From Washington

The Army has authorized cash awards for enlisted personnel of the European Command, up to \$10, for time-saving and labor-saving suggestions. The awards will be paid from welfare funds.

The Defense Department has advised Service writers desiring to write articles or books for personal profit that policy governing access to classified military and technical information gives no preference to military personnel over civilian writers.

A full length film of "Operation Haylift," Armed Forces rescue operations in the western blizzards of 1948-49, will be exhibited to the public in the near future. The Air Force participated in preparation of the picture.

New joint post exchange regulations issued by the Army and Air Force stipulate personnel eligible to make exchange purchases as follows: Regular members of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Public Health Service, and members of Reserve components of

these branches on active duty in excess of 72 hours, and dependents of each category. Others authorized are; retired Regular members of the Uniformed Services, non-Regular members of the Army and Air Force retired for disability; unmarried widows of Regular members of the Uniformed Services, or members of Reserve components who died on active duty; unmarried widows of Regular retired personnel and of Reserve component members retired for disability. Limited purchase privileges may be extended to other categories of military and civilian personnel or dependents under specified conditions.

The first 17 women doctors to complete their medical internships under the Navy civilian intern training program have been ordered to duty this month in hospitals and dispensaries in the U.S. for 24 months of active duty.

Members of the Army Nurse Corps and Women's Medical Specialist Corps may purchase and wear the new white uniform immediately. Wearing of the white uniform will be mandatory on or about July 1, 1951, when it is expected to be available from the Quartermaster Corps.

Promotions Soon For Eighteen RAFB Regular Officers

President Truman recently approved the selection of 2294 regular Air Force first lieutenants for permanent promotion to captain and eighteen of this number are officers stationed at Reese.

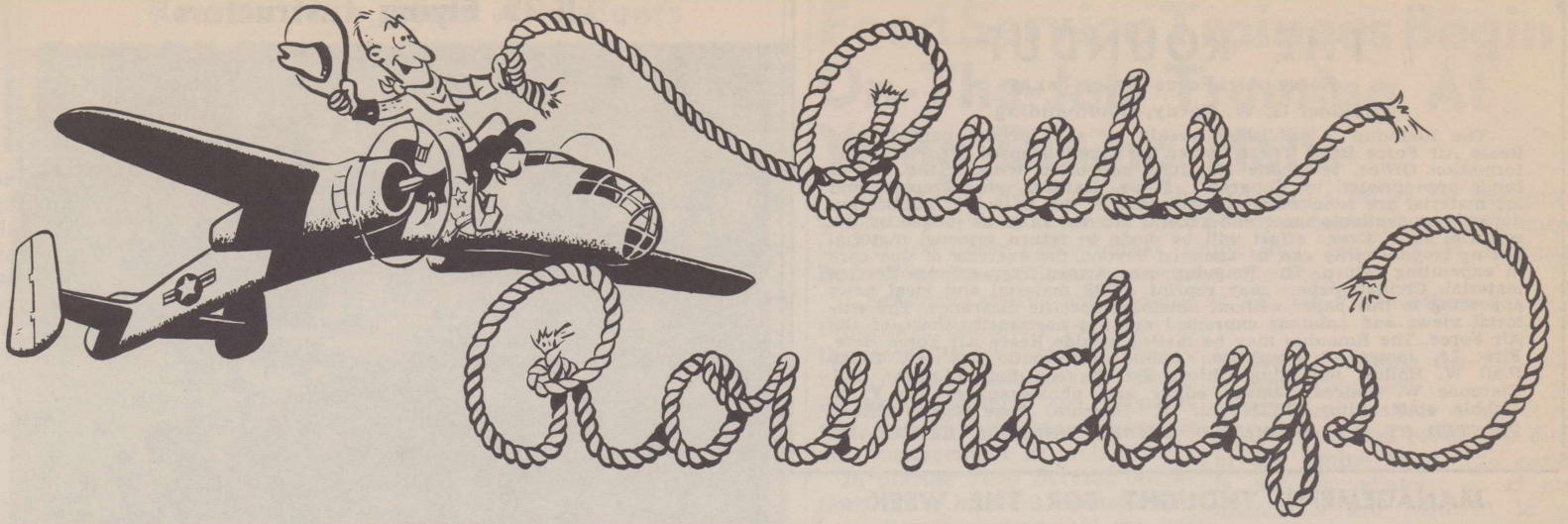
Upon their confirmation by the Senate 21 officers will be promoted immediately and the remainder will be advanced as they complete the required seven years of promotion list service.

The Air Force is now in the process of convening other selection boards this month to consider officers for permanent promotion to colonel and general officer rank. Similar boards will meet in September and November to consider for promotion of lieutenant colonel and major, respectively.

The last selections for promotion to permanent captain resulted in the promotion of 2,071 officers.

The 18 officers selected for promotion include captains, Gordon L. Brownlee, Jr., Marvin R. Hall, Donald F. Karschner, Lawrence E. Madsen, Ramon R. Melton, William F. Osborne, and James E. Sullivan.

Local Boy Scouts Convene Here Before Going To World Jamboree

Reese Air Force Base will be host to seventy-nine Scouts and nine supervisors on 21, 22, and 23 June. This group of Scouts plans to use the base as a staging area prior to their departure for the National Scout Jamboree at Valley Forge, Pa.

The Scouts will use the area adjacent to the Base Gym as a camp-site and will eat in the mess hall as did those who attended the big Explorer Rendezvous held here on 24 and 25 of March.

Railway cars will be brought into the south end of the base in order that they may load their baggage and equipment directly from their encampment and proceed without delay to the Boy Scout Jamboree.

This year's jamboree is dedicated to "Strengthening the Arm of Liberty," deepening the scout's patriotism and increasing his respect for those ideals which this country fought for and won in the War of Independence.

They will join with forty thousand scouts from the United States and foreign countries who will gather at Valley Forge to reenact the trials and tribulations of General George Washington and the Army of Independence in that bleak winter of 1777-78 when the cause of liberty seemed to hang in the balance.

While at Valley Forge they will dedicate themselves anew to the cause and principles for which General Washington and his soldiers fought and which gave them the strength to carry on to victory under seemingly insurmountable odds.

The jamboree will offer them the opportunity to see many of the "Shrines of Freedom" at Valley Forge and in and around Philadelphia.

Prisoners Escape From Stockade On Base, Sunday

Two RAFB prisoners, Francis M. Trier, 18 of Milwaukee, Wisconsin and Uller Palmer, 19, of Atlanta, Georgia, escaped from the base guardhouse sometime Sunday night, 11 June. The break was discovered by PFC Hival Forrester, a turnkey, who came on duty at midnight.

Trier was recaptured Tuesday night in a rooming house in Lubbock after an investigation showed it to be the residence of his wife. He gave up without a struggle to the police officers who came to the room in which he was hiding.

Palmer turned himself in to Air Police authorities on the base at 1945 hours on Wednesday night after getting hungry and tired. He had been hiding under the Wing Dining Hall.

The general alarm was sounded as soon as the break was discovered and the search for the escapees was begun. The state police, Lubbock county police, and the police officials in the areas immediately surrounding the base were notified of the escape.

This was the second escape for Trier and the first one for Palmer. Trier broke out of the guard-

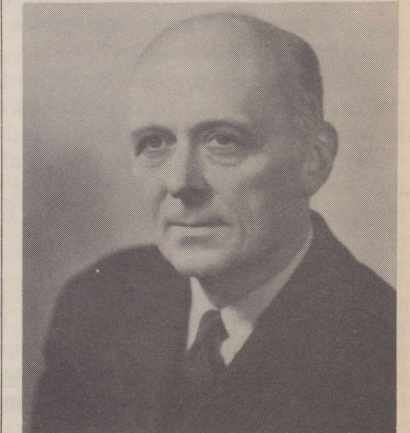

PLEASE FORGIVE

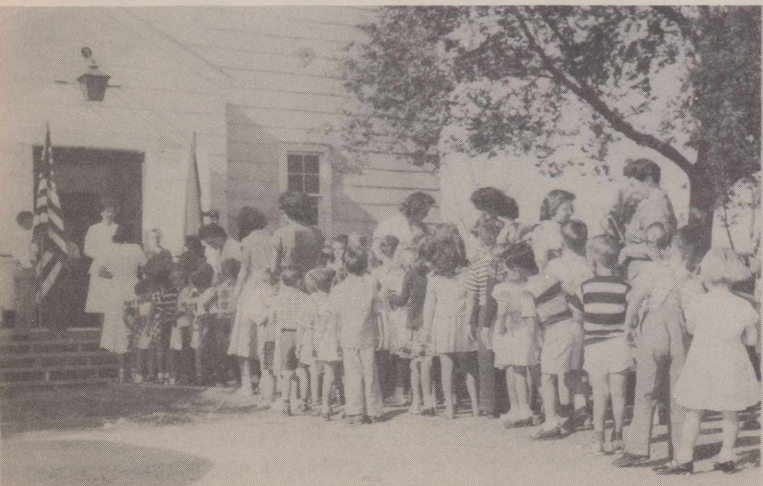

Chapel Bible School Has Commencement

Diplomas will be awarded to Protestant Vacation Bible school students tonight at 1930 hours in the base chapel.

"All students who attended over fifty per cent of the time will receive a diploma at commencement exercises," stated Protestant Chaplain Jared A. Walker.

The Bible school started the fifth of June and has 90 students in average daily attendance with an enrollment of over 100. School lasts from 0830 to 1100 hours.

The youngsters form a line behind the Christian and American flags and parade into the Chapel, where opening exercises are conducted. There they learn to sing hymns, salute the flags and the bible, and to recite the school motto and school pledge.

Then the actual teaching is done in the chapel annex, where they're taught bible and patriotic songs bible stories, handicraft, how to pray, and also how to play during recess.

The students, ranging from four to sixteen years, are both officers and enlisted men's children. Most of them live on the base but those living off the base in town and at Modern Manors are provided with school bus transportation.

They are divided into four age groups: beginners, 4-6; primaries, 6-8; juniors, 8-11; and intermediaries, 11-16.

Mrs. B. D. Shrum, wife of M/Sgt. Shrum, is principal. She also teaches in the intermediate department. Mrs. G. S. Sprague instructs the juniors. T/Sgt. W. H. Shanks, Chaplains assistant, teaches the boys in the two classes woodwork, such as making

book ends, bird houses, and flower boxes.

Instructors in the Primary division are Mrs. L. A. Pilgreen, supervisor; Mrs. L. C. Smith; Mrs. T. H. Gingles; Mrs. J.E. Ike; Mrs. O. D. Cates and Mrs. J.H. Ellis. Miss Rosemary Sprague is singing director for the primary group.

Beginners' instructors are Mrs. Leo Hess, supervisor; Mrs. Tom E. Toms; Mrs. Grady Williams; Mrs. Reuben Yarri; Miss Virginia Yarri; and Miss Maggie Tuten.

Mrs. W. H. Shanks is in charge of the nursery for little children under four.

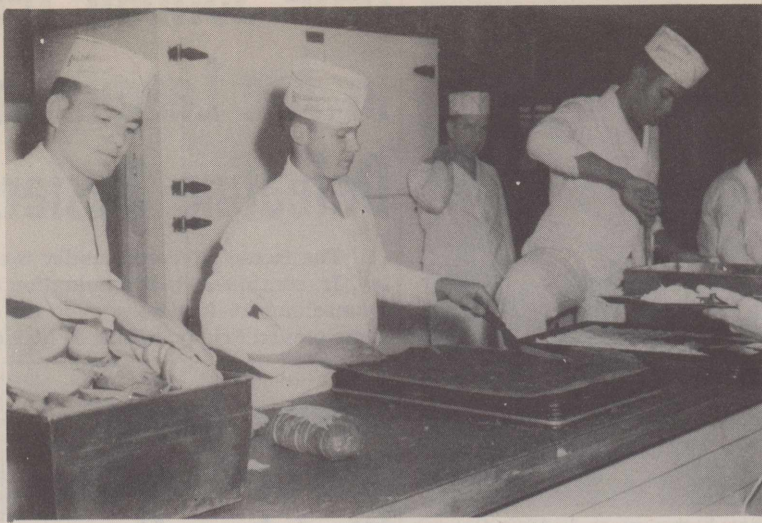

AF Weather Balloon Takes Long Trip

Holloman AFB, N. M. (AFPS) — A 20-foot plastic weather balloon, launched from this Air Force Base, landed two days later in Myrdal, Norway, 7,000 miles away.

It is estimated the balloon traveled between 120 and 160 miles an hour and at an altitude of 40,000 feet.

Food Service Trainees Begin On-The-Job Training At Wing Dining Halls

"Operation New Look" as the program is called, for implementation of the Food Service Career Field, is being placed into operation at the Reese Consolidated Dining Hall, 1st Lt. A. G. Blakeslee, Reese Food Service Supervisor, stated this week.

Extensive studies and analysis of AF operating methods for peace

time have definitely indicated in their conclusions that food service needed modernization, not simply in menu planning and preparation, but in equipment manning and management as well.

In placing Food Service operations on a business management basis it was evident that the Air Force had outgrown the system whereby dining halls were operated as a community project. In the modern Air Force there is no more logic or justification for supplying manpower for this service on a detail or punitive basis than there would be in the operation of maintenance shops, supply rooms, or administration sections, by cooks.

Therefore, "Operation New Look" is concerned in part with providing sufficient numbers of personnel to efficiently operate dining halls.

Lieutenant Blakeslee stated that although at the present time there are not enough food service trainees to perform all the jobs in the dining hall, squadrons on the base were screening their organizations for volunteers and

personnel suitable for the duties of mess attendant.

Will food service trainees eliminate squadron rosters for duties at the dining hall? The answer is, not immediately, as 45 mess attendants are required to operate the dining hall, working on a day on and a day off basis. Until such time as enough personnel are available, the squadrons will continue to furnish men for the dining hall.

The Food Service Career Field was the first career field placed in operation by the Air Force and provisions were made to advance personnel through the grades to that of CWO.

The Food Service program here will give the airmen six months of training as cook's helpers and upon completion of this training qualified airmen will be sent to school to study the various phases of the Food Service field such as cooking, baking, or meat cutting.

As part of the training of food service men, those permanently assigned to the dining hall are learning all of the duties involved in feeding a large group of personnel on a job rotation basis. Mess attendants work one day and are off for one day.

Ten men, directly out of basic training, are now at food service schools, Lieutenant Blakeslee stated. When they graduate they will report to the Food Service Squadron here. Eventually the Food Service Squadron will handle the complete operation of the Wing Dining Hall and the need for the old-fashioned kitchen police will be eliminated.

In an interview, Private Horace Rutland and Private First Class Robert Austin, volunteers for food service training, stated that they had chosen the Food Service field because it offered opportunities for useful, practical training and advancement in grade.

As an aid in their training, Air Installations has been making a survey to determine methods of simplifying the kitchen arrangement to aid in the more efficient preparation of food. It is planned to place the tray and utensil washing equipment in a separate room and to utilize the additional space for streamlining the kitchen.

The renovation of the dining hall is progressing. The walls of the West wing have been covered and are now being painted. The coffee urns have been moved to make them more accessible. Base Supply was recently notified that a shipment of 40 four man tables was on the way and they will be installed in the wing as soon as the renovation is completed.

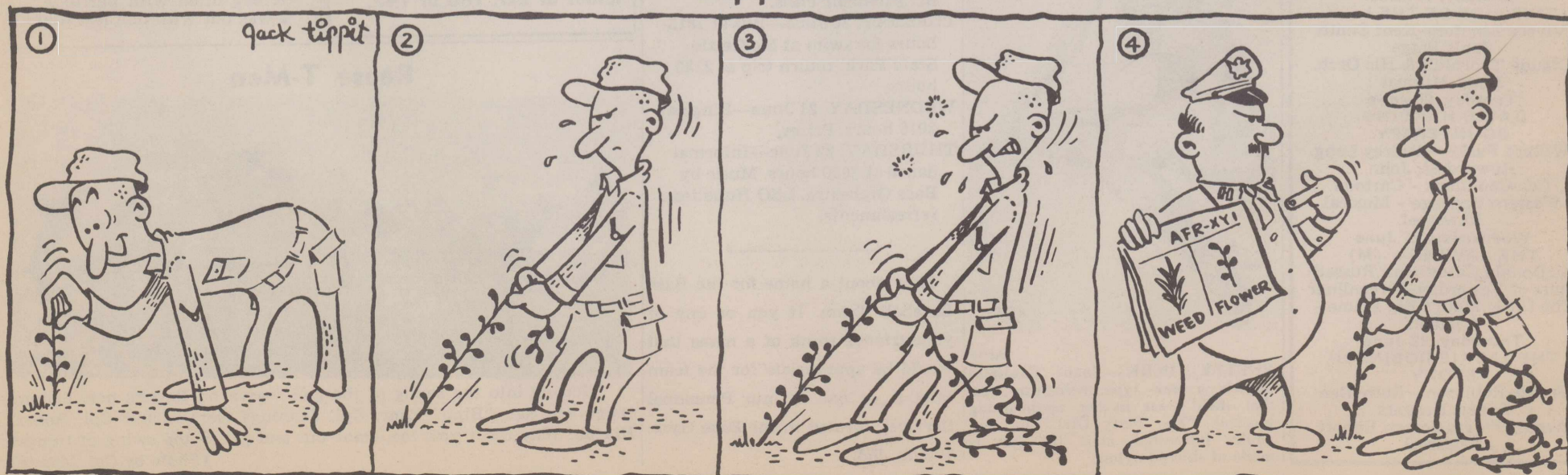
Bill arrived at Reese 19 May. He requested and got a transfer here from Bolling AFB to be with his brother. He works as a butcher for Food Service.

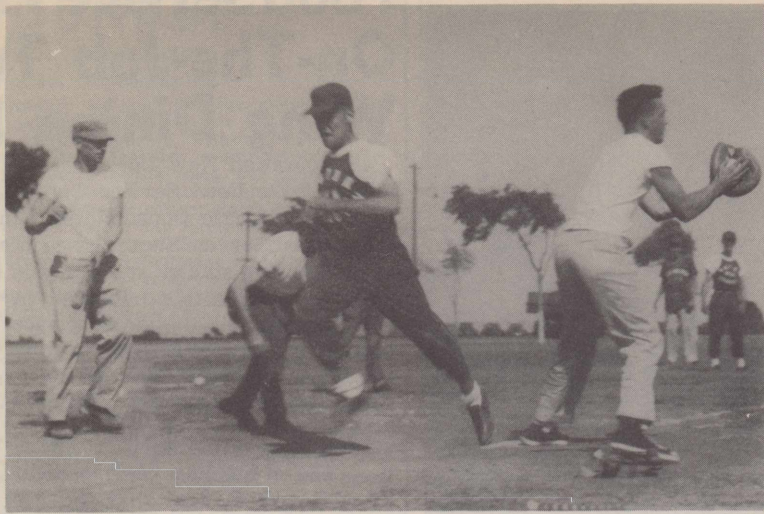

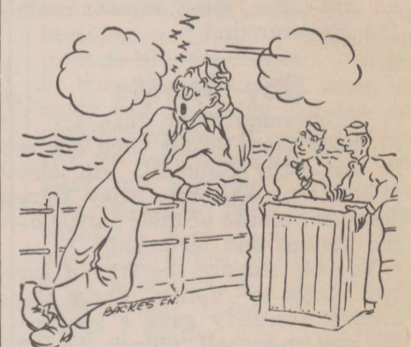
