From Washington

The Air Force has begun preparation of approximately 300 proficiency tests for use in the 42 fields of the Airman Career Program. Results of these tests will be one of the factors considered in establishing qualification for promotion under the Career Program.

Air National Guard units have been instructed to use the approved code for filing clearance messages with USAF Military Flight Service Centers at the departure point in VIP flights. The code is as follows: VIP Fox—accord honors; VIP Love—Visit informal, accord no honors; VIP X-ray—accord no honors, provide transportation only; VIP Sugar—accord no honors, provide servicing only.

Determination of dependency status for payment of quarters allowance to Army personnel will be made by local accountable disbursing officers except in cases involving "loco parentis," the legal status of a person who stands in the place of a parent to another person; and cases involving adopted children when no certified court adoption papers exist. Cases involving these exceptions must be forwarded through regular finance channels to the U. S. Comptroller General for decision.

The Secretary of the Navy has approved placement of permanent commissioned warrant and warrant officers in higher warrant officer pay grades, effective in most cases as of last February 16. Officers now serving temporarily in grades of ensign and above, however, may not be paid on the basis of their warrant pay grade assignment until termination of their temporary status. 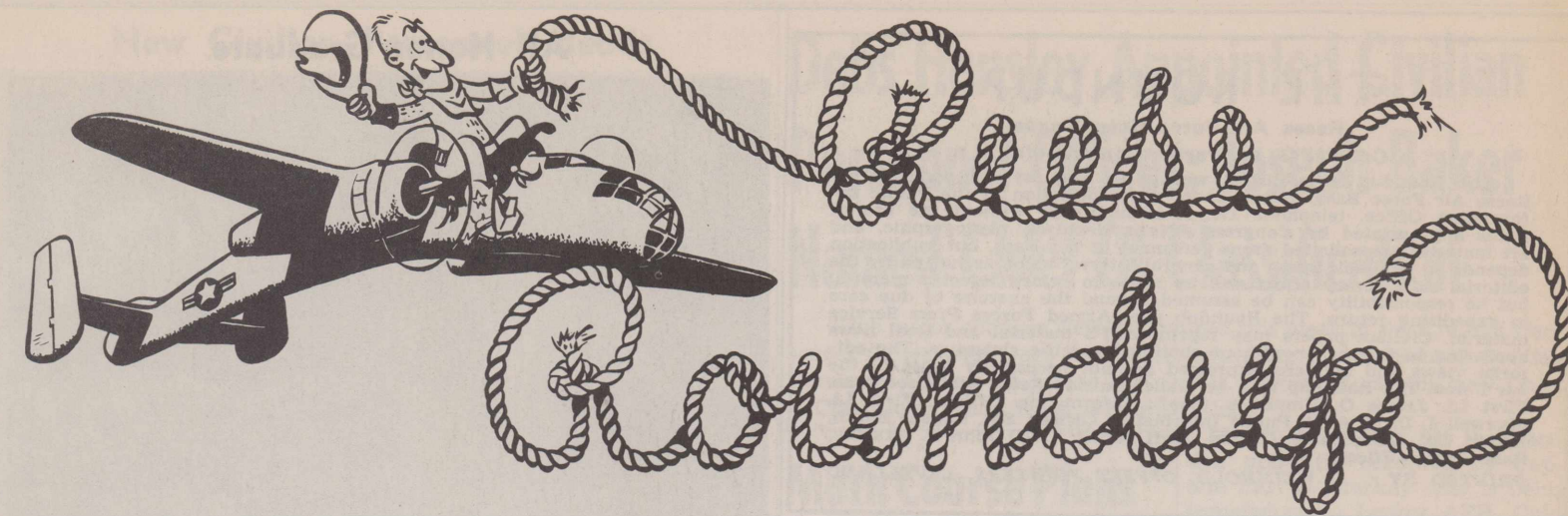
The press cards, issued by Headquarters, ATRC, through its bases to news media representatives are designed to permit easy and rapid entrance of press representatives at all ATRC bases. The cards are standard and those issued at one base are honored throughout the command.

Although the idea of "press identification" cards is not new ATRC desired a standardized card, renewable each year, that would be recognizable to military personnel. The card would receive its utmost utilization when such incidents as off-base or on-base airplane crashes occur. At such times, the cards would readily identify the bearer as a bona-fide news representative and he could quickly gain entrance to the scene.

## Thrift Shop Holds Big Monthly Sale

The Thrift Shop will hold its first big monthly sale Monday, 1 May, in its new location in the rear of the Post Office Bldg. T-11.

Articles for sale range from golf clubs and tennis rackets to clothing and household articles, such as tables, stoves, and refrigerators.

According to Thrift Shop policy, an inventory of all merchandise is taken at the end of each month and those articles which haven't been sold within the first 30 days are reduced 5 per cent each month.

For the convenience of the customer a lay-away plan may be used. A 20 per cent down payment is required, with the remainder being paid within four months. Also, the Thrift Shop offers free pick-up and delivery service for all large articles.

If you have anything you'd like to sell, the Thrift Shop will gladly sell it for you on a 10 per cent commission basis. Commission profits go into a Welfare Fund, which is jointly sponsored by the Women's Club and the NCO Ladies' Auxiliary. Members of these clubs donate their time to operate the

## Promotion To Top Four Grades Will Be On Quota Basis

Monthly quotas released to the major commands will be the basis for promotion of airmen to the top four enlisted grades starting with the month of May.

The new quota plan is similar to that adopted recently to control the promotion of officers.

To facilitate placing the quota promotion plan in operation, USAF Headquarters has instructed major commands to stop promotions to the top four grades until the release of the May quotas.

Airmen in the lower three grades are not affected by the quota system at the present time.

According to the Air Force announcement, budgetary restrictions and other personnel considerations were the reasons for adopting the new promotion plan.

The new quota system follows close on the release of Air Force Regulation 39-30 replacing AR 615-5, 23 September 1946, which provides for promotion to the top four grades on a best qualified basis, with due regard for seniority, efficiency and time-in-grade.

## Chilean President Flies Here Sunday

Gabriel Gonzales Videla, president of the Republic of Chile, will land at Reese Air Force Base from Houston, Tex., on Sunday to inspect oil installations and refining processes at Levelland and agricultural irrigation developments in the Lubbock area.

An honor guard, the Aviation Cadet Corps and the 514th Air Force Band will render full military honors to the Chilean president. The national anthems of Chile and the United States will be played and the 514th Air Force Band will give a short concert.

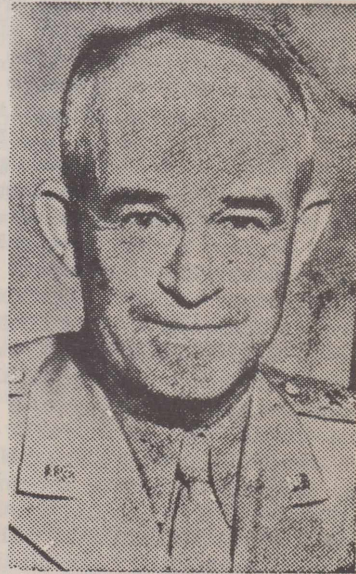
The President's visit to the various oil operations of this area is due to the interest aroused by George P. Livermore, Lubbock and California oil operator, who drilled a number of wells for the Chilean government.

Chile lies on the west coast of South America and the capital city is Santiago. It is the second largest producer of copper in the world and her provinces of Atacama and Coquimbo have enormous iron deposits. Agriculture is also an important industry.

President Videla and his party, which will include his wife, Senora Videla and their daughter, Sra Silvia Gonzales de Campos, will return to Reese on Monday to be flown to New Orleans.

At 1000 hours on the 22nd there will be a parade consisting of Reese airmen, officers, and the 514th AF Band; 132nd Field Artillery Battalion of the National Guard; Naval Reserve, Marine Color Guard, Junior and Senior High School bands and various Lubbock veterans organizations.

In addition to participating in the parade Reese will send a group

of 18 T-6's and 12 B-25's on an aerial tour of Lubbock and towns of the surrounding area. Saturday, 20 May, will be the date for the first fly-over.

At the graduation ceremony 126 student representatives from the Army, Air Force and Navy received graduation certificates from Colonel William H. Maglin, school commandant.

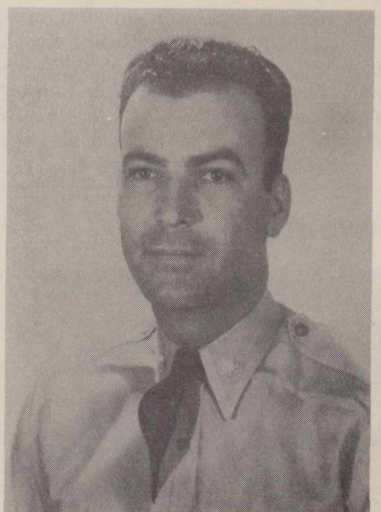

## "YOUR CHAPEL"

'Honor Thy Father and Mother'

One of the most important of the Ten Commandments to all of us is the Fourth. We notice that immediately after God has set down the three laws that govern our relations with Him, our Creator, He begins by defining our relations with our neighbors. First among our neighbors are our parents. They are responsible for our very existence, having acted as co-creators with the Lord in bringing us into existence. Normal parents act as our real ties with this life for a long period of years. They literally feed and clothe and shelter us for quite some time. They are the source of our first education, the primary moulding of our character.

Every law has a negative and a positive aspect. It prohibits something and command something. In this case it seems to prohibit disobedience in all things lawful, disrespect in all things and contemptible conduct. It commands that we love, honor and obey our parents. We must love and honor them at all times. Then we must obey them in affairs that do not involve offense against God until we have left the household or are freed by reaching an adult age.

While the Commandment seems to primarily place the burden on the children it certainly does demand something of the parents. That is what we are primarily interested in here. Parents must realize that they have been given children with strings attached. Unlike a litter of puppies, the mother and father of human children have strong, lasting responsibilities toward their young. The little puppies are soon able to make their own way. The children of human parents look to their parents for a long time. Animals can expect little from their parents but food and some physical protection, but children instinctively look to them for character molding and guidance. When a child comes crying to its mother after a brush with another child it is looking for more than physical comfort. At that time the parent has an excellent opportunity and a responsibility to develop personality and character. The parent who sympathizes and consoles whether the child is in the right or wrong is sadly neglecting duty. There the parent is laying the groundwork for a weak, unstable character which may not show itself for many years.

Recognition of the responsibility is the important thing for parents. Most mothers and fathers are equipped to do the job as long as they realize the need of doing it. We could write dozens of essays on the proper way to rear children and be wrong in all of them. One thing does come to mind that might be helpful. A few

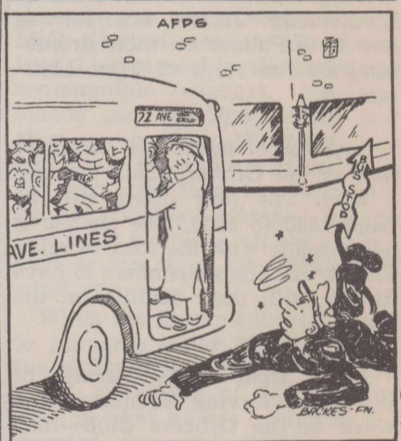
