, 1970, telling about a Jersey cow that established a new world's milking record. The article said that the Jersey cow produced 29,320 pounds of milk and 1550 pounds of fat in 365 days in a twice-a-day milking pattern.

No, Dr. Shipman, I wasn't there but if I'd had that Jersey cow in Odessa, Texas and been encouraged on by Wesley Mickey (he's the one I used to fuss with about how much milk we could get) I probably couldn't have increased her pounds of butter fat but I know I could have gotten more pounds of milk.

\$1.5 million bond to give the people some idea of a pay out. On Plan I pointing out the cost to issue \$1,500,000 in hospital bonds (according to Wall Street Journal, municipal bonds are selling from 6.60% up, the following schedule is figured at 6.50%) in 1971 the principal would be \$100,000.00, the interest \$97,500.00 for a total of \$197,500.00. In 1981 the principal would be \$180,000.00, the interest \$11,700.00 and a total of \$191,700.00. This would mean a total of \$1,500,000.00 principal, \$642,860.00 interest and \$2,142,860.00 total for ten years. The law limits the tax levy of the counties for all purposes except roads to \$.80. Allowing 5% for discount for prompt payment of taxes and delinquencies, \$26,000,000 in values would produce \$197,600.00 in revenue. Values on the 1969 tax rolls amounted to \$73,404,850.00. Adding \$26,000,000.00 to these values would increase taxes assessed by 35.4%.

The alternate schedule, taking into consideration outstanding bonds payable from the 80¢, to provide for an approximate level amount each year, hospital bonds - principal \$1,500,000.00, interest \$642,525.00, total \$2,142,525.00; courthouse and park \$346,006.25 making a total of \$2,488,531.25. The above would require an increase in value for 1971 of \$21,000,000.00 and increase taxes assessed by 28.6%.

It was pointed out that this would be a county facility. For a bond to pass it would have to be voted on county-wide. Also it was pointed out that Seminole's hospital facilities were in better shape than Seagraves.

A great deal was said about the new surface property evaluation in the county. When this is completed in June or July then tax structures will be more clearly seen, the hospital board will be in better shape as to what to ask for and the commissioners court will be in better shape as to how to set up the bond indebtedness.

The meeting was harmonious, closing in two hours and ten minutes with the expectation of something needing to be done and some trying to be done.

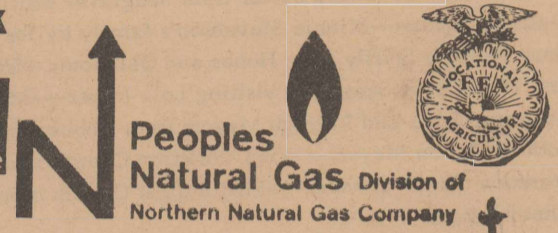

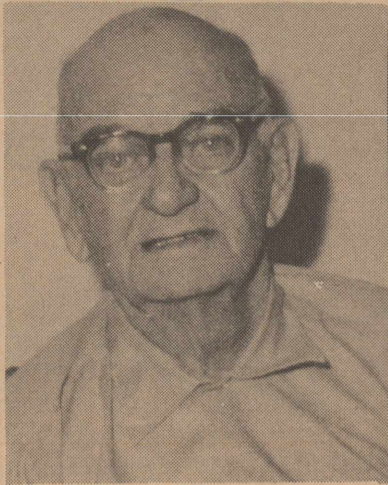

School Board Meets

The School Board met Monday night in a four hour meeting. The first thirty minutes of the meeting was taken up in the discussion of board policies. Next they discussed the kindergarten program which is required by state law beginning with the 1970-71 school year.

To qualify in the kindergarten program a child must be between the ages of 5 years, 5 months and 6 years old to attend. Also they must be from an economically deprived background. (Texas Education Agency interprets the law as children who do not speak or understand the English language or from families with less than \$3000 income.)

Frank Nix was present to discuss his contract in an executive session.

The board also discussed salaries for the 1970-71 school year and thereafter. It was pointed out that Seminole teachers are above the state salary schedule as follows: Above beginning state salary for BA - \$1383, Above maximum state salary for BA - \$1613, Above beginning state salary for MA - \$1143, and Above maximum state salary for MA - \$1289.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT:

Texas Public School Week is set for March 2-6. Open House for the Seminole Public Schools during Public Schools Week is March 3, 7:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. There will be no school on March 6 as the professional staff will be attending the District TSTA meeting in Odessa. Mrs. Betty Davis came back to work in the cafeteria Thursday, February 19. Most schools have been adopting a beginning date of August 24 for the 1970-71 school year which is the same as ours.

Scheduled activities: February 25 - Six-weeks tests for periods 1, 3, and 5; February 26 - Six-weeks tests for periods 2, 4, and 6; February 27 - Volleyball team plays at Pecos, Golf team plays at Andrews.

Our enrollment as of February 20, 1970 is 2119, compared to 2064 on February 21, 1969.


