Last week I discussed some of my favorite bridges and I guess the one that I loved the very best was one over Willis Creek on the way to Woodland Heights School from our house. It was a foot bridge. It seems to me that it was about 200 feet long (probably 40 feet). A big tree was cut down on either side of the creek and one strand of cable, probably 1/2 to 3/4 inch, was run from one stump to the other, making a complete circle. A board one foot wide with lappings underneath it formed the board path. Another cable was stretched immediately above this to a standing tree in line with the stump to make hand-rails. Heavy wire ran from top to bottom along the way to make the cable hold its correct level.

This bridge was used for many purposes. You hid nearby and waited for a sister or some other girl to get in the middle and you immediately jumped upon the bridge. It would dance and it would shake and the screaming took place.

It was about ten feet from the water and a good swimming hole. No greater fun could be had than to jump up and down on the top cables and dive into the water. I remember one time my brother, Leonard, and I were going to show some of the boys how to dive off in the water from that bouncing bridge after a big rain. **CON'T ON PAGE 2**

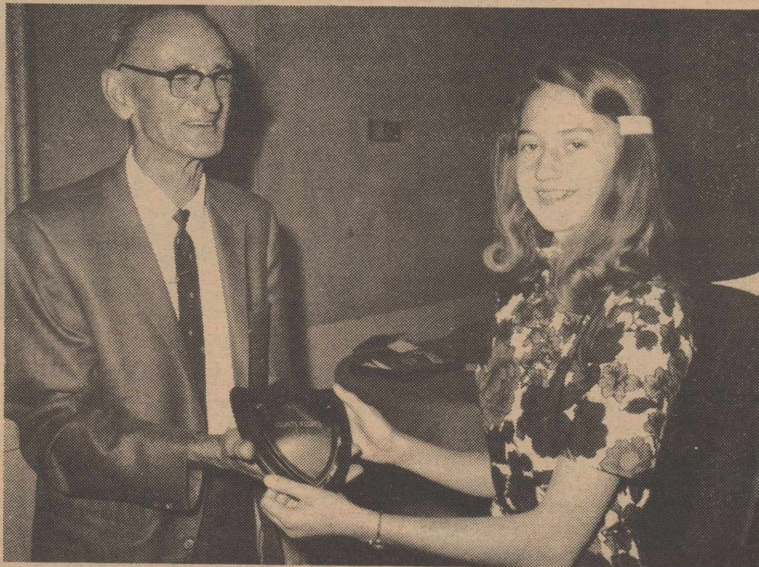

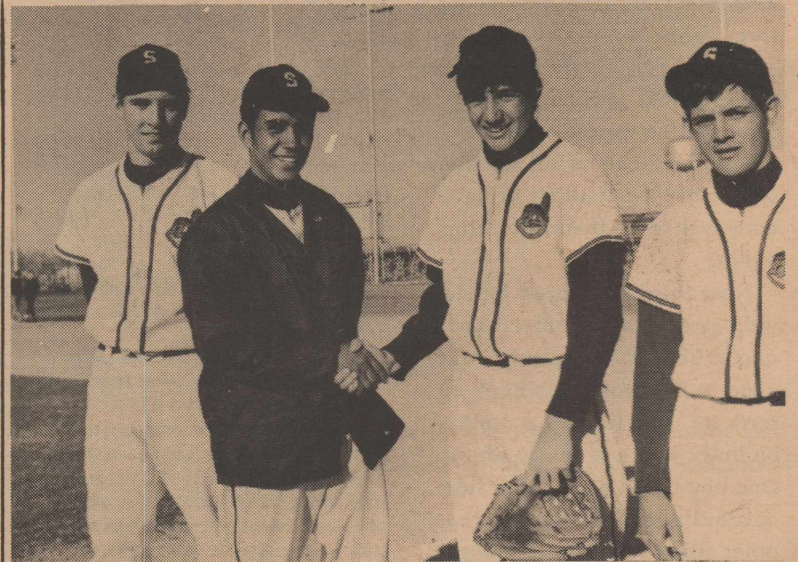

Teachers Given Raise

The Board of Education met Monday night and discussed at length salaries for administrators and teachers. The auxiliary employees (secretaries, custodians, bus drivers, and cafeteria workers) will be discussed at the regular board meeting on March 23.

The board gave raises to teachers amounting to \$1320 above the state salaries. This means that a beginning teacher with a BA degree will receive \$7320 for a 10 month contract; with a maximum of 12 years experience \$8620. A beginning teacher with a Masters degree will begin at \$1320 above the state schedule of \$6600 or \$7920; with 18 years maximum experience reaching \$9980.

It will take teachers that are concerned and teachers that have convictions. After all, we could do something they couldn't. We got that bridge going. We dived high, wide and handsome. We hit the water at the same time but we ran into trouble after that. Our swimming hole had washed full of black mud and silt. The water was only about three feet deep.

I'm here to testify that before nor since has anyone come up looking like we did. We received loud cheers but somehow or another we couldn't bring ourselves to do the same thing again.

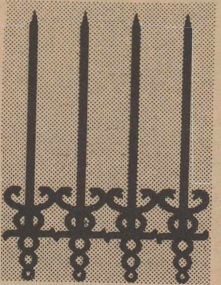
Near this bridge grew berries, wild grapes, sheep sorrell and cactus berries. The bridge was good to fish from, run back and forth on, and to cure a would-be bully who was really afraid. One boy could get on one side of a bully and another on the other side of that bully and that bridge could make him give it down.

And then there's the Weems story about the bridge. Mr. Weems weighed well over 300 pounds and he sat down and started pulling off his shoes so he could wade Willis Creek. "Why, Mr. Weems," he was told, "that bridge will hold you up, that bridge won't fall." "I know," he said, "I know it won't fall and I know I could get across it but if I ever got out in the middle of that bridge," he told a neighbor, "you'd make me vote for Calvin Coolidge. I'll wade that creek and vote for Al Smith." That bridge had personality.

The bridge is gone but fond memories remain.

BOLL WEEVIL MEETING SET FOR WEDNESDAY

NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN THE PAST TWO YEARS WITH REGARDS TO THE MOVEMENT OF THE BOLL WEEVIL HAVE BROUGHT CONCERN TO SOUTHERN COUNTIES ON THE TEXAS SOUTH PLAINS, AND PLANS ARE BEING MADE THIS YEAR TO KEEP A CLOSE WATCH IN THIS AREA FOR WEEVIL INFESTATIONS AND MIGRATIONS.

IN ORDER TO DISCUSS THESE NEW DEVELOPMENTS AND PLANS AS WELL AS THE PROGRESS OF THE HIGH PLAINS DIAPAUSE BOLL WEEVIL CONTROL PROGRAM, A MEETING WILL BE HELD IN THE COUNTY COURTHOUSE AT SEMINOLE ON WEDNESDAY, MARCH 25, AT 1:30 P.M., ANNOUNCES GAINES COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT CALVIN HOLCOMB.

COMPETENT PERSONNEL FROM VARIOUS AGENCIES WILL BE ON HAND TO DISCUSS THE DIAPAUSE CONTROL PROGRAM WHICH HAS BEEN SUCCESSFUL IN CONTAINING THE MOVEMENT OF BOLL WEEVILS ON THE TEXAS HIGH PLAINS, SAYS HOLCOMB. THESE WILL INCLUDE DR. DON RUMMEL, AREA ENTOMOLOGIST WITH TEXAS AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE, ED DEAN, DIRECTOR OF FIELD SERVICES, PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC., A REPRESENTATIVE OF THE U.S.D.A. PLANT PROTECTION DIVISION, AND OTHERS.

THERE ARE MANY FAVORABLE HIBERNATION SITES FOR THE BOLL WEEVIL IN GAINES AND SURROUNDING COUNTIES, POINTS OUT HOLCOMB. ONCE THE WEEVIL GAINS A FOOTHOLD, A SERIOUS PROBLEM WILL BE POSED TO THE COTTON CROP IN THIS AREA AS WELL AS TO THE NORTH. COUNTIES IN EASTERN NEW MEXICO ALSO OFFER GOOD HIBERNATION QUARTERS, AND COTTON IN THIS AREA WILL ALSO BE THREATENED BY THE INSECT PEST.

HOLCOMB URGES ALL COTTON PRODUCERS AND OTHER INTERESTED INDIVIDUALS IN GAINES AND NEIGHBORING COUNTIES TO MAKE PLANS TO ATTEND THIS IMPORTANT MEETING. THE MOVEMENT OF THE BOLL WEEVIL MUST BE STOPPED, AND THE ONLY WAY TO ACCOMPLISH THIS IS BY ACTING ON A UNITED FRONT.

HOW DISABLED DO YOU HAVE TO BE IN ORDER TO RECEIVE MONTHLY SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS? THIS IS A QUESTION THAT IS ASKED MANY TIMES EACH DAY AT THE SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE.

UNDER THE SOCIAL SECURITY LAW A PERSON IS CONSIDERED DISABLED IF HE HAS A PHYSICAL OR MENTAL CONDITION WHICH IS SO SEVERE THAT: (1) IT PREVENTS HIM FROM DOING A SUBSTANTIAL AMOUNT OF GAINFUL WORK, AND (2) IT

CAN BE EXPECTED TO LAST AT LEAST 12 MONTHS.

DISABILITY MAY BE SHOWN BY CLINICAL REPORTS FROM YOUR FAMILY DOCTOR AND REPORTS FROM OTHERS WHO HAVE TREATED OR EXAMINED YOU. IN ADDITION TO MEDICAL EVIDENCE, YOUR AGE, EDUCATION, TRAINING, AND WORK EXPERIENCE ARE TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION.

IF YOU OR SOMEONE IN YOUR FAMILY CANNOT WORK BECAUSE OF A DISABLING CONDITION, CHECK WITH THE SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE IN ODESSA, TEXAS OR GET IN TOUCH WITH ME ON ONE OF MY REGULAR VISITS, AT THE GAINES COUNTY COURTHOUSE.

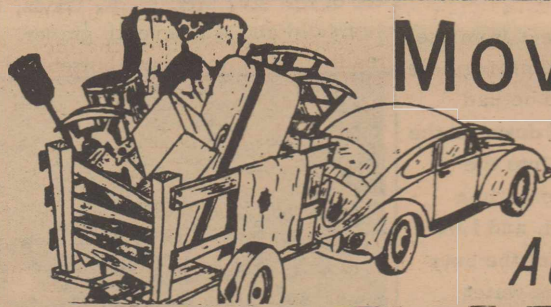

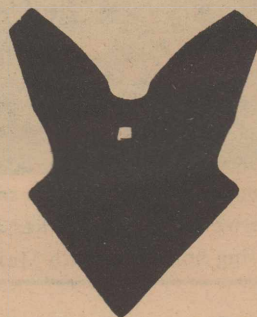
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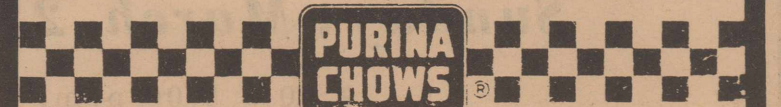

Calvin Smith has just come out of the hospital. We hope he will be O.K.

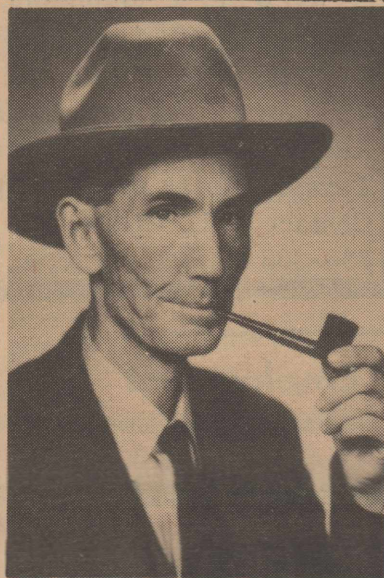
Brother Roberts had a bunch of young people. They have their fellowship at the parsonage at the church.

Results**

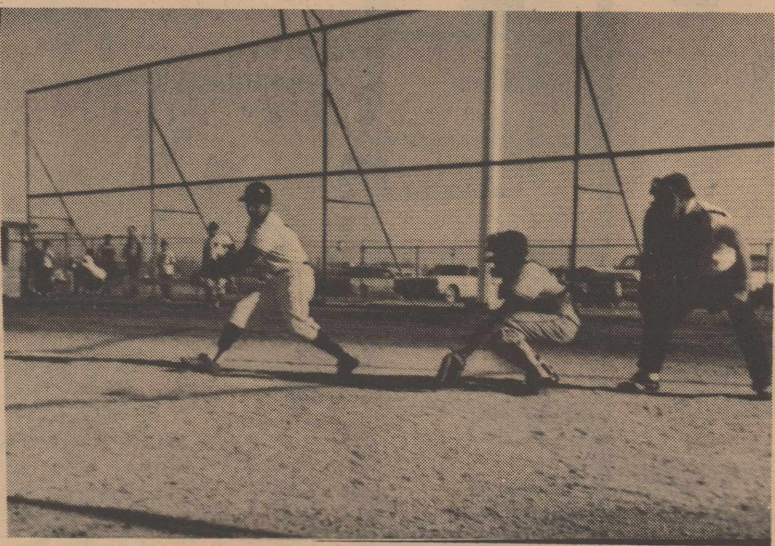

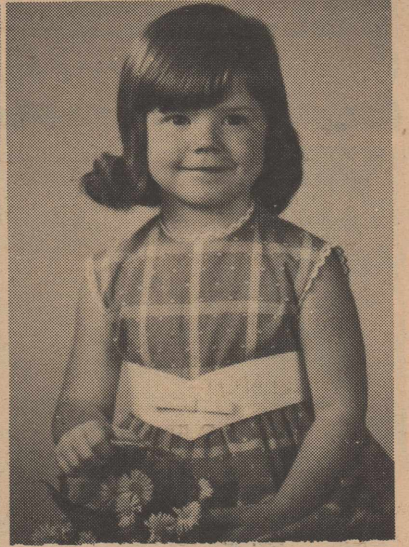
Recently married, Caffey also established the single season scoring record by totaling 70 points last fall. Caffey scored ten touchdowns and five two-point conversions on pass receptions.

RESULTS OF THE TESTS WILL BE READ ON MONDAY AND TUESDAY AND PARENTS WILL BE NOTIFIED OF THE OUTCOME OF THEIR CHILD'S TEST.

THE HEAF IS A PAINLESS SKIN INJECTION PROCEDURE USED IN MASS SCREENING FOR TUBERCULOSIS. A

OFFICIALS EMPHASIZED THAT A POSITIVE REACTION DOES NOT MEAN THAT THE CHILD HAS TUBERCULOSIS, BUT IT DOES INDICATE THE NEED FOR ADDITIONAL EXAMINATION.

ONLY CHILDREN WHO HAVE RETURNED A SIGNED PARENTAL PERMISSION SLIP WILL BE GIVEN THE TEST.

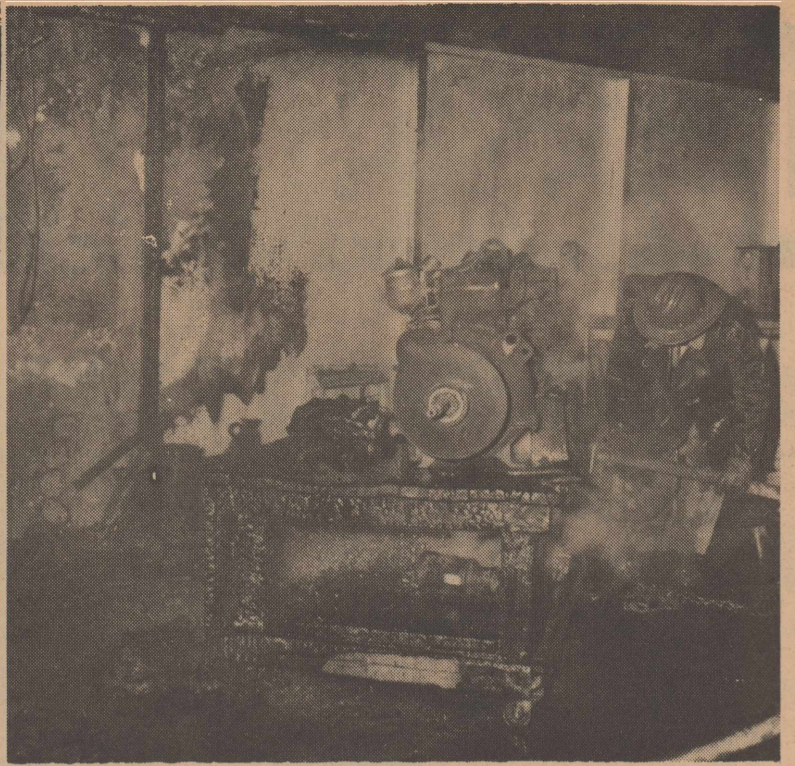
